Abilene Detective Capt. W. B. McDonald, Lt. W. E. Clift and a federal officer arrested a man in downtown Abilene as he steppe d from a taxi cab about 8:30 a. m. During questioning at police headquarters the man gave his address as Mesa, Ariz.

He was booked for vagrancy and held only for investigation. Checks with Austin and Phoenix revealed that he had no former police record in Texas or Arizona. Officers said he had been in Abilene about three days.

"We're called on to do something like this (broadcasting the alert) dozens of times a year," Capt. McDonald said. "We have to act on every tip. If we ignored one we'd be sure to miss a real case, so we can't take a

THE HISTORY OF LIBERTY.

"Liberty has never come from the government ... The history of liberty is the history of limitations of governmental power, not the increase of it."

That was said more than 40 years ago by one of the greatest student of government who ever sat in the White House — Woodrow Wilson. And the warning he issued is a hundred times more important and timely now than it was then.

The overriding lesson that modern history teaches is that when we give government virtually unlimited power, freedom dies - and oppression and tyranny take its place.

FROM ENVELOPES TO ELECTRICITY.

For many years the government has made a business of printing return addresses on stamped envelopes. It knocks thousands upon thousands of local printing establishments and country newspapers out of hundreds of thousands and probably millions of dollars worth of business annually. This deprives government of taxes which would be paid on the

business were it carried on by private citizens.

There is nothing the local printer can do about it unless he can get the law changed. This is also a good example of how once government is established in business, its hold can seldom be broken.

While printing return addresses on envelopes might be called a matter of small concern in the field of business, it is the principle involved that should interest everyone. From printing envelopes government has gone into many lines of business, most outstanding of which has been a 20-year crusade to create a federal electric power monopoly. Already some 20 per cent of the nation's power production is included in such a program. A large part of it is wholly tax-exempt. Some of it contributes comparatively small amounts to help with local taxes — it escapes all federal taxes.

From printing envelopes to half billion and billion dollar tax-exempt federal projects is quite a step, but the principle involved so far as putting private citizens out of business is the same. It is only another step for the government to sell groceries, automobiles, or to print newspapers "at cost," etc. It is all in the socialistic picture as it gains headway.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION.



EASTLAND, November 25 .-According to government authority come Dec. 15, peanut growers will have the chance to approve marketing quotas on their commodity for the next three

If two-thirds of those eligible vote for the referendum quotas will be in effect for the 1954, '55 and '56 crops of peanuts. Should more than one-third oppose, quotas would not be in effect for the 1954 crop. However, in this event, another referendum would be held in the fall of 1954 for the following three crop years.
