

> Launder Mopheads Often Soiled mopheads can be laundered in hot water with a detergent. Never put a dust mop away dirty. To treat the floor mop, so it will pick up dust follow this recipe. Use one pint of boiling water and one-fourth cup lemon oil furniture polish into boiling water. Immerse the clean mop in it and let it absorb as much liquid as it will. Wring it as dry as possible and let it hang until thoroughly dry.

> When the water evaporates there will be enough oil to do a good job of dusting.
