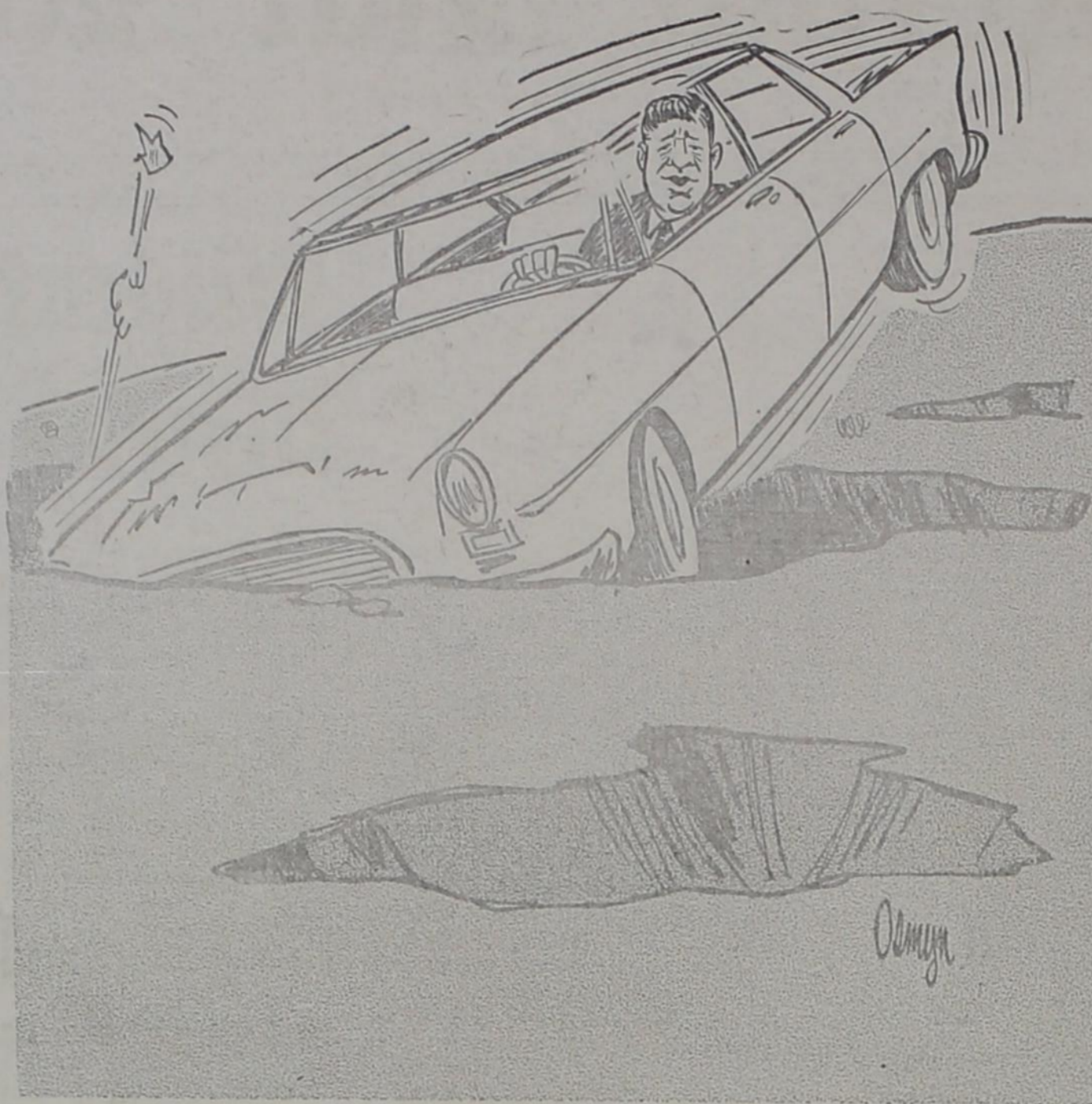
Douglas Eakin is under treatment in Wichita Falls for an attack of pneumonia and flu. He is improving.
