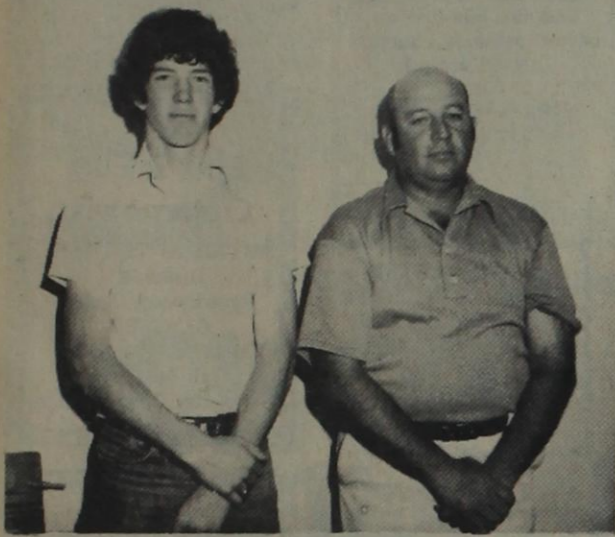


Kyle Williams To Attend Annual Texas Energy Science Symposium



Kyle Williams, a student at Rising Star, has been selected to attend the 19th Annual Texas Science Symposium for High Schools at the University of Texas at Austin June 5-8.

Frank Gray, teacher at the high school, will accompany him to the symposium.

West Texas Utilities Company, a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation which is jointly putting on the symposium with the university, will sponsor them.

Some 500 outstanding science students and their teachers from throughout the state have been selected by their schools to attend the four-day meeting. Scientists and engineers for industry and education will

discuss nuclear physics, nuclear engineering and related topics.

Participants will spend two afternoons touring the science laboratories at the university, including those where experiments sponsored by the foundation are being carried on in the nuclear (fusion) research.

"We are pleased to be able to provide this opportunity for some of our young people and their teachers," says Durwood Chalker, President, of West Texas Utilities Company. "Hearing such notable authorities in the energy field and seeing the facilities at the university should be a most interesting educational experience for them."

Students Protest May School Board Decision Over Coach

In a special called meeting, the May School Board conducted some regular business and also listened to interested parents and students with regard to three teacher contracts. The board had voted in a previous meeting in April to not renew contracts for Mrs. Debra Cooksey, Kindergarten teacher; Mrs. Martin, third and fourth grade teacher and Dan McGhee, Coach.

Individuals at the special session expressed to the board members and Supt. M.H. Buchanan a desire to learn the reasons for these contracts not being renewed. Supt. M.H. Buchanan spoke to the crowd by reading from the handbook used by school board trustees, Title 14, which states that a reason need not be given for renewing a teacher's contract.

Teachers are given a written one year contract that is binding.

Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Cooksey were represented by a member of the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA), who spoke to members of the board in their behalf.

Each teacher was then given a chance to speak in their own behalf. Parents, students, and interested members of the community were also given a chance to speak in behalf of the teachers—pro or con.

Petitions signed by members of the community supporting Coach McGhee and Mrs. Cooksey were presented to the board. Mrs. Martin asked that a petition not be circulated in her behalf.

The board then went into executive session to discuss the three contracts.

When the board returned, the three previous motions were rescinded and members voted on the individual contracts. Mrs. Debra Cooksey was re-hired by a vote of 6-0. Mrs. Martin's contract was not renewed due to a lack of a second on the motion. Coach Dan McGhee lost his contract by a 4-2 vote. Voting in favor of rehiring McGhee were Joanne Windham and Tom Petross. Voting against McGhee were: Jim Wells, Jerry Lindley, Mike Hardwick, and Eddie Hardy.

Students were especially upset over the decision and following the Thursday night meeting went on

a protest march through town, remaining out of classes. Protesting students said they would continue to demonstrate until Coach McGhee was rehired.

Monday Kenny Hignight, student representative stated that Board members had told students that if they would return to classes the board would give reasons for dismissing Coach McGhee Wednesday night. Kenny also stated that some students were given ultimatums by the board and received calls to their parents.

The board has called another special meeting for Wednesday night, May 9th.

Vocational Students To Host Open House At Mobile Home

Homemaking students at Rising Star High School will host an Open House Thursday, May 17th from 9:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. at the school to show the public just what they have accomplished during a unique "hands-on" learning experience.

During the past school quarter, students in Mrs. Dorothy Diddle's homemaking class have redecorated and refurbished a home right on the school campus, through a program offered by the Texas Manufactured Housing Association.

Using a teaching curriculum developed by Libby Crouch, a TMHA member and a former vocational homemaking teacher, the Rising Star High School students were able to complete specific decorating projects inside a previously-owned mobile home delivered to the school campus by an Abilene manufactured housing retailer. The retailer, Paul Washburn, Sr. of 4618 North First Street in Abilene, also provided the homemaking class with a budget to cover the cost of materials.

The cooperative program, titled "Teaching Homemaking... in a Mobile Home Laboratory", now in-

involved more than 200 high school vocational homemaking classes throughout Texas. The project was initiated during the 1978 Vocational Homemaking Teachers Association of Texas Convention in Dallas, where a student-reddecorated home was on display.

Mrs. Diddle says everyone is cordially invited to attend the Open House at Rising Star High School. The mobile home is located directly north of the Home Ec Cottage. Graduation will be May 24th in the High School Auditorium.

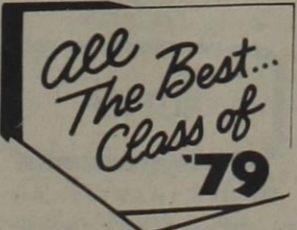


Kim Harris

Social Security

People who anticipate that they or their children will need social security numbers in the near future might well take some time to get together the evidence they will need when they apply.

Everyone, no matter how old or young, must furnish evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful admission status when applying for a social security number. In addition, a person 18 or older must apply in person.

It is a good idea to apply well before the number is needed, since it takes about 6 weeks to receive the number after the necessary evidence is submitted.

Only original or certified copies of documents should be submitted. Photocopies are not acceptable, and documents are subject to verification.

A birth certificate or

church record of birth or baptism recorded before a person's 5th birthday is preferred as proof of a person's age and place of birth for people born in the U.S. Other documents can be used if these are not available.

Evidence of identity should show the person's name and signature or photograph.

Naturalized U.S. citizens should show their citizenship papers. Non U.S. citizens should show their immigration papers.

If parents are having trouble getting evidence of identity for young children, they might consider clinic or doctor's records, vaccination certificates, day care or nursery school records, insurance policies, or church school records as possible sources.

The leaflet, "Applying for social security number," lists many different proofs that can be used. A copy of this leaflet can be obtained at the Abilene social security office.

NEWS FLASHES

Heavy flooding in the south part of Eastland County Monday night prompted many countians to wonder:

"Whatever happened to the Sabanna River Watershed Flood Control Plan?"

A check with Ronald Bailey of the Soil Conservation Office shows that the plan is "on schedule" and moving forward - and that the flooding of this spring is another strong indication of the need for this program, which over an eight-year period, would see the construction of 15 structures to prevent flooding.

The Sabanna Plan (initiated as far back as 1960, and officially kicked-off with a giant rally in Gorman in September of 1966) has been re-evaluated and approved by the SCS, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The plan has also been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Its next step, Bailey says, is a review by the Water Resources Council in Washington. If it clears that, it would then go to the Office of Management and Budget.

There's good indication that the program could be funded this year, and if so, the work could begin with 18 months.

The plan for an eight-year installation, and easements are already being accepted. Others wishing to let easements in connection with the plan, may do so through the County Judge's Office. The County Commissioners Court is a joint sponsor for the project.

Spring thunderstorms continued to dump moisture on Eastland County as April ended

and May began. About two inches of rain was reported from most points with higher amounts reported particularly from the south part of the county, early Tuesday morning.

The cool front moved through slowly, prompting thunderstorms and accompanying rain, with hail reported in some areas stripping trees between Carbon and Eastland and other areas.

A severe thunderstorm alert was issued about 12:30 a.m. in the area generally from Rising Star and Carbon, where the heaviest rain was reported, covering FM 1027.

Eastland County Dispatch Chief Bob Mercer reported the flash-flood warning expired about mid-morning, and that logs showed that Constable George Hicks of Rising Star had reported high water east of that city about midnight when State Highway Department crews were notified.

A Highway Dept. spokesman said Tuesday morning that high water was evident on the access roads near the Leon River. Roads south of Carbon were over-run with high water in many areas.

Gorman reported had two inches of rain, and Olden recorded 1.8 inches.

At mid-morning Tuesday, water still had not gone over the spillway at Lake Leon, but water was running briskly in all the north and south forks of the Leon, so with the continued runoff from what was a generally wide-spread heavy rain, the water should go over, it was believed.

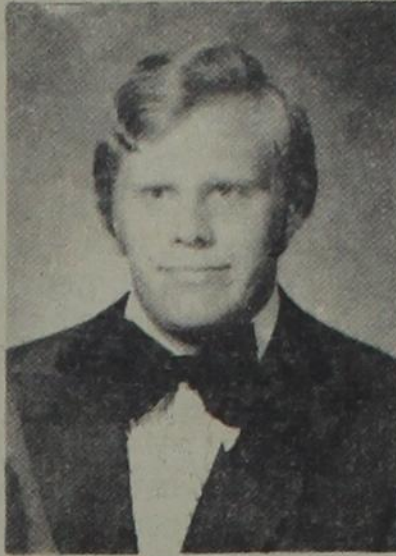
Becky has been very active in 4-H winning blue ribbons with clothing, animal projects and demonstrations.

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C. - I have introduced a bill (H.R. 3809) in the House of Representatives this past week entitled the Producer Elected Farm Policy Advisory Board Act of 1979. This bill will establish a vehicle whereby the Nation's farmers and ranchers can bring direct producer input into the decision making processes of the Department of Agriculture on policies, procedures, programs, and practices. I believe this will help to alleviate a common complaint from farmers and ranchers that the Secretary and the Department are not responsive to the needs of agriculture.

I have provided that the Board will function for a period of five years, after which the Congress may review the Board's record of achieving the objectives set forth in the bill prior to extending the authority of the Board or letting it expire. I feel that this bill will help to reduce the number and improve the credibility of existing appointed advisory groups in the USDA and will allow the Nation's agricultural producers direct input by their elected representatives in the decision making processes of the Nation's agricultural policies.

Several of my colleagues have introduced bills this session to provide for Cost of Production Boards that would formalize the existing practice of appointing those persons. I believe these bills fail to recognize that usually such Boards only become the instruments of the current Ad-

ministration in power at the time, and therefore are unable to speak out freely and act accordingly on the issues that are of concern to the farmer. Too, these boards would lack the authority to address the full scope of agricultural issues that my bill envisions.

The Board I propose will be composed of 30 agricultural producers, three from each of the ten regions across the Nation. These Board members will be elected by the ASCS committee members in each county in the U.S. and will be unpaid for their services, though they will be reimbursed for travel and per diem expenses while actually on Board business. The members will serve three year terms with a two term limit. The ten regions designated in my bill were selected on the basis of total agricultural income and the number of farms, in an effort to achieve a good cross section and fair representation of all farmers and ranchers and agricultural production. The Board's clerical and administrative support will come from the Department of Agriculture in an effort to insure that the Board will function as an integral part of the Department and Secretary's office. The Board will nominate all commodity task force members, who will be appointed by the Secretary. The Board and all task force meetings will be open to the public and records of their meetings will be available for public inspection.

The cost of the course will be \$2.50 per

couple for each of the 16 week lessons. Because of the cost, students will be allowed to pay one-half of the tuition at registration and one-half after eight weeks.

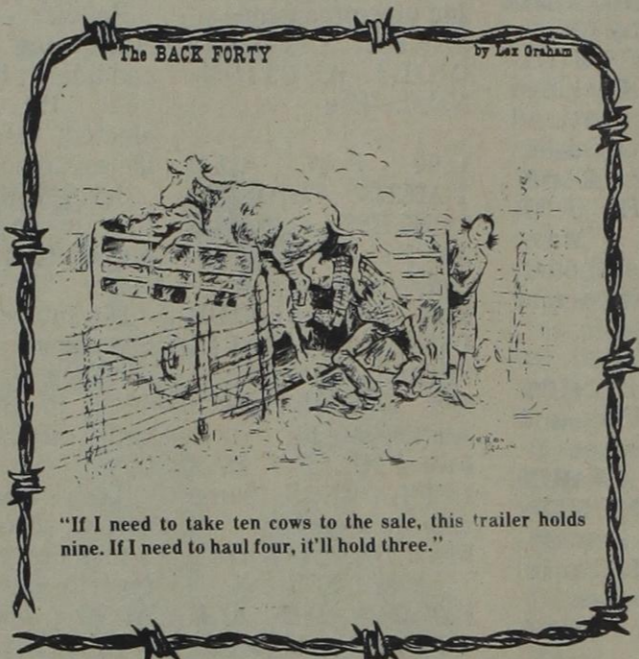

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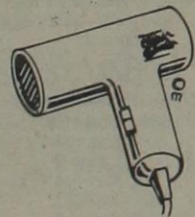
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
