The contract calls for surfacing of 8.07 miles of highway to be designated as Farm-to-Market Road No. 2526.

The contract was for \$121,-766.85. Eighty days is allowed for completion.

Detailed rates may be obtained from Charlie Smith, postmaster, or members of his staff.

A charge will also be made for short paid mail, or mail with insufficient postage. Such mail will be rated for the insufficient dress. There will be reports on postage plus a new short paid charge of five cents, dispatched for delivery and delivered to the addressee upon payment of the

> This means that if a letter is mailed with only four cents postage, when it weighs for eight cents, a charge of four cents per ounce plus five cents will be marked on the letter, the letter mailed and delivered to the addressee when the additional charge is paid.

The new rates were enacted by Congress early this year.

the books elsewhere, but Smith This human error — and that still claimed that his belated "acceptance" had nevertheless sealed the contract with Brown.

Was there a contract? No, the offer had lapsed because it had not been accepted in the circumstances within a reasonable time. There are many ways to end an offer. You may withdraw it, or the other party may turn it down directly or by making a counter'

Here Smith had failed to accept Brown's offer within a reasonable time, which ended it just as though it had been withdrawn.

What is a reasonable time? It varies. The offer could expire in a few minutes in the stock market or last for quite a while, depending upon what a court would think is a reasonable time.

But in Smith's case six months was unreasonable.






