Allen is a longtime cooperater with the SCD. Soil and water conservation are accomplished on the Allen Ranch by the application of proper range use, deferred

grazing, brush control, crop residue utilization, terracing and contour farming, SCD officials state. "When I practice deferred grazing and proper use, the grass improves in quality and vigor, and my farm ponds catch water only in the big rains," Allen says. Most years Allen raises 100% lamb crop. He believes that credit for this goes to an adequate supply of good grass at all times. Allen runs cattle, sheep, and goats on his 1950 acre ranch.

The Rising Star Wildcats, playing their best game of the year, according to many observers, defeated their neighborhood rivals, the May Tigers, 44-0 at May last Saturday night. It was the first conference game for both teams, and for the May Tigers, perennial thorn in the Wildcat flesh, it put a sad finish to an otherwise delightful Homecoming event.

It was one of the worst defeats that the Tigers have ever absorbed at the hands of the Rising Star team, and it marked a resurgence in spirit on the part of the Wildcats which gives a new promise to what has been an off and on season. Usually games between the two teams are decided by one or two points and at most by a touchdown with the outcome a toss-up.

## New Medical Facilities Are Greeted Here

This issue of the Rising Star Record carries full-page congratulatory advertisements from Rising Star business and professional people which are of interest to all concerned with available medical and hospital facilities in Rising Star.

The location in Rising Star of Dr. Allen Dean Schmitt, who has moved his offices here from Ranger, Texas, and the steps taken for the early re-opening of Rising Star Hospital where Dr. Schmitt is now located, are developments greeted with genuine satisfaction by the people of this area. It appeared for a time that the 25-room hospital, one of the largest and best facilities of its kind in this section, would have to remain closed. Dr. Schmitt opened his office in the hospital Monday.

Similarly the many friends and patients of Dr. Ben Bradley are happy that he has chosen to remain in Rising Star community and is this week opening his new private clinic on the Brownwood highway a mile south of Rising Star and near his home. Dr. Bradley returns to Rising Star from Cook County Hospital, Chicago, Ill., to formally open his clinic Wednesday of this week.

Rising Star Hospital will be open for bed patients much earlier than was predicted, according to information this week. Equipment, purchased from the now closed West Texas Hospital and Clinic in Ranger, has been moved to the hospital and its installation is being completed this week.

Included is a large X-ray machine which an Abilene technician was expected to complete installing Tuesday; a complete laboratory and supplies; two oxygen machines and tents; a portable X-ray; and other equipment.

In addition, Dr. Schmitt has brought a great amount of his own equipment including examination room furniture and equipment and surgical instruments.

Mrs. O. E. Wilkerson, wife of the late Rising Star druggist, and a registered nurse, is in charge of the hospital office and is technician for the hospital.

Mrs. Georgia Street, who was with Dr. Bradley as nurse and technician for a number of years while Dr. Bradley operated the hospital, is in charge of the office and laboratory at the new Bradley clinic.

## Bank Deposits Near 2 1/2 Million Before Harvest

Deposits in the First State Bank on October 3, date of the most recent call for condition by the State Banking Commissioner, were \$2,420,317.98, a decline of about \$75,000 from the date of the last preceding call on June 15, according to the statement published in the Rising Star Record this week.

The decline is normal for the period, just before the harvesting of fall crops which give a big boost to the figures.

Harvesting of the peanut crop in this area is just now getting ting under way, with several loads arriving early in the week. Grade and yield per acre are much better than was predicted late in the summer and the income from the crop is expected to be considerable.

Local buyers estimated that 100 tons of peanuts were received here through Tuesday with the average grade improving from 55 to 65. Average yields were also considerably increased.

## Demos, 700 Strong, Cheer Wright in Attack on GOP at Eastland Rally

EASTLAND. — Jim Wright, United States Congressman from Fort Worth, gave a rousing, enthusiastic campaign speech to Democrats, 700 strong, gathered in Eastland City Park Tuesday, Oct. 4, for a barbecue and rally in the interest of the Kennedy-Johnson presidential ticket.

Eastland County Democrats for Kennedy-Johnson were hosts to the throng from Weatherford, Jacksboro, Baird, Clyde, Abilene, Cisco, Ranger, Eastland Breckenridge, Carbon, Putnam and other points in North Central Texas.

Richard Moore of Cisco and Mrs. Roscoe Hopper, Ranger, are co-chairmen of the organization which has set up headquarters in Ranger.

Sam Aills of Ranger was general chairman of arrangements for the rally.

Wright, a pilot during World War II, a former state representative from Parker County, former county judge of Parker County, former mayor of Weatherford, brought what the gathered Democrats were waiting for, a strong attack on the poli-

cies of the present administration in Washington and outlined the course the Democratic party would follow if they win in November.

Wright said "Almost without challenge, certain unthinking people sling the mud of 'big spending,' 'socialism' and 'welfare state' at the Democrats. In so doing, they ignore the Republican platform and the record of the 'modern Republican'."

He discussed the financial condition of the government and said "The national debt was reduced \$11 billion under Truman, even with the Korean War. Under the Republicans, the debt has increased \$19 billion."

Accompanying Wright from Weatherford were Mrs. Herbert Smith, State Executive Democratic Committeewoman for that district, Charlie Minshall, Ed Nash, attorney, County Judge Frank Woodruff, Bobby Joe Tipton.

Wright was introduced by French Robertson of Abilene, Committeeman of State Democratic Executive Committee, 24th Senatorial District, who called him "one of the young men destined for greater achievements on the national scene."

Among prominent state and area Democrats present were Callahan County Executive Director of the Kennedy-Johnson Campaign, Charles Walker of Baird, Wiley Connally, brother and representative of State Democratic Chairman Ed Connally of Abilene, Scott Bailey, Cisco, newly elected state representative from this district, who gave greetings to the gathering.

Attending with Robertson from Abilene were Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hughes, Hughes is Taylor County chairman for Kennedy-Johnson. Also present were Randall Jackson, state Executive Committeeman of 22nd district and Mrs. Jackson, Chairman of Woman's Affairs, 17th District of Baird, Raymon Thompson, County Judge from Graham and a state Democratic Executive Committee member from 23rd Dist., Dr. K. P. Green, W. C. Reid and Jack and Neal, County Attorney, all of Graham.

Grady Hogue, president of Cisco Junior College served as master of ceremonies.

The Eastland High School Stage band, under the direction of Phil Hewett, gave a concert preceding the barbecue and the Harmonettes, a girls quartet from Baird High School entertained the crowd following the dinner.

A thundershower moved the crowd from the park grounds into the American Legion Building but a typically, enthusiastic Democratic crowd interrupted Wright's speech on eight occasions to give him their resounding applause in approval of his statements. He was given a standing ovation at the conclusion of his forceful, effective presentation of the Democratic picture.

## Peanut Research Program Explained To Growers Here

Approximately 25 peanut farmers of this area were present at a meeting Tuesday night hosted by the Young Farmers Club at the High School agriculture building when a research program in Southern blight and other destructive peanut diseases was explained. The program, sponsored by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Ass'n and agricultural services, is financed by voluntary contributions from growers.

Peanut diseases are costing the growers three million dollars annually, Ross Wilson, manager of the SWPGA, and other speakers told the group. Among those present and appearing on the program were D. B. Warren, SWPGA director, and County Agent J. M. Cooper.

After funds are obtained, the group was told, all research will be carried on by the State Agriculture Experiment Station with the possibility that research will be done in Eastland and Comanche counties.

Frank Gray is president of the Young Farmers Club which will sponsor the program in the Rising Star area.

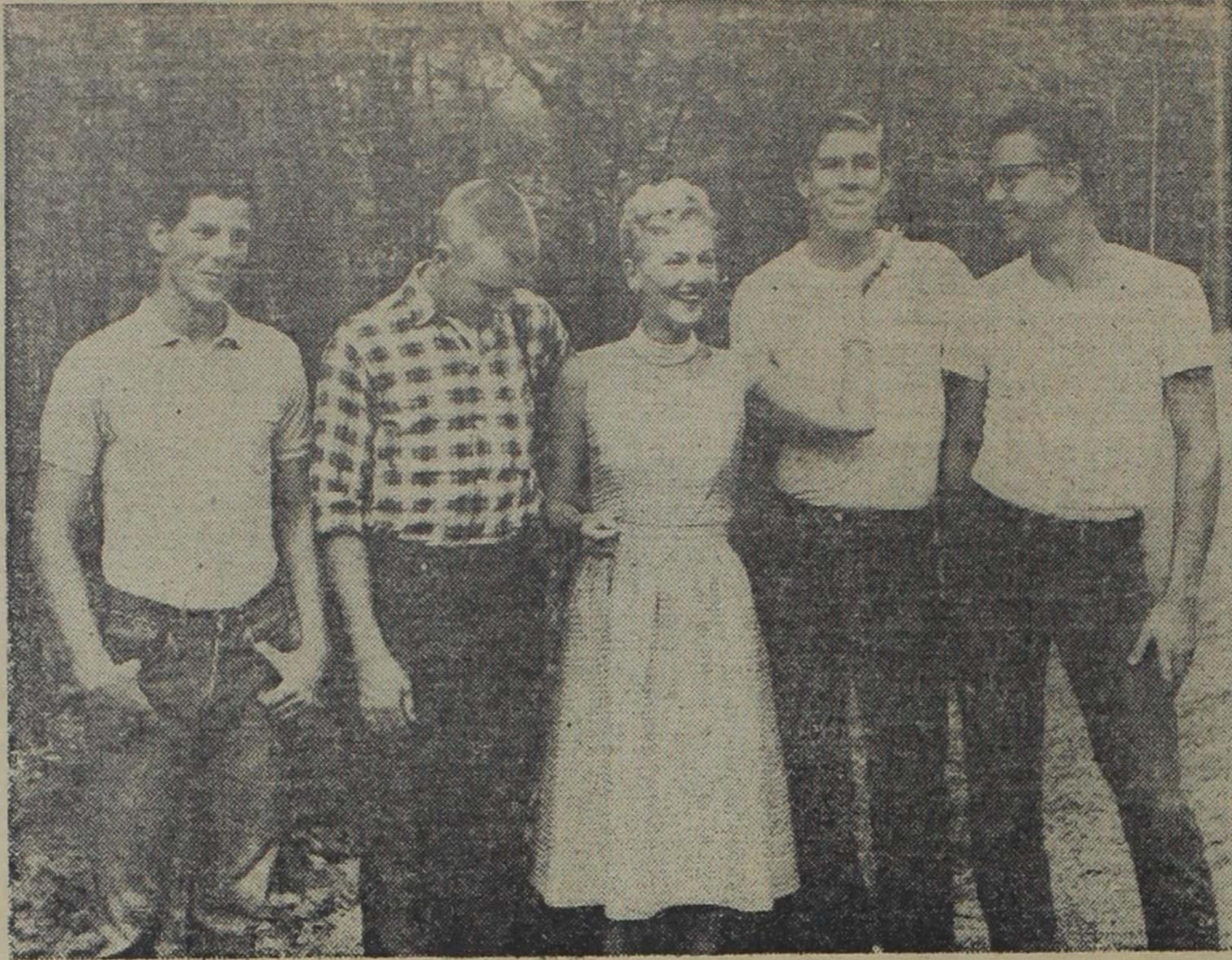

Also, the president appointed a committee for raising the flag every day.

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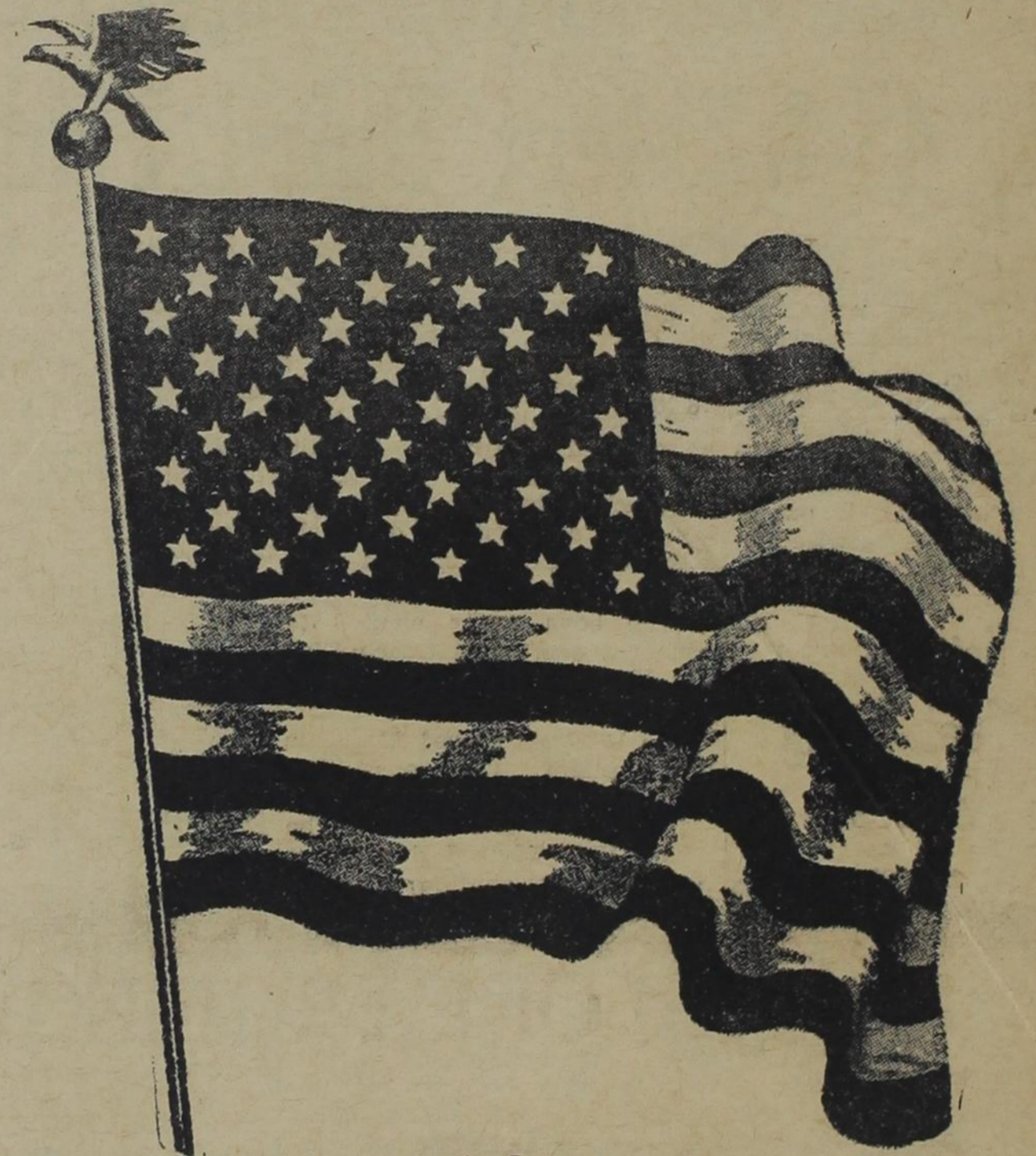
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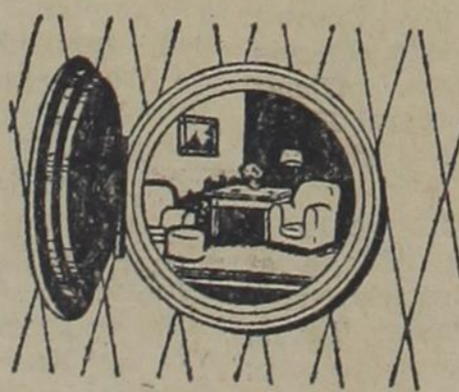

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

The thrill of the hunt is exhilarating, and yet at the same time can be soothing. This paradox of emotions probably accounts for the tremendous popularity of the sport.

But there is still another aspect—this one, not so attractive—the ever-present possibility of accidental deaths attributable to an accident.

During 1959, there were 159 firearms. While a large number were children who had pulled a "toy" gun out of Dad's bureau, most were outdoor hunting or allied "cleaning" accidents.

By October 1, 1960—during dove hunting season—there were four deaths from hunting accidents according to the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas.

However, death from firearms is not the only way to die during hunting season. A good many hunters slip and fall over precipices while gazing off into the distance ahead instead of watching their steps on unsure ground.

But the greatest danger is still the hunter's weapon. Here are the ten commandments of shooting safety, which if followed seriously may save your own or your partner's life.

- 1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. 2. Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely—keep the safety on until ready to shoot.

3. Unload guns when not in use, take down or open breech—guns should be carried in cases to shooting area.

4. Be sure barrel is clear of obstructions, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the gun you carry.

5. Be sure of the target before you pull the trigger—know identifying features of the game you hunt.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not intend to shoot—avoid all horseplay.

7. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun—never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

8. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water—at target practice be sure your backdrop is adequate.

9. Store ammunition and guns separately, beyond reach of children.

10. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

\$100 Million Per Year Is Estimate of Loan Sharks' Take

With the pitch of the carnival side-show barker, thousands of small loan companies in Texas offer Texans an opportunity to borrow money with "no red tape" and "easy terms". Unfortunately, the thousands of Texans who respond to the bait of easy cash do not know that in so doing, they have become the victims of loan sharks, who annually reap a harvest of \$100,000,000 from usurious interest charges.

So says Abner V. McCall, executive vice president of Baylor University and chairman of a state-wide committee of businessmen, labor leaders, lawyers, educators, newspaper editors and others who are waging a campaign to put loan sharks out of business in Texas.

The committee is working for the passage of amendment No. 4 to the Texas Constitution which will be voted on at the Nov. 8 general election. The amendment would give the Texas Legislature the authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders and fix maximum rates of interest.

"We now have no legal program which can stop the loan shark," says McCall. "He can violate the few laws which we do have, but there is no punishment of any kind. The loan shark doesn't have to pay any sort of fine, he can't be imprisoned and he can't be forced out of business."

As proof of the fact that Texas' law can be openly violated by loan sharks without fear of punishment, McCall referred to the activities of the Attorney General's office for the past four years.

"The Attorney General has filed some 365 lawsuits charging about 465 lenders with accessing usurious interest and using various means of subterfuge to collect total charges on small loans that range from 200 per cent to over 1,000 per cent a year. The courts have granted 60 injunctions against these loan sharks and all of the injunctions tested have been upheld by superior courts. But all an injunction does is to obtain a promise from the loan shark not to charge illegal interest rates in the future. If the loan shark goes ahead with his unethical activities—and he often does—he can only be found in contempt of court. There is no other penalty that can be assessed."

McCall said that the Attorney General's office has only four men working full time in the finance law division. "The number of loan shark operations in Texas it has been estimated at approximately 4,000. This means that each of these four assistant attorney generals has about 1,000 loan sharks to watch. With the odds so heavily in favor of the loan shark, the loan shark feels the rewards are worth the minor risks and continues to fleece the public."

According to figures developed by the Attorney General's investigation, McCall stated, "Lending of small sums of money can be fantastically profitable in Texas. A loan shark can start with only \$50 and in only 12 months that \$50 can be increased to \$1,200."

"A woman in Austin went into the small loan business with only \$2,000. In only 18 months, she had over \$29,000 in outstanding loans. Loan sharks can make this type of profit because they can prey on the desperate and the ignorant."

"Every civic-minded Texan has the moral responsibility to help protect his fellow man from the clutches of the loan shark. He can fulfill this responsibility by voting for amendment No. 4," McCall concluded.

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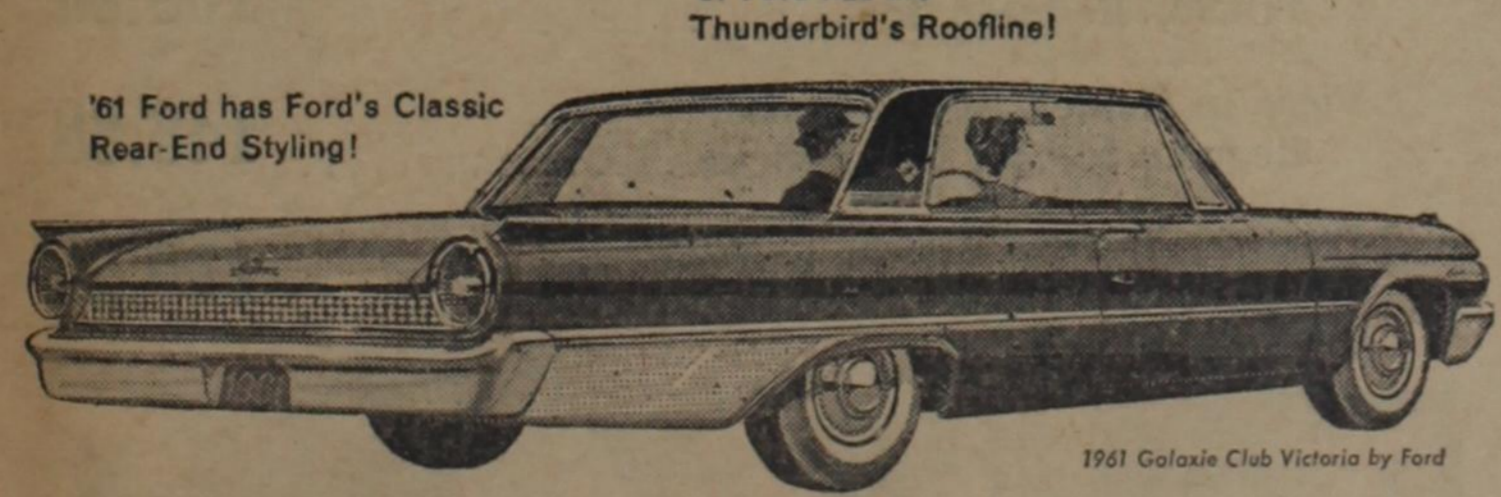
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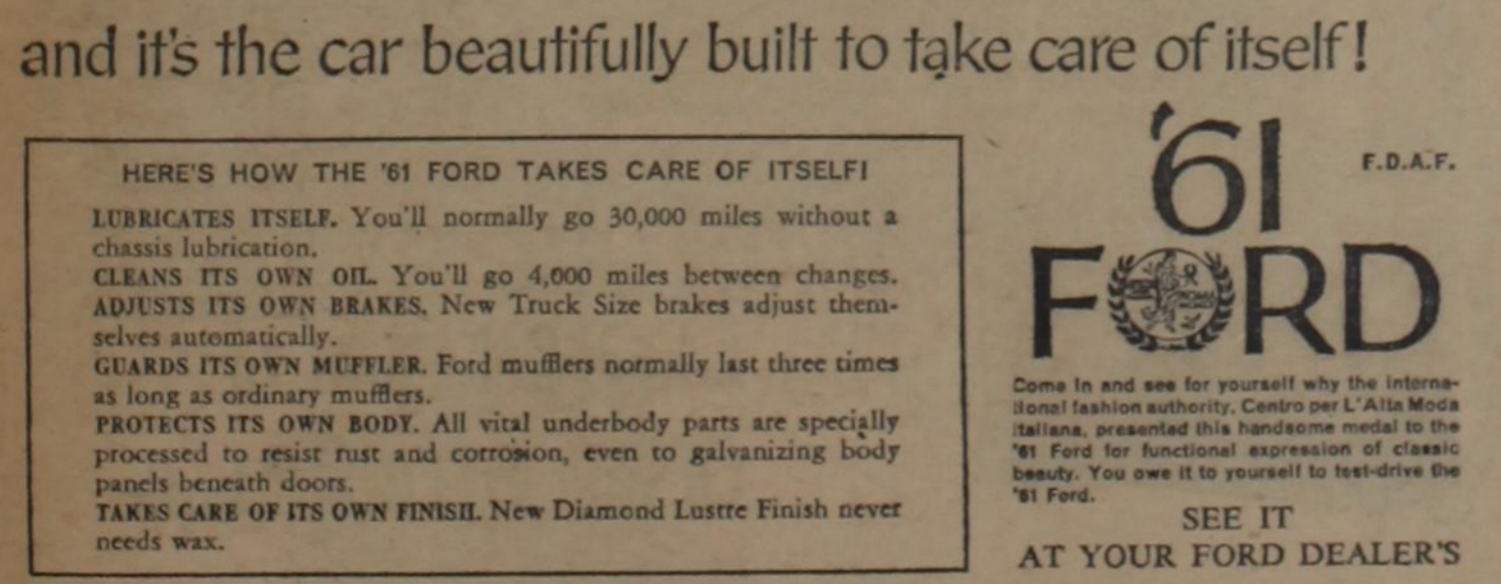
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## WTCC to Conduct Tour of Stock Feeding Region

LUBBOCK.—With millions of bushels of grain produced in the area with thousands of cattle, sheep and hogs why does West Texas ship so much of its livestock into the cornbelt to be fed for market?

To learn some of the feeding techniques used in cornbelt operations, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce next month is sponsoring a tour of interested farmers and ranchers, bankers and agriculturists into

the Des Moines and Ames regions of Iowa.

Tour conductor Dr. W. L. Stangel said that anyone interested is welcome to join the tour. Stangel is chairman of the Agriculture and Livestock Committee of the West Texas Chamber and dean emeritus of Texas Tech's School of Agriculture.

Arrangements have been made, Stangel said, for accommodations on bedroom-type Pullman cars leaving Lubbock and Fort Worth on the afternoon of November 26. The cars will be put on the same train at Kansas City. Return trip is to be December 1.

First stop will be Chicago to attend the International Livestock Exposition where Texas Tech's Stanley Anderson is to name the Grand Champion fat steer.

From Chicago, the group will travel to actual farmer-feeder locations in Iowa and will also inspect the feeding research facilities at Iowa State University.

Livestock feeding specialists of the university will conduct the entire tour of feeding operations, giving the group an opportunity to discuss actual feeding operations with farmers in the area, Stangel said.

Chartered buses will pick up the group at trainside and return them each night to the Pullman accommodations which will serve as hotel rooms.

Cost of the five-day tour,

including train fare, Pullman bedroom, chartered buses and four planned meals, is \$165 per person. Reservations may be made before November 1 by contacting the Abilene office of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Texas Tech and Texas A&M are cooperating in the tour.

## Social Security Questions Answered

QUESTION: What were the major changes in the 1960 Amendments in the old-age, survivors, and disability provisions of the Social Security Act?

ANSWER: Disability benefits can now be paid before age 50; amount of work or social security credit required to get benefits was reduced about one-third; work restrictions changed for 1961 in a way that will benefit most beneficiaries; survivors of insured workers who died before January 1, 1940 and after March 31, 1938, may now receive monthly benefits; some children of deceased parents will have their benefit amounts raised; dependent widowers of women who died before September 1950 may now get benefits; parents who work for sons or daughters (except household work) may get social security credits beginning in 1961; clergymen who failed to file waiver for social security credits before April 15, 1959 may do so before April 15, 1962; part or all the lump-sum death benefit may now be paid directly to the funeral home.

QUESTION: What does the removal of the age 50 requirement for disability benefits mean?

ANSWER: It means that a disabled person who has five years of social security credits out of the ten years before becoming disabled may be paid his social security benefits regardless of any age requirement. Too, minor children and qualified wives may also be paid benefits based on the disabled parent's earnings record prior to disability.

QUESTION: I had my social security record frozen under the

old disability freeze provisions. What should I do now?

ANSWER: If you have not had a letter from your social security district office by October 31, asking you to file your new claim for monthly benefits, then write that office for information on your rights to a new claim.

ANSWER: The first month such new benefits are payable for is November 1960.
