Salt Tank-Crocker Reunion July 20-21

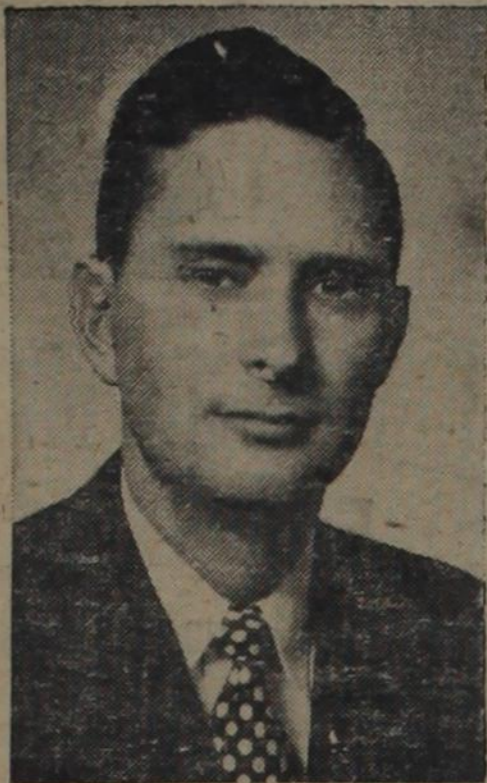

Comanche County Agent Hastings, who has resigned effective July 31, is to be the new president of the Iredell State Bank, of neighboring Bosque County. Comanche County's new agricultural agent has been in the extension work for the past two years. He has been in Hillsboro, as assistant agent, since joining the A&M extension service.

Dickson is a 1948 graduate of Texas A&M College, and is a veteran of World War II. After his graduation from A&M, he farmed and operated a dairy in Kaufman County for six years.

Roberds Area Production Is Increasing

A steady drilling program which is gradually increasing the magnitude of the Roberds area northwest of Rising Star, has resulted so far in the completion of four wells, prospects for the completion of another and locations for several others. Monthly production of the field was pushed to almost 2,000 barrels per month, the allowable. The area is three miles northwest of Rising Star.

Four completions were by Sam Eakin, who started development of the area with his No. 1 F. W. Roberds, producing from sand at 1050 feet. Since then Eakin has completed two other wells from the same horizon in the F. W. Roberds and one in the Pauline Roberds adjoining. All are making their allowables.

Eakin is now drilling his No. 1 Pauline Roberds-A, in which surface pipe was set last week. This is an 80-acre lease adjoining the F. W. Roberds, also an 80-acre tract as is the Pauline Roberds.

C. R. Brown, Abilene, who took a farmout from W. E. and C. R. Tyler on the Gus Dunn tract, a 60-acre lease, has completed drilling to the 1050 horizon and has sandfracked. It promised to make a good well. Location is 600 feet north of the Eakin No. 1 Roberds, on an adjoining lease.

Word was received here Sunday of the death at Phoenix, Ariz., at 11 a. m. Sunday morning of Merle Jay Carrell, 39-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. B. M. Carrell of this city. Mr. Carrell died in St. Joseph Hospital at Phoenix only a few hours after he became ill Saturday and was admitted to the hospital. He died of leukemia. Funeral services were held Wednesday with burial at Phoenix.

He was a certified public accountant, a 1933 graduate of Rising Star High School, a former student of Daniel Baker College at Brownwood and a graduate of the University of Arizona.

Shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack which put the United States in World War II, Mr. Carrell volunteered in the United States Air Force, trained as a bomber pilot and saw service in the Japanese theater where he flew 31 missions over Japan.

Showers Help But General Rain Needed

A pattern of shower activity extending over the first part of the week brought beneficial rains to scattered areas but only sprinkles to Rising Star and its immediate vicinity. Only about four-tenths of an inch was within the city limits.

However the continued cloudiness and cool weather broke a heat wave that was becoming extremely serious, burning pastures and other crops and even threatened the peanut plantings which in the early stages of germination can withstand much heat and dry weather. Pastures, feed crops, melon and garden crops and peanut fields were freshened up by the moisture even where there was little measurable precipitation and there was hope that the break in the searing wave would mean crop-making showers later on.

Meanwhile there were areas of the Rising Star territory which received good rains. The May and Amity districts reported rains measuring from one inch to almost two. The Carbon section and eastward to Gorman benefited with heavy showers. More than two inches fell at Gorman, reports said.

Southwest of Rising Star the Williams community was visited with rains that gauged two inches or more, according to reports and immediately west there were showers accompanied in places by freakish winds that did damage to trees and television antennae. J. H. Yocham reported some localized hail damage on his farm west of town.

But despite the beneficial effect of the showers there was still need of a general rain before a good crop can be made this fall, farmers said. Peanuts are not suffering and present cool damp weather has been of considerable help, but a good rain within the next four or five weeks is necessary if the vines fruit heavily enough to produce a crop, it was said.

\$16,000 in Vets Fee Refunds to Be Distributed

AUSTIN.—More than \$16,000 in fee refunds will soon be in the hands of Texas veterans, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder said Friday.

The fees were collected by the Veterans' Land Board from ex-servicemen buying land through the Veterans' Land Program. Some transactions were not completed, but until now fees could not by law be returned.

Commissioner Rudder recommended to the Legislature during its last session that the law be changed to authorize refund of these fees.

"I want to commend the Legislature for giving the veterans the just refund of their money," the Land Commissioner remarked.

A total of \$16,271.80 will be returned to 229 veterans who have submitted fees since the Program reopened in October, 1955, but who did not complete their transactions.

This is an average of \$71.06 per veteran. The largest refund will be \$100, the amount each veteran must pay in fees. Several will receive the full amount. Half of the \$100 covers closing expenses, \$25 is appraisal fee, and \$25 is a contract service fee.

The Veterans' Land Board began mailing refunds this week. Most will be mailed within several weeks, Commissioner Rudder said.

Rituals of Ancient Aztecs to Be State Fair Attraction

One of the world's most remarkable spectacles will be featured as a free attraction at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 5-20.

The mysterious rituals of the Aztecs and Mayans of ancient Mexico will be faithfully recreated by actual descendants of those long-vanished races.

The Aztec-Mayan Spectacular will be presented twice daily on the Magnolia Stage, climaxed by the dangerous "ceremony of the flying pole."

This awe-inspiring ritual is performed by "The Birdmen of Teotihuacan." Dressed in feathered, birdlike costumes, these "flying Indians" climb to the top of a 100-foot pole. To the weird music of a flute and drum, the four fliers one by one go through an intricate dance on a tiny platform atop the pole. They then leap into space,

spinning head down, hanging by their heels from ropes wound around the pole. As they glide gracefully to earth, the ropes unwind in ever-widening circles.

Seldom seen outside a few remote villages in the jungles of Mexico, the strange ceremonial of the flying pole is among the oldest of the surviving native rites of that country, dating from the times before the Spanish Conquest. Fliers are trained from the age of 9 for this daring feat.

The colorful dances of the Aztec-Mayan Spectacular are performed by a troupe of 20, attired in authentic costumes. In addition to the daily appearances on the Magnolia Stage, they will be featured in three big free Cotton Bowl shows during the fair. The first will be on Mexico Day, Oct. 7.

Grid Officiating Problems Studied

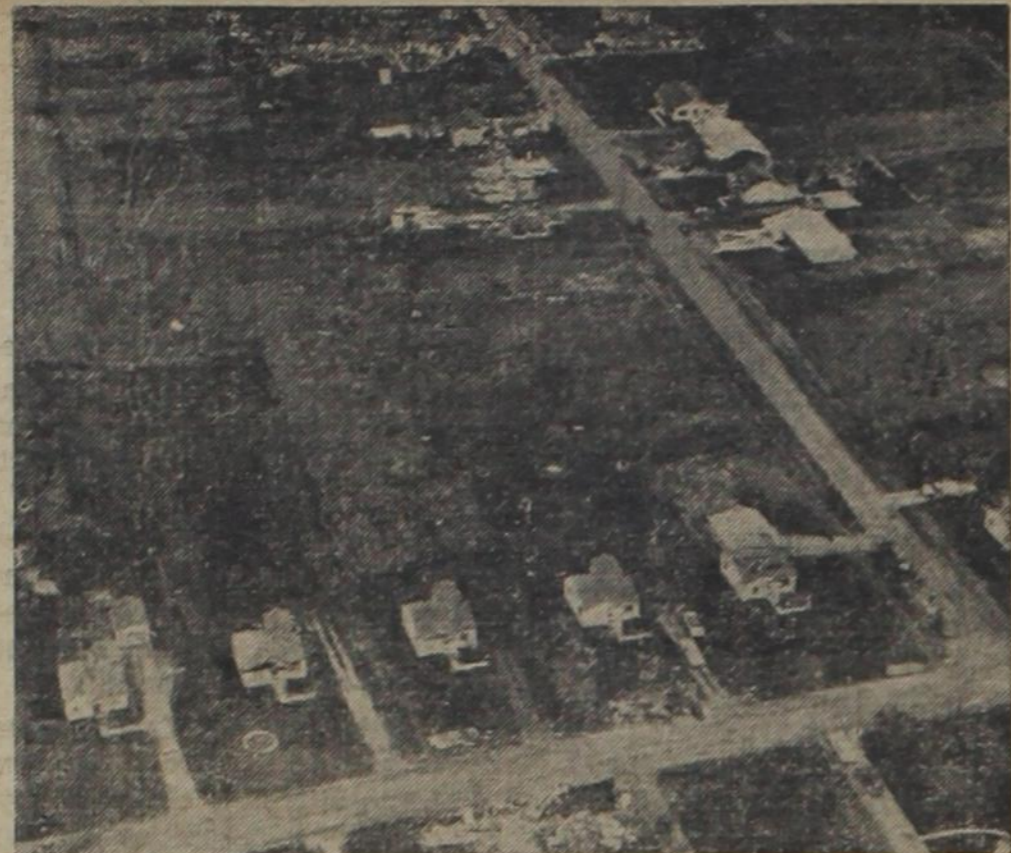
AUSTIN.—A two-week work-conference on interscholastic football officiating and coaching problems is scheduled July 22-Aug. 2 at the University of Texas.

West Texas Share Of Proposed Road Fund \$400 Million

ABILENE.—West Texas' share of the proposed federal highway program will total almost 400 million dollars, an article in the July issue of West Texas Today states.

The magazine, in an article reflecting on the effect of the new highway system on West Texas and its economy, quotes State highway engineer D. C. Greer as saying that "1,359 miles, 47 per cent, of the proposed Interstate System for Texas will be in West Texas."

The magazine, monthly publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, states that Greer estimates West Texas' share to be about \$377,964,000 or 25 per cent of the total allotment for the State's interstate highways. Texas will receive about \$1.6 billion during the next 13 to 15 years from the Federal government for the program.

The article also explains the current highway program of the Texas Highway Department.

"Our highway program, including Interstate, for the present fiscal year calls for 5,068 miles

of construction throughout the state at a cost of \$381,000,000. Of this programmed construction, 43 per cent, 2,229 miles, is in the West Texas area," Greer says in the article. He adds that the total cost for this West Texas construction will be about \$128 million.

The article also quotes Greer concerning future multilane or expressway construction for West Texas which is now on the Highway Department's program books. In addition to similar construction now underway, Greer states that 181 miles of multilane construction in West Texas is planned.

A complete list of all multilane construction programmed for West Texas—that part of the state served by the WTCC and west of a line running generally from Gainesville through Arlington, Waco, Johnson City, and Kerrville to Del Rio—is carried in the article.

Radioactive Waste Elements May Prove Valuable

AUSTIN.—Radioactive wastes, which scientists are now intently trying to destroy, may be very valuable in the future, a University of Texas physicist suggests.

Dr. R. N. Little says scientists have yet to scratch the surface in finding beneficial uses of radioactive materials now regarded as wastes.

"The atomic energy field is just like the packing industry in its earliest stages. At first the meat packer saved the pork chop and threw away the rest of the hog, but now everything but the squeal is utilized," Dr. Little said.

A few radioactive isotopes are already widely used by scientists as tracers to determine what goes on in various chemical reactions and in cancer treatment. Another radioactive isotope is currently being used to manufacture luminous signs for isolated crossings without electric power.

Another use Dr. Little proposes for radioactive isotopes is in the aircraft industry. As a source of energy, the radioactive material could be applied to airplane wings to prevent them from icing over at high altitudes.

Scientists have not done more with the so-called wastes because such material is extremely dangerous and must be handled by remote-control equipment not yet widely available, Dr. Little explains.

He foresees wider use of the radioactive wastes when private business enters the atomic energy field. "So far atomic energy has been a government enterprise, but as soon as private business enters the scene, businessmen will have to show a profit to their stockholders and will be quite interested in developing uses for all the waste products, Dr. Little said.
