

Amity Rancher Is Producing More And Better Grass

T. A. Holcomb, who ranches five miles southeast of May, has found that more litter per acre pays. He is growing more grass by practicing proper use and deferred grazing on his rangeland,

Holcomb has been deferring a part of his ranch each year along with proper use. He operates on the theory that the cheapest feed is that grown by proper range management.

Holcomb set as his first goal a good cover on the land at all times. The good cover, with deferred grazing, allows the stand of the better grasses to improve. These in turn make better use of water and soil.

"Little bluestem and sideoats grama are my most important grasses because they produce well on my rangeland and cure out well for winter feed," he said. "The stand of these has more than doubled on my pasture during the last five years."

Holcomb feels that he has had excellent results. Not only have his better grasses been allowed to seed and increase in vigor and strength, but there has been an increase in density and litter. The heavy cover has slowed the water and caused more of it to go into the ground. He also noticed few, if any, weeds where good grass was present. There was less evaporation with good grass.

lic schools at a beginning salary of \$4,250 per year. This is \$1,046 more than Texas' minimum salary of \$3,204.



Cover crops will help but will not control blowing every year." To do a good job the strips of sorghum or sudan must be four rows wide and the peanuts not more than eight rows on coarse texture soil or 12 rows wide on medium textured soil. The central strip should be left standing until spring to give protection from the winds that would move soil from unprotected land. The strips should be rotated each year and the residue used for soil improvement after it has protected the soil from wind erosion.
