Through The Editor's Specs

The Rising Star area this week received the best drought relief there is — rain! Showers which began falling in scattered fashion Saturday had by Monday merged into a general pattern of rainfall which, although still varied in its intensity, brought a welcome and encouraging respite from one of the most damaging summer droughts in local history.

Monday morning at 8 o'clock the city gauge — noted for its scrupulous honesty — had registered an aggregate of 1.70 inches. Further showers fell softly during Monday increasing the benefits of topsoil moisture to pastures and the scanty peanut acreage which some of the more daring growers had gambled on the prospect of August rainfall.

It was quite a gamble, to believe experienced farmers and ranchers, for rarely has a drought been broken in August, they say. Charley Ballew, for one, told me that he could not remember an instance of such.

At any rate there has been a measurable relief, enough perhaps to carry such acreage as has been planted into the more favorable season of September — a month in which we can reasonably expect some good rain.

The summer drought was not as long in point of time as the interminable dry spells of the 50's, but it was more damaging because it covered the normal planting period and, in consequence, kept most of the farmers from planting. Combined with the drop in cattle prices, due to drought selling and foreign beef imports, it caused even the white hot glare of the summer sun to turn a distinct and unhappy blue.

The rains this week have changed that complexion to a happy degree.

But we need more.

1964 Wildcats To Have Weight and Experience

With most of last year's starters returning, and a flock of lettermen, the Rising Star Wildcats face the 1964 football season with the best prospects in several seasons. The squad will have experience, talent and plenty of weight — the starting line will average almost 190 pounds. The entire squad will average around 160 pounds.

Anchored with such seniors as Terry Geyer, quarterback and passer; Frazier Clark, tackle and place-kicking specialist whose accurate, long range toe has spelled the difference in several closely contested games; James Cox, Danny Wooley and Donnie Fraley, with seven equally talented and experienced Juniors, the Wildcats expect to give a good account of themselves this season.

Rodeo Ends Good Summer Season With 12th Event

The Rising Star Roping Club closed out the current rodeo season Friday night with its 12th performance of the summer at the rodeo arena east of town on Highway 36. A crowd of between 1,000 and 1,200 watched the final contests which, as usual, drew large lists of competitors in most of the events.

The season, thirteenth in succession since the beginning of the rodeo in the early 50's has been one of the most successful, said Jack Jackson, president of the sponsoring club. The crowds have been uniformly large, the number of competitors and the competitive spirit excellent, he said, and he expressed the thanks of the club to the people who attended and the performers who took part in the contests.

Although the expenses have been higher this year due to increasing feed costs, the rodeo has done well financially also. The rodeo is a non-profit institution and all funds remain in the club treasury for use in operating the rodeo or improving the facilities and arena. A considerable part of the capital is invested in rodeo stock, some of which — the bulls and calves in particular — is bought at the beginning of the season and sold at the last.

1.7 Inches Rain Recorded Here Over Week-End

Drought-breaking showers spotted the Rising Star country over the week-end, bringing respite from a summer-long heat wave and aising hopes for improved pastures and at least a token peanut crop.

Rainfall in Rising Star, as measured by the city hall gauge, totaled 1.7 inches from Saturday until early Monday morning. Almost an inch fell Sunday night and Monday morning. The precipitation, however, was not uniform, some areas receiving little if any rainfall. Heaviest areas were to the north and west while south of Rising Star the rainfall was slight.

SOIL BANK ACRES ARE GRAZED IN DROUTH RELIEF

Drought-plagued livestock in Eastland County began grazing soil-banked acreage late this week in a U.S.D.A.-approved emergency measure to help farmers and ranchers during the dry spell.

The Agriculture Stabilization Conservation office at the courthouse was literally swamped all day Friday, and Office Manager Gilbert Meredith reported that the staff accepted applications as quickly as possible, and began granting approvals about 2 p.m. as land-owners signed statements to follow the rules of the program and paid the office for the right to graze the land.

The U.S.D.A. has already paid the landowners for "laying the land by" and now, with scarcely little rain this summer, the owners are turning to the emergency help to keep stock feed.

It's costing the landowners a minimum of \$1 an acre per month for land with poor cover. And \$1.25 an acre per month for fair cover and 1.50 for good cover. The ASCS office has records of the type of cover, and field men will begin Monday making spot checks of the participating landowners to confirm the estimate of the quality of the cover.

Meredith warned against grazing of diverted acres before permission is granted and payments are made.

The office will continue to take applications, he said. The program was authorized by the Washington Department of Agriculture headquarters to extend through Oct. 31.

Born March 19, 1881, in Rising Star, a member of one of this community's earliest families, he had lived here all of his life. For several years he was engaged in the cafe business here, but his primary occupation was that of a stock farmer to which he was actively devoted until his last illness.

He is survived by his wife, the former Clara Jacobs; a daughter, Mrs. Juanita Clark of Lovington, N. M., and by two sisters, Mrs. Maud Mauk and Mrs. Mabel Falls of Irving.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Taxpayers Urged To Meet With Board

Taxpayers of the Rising Star Independent School district who have received notices from the Board of Equalization were urged this week to meet with the Board on August 24, when it was announced the board would be in session, according to Oscar Schaefer, chairman of a taxpayers committee.

Notices to the effect that the Board would meet to consider revisions in property renditions were received by taxpayers last week, Mr. Schaefer said.

"It is our understanding that an increase in the rendition value of land and possibly other property within the district, is contemplated," said Mr. Schaefer. "Under Art. 2791 of the State statutes, a taxpayer is entitled to a full and fair hearing on any increase that may be intended."

"It is to the interest of every property owner and taxpayer who may be affected, to appear and insure that rendition of his property is done in accordance with the law," he said.

"Therefore, we urge all who have received these notices to be sure and met the board."

No general meeting is contemplated, he said. "We are asking

each taxpayer to appear at some time during the day indicated. Our interest is to see that any tax increase is properly and harmoniously done."

Cattle Buyer, Well Known Here Faces Charge In Slaying

COMANCHE — Chester Carouth, 40-year-old Sidney Peanut farmer and stock raiser, was shot to death about 8 a.m. Sunday in the front yard of a prominent livestock commission buyer, Damon Hall, 51, of Sidney.

Hall was charged with murder with malice by District Attorney Byron McClellan of Gatesville after signing a statement concerning the shooting.

Carouth died from three blasts from a 12-gauge shotgun fired at close range, Peace Justice J. H. Hall of Comanche ruled.

McClellan said Hall's statement told of personal and business trouble between the two men over a period of years.

Following the shooting, Hall summoned neighbors to his home and they called Comanche County Deputy Sheriff Leon Sledge and McClellan.

Justice Hall set a bond of \$10,000. The livestock man posted the bond after waiving examining trial and will face action of the 52nd district court grand jury Oct. 5, McClellan said.

The two men had been neighbors and had had business dealings pertaining to land and crops for a number of years. Hall has been a commission livestock buyer for major livestock companies for 23 years.

Carouth's widow said her husband left the family home shortly before 7, she thought to feed cattle on a leased place about a mile away, and had no knowledge of why he went to the Hall home.

She said she did not know of her husband's death until officers officially notified her at 10 a.m. The two families reside about two miles apart.

Mr. Hall is well-known to cattlemen of the Rising Star area as a cattle buyer for Swift and Co.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT, NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

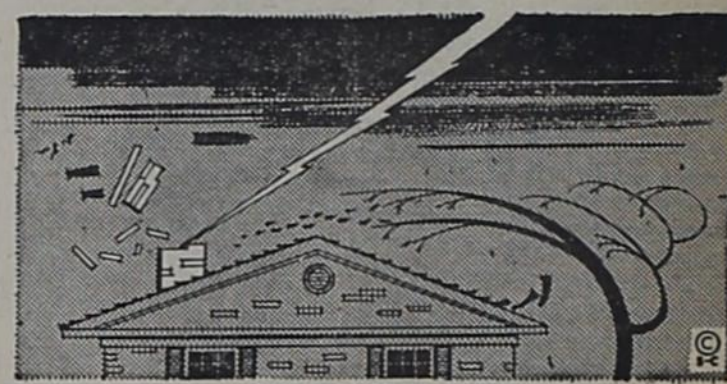
