White. land is declining by about 4,000 acres a day. To picture the situation, each year we are adding to our population a figure equivalent to the population of Los Angeles-even as we take away productive acreage equivalent to the whole state of Delaware. That fact led the association's president to say: ". . . no matter how efficient are the machines produced by our industry, there are certain limiting factors such as, soil types, characteristics and poor farming practices which cannot be overcome by improved farm mechanization alone. Good soil and water conservation practices coupled with improved farm machinery is the answer to the challenge."

Luckily for America's future, more and more farmers are inswering that challenge.







If need be, they used their given names, and now and ing to court. then their fathers' given names (like John John's son) or their your name puts the public offihome towns' or neighborhoods' (like Thomas of Aquinas).

But mostly they went by their riven or baptismal names. Some churches today still call their members by their first names (Sister Joan and Brother Albert) like royalty (e.g. Queen Elizabeth). In certain European countries you can register a child's name if it is one of an approved list. High nobility goes by its last name (de Medici, Marlborrugh), but knights take their riven names (Sir Winston).

Since people had little proporty interests in their last names, English and American law gave them little or no protection. Trade names, of course, are another matter.

But in France and Germany the law gives one a property interest in his name; you may get a court to keep somebody from adopting your name by showing it would harm you. But not as a rule in America or England.

For instance, on the ground





Following is a condensation of a review of the book, "Deep in the Heart of Texas", written by Eugene Miller, given before the Saturday Club recently by Mrs. John D. Clark:

On March 2nd, the 121st anniversary of the birth of indeperdence, in the Republic of Texas, was celebrated; when the delegates met at old Washington-onthe Brazos and declared the Pepublic of Texas a free and independent nation. Texas is called the land of the Big Rich, a world unto itself whose fables are faburlous, and whose facts are even more so. Texas legends have gone clear around the world. The typical Texan is envisioned as a tall, rangy cowboy of the Garv Cooper stamp, who feels naked without a pair of \$100 boots on his feet and an equally expensive ten gallon hat on his head. His female partner is a girl

of the Ann Sheridan species who looks as smart in her cowbry togs as she does wearing a Janques Fath original, with a \$50,000 mink on her shoulder. Even without the distinctive clothes the storybook Texan is easy to spot. He's a dead give-away every time he opens his mouth or pocketbook. His favorite subject is Texas.

The legendary Texan is an oilman who counts his millions by the dozens, and spends his wealth with a lavish hand. These legends of Texans and their state have been told until they have become a part of the story of the Great Republic. The only trouble is-they are not tree. In fact, most Texans live in the cities now, and even those on the ranch prefer jeeps to horses. Texans love to boast about their state. The boasting revolves about three things: the state's vast geography, unique history and mineral health. The state also has every type of weather in the book. A rancher care freeze in the Panhandle while a secretary suns herself on Corpus Christi beach. In Brewster County, farmers rarely se rain; in Orange County, the downpour totals 50.41 inches a year. The blue norther car shove a thermometer down 43 degrees in a few hours time. Texas history has the unique touch, too. For one thing, si = flags have flown over the state. Texas was a Republic before it. joined the Union, and when it did come in, its officials were smart enough to retain rights to all public lands-a foresig' that has meant billions of dollars in income to the state. Texas has far more mineral wealth than any other state. Texas is the country's largest producer cf natural gas and sulphur, and is loaded with such raw materials as limestone, salt and lignite. It has a treasure house in its iron. copper and mercury deposits. This wealth of raw materials has brought industries in by droves. This in turn, has kept the state's economy booming. One reason Texans have little or no worries about depressions, are these facts. Texans are religious people. One out of every five Texans is a church member. Politically speaking, Texans are conservatives. In music, Texans have done well. Fourteen cities have their own orchestras. In drama and art, Texans have pioneered. Texans do not take a back seat in education. Gifts of wealthy Texans attest to the fact that they value the fruits of education highly. John Ben Shepperd once said "a real Texan was a laughing, bragging, God-fearing, hard-working chraacter, with a sense of humor and a vision of greatness which is a natural reflection of his dominion over the vast, valuable and sometimes cantankerous expanse of Texas". 
