Wednesday was "Sam Jones Day" in the Rising Star public school system. It was a well-deserved tribute to the man who will retire this year after having headed the local schools for twenty years; a tribute the more impressive because it came spontaneously from the students and faculty members of the organization he served as the administrative head.

There can be no better recommendation of a man than the tenure and character of his service. In these respects Sam Jones measures up. To serve twenty years as the head of any public institution -especially one so sensitive to the public mind as a school system—is an accomplishment of no mean degree. And to be able to look back upon a career of school administration spent in only a few places, simply emphasizes the qualities which made possible Mr. Jones' long record here.

Mr. Jones' entire career has been spent within the radius of comparatively a few miles. He was born in Erath County within fifty miles of Rising Star. He has taught and administered schools in Stephens county and at Desdemona, Morton Valley and Rising Star. He has been employed and kept in employment by "home folks." In their eyes he has measured up.

No trash which can be disposed of on the property by burning, and no garbage will be removed, the mayor explained. Tree limbs, grass and shrubbery clippings should be burned on the premises, he said. Old cans, pieces of metal and junk that cannot be burned will be picked up providing it is not too heavy or cumbersome for the crews to handle.

Special emphasis was placed on removal of fire hazards. Accumulations of flammable material, such as rags, old papers, etc., and faulty wiring and other conditions offering fire danger should get careful attention, members of the Fire Department, said.

So should conditions that contribute to health hazards, it was emphasized. In particular, places where water can accumulate and invite mosquito larvae, and places in which flies can breed, should be cleaned up, it was pointed out.

Meanwhile, the City plans to clean the business streets and to repaint the parking space stripes on a greater angle to conform to the more convenient practice followed in many other cities, the mayor said.




By Beverly Nicholson **County HD** Agent Mildew thrives in hot, humid weather. High moisture causes the mold spores, which are always present in the air, to settle

niture and books. The best protection against mildew is its prevention. To remove dampness, the use of air conditioners, dehumidifiers, heat and chemicals, is recommended. Air conditioners are good dehumidifiers because the cool air contains less moisture than the warm air. You can also fight off dampness by heating the

house for a short time. Then open the doors and windtows to let the moist air out. An exhaust

fan will help fosce it out. To dry the air in closets and other small areas, keep a small electric light burning. The heat from the lamp will be enough to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. Or you can place a small electric heater in a large closet. Use extreme care and be
