

All American Bonnie Buchanan Is Signed Up At Stephen F. Austin State University



During high school days at May, she averaged 37-points per contest, capping it off with a phenomenal 48-point average her senior year.

Buchanan once scored 74 points in a game, and poured in 50 or more points on 16 occasions her senior year.

While Buchanan is already a proven player, the other recruits will have their work cut out for them. But if Gunter's assumptions are correct, look for Crawford to figure prominently in Ladyjack fortunes in the future.

At 5-7, Crawford will add depth to the guard slot for SFA. A highly recruited high school senior at Deridder, Crawford is "an outstanding leaper", according to Gunter.

"From 18 feet, she is tougher than nails, and

has the ability to penetrate the middle. Crawford is incredibly quick and strong.

For Scoggins and Krauskopf, Gunter looks for them to become an integral part of the Ladyjack program with a little experience.

"Scoggins had a real fine high school career. She is a good shooter, and being left-handed, gives her an advantage". But the big plus with Scoggins, Gunter says, is her dedication.

As for Krauskopf, a lot of work is in store. "At 5-11, she is very mobile, and a good rebounder." But she played post in high school, and needs to work on her shooting.

The Ladyjacks, who finished 30-5 this past season, open play November 13 at Temple Junior College.

NACOGDOCHES-- The signing of all-American Bonnie Buchanan has been announced by Sue Gunter, Ladyjack basketball coach at Stephen F. Austin State University.

Buchanan is the fourth recruit signed by Gunter and assistant Mary Ann Otwell. She will join Freshman Pam Crawford of DeRidder, La., Emily Scoggins of Bertsville, Okla., and Kelly Krauskopf of Tyler as Ladyjacks next season.

Of the four, Gunter is perhaps the happiest over Buchanan, the 6-0 junior who re-wrote the record books while at Tyler Junior College. And she didn't mind saying so.

"She's the shooter we have been seeking for two years," Gunter said. "Buchanan is a very fine perimeter shooter, and very consistent from 22 feet and in. Her attributes are here shooting consistency and range.

"She is so versatile and so mobile and her jumping ability will give us added strength on the boards. Buchanan is the finest

junior college player in the country. We feel fortunate to get her".

Not that Gunter and the Ladyjacks were the only university interested in the May, Texas native. Quite the contrary. She received over 150 offers, from such schools as UCLA, University of Nevada-Las Vegas, Hawaii, Tennessee, Nebraska and just about every school in Texas.

But it all boiled down to two--SFA and rival Louisiana Tech, where teammate Janice Mulford has signed earlier. Buchanan decided on SFA because of its winning tradition and because of the location.

While at TJC, Buchanan scored 1540 points in two years (a school record), leading the Lady Apaches to a 52-9 record and a second place finish in the national junior college tournament this past year.

As a freshman, Buchanan averaged 24 points per game and hauled down 18 rebounds in gaining all-Texas Eastern Conference honors.

This past season, she scored 25.4 points, grabbed 18.1 rebounds, had nine assists and blocked three shots per game. Buchanan hit 393 of 659 shots (60 percent) and 128 of 154 free throws (83 percent).

She was named to the junior college All-American team, in addition to being selected Region XIV most valuable player, and the outstanding player at the National All-Star game.

Kimberly Harris Winner Of Merit Scholarship

Kimberly J. Harris of Route 2, Box 148-B, Rising Star, Texas, has been named the winner of a North Texas State University Merit Scholarship, it was announced today by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) of Evanston, Illinois. She joins a total of more than 4,200 Merit Scholars in the 24th annual competition.

Valedictorian of her graduating class at Rising Star High School, Miss Harris plans to major in physics in college. She was a University In-

terscholastic League State qualifier in speech, and alternate in science; a Soil and Water Conservation Essay winner; was named to the All-American Band Hall of Fame; and is chapter president of Future Homemakers of America. She was also finalist and test winner in "Miss Teenage" Abilene contest.

Miss Harris's four year scholarship is sponsored by North Texas State University in Denton 38 miles north of Dallas and Fort Worth.

With over 17,000

students, it has Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, and Education; and Schools of Music, Home Economics, Community Service, Library and information, and the Graduate School. The Music School is the second largest in the United States.

College-sponsored four year Merit Scholarships are generally worth between \$1,000 and \$6,000 over the four years of college undergraduate study. The amount of the winner's scholar-

ship stipend is not revealed since it is related to confidential family financial information.

The Merit Scholars were selected from among 14,000 Finalist in this year's Merit Scholarship competition. The more than 4,200 awards being offered in 1979 have a total value of over 13 million and are supported by some 600 organizations and institutions. Since 1956, the first year of the annual competition, over 58,000 Merit Scholarships have been awarded with a total of more than \$161 million.

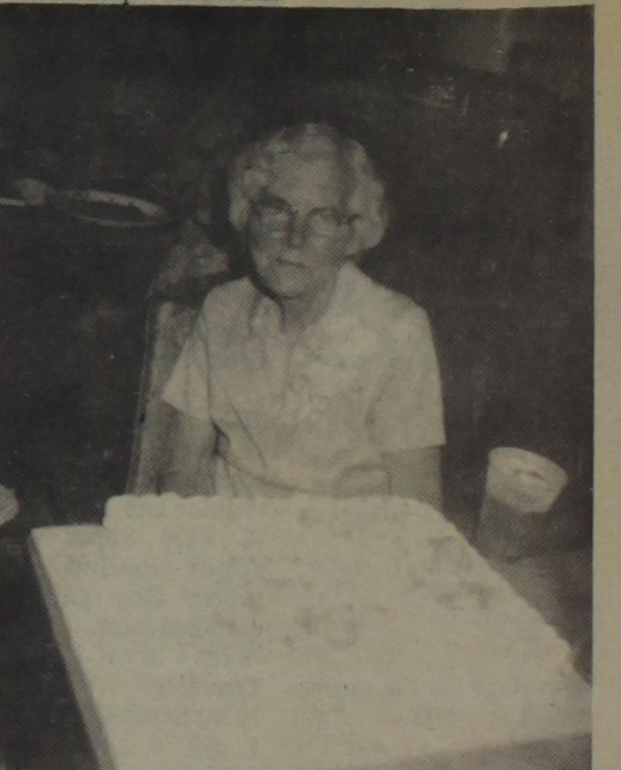

Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

It is time to write Pioneer News as usual, I wish to write some introductory remarks. I hope what I write will not be too boring, and that in reading, it will provoke readers to "Think". "Think" (to think, that is) is suffering from non-use among peoples today. In saying this I restrict the meaning of the word to right thinking, and it does not include the wrong exercise of the mind. Right thinking is based on honesty and intention of living with and trying to do something about the conclusions we arrive at. Truly there is much confusion, fear, unrest, and discouragement among all people, to

day. Fundamentally there is only one reason for this and that is the age-old battle between good and evil, that originated when man fell (out of) the Garden of Eden and his efforts to get back to that utopian state where life is beautiful and at its best. Before we reach this state (if one is deluded to think we can) greed, lust for power, dishonesty, selfishness, must be ruled out of our lives and out of the lives of those who make our laws. Briefly, my theme for today, is to set our own houses in order and be willing to take the rap. Most of the following paragraphs are quotes from a church paper and one I am glad to

read; not that it reveals any solution to our problems but that it is a revelation of some of the evils that are labeled "good" by many people. It does provoke thought. "Totalitarian Left" embraces the gamut of advocacy of unlimited government power, Naziism to Communism. "The 4-volume 2500 page Biographical Dictionary of the Left 1973, by Francis X Gannon PH.D., Georgetown University lists Leftist and Pro-Communist activities of some 200 organizations and 550 individuals including churchmen Reinhold Niebuhr, Fathers Daniel and Phillip Berigan, The REverend Jesse Jackson, Martin Luther King, Jr., and Harry W. Ward, a co-founder in 1909 of what became the National Council of Churches. "The real father of

Communism was Adam Weishaupt, professor of Canon Law at Bavaria, Germany, who founded his secret Order of the Illuminati May 1, 1776 the date Reds Celebrate: Goal Illuminist Elite world of tyranny. Methods, wipe out all competing loyalties, religion, family, patriotism, moral principals, and cltural heritage; capture the minds of the rich, powerful and intellectual, control public thought by controlling all public media.

In 1978 publication of two works--exposed the Illuminati, in France in the Abbe Barrouel's 4 volume tome; in England in 'Proof of a Conspiracy', by professor John Robinson (304 pages) with many of Weishaupt's letters. 'Top level and radical Marxist leaders have demonstrably conceived and directed the push for Social Security (1933-35), the UN (1944-45), UNESCO and UNICEF; the graduated income tax and Federal Reserve (1931) both Marxist planks; for ERA, IWY, IYC, (1979), AIM, American Agricultural Movement (1975); sex education, 'mental health', environmentalism, gun control; federal government control of education, land use, and medicine; forced busing and so much more. These Red causes have been greatly aided by dupes who can't see the Red Connection, and our churches have cooperated to a tragic extent. Of the 95 scholars who brought forth the Revised Standard Bible, 30 had a total of at least 95 pro-Communist affiliations (Congressional Record, March 3, 1960, page 3981) and or records of pro-Communist support. Again, the Bible warns of false prophets". End of quote, Letter written by J. A. James Jr., Bastrop, La. Let us THINK, PRAY, mature as Christians by reading the Bible; then vote. Even then the hour may be late!

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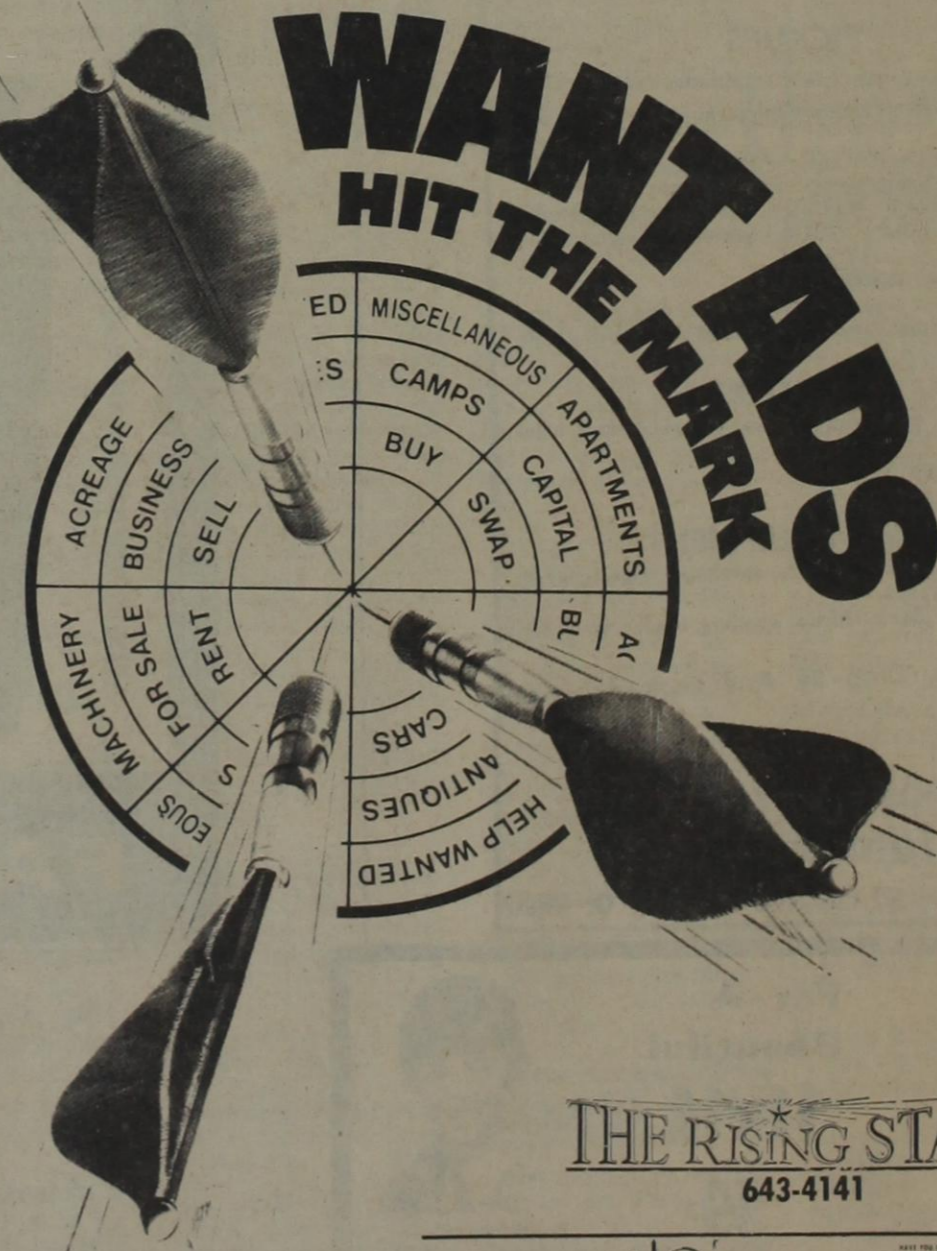

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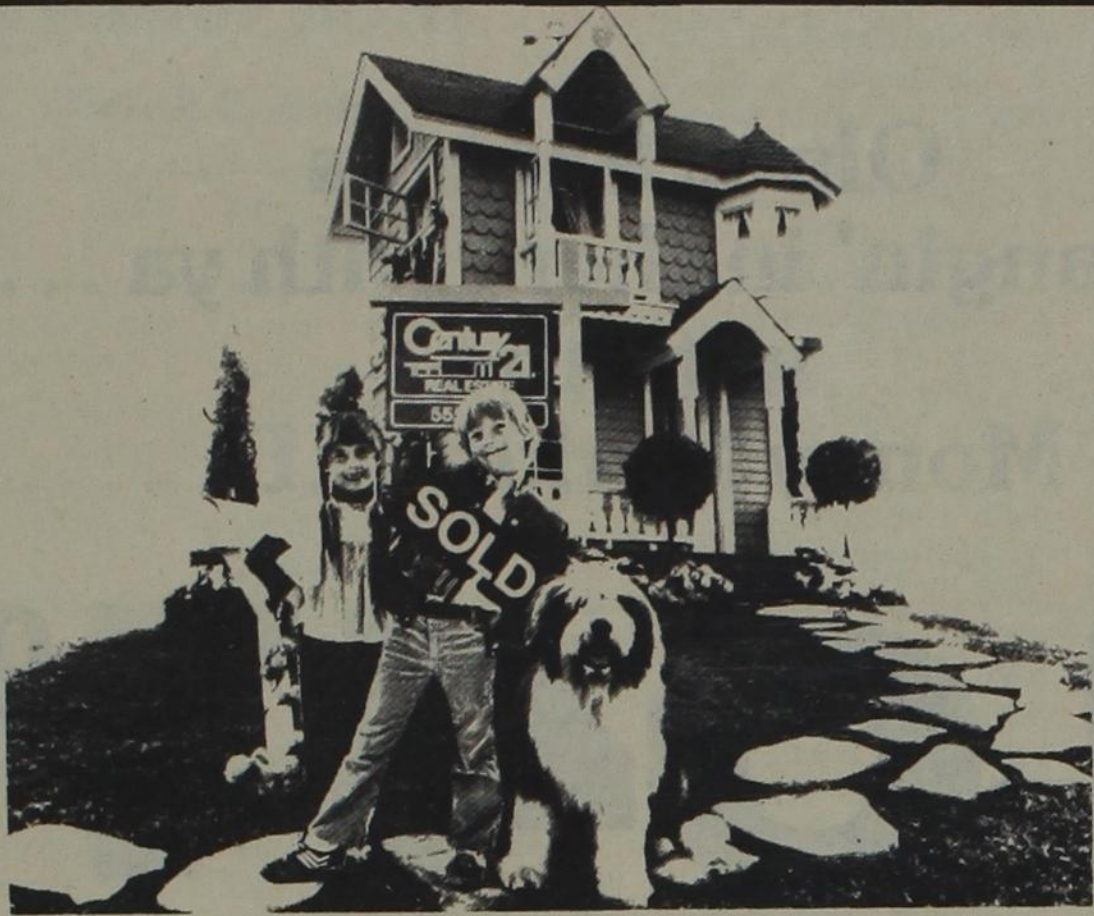

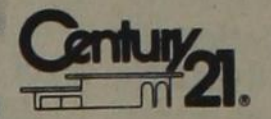

Doyle F. Beard

Passes Away

Doyle F. Beard, 71, of 204 West Second Street passed away Sunday night, June 3, at Robert Long Hospital, Indianapolis. His twin brother, Paul, died on October 8, 1978.

Mr. Beard was born in Marion County on August 26, 1907, the son of Fred J. and Bessie B. Lines Beard. His mother survives. Early in his life, the family moved to Sheridan. He married Mary N. Cain of Rising Star, Texas on June 23, 1930. She also survives. They would have celebrated their 49th anniversary later this month.

Doyle Beard entered into business with his

Peanut Contract Decisions Important

Peanut growers in the Southwest are viewing a recent announcement by Gold Kist regarding 1979 crop contracting with great concern. Ross Wilson, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association Manager, said the Gold Kist offer of \$357 per ton for 50 percent of the farm additional production and \$305 for the remaining 50 per cent is significantly below the contract prices being offered by the other area shellers for additional peanuts for export. According to Wilson other shellers are offering prices ranging from \$380 per ton to \$391 per ton.

The SWPGA Manager said that Gold Kist officials had informed him on May 10 that the Atlanta based firm did not plan to contract any additional peanuts in the Southwest. He said Gold Kist indicated at that time that it planned to do its contracting of peanuts for export with growers in the Southeastern United States because of lower costs of acquisition and shipping.

The Association Manager emphasized that contracting peanuts at the level of \$357 per ton likely will work adversely to grower interest in two respects—(1) such contract price levels will encourage lower export market levels for shelled peanuts and (2) such a low contract price is an indication to USDA and the Congress that growers can and will grow peanuts for reduced quota support rates.

Gold Kist officials who met with Texas and Oklahoma growers recently are reported to have encouraged utilization of the Southwest Runner pool as an alternative to contracting in 1979.

Wilson said that SWPGA currently is not advising growers to produce peanuts for pool participation. He said the 1978 crop pools for Seg. 1 peanuts were a real disaster due principally to large quantities of low quality peanuts in the pools that were sold for crushing at prices well below the quota support rate. Wilson stated even though the pool potential may improve somewhat due to changes that may occur in the USDA 1979 Crop Regulations, we cannot at present in good faith recommend that any grower produce peanuts for the pools. If USDA Regulations provide for a separate pool for "Buy-Back" peanuts, SWPGA would recommend that growers seriously consider the production of additional peanuts for such a pool. 1979 Regulations are expected to be announced by USDA within a few days.

**USDA Announces
Change In Regulation
For 1979 Crop Peanuts**

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland today announced final changes in the 1979 crop peanut program regulations, including eight changes from the proposal originally announced last April 27.

The following incorporate suggestions made during the comment period:

The discount on Segregation 3 peanuts being transferred from additional to quota loan at the end of the marketing season has been changed from \$50 to \$25 per ton.

The maximum discount on Segregation 2 peanuts under the same program has been changed to \$25 per ton. Previously the maximum discount was \$100.

Shellers may contract additional peanuts to be used in domestic markets if they put up an irrevocable letter of credit equal to the to the penalty rate for selling additional peanuts in domestic markets (120 percent of the quota peanut price support level of \$420 per short ton). These shellers must then agree to sell for export an equal quantity and quality of quota peanuts by the deadline required for the export of contract additional peanuts.

The time for buyback of additional peanuts for domestic

use without added costs has been extended to three days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and Federal Holidays.

Field dried peanuts have been eliminated from the minimum allowable moisture level for quota support.

The definition of peanut products has been changed to read: "Any products manufactured or derived from peanuts such as but not limited to peanut candy, peanut butter, peanut granules or peanut flakes."

Provisions have been added for providing proof of export of peanuts by air.

The maximum allowable shrinkage in contract additional peanuts stored commingled with other peanuts has been increased by 0.5 percentage points to 3.5 percent on Virginias and 3.0 percent for other types if graded before Feb. 1, and 4.0 percent on Virginias and 3.5 percent on other types.

The following four proposed changes were among those suggested by various segments of the peanut industry but were not accepted by the U.S. department of Agriculture.

Substitution of split and small sized kernels shelled from contract additional peanuts in domestic

markets for larger sized kernels which are exported from quota peanuts.

Adding on of carrying charges to the announced \$400 minimum sales policy for additional peanuts sold from loan stocks for edible export.

Separate pools for producers whose additional peanuts are purchased from the loan association for domestic edible use.

That program compliance for handlers of contract additional peanuts be based more on certification with performance bonds.

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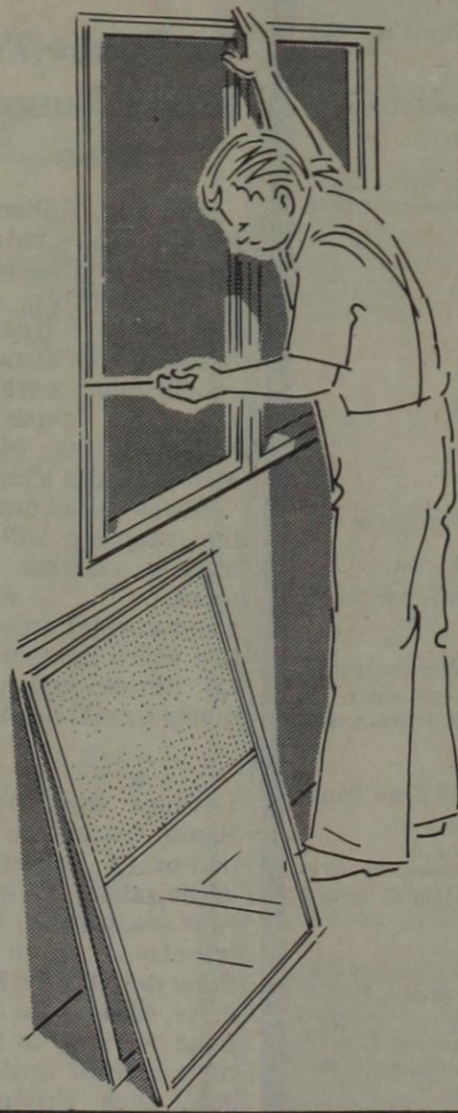
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
