be looking at Texas as it holds its first (and probably last) presidential preference vote in connection with the party primaries next Saturday.

Eastland County voters are now on Daylight Saving Time and have one week to ponder the complexities of the ballot.

The Democrats will find a combination Eastland - Latin American ballot when the polls open at 7 a.m. Saturday at the nine county precinct voting

Three presidential hopefuls each have three delegates on the ballots as well as one set of totally uncommitted group of three delegates.

Statewide Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others are urging that voters check all three of the Lloyd Bentsen delegates in David Finney and Jon Newton. order to insure a strong leadership for Sen. Bentsen and Gov. Briscoe at the New York Democratic Convention in June. In Eastland County Mike delegate nominees.



The New Testament uses the term "church" to describe those called out of the world by the Gospel to follow Christ (2 Thessalonians 2:14). The collection of believers is also referred to as "the body of Christ" (Ephesians 5:23). This same passage makes it clear that those who are saved are in the church; otherwise stated, the "church" is the collective term for the community of the saved. Those who are saved are said to be "added" by God to it (Acts 2:47). But, how does a sinner: lost, condemned, separated from God and without hope, come to have the forgiveness of past sins, so that God can include him among the saved?
