

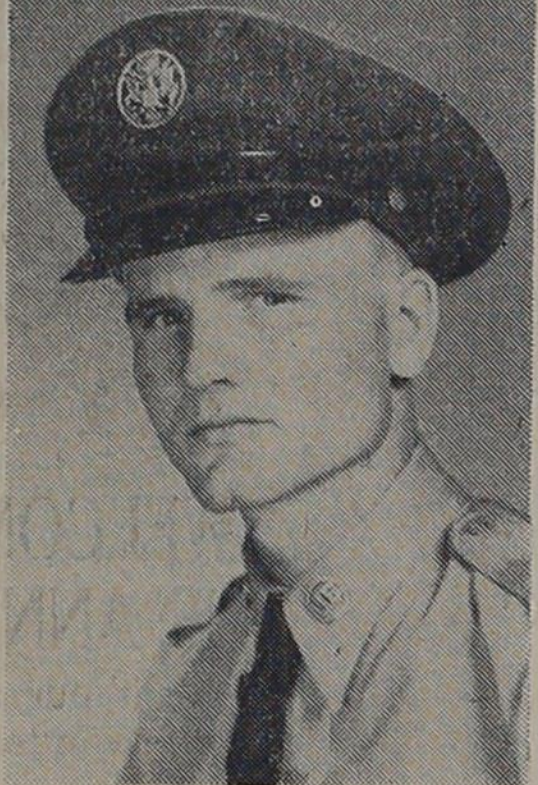
AREA OIL NEWS

EASTLAND, September 29.— Production was on pump from an open hole at 1,090-1,127 feet. Location of the new producer is three miles northwest of Rising Star in Section 26, Block 2. Breeding & Tyler of Rising Star also announced locations of the No. 2 and No. 3 G. A. Dunn. No. 2 will be put down 150 feet from north and 480 feet from west lines of Section 26, Block 2, ETRR Survey. No. 3 will be 480 feet from north and 150 feet from west lines of Section 26. Both are slated for 1,200 feet. A new completion and two locations for additional stabs in the Rising Star area of Eastland County were announced this morning.

Breeding & Tyler of Rising Star have completed their No. 1 G. A. Dunn for a daily gauge of 73.12 barrels of 40 gravity oil and 25 per cent water. Another new location for Eastland County highlighted area oil news Saturday morning. Jack Hailey of Cisco announced staking of his No. 6 R. A. Some two and one-half miles northwest of Rising Star. The new venture is scheduled for a depth of 1,995-feet. Location is 150 feet from north and east lines of Section 25, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

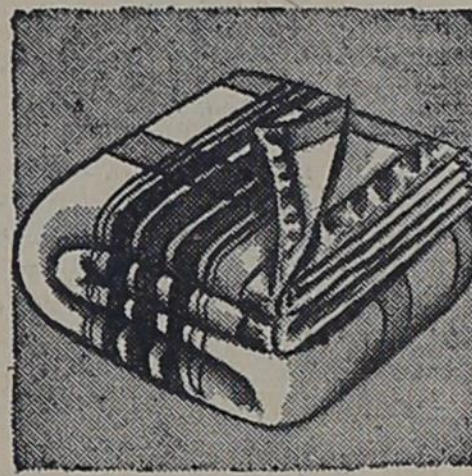
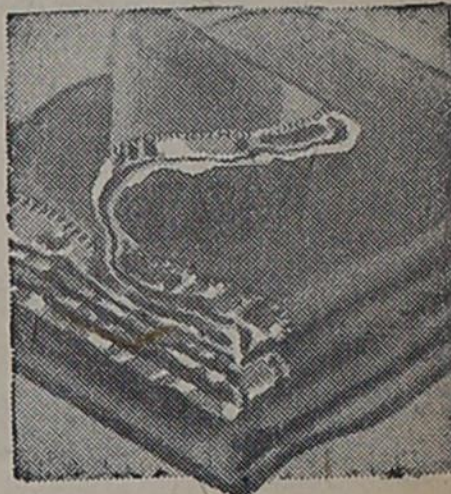

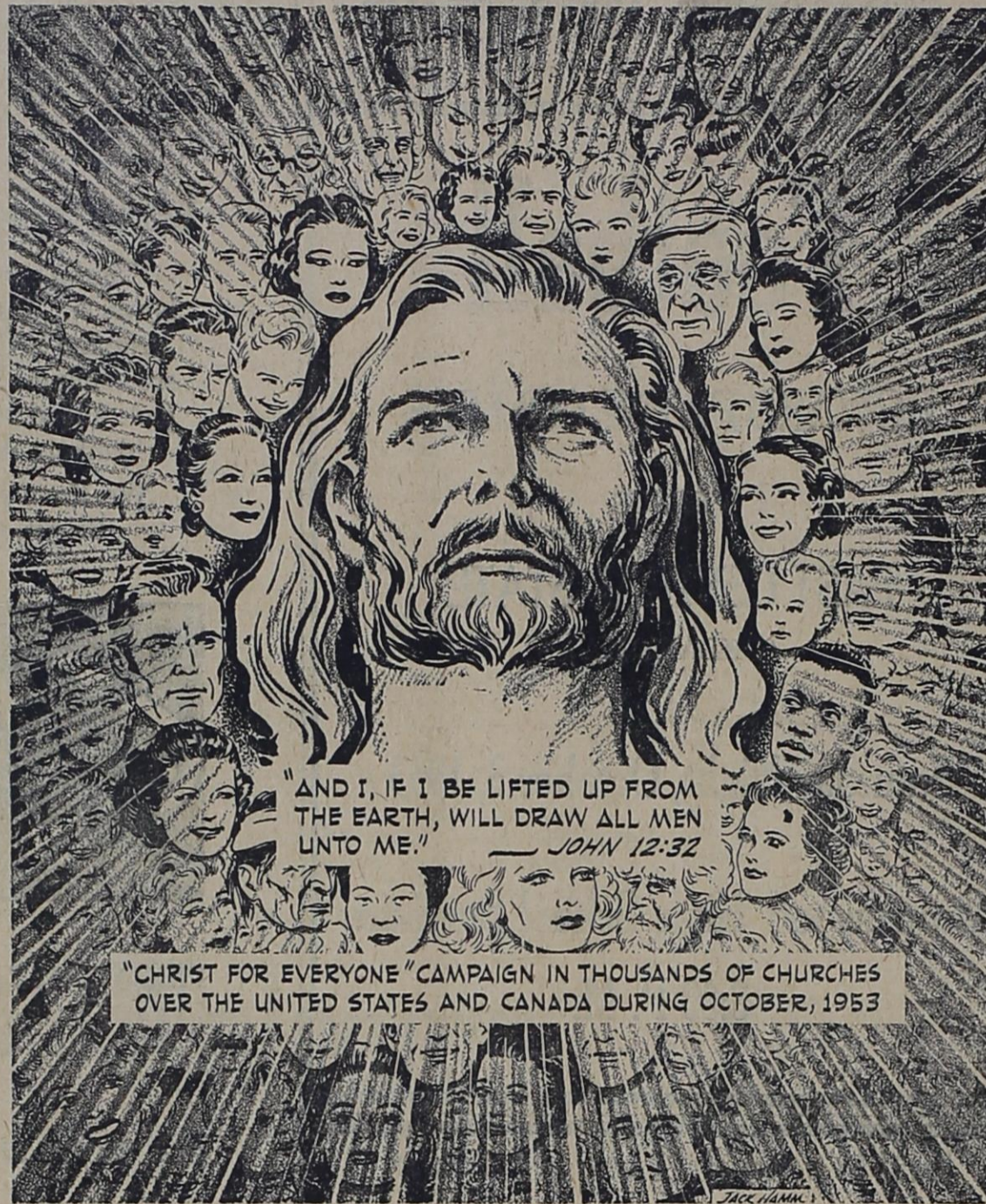
He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; He was despised and we esteemed him not.

\$660,000 REA Loan For Rural Telephones Comanche County

A \$660,000.00 loan to the Comanche Rural Telephone Co-operative has been approved by the rural electrification Administration in Washington, it was announced this week.

The telephone co-op when completed will serve some 626 miles covering all of Comanche County, except an area east of Blanket, an area in the Sipe Springs sector and an area east of Gustine.

There are now 712 subscribers, with a five-year plan calling for a potential 1,280 subscribers in the county area.
