CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE RISING STAR CI-

TY & RURAL VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Whereas, Certain Laws

and Regulations are necessary for the good order and well being of all associations, in order to define duty, to establish discipline, the maintenance of harmony for the full promotion of the object for which we are associated together, do ordain and adopt government, and do hereby pledge ourselves to cheerfully submit to the legally expressed

will of the majority and to

support our officers in the discharge of their duties. ARTICLE I

SECTION 1. The name of this organization shall be The Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department. SECTION 2. The object of this organization shall be the saving of lives, the protection of property endangered by fires and other disasters and to promote the teaching and practice of fire prevention and protection.

SECTION 3. Each member shall pay \$1.00 as annual dues. Any person or supporter who pays their \$1.00 membership dues for the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department will have voting rights at all area meetings. The dues will become due at the annual meeting of the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department.

SECTION 1. This organization shall consist of a Board of Directors and Firemen (firefighters).

SECTION 2. The Board of Directors shall have a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and other officers deemed necessary.

SECTION 3. Firemen shall have a Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Secretary-Treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms and any other officials as required. ARTICLE III

BOARD OF DIRECTORS SECTION 1, The Board of Directors shall consist of six members, three of whom shall reside within the city limits of Rising Star, and three of whom shall reside outside the city limits. The members shall be elected in a meeting of the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department. Two members (one city, one rural) will serve for one year; two members (one city, one rural) will serve for two years and two members (one city, one rural) will serve a term of three years. A quorum for this meeting shall be two-thirds.

SECTION 2. Organization: There will be elected, by the Board of Directors, a President, Vice-president, Secretary-Treasurer and other officers as deemed necessary.

SECTION 3. Duties: The duties of the Board of Directors shall be to serve in an advisory capacity to the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire department. The Board may consist of active firemen or officers, or other citizens who will observe performance of the Department. A prime responsibility is to determine that all functions required by the State Fire Insurance Board are accomplished in good order. They will assure that the Department has adequate firefighting equipment, (trucks, clothing, hose, communications, etc.) and financial base which will assure success of the Department functions. They will maintain an adequate public relations program to assure

public support. SECTION 4. The President of the Board shall preside at all meetings of the Board; he shall sign all minutes, resolutions, orders and summons of the Board as well as these By-Laws and amendments thereto. He shall appoint all committees and officers, not otherwise provided for the Board. He shall do such other and further things as the Board may direct. The President shall have the Vacation Bible School will the our grade will be authority to fine any member, in an amount not to exceed one dollar (\$1.00) for misbehavior or misconduct during any meeting of the Board of Directors or the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department. SECTION 5. The Vice-President of the Board shall act and have all the authority of the President, in his absence, and shall do such other and further things as the Board may direct. SECTION 6. It shall be the

> duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a record of all department business and an account of the department finances. He/She shall have the authority to collect all monies due the department and shall keep a record of the same. H/She shall also keep a record of proceedings of each regular and called meeting and shall have custody of all business

records pertaining to the organization. It shall further be his/her duty to make a report of funds received and disbursed at each regular meeting.

SECTION 7. Finance: Financial accounts for the department will be maintained in a local bank. Checking or expenditures will be by the Board of Directors and all checks will be signed by the Secretary-Treasurer and one other Board member.

SECTION 8. A Fire Marshal shall be appointed by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 9. Any Board Member who is absent from three (3) consecutive meetings of the Board, without legal excuse, shall be dismissed from the Board and shall be so notofied by the Secretary-Treasurer.

SECTION 10. In case of dismissal, expulsion, resignation, total disability or death of an active member, the Secretary-Treasurer shall, in writing, certify such facts to the Rising Star City and Rural Volunteer Fire Department members in order to elect a replacement.

ARTICLE IV DUTIES FIREFIGHTERS FICERS

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the Fire Chief to preside at all meetings of the Firefighters. He/She (hereinafter referred to as he) shall sign all minutes, resolutions, orders and summons of the Firefighter Department. He shall appoint all committees and officers not otherwise provided for by the firefighters. He shall do such other and further things as the Department may direct. He shall have the authority to fine any member in an amount not to exceed one dollar (\$1.00) for misbehavior or misconduct during any

meeting of the firefighters. It shall further be the duty of the Fire Chief to assume full charge of all members, apparatus and equipment while on parade, at drills, at conventions and at fires or other emergencies requiring the services of the Department. He shall have the right to call out any and all members and apparatus for any purpose incidental to Continued Inside...







Firefighter unit. It shall further be the duty of the Fire Chief to see that a proper record is kept of all fires: the hour and date, the type of occupancy, the name of owner or tenant, the value of peroperty involved, the estimated amount of damage, the amount of insurance carried and insured loss paid, the type of structure, where the fire originated, the extent of its spread and how it was extinguished. He shall make such reports as is provided by law, furnishing a copy of the same to the Secretary-Treasurer of the department.

It shall further be the duty of the Fire Chief and/or Fire Marshal to see that periodic inspections of public and commercial buildings in the City of Rising Star be made for the purpose of providing improved firefighting practices. He shall do such other and further things as the Department shall direct. SECTION 2. In the absence

of the Fire Chief the Assistant Fire Chief shall act and have all authority of the Fire Chief and shall do such other and further things as the Firefighters may direct.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a record of all Firefighters' business, a roster of all Firefighter personnel and an account of the Firefighters' finances. He/She shall receive all fines and minor funds of the Firefighters. It shall further be his/her duty to make a report of funds received and disbursed at each regular meeting. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a record of all fire alarms, meetings, drills and other activities of the Firefighters, making a list of those in attendance. He/She shall be in charge of all Firefighter correspondence.

SECTION 4. The Sergeantat-Arms will assist the Fire Chief in maintaining order as directed and perform other duties as the Fire Chief may direct.

ARTICLE V MEMBERSHIP OF RISING STAR

VOLUNTEER

FIREFIGHTERS SECTION 1. Any resident of the Rising Star area who has attained the age of 18 years, not exceeding 75 years, and who is in good physical condtiion may apply for membership as a Firefighter and will become a member after receiving a favorable vote of the members present at any regular meeting. All applications shall contain endorsement of at least two (2) active firemen; applications shall be read at the first meeting of the department following date of filing and shall not be voted upon until the next regular meeting. If a vacancy exists, a secret ballot is taken and if the applicant receives no more than five (5) negative votes, he shall be declared an active member of the Department. Dismissal of members may be for unfavorable performance, moral turpitude, drunkeness, insubordination or other good cause. Proposed dismissal will be referred to the Board of Directors whose decision will be final.

SECTION 2. An investigating committee may be appointed by the Fire Chief to investigate the moral character and physical condition of all applicants. Their findings will be reported to the Department, and any member of the Department who makes public the findings of this committee, upon being found guilty, will be dismissed from the Department.

SECTION 3. Any Officer who is absent from three (3) consecutive meetings of the Department without legal excuse shall be dismissed from the Department and shall be so notified by the Secretary-Treasurer.

SECTION 4. In case of dismissal, expulsion, resignation, total disability or death of an active member the Secretary-Treasurer shall, in writing, certify such facts to the authorities who, for legal purposes, are furnished a roster of the Firefighters.

SECTION 5. Any member whose name has been dropped from the roll shall deliver all property belonging to the Department which he/she may have in his/her possession to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Depart-

SECTION 6. Any member who reports for duty at a fire, drill or parade in a state of intoxication shall be subject to expulsion from the Firefighters.

SECTION 7. Any Officer or Member of the Firefighters who knowingly fails to report an intoxicated member, as provided in Section 6, shall be fined the sum of one dollar (\$1).

ARTICLE VI This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended by majroity vote of the Rising

Star City & Rural Fire

Department. BY-LAWS RISING STAR CITY & RURAL FIRE DEPART-MENT

ARTICLE I OFFICERS ELECTED BY VOLUNTEER FIRE-MENT

SECTION 1. Elective Officers: The Elective Officcers of the Firemen shall be Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Secretary-Treasurer and Sergeant-at-Arms.

SECTION 2. Elections: The election of Officers shall be conducted at the regular meeting in the month of and newly elected Officers installed at the regular meeting in the following month. Terms of office shall be for one year.

SECTION 3. Fire Chief: the Fire Chief shall have full and complete charge of all equipment at all times. He/She shall have full and complete charge of all Personnel at fires, other emergencies and practice periods and shall direct members at their labors through his/her assistants.

SECTION 4. Assistant Fire Chief: The Assistant Fire Chief shall assume the duties of the Fire Chief in his absence and will cooperate with the Fire Chief during his presence.

SECTION 5. Secretary-Treasurer: The Secretary-Treasurer will keep a record of the proceedings of each regular and called meeting and shall have custody of all business records pertaining to the firemen.

SECTION 6. Sergeant-at-Arms: The Sergeant-at-Arms will assist the Fire Chief in maintianing order as directed and perform other duties as the Fire Chief may direct.

ARTICLE II DUTIES OF FIREMEN SECTION 1. TRAINING: Each member will work diligently to attain the level of proficiency established by the training committee. Members will be examined to determine their level of training proficiency by the Fire Chief.

SECTION 2. PRACTICE PERIODS: Units and Officers of the Firemen will report for regular practice and drills at a place and time to be determined by the Fire Chief.

SECTION 3. ALARMS: In answering alarms, every member shall remain on duty until dismissed by the Officer in charge. Any member, upon answering an alarm and taking charge of a unit, is responsible for returning the unit fully serviced. ARTICLE III

MEETINGS OF FIREMEN SECTION 1. BUSINESS MEETINGS: Regular business meetings will be held at a time and place to be established by the Fire Chief. A quorum shall consist of 50 percent or moree active members.

SECTION 2. VOTING: All active members present shall be required to vote on any question coming before the firemen.

SECTION 3. ATTEN-DANCE: All active members shall attend 40 per-

cent of the scheduled drills. SECTION 5. CONDUCT: If any officer or member of the department be charged with improper conduct while discharging his/her duty as a Firefighter or at any function sponsored by the Fire Department, the charges shall be made in writing, signed by the member making such charges and filed with the Secretary-Treasurer. The Secretary-Tre: ... er will then furnish the accused member with a copy of the charges and require him/her to make a defense before the department, which, if he/she refused to make within one month, after having been notified, he/she will be dismissed from the

Firefighters. ARTICLE IV SUGGESTED COMMIT-TEES

AND THEIR DUTIES SECTION 1. GENERAL: The Fire Chief, upon assuming office, shall appoint standing committees and such other committees as may be required to support the needs of the Firemen. Term of office shall be one year.

SECTION 2. FINANCE COMMITTEE: The Finance Committee will plan and recommend a budget for Firefighters to review the financial situation and organize ways and means to obtain funding.

SECTION 3. TRAINING COMMITTEE: The Training Committee will plan and prescribe suitable training of members and organize and assist the Fire Chief in the conduct of training.

SECTION 4. COMMUNITY RELATIONS COMMIT-TEE: The Community Relations Committee will promote good relations between the firemen and the community, promote hospitality and goodwill, represent the organization (of Firemen) to the news media, other organizations and governmental agencies.

SECTION 5. EQUIPMENT COMMITTEE; The Equipment Committee will assist the Fire Chief in determining requirements, policy on use, care and maintenance of the Firemens' equipment. SECTION 6. MAP COMMIT-TEE: The Map Committee will develop and maintain a station map to include road networks, structures, dwellings and potential water sources for use in an emergency. Additionally, this committee will develop communications notification procedures.

ARTICLE V BOARD OF DIRECTORS SECTION 1. MEMBER-SHIP: The Board of Directors shall consist of six (6) members, three (3) of whom shall reside within the city limits of Rising Star and three (3) of whom shall reside outside the city limits. The Board shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department. SECTION 2. ELECTION: The election of Board Members shall be conducted at the regular Annual Meeting of the Rising Star City & Rural Volunteer Fire Department. The newly elected members shall take their positions on the Board immediately. New Officers shall be elected by the Board at the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors. SECTION 3. QUORUM: Two-thirds of the members designated in Section 1 will constitute a quorum. SECTION 4. ORGANIZA-

TION: There will be elected by the Board of Directors a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and other officers as deemed necessary. Minutes will be written for each meeting. SECTION 5. ABSENCES: Any Board Member who is absent from three (3) consecutive meetings of the Board without legal excuse. shall be dismissed from the Board and shall be notified by the Secretary-Treasurer. PUTNAM SCHOOL IN 1910--Enclosed is a Xerox copy of a picture from your newspaper that my niece, Jewel Golson of Eastland, recently mailed to me. Several years ago, I mailed this picture, along with several other pictures, to Mr. I.G. Mobley of Putnam. We have corresponded for many years.

The picture was given to me a long time ago by one of my childhood friends, Florence Anthony Hammond of Canyon, Texas. The picture was made in 1910 and is the last student body, grades 1 through 10, to use the old wood school building in Putnam. A new two story school was built of red brick about four blocks southeast from the old building. A teacher was Omar Burkett and he is standing in the top row in front of the middle window. I am in the second row down about half way between the windows. Winnie Rutherford has a scraf around her neck and is standing in the top right hand corner of the picture. Earl Rutherford, Winnie's brother, is in the upper left hand part of the picture. Earl is the father of LaVern Rutherford who is the postmaster in Putnam. The Sandlin boys, Harry, Benson, and Crayton, are standing in the door of the school. The Mobley girls, Ruth, Betty, and Mable, are in the center of the top row. They are I.G.'s sisters. I.G. is in the picture too but I am not sure where he is. My sister, Ila Crosby Culwell, late of San Antonio, is next to Bonnie Wayne Britton and they are standing with two other girls in the lower right part of the picture. Bonnie Wayne is the daughter of Doctor Britton who was a pioneer doctor in Callahan County. He attended gunshot wounds, set broken bones and delivered babies from the late 1800's until his death. Florence Anthony Hammond and her brother Barney Anthony, both of Canyon, Texas and Neil More and Jewel Golson, both of Eastland are in the picture but I am not certain about their locations. I am sure that if I had the original picture, I could identify many more people.

I was born in Ellis County, Texas on June 14, 1896, and was next to the youngest of nine children, six girls and three boys, born to Tom Crosby of South Carolina and Columbia Florence Cates of Limestone County, Texas. The Crosby family moved to a farm in Callahan County in 1896, the year I was born.

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
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'Hay Is Perishable?

The Texas Farm Bureau and five of its members have filed suit against Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng and the USDA, seeking inclusion of hay as a perishable crop under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of

In a letter to Lyng, TFB President S.M. True of Plainview, explained that hay is "perishable, labor intensive, and has critical and unpredictable labor demands." True said hay's inclusion as a perishable crop will alleviate serious labor problems experienced by hay producers.

Eastland County Farm Bureau President Joe Frank McCollum said, "making hay a perishable crop will make it eligible for the Special Agricultural Worker (SAW) program. This is a chance to help livestock producers who have been shut out of this important source of labor."

A similar suit was filed in Lubbock last year seeking inclusion of cotton in the Act. That suit resulted in cotton being classifed as a fruit, making it eligible for the SAW program. The five plaintiffs joining Texas Farm Bureau in the suit are Sulphur Springs dairyman Don Smith, Trinity cattleman Russ Arnold, rancher James Wood of Gilmer, and Warren and Anna Madson, ranchers from McLennan County.

FmHA's Proposed Lending Rules

Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued today, according to FmHA Texas State Director

J. Lynn Futch. The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Futch said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. There are approximately 5,000 delinquent borrowers in Texas, many of whom should be assisted with this Program once implemented.

In related actions, the Agency also issued proposed regulations to:

DENIM? The popularity of denim

clothing is a wonderful example of the old saving that "you can't please all of the people all of the time." For every person who likes faded denim, there seems to be another who is unhappy about creases, steaking or color loss.

Denims Always Lose Dye

Changing in most denim fabrics are inevitable because they're indigo piece dyed fabrics. The dye is applied in a heavily concentrated form so the residuals are most on the surface of the fabric. Friction with the body, rubbing or mechanical action during laundering will dislodge the dye particles from clothing.

The loss of color will be most apparent on creases, double seam thickness and edges, since they receive greater abrasion. Heavy denim lacks draping capabilities and retain the same position of creases in the washer and dryer, this also contributes to color loss and streaking.

Reducing Color Loss, Creases and Streaks

So what if you don't like the creases and streaks? They can't be eliminated, but you can reduce them. Turn the garment inside out for washing if it's not heavily soiled. Underload the washer, increase the water level and shake out the garment before putting in the

Another alternative is to buy jeans made from a polyester-cotton blend. The dyes used on blends are different from the dyes used on 100% cotton, and are less likely to fade.

Fading Your Denim and

Do you like the faded, streaked look for your jeans and other denim clothes? If you do, you can save some money by purchasing regular denim cloth or clothes and fading them yourself.

Senator Bob Glasgow recognized on May 20, 1988, the importance of the designation of the month of May as Bluegrass Music Month in Texas.


The Governor proclaimed May as Bluegrass Music Month in Texas upon the request of Senator Glasgow who was the author of legislation creating the Texas Music Commission.

Fred Snyder, director of the American Red Cross disaster team, reported Saturday that a total of eighty dwellings or businesses were damaged or destroyed in the Comanche flood area.

There were four homes destroyed and 29 reported with major damage and 40 with minor damage. Three mobile homes suffered major damage and six apartments minor damage. Thirteen small businesses were affected and one public building.

Ninety-seven were sheltered following the flood and 650 meals furnished to those stranded.

It was previously reported that one home was destroyed by a tornado in Jones County but this report has been uplated to read two homes.

Member's of the Red Cross team that assisted families with food, clothing and shelter came from Wichita falls, San Antonio, Stephenville, and Temple.


