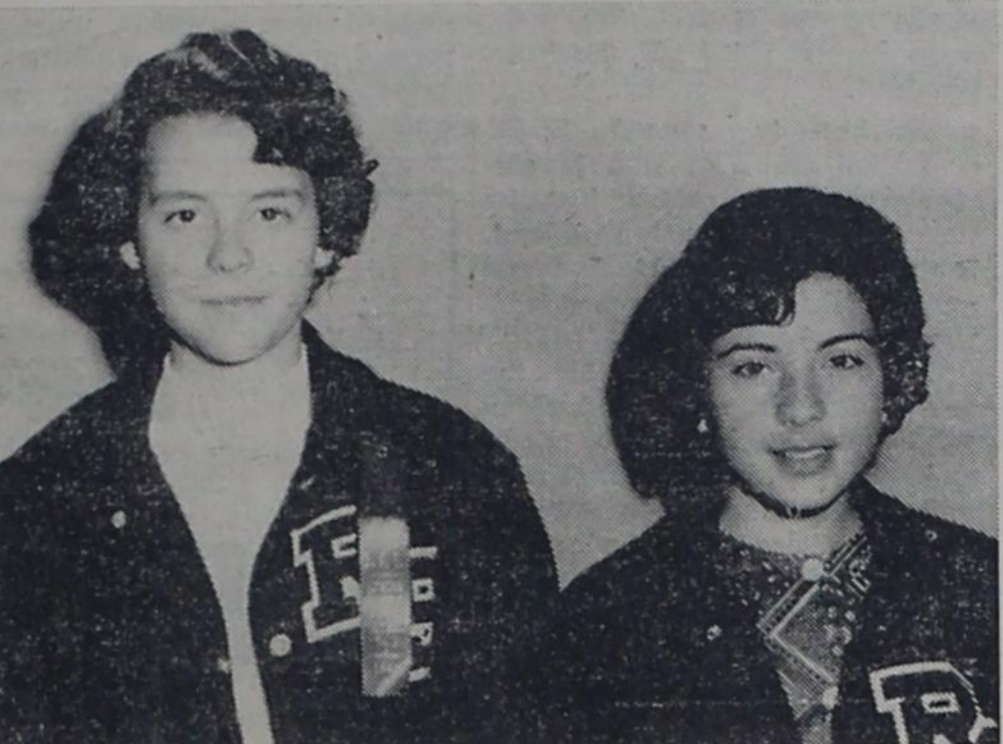
## Patterson Cites Experience in Bid For Election May 2

## Limited Changes Affect Saturday Postal Services

Limited adjustments in some postal services ordered in Washington March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million will begin to take effect in Rising Star and other cities on May 4, Postmaster Cliffogene Witt, said today.

The limited adjustment to date will affect Saturday services only in Rising Star. Service changes planned locally for Saturdays only, includes the following:

1. Parcel post deliveries: Parcel post will be delivered in the usual manner on the rural routes.

2. Window services: Stamps, parcel post, registry, and C.O.D. services will be available. Services such as inquires, meter settings, box rent collections, trust fund deposits and claims will be discontinued on Saturdays only. Money orders will not be issued on Saturdays and rural carriers shall not accept applications for money orders on Saturdays.

Patrons are urged to transact as much of their postal business as possible on weekdays.

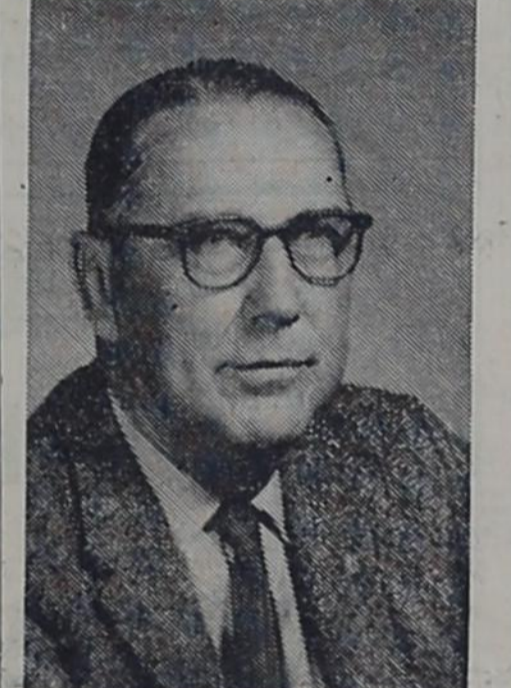
The postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under the orders. There will be no change in special delivery services; letters and other first-class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

The economy step, Mrs. Witt emphasized, is in line with President Johnson's program under which the recent Federal income tax cut was provided.

## Perry T. Brown Asks Support For County Attorney

Perry T. Brown, Rising Star attorney, this week issued the following formal statement in connection with his campaign for county and district attorney of Eastland county in the democratic primary May 2.

To the Voters of Eastland County:

It has not been and will not be possible for me to see each of you and solicit in person your support of my candidacy for the office of County and District Attorney of Eastland County. So I take this means of extending to you a final request that you give my candidacy due consideration with the assurance that your support will be much appreciated.

I am a native Texan, born and reared in Titus County, but have spent most of my life in central and west Texas. I am a college and university graduate with the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education and Master of Arts with a major in history and political science. I am a veteran of the World War with service in the U. S. Navy on patrol duty in the Atlantic, in the invasions of Sicily and Salerno and subsequently as commanding officer of a tanker in the Pacific.

With 16 years experience in the practice of law, six years of which I was county attorney, I am qualified by experience for the office of District Attorney. I began the practice of law as County Attorney of Kent County, Texas which was a part of the 39th judicial district. The district attorney at that district at that time was the Hon. Clyde Grissom, for the past number of years the chief justice of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland. Mr. Grissom had me meet with him and the grand jury in the investigation of law violations and had me make the opening argument in felony prosecutions, in each of which a conviction was obtained. I am sure Mr. Grissom deserves the credit for that record, as he was as able a district attorney as there was in the State; however, the experience was very valuable in qualifying me for the office of district attorney.

I pledge a conscientious performance. My wife, formerly Frances Ruth Evans, and I have three children. Emily is a teacher in the school at Fabens, Texas, Cynthia is a freshman in John Tarleton, and Caroline is a sophomore in the Rising Star High School.

If elected to this office I shall do my best to make the lawbreaker realize that the "way of the transgressor is hard."

## Emphasis On Clean-Up and Fix-Up Here Next Week

Next week will be Clean-up Week in Rising Star.

The week was so designated as the time for a community campaign to improve community appearance, property values and living conditions in a proclamation by Mayor Walter Smith and the Rising Star

Chamber of Commerce, the Volunteer Fire Department, the P-TA and other organizations of the city have joined in the appeal for community-wide cooperation toward that end.

Trucks of the city streets department, assisted, as usual by those of the county com-

missioners precinct, will be available during the latter part of the week to haul away trash accumulated during the campaign.

The trucks will start their rounds on Wednesday — allowing time for residents to clean their premises and collect the rubbish to be disposed of. Trash which may be burned on the site, and such things as tree trunks and limbs cannot be hauled free of charge. Residents will be expected to dispose of these.

The City also asked that trash to be carried away in the city trucks be placed in places where it may be conveniently reached.

In addition to clean-up, emphasis is being placed on repairing, repainting, and otherwise improving city residential and business property.

Success of the campaign will materially reduce fire and health hazards, as well as make the city more attractive.

Prizes of \$30, \$10, and \$5 will be awarded for the most improved places.

## Regional Meet Held At Stephenville This Week

Rising Star track and field district champions will go to Stephenville Saturday to compete in regional for the right to go on to the state meet to be held at Austin next month.

Meanwhile the Wildcats, to keep in tone and to test their mettle against the classes of

The Wildcats took first place in the 880-yard run, the 440-yard dash, the mile run, and seconds in the 880, the 100-yard dash and the mile relay.

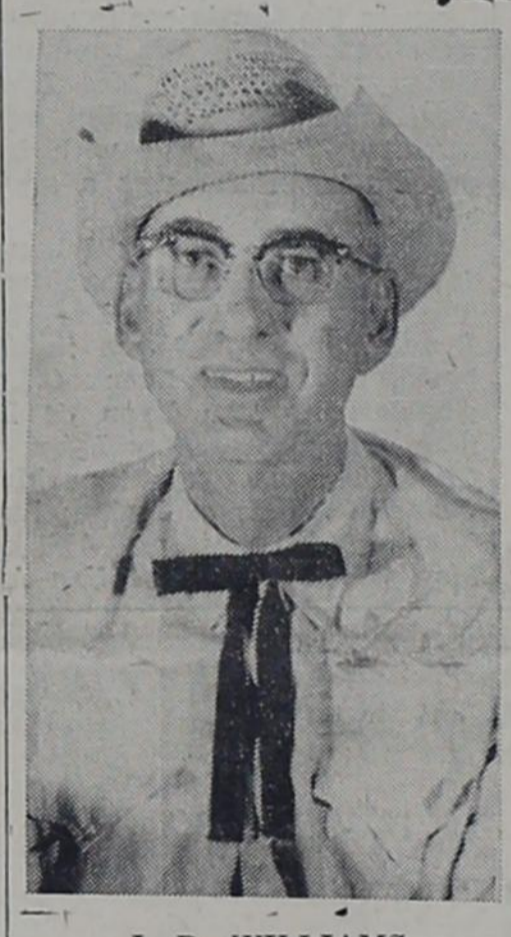
Larry Duggan made the best time to date in winning the mile run in a time of 4:48.3.

Rising Star was third in the 440 relay, fourth in the 180-yard low hurdles run by Jimmy Rutherford, while James Cox placed third in the discus. Don Rudd's time of 23.9 took third place in the 220-yard dash.

First and second place winners in the regional will go to the state meet.

**Farm Bureau Aid Praised For Opposing The Forced Pooling Bill By Gibbens**

Noting that the Texas Farm Bureau at its State convention in San Antonio passed a strong resolution supporting property rights, the Texas Land Owners and Independent Oil and Gas Producers Association commended the organization for its stand.

The Landowners' resolution praised the leadership of Farm Bureau leader C. H. De-tative Chas. Huff and Ed Mc-Vaney, Legislative representative Kay for their help in defeating House Bill 510, the compulsory oil and gas pooling bill at the last session.

The Farm Bureau was also cited for making a valiant effort to pass legislation that would give the landowner the right to try cases involving appeals from the Railroad

Commission in district courts where the land is located.

"The Texas Landowners and Independent Oil and Gas Producers are very grateful for the help furnished by the Texas Farm Bureau," the resolution states.

Although the pressure continued for consideration, it was finally conceded by the bill's author, Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, and its co-authors, Reps. George Cook of Odessa and Maurice theirs was a lost cause. For this time.

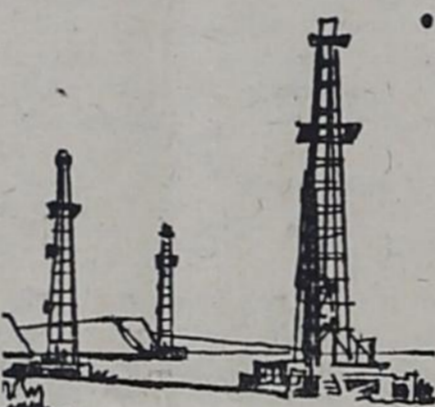

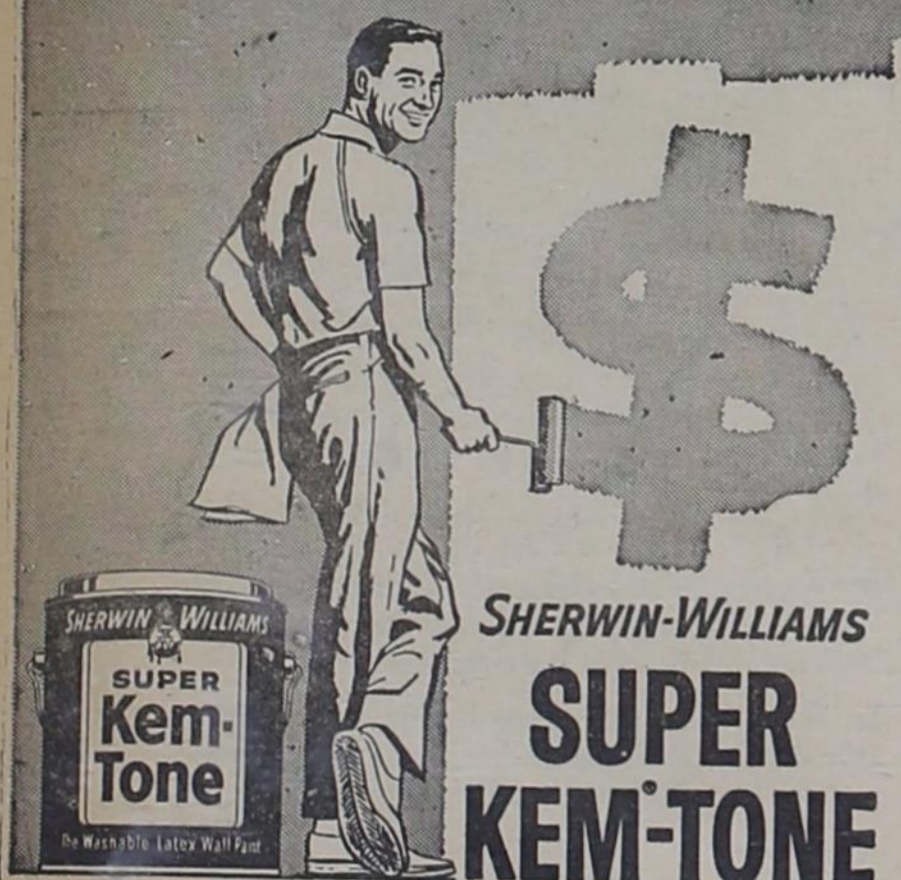

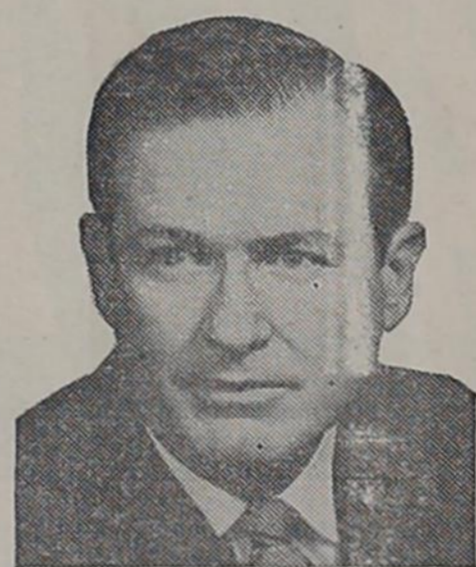

### About Your Health

AUSTIN — Through April 4, an aggregate of 27,384 cases of measles (rubeola) had been reported from all parts of Texas. Compare that figure to the 7,541 cases reported for the same period in 1963, and it is clear that the State, in general, is indeed experiencing an epidemic.

Measles epidemics can be predicted with a fair degree of certainty. In metropolitan areas, a mild form of the disease can be anticipated to reach epidemic proportions every year. In rural areas, outbreaks are usually somewhat more severe.

Outbreaks occur in keeping with population growths — that is, the birth of new babies who are unimmunized, and who are thus susceptible when the community is "seeded" with the virus.

Measles comes in two different varieties. Rubella — often called 3-day measles — or German measles — is of shorter duration than rubeola. Normally, rubeola is considered more serious in nature, with one exception. When rubella occurs during the first four months of pregnancy, it is thought to trigger malformation of the unborn child.

In any case, measles may not be lightly dismissed as a harmless childhood disease. Measles (rubeola) claims 34 lives per year, half of which are under two years of age.

Quarantining a measles patient — of either variety — doesn't help the situation. A person is most contagious before the tell-tale red spots appear when symptoms simply resemble a cold.

Recently a vaccine for rubeola was put on the market. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that any child over nine months of age, who has no history of the dis-

ease, be given the vaccine. Children with special problems, such as cystic fibrosis, asthma or heart disease, are particularly advised to take advantage of this protective measure. If symptoms are suspected a physician should be contacted immediately.

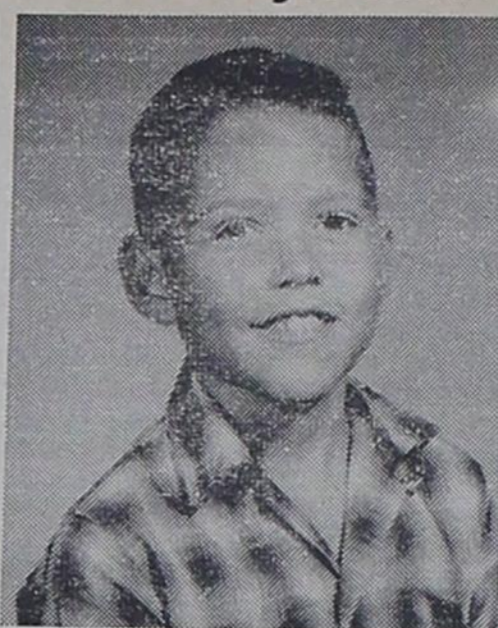

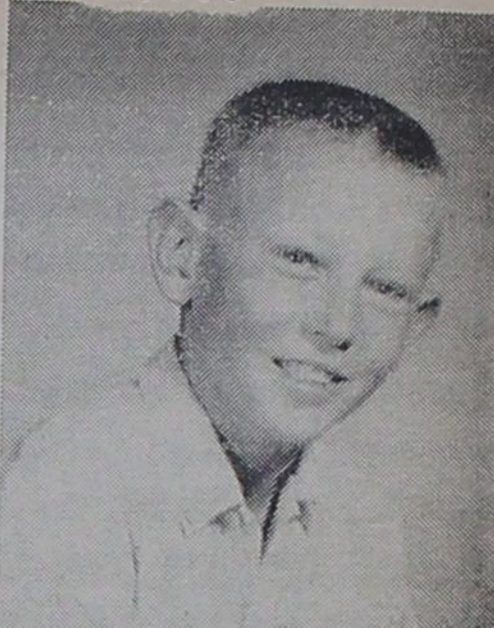

**Cisco and Scranton Schools Consolidating**

CISCO—Legal details are being worked out for consolidation of the Cisco and Scranton independent school districts, Supt. T. M. Roach announced.

Roach said the board of trustees at Scranton petitioned the Eastland County School Board asking to be annexed to Cisco. The county board gave the request unanimous approval.

Since part of the Scranton school district, located 12 miles southwest of Cisco, is in Callahan County, it will be necessary for the Callahan County school board to approve the action, Roach said.

The Callahan board has been forwarded papers concerning the consolidation.

**WHAT IS FORCED POOLING?**

Under a forced pooling law, the owner of a lease may make application to the Railroad Commission for the creation of a "pooled unit" by which all persons owning any interest in the oil or gas thereunder would have their properties forcibly pooled or combined.

Compulsory pooling is sought in Texas by the major oil companies. House Bill 510 by Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge would create such a law under which any part of a tract of land could be forcibly pooled with the lands of others and without the consent of the parties concerned.

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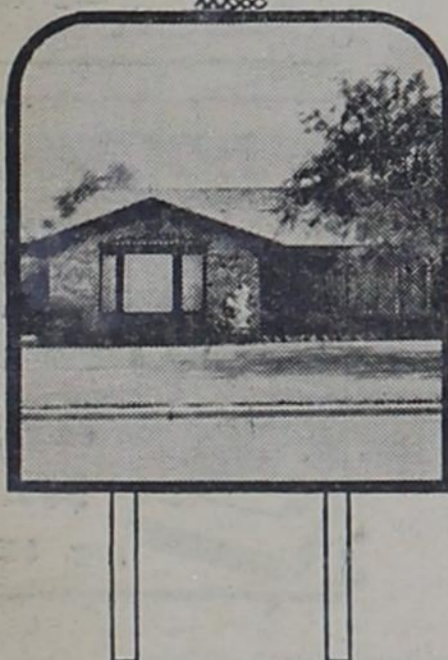
