Just prior to writing this article, I have been flying for over two hours out of Brownwood Municipal Airport. Let me say that I really enjoyed it and came back refreshed. I can't begin to tell you how the city of Brownwood or Rising Star looks from the air. But it is a sight that I wish every man, woman and child could see.

As I've said, I was flying out of Brownwood with a Mr. Howard O. Wilson who is the weatherman at the airport and who is also the same Mr. Wilson you hear on Radio Station, KEAN in Brownwood. "H.O." as he prefers to be called had already soloed but has not been flying for the last five or six months. I got him interested again and have been giving him some instruction at the same time. He is now doing what we call touch and go landings, that is he makes a landing, but instead of stopping he adds power and takes off again. We have been also doing what is called power off landings. A power off landing is when you your car and coast to a stop. The landing is made completely by gliding the airplane

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without using the engine down to a safe landing. I cut the power off about ten miles from the airport and we glided all the way down, landed on the proper runway and this without no help from the engine in any way. We started from only three thousand feet high, but from a

higher altitude we could have gone much further. Like I said before, an airplane just does not fall out of the sky and any pilot using common sense can normally make a safe landing in any type of large field or

Brownwood Municipal Airport has three runways, of which only one is normally used because of prevailing wind conditions. Brownwood is operated by 'lefty' Gardner whom by the way is a Colonel in the Confederate Air Force. 'Lefty' operates a crop dusting service and spends many days away from his home field. tell you what runway to land on or when to land or take off. He is in an advisory capacity only, but he will tell you if other aircraft are about, the barometer setting and direction of wind. Other than that, you are on your own about landing and in which direction and on what runway. It is up to you to use safe and sane judgment. At an airport with a control tower, you have to follow the operator's instructions to a 'T'. The operator is there to protect you and to protect other aircraft near you. Remember too, that the operator is human also and can be prone to make errors or mistake your aircraft for another so again it is up to you, the pilot in command, to make the final judgment. He may be handling up to 10 to 12 other aircraft in the area besides yours and he has to make his instructions curt and short. If you call the tower, know in advance what you want to say, say it, and get off the air.

The pattern in most times is flown in a large rectangle, and has what they call legs. Normally you enter the pattern at a 45 degree angle until you are the proper distance from the runway. Then you will fly the downwind leg (this is in the same direction the wind is blowing), then you will turn to the crosswind leg, and last of all the final leg which at this time will put you in alignment with the final landing. You may be called upon to make a straight in approach or a base leg approach. Incidently, the crosswind leg is also called the base leg. All of your approaches have to coincide with other traffic and you may have to follow other aircraft in for a landing. All this sound difficult? At first it is but after a few landings at tower operated fields you'll be an old pro. Another bit of knowledge, Control Towers are operated by the FAA and these operators have to go through a long period of training before they can even touch a radio microphone and then only under the watchful and alert eye of their Chief Operator. At an airport like Los Angeles International, they handle a take off or landing about once every 20 seconds, and this is all day, and most of the night. Despite the long hours and the hard duty, the job also has it's rewards, especially in the lives they save to which most of

'Tune' Tires First To Save Time For Summer Fun

Motorists' chances of truly enjoying the lyrical "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" are a lot better if they bone up on warm weather tire care.

These maintenance and tips to drivers preparing for summer trips vacation traditionally, just more time on the open road:

- - Make sure you have enough tread on your tires to last on long trips. If you're near . the minimum safe tread depth of 1 16 inch in two or more grooves you may want to make replacements before you take off for isolated areas.

- - If you buy any new tires remember the law requires the seller to register them if they were made after May 22, 1971. In the unlikely event a recall is necessary because of possible safety defects the manufacturer will notify you directly.

- - Check for proper inflation when tires are "cold", before starting out. Follow the car manufacturer's recommendations in your owner's manual, or posted in the glove compartment or affixed to a door pillar. Add up to four pounds of air per tire for long periods of highway driving at high speeds, but nexer exceed the maximum pounds per square inch (example: 32 p.s.i. max.) marked on the sidewalls.

-- Use your own air pressure gauge if possible. Studies have shown station air towers are often inaccurate up to plus or minus four pounds per square inch.

- - Vacation trips often mean heavy loads. Make sure the weight is distributed as evenly as possible, including weight in any towed vehicle. Check your owner's manual or a tire dealer for the maximum load limits of your tires.

- - Driving on snow tires for any prolonged period in warm weather is poor economy. Abnormally high heat buildup in these thicker tires can wear down the tread faster than in regular tires. It may also cause sudden disablement

- - When the rain comes, beware of skidding on "summer ice". Water mixes with oil and gas films already on the road to form a slick surface. The risk of losing control is five to ten times more likely on wet pavement.

- - Check front end alignment frequently, especially if you notice uneven tread wear or "pulling" to one side while driving. Back roads or a few solid bumps on any surface can throw alignment out, even if it was recently adjusted.


- - Check for debris such as stones and glass embedded in the tread and in the grooves before starting

- - Rotate your tires according to the recommendations in the owner's manual. If you notice abnormal tread wear or seem to be getting a bad ride, this is a good time to have your tires balanced.

- - Let experts check your tires for proper inflation, cuts or other damage, You'll like the folks at





We hope the top barn will become one of the largest retail wholesale pet shops in Texas.

In the near future we hope to stock a few of every native and non - native animals, reptiles, and fowl possible. We also plan on a few small kittens and puppies, along with foods for each, and the most used and wanted pets supplies.

For the lower barn - we have just purchased better than one hundred head of breeder stock skunk.

For the last three years now we have purchased baby skunks from area farms and the wild skunks from local individuals. Now by purchasing the above breeding stock, we can cut out the middle man and raise and supply our

customers with our own stock. Skunks are our main business. They make a truly uncommon pet. They are a beautiful animal, intelligent, immaculate, easy - tamed and easy to maintain. Most are very affectionate and can be allowed freedom in the house, where they can be trained to use a cat litter box. Although a tame skunk learns not to spray, he may forget his manners if startled, so it is best to have him de - scented. (Which we do ourselves.) A skunk himself is odorless, the smell is only in the spray. The skunk is a nocturnal

animal, but can adapt himself to some daytime play periods. Never release a de - scented skunk, as he has no defense against his enemies. Skunks are 13 - 18 inches long, plus a 7 - 10 inch tail and weigh 6 - 14 pounds. The life span is 5 - 8

The weaning size baby skunk diet: feed soybean substitute milk or nursing chow mixed with mashed potatoes and warm water. Our adults receive daily portions of cat chow, dog food, raw chicken necks, frogs and mice when available. Breeding - yes, they do breed in captivity. The gestation period is 63 days, with four to ten young born in a litter

We are going to be breeding for the very broad - striped and solid white. We would like to get a start of hognose and the little spotted skunk later on.

This winter we hope to put in cement shelters and runs for our dogs. By next summer we hope to be in the position to offer boarding facilities to the public. We are now doing some dog grooming, but hope to complete our facilities so we can offer additional services


