The term takes on special significance when it is remembered that it has a close connection with one of the most important cases in American legal history — the seditious libel trial of John Peter Zenger in 1735.

Zenger was the printer and publisher of a paper known as the New York Weekly Journal. Unfortunately, he made the unhappy mistake of criticizing the administration of Royal Governor Cosby of New York in public print. The tyrannical Cosby had Zenger jailed and thus began a dramatic and important event in American history. Zenger had editorialized that the Governor had deeds to lands destroyed, judges arbitrarily displaced, new courts established
