

Ciscoan Is Named Governor Of Lions

Archie Chamness, Cisco realtor and building contractor, was elected district governor of Lions International District 2E-1 at the annual district convention in Abilene last Saturday. He has served as lieutenant governor of the district during the past year.

Mr. Chamness will take office at the annual convention of Lions International in Honolulu, Hawaii, in late June. Following his election,

Mr. and Mrs. Chamness were among honorees at a reception following a banquet Saturday night that was the district convention's closing event.

The Chamness family, of 606 Avenue I, has lived in Cisco 10 years, and formerly lived six years in Odessa. He is a native of Missouri and they have lived in Texas since 1948. The Chamnesses are members of the Church of Christ.

Mr. Chamness is a member of the Cisco Evening Lions Club and has been

a Lion here for some 10 years. Three other Cisco Lions have served as district governor — the late W.H. LaRoque, O.L. Stamey, and the late James McCracken.

Three other district governors have resided in Cisco at times other than when they were elected. They are Horace Condeley of Abilene

and the late H.R. Garrett and the late Joe Weaver.

Some 200 persons, including members of both the Cisco noon and evening clubs, attended the district convention.

Featured speakers included U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm, who addressed the convention at the noon luncheon Saturday, and W.L. Woolard of Charlotte, N.C., a director of Lions International, who spoke at the banquet.

The district includes 23 counties with 68 clubs and 2,500 members in West Central Texas. Some 40 clubs were represented at the meeting.

Tim Cassle, Jacksboro banker, was elected lieutenant governor. He is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Jesse Cassle of Abilene and formerly of Cisco. Bobby Sales of Tuscola was elected a director of the Lions Camp of Crippled Children at Kerrville.

A memorial service for Lions who passed away during the past year was held at

11:15 a.m. Saturday at the First Presbyterian Church in Abilene. Bryan Bradbury, Abilene attorney, gave the memorial address. A feature of the program was a memorial candlelighting service to honor deceased Lions.

The list of Lions honored at the district service included the late Gene Abbott, past

president and long time member of the Cisco Lions Club, and Dr. D. Ball, the late charter member of the Cisco club. The list included 24 other deceased members.

Mr. Chamness is scheduled to speak at a District 2A-2 convention in Laredo this weekend. He will attend a state Lions convention in Victoria May 20-22, and will preside at a District 2E-1 zone meeting in Cisco at the Colony Restaurant May 17th.

Mr. and Mrs. Chamness will fly to Hawaii June 17th for the international convention, where he takes office, and plan to return June 27th. He has already accepted several invitations to install club officers in his district for the next fiscal year that begins July 1.

Crackdown on Theft of Electricity Is Begun

Electric utilities in Texas, including West Texas Utilities Co., are taking a tougher stance these days on theft of electricity.

Reasons for the crackdown are a change in the State Penal Code making meter tampering a penitentiary offense and the fact that the cost of producing electric energy has gone up.

"We view any form of stealing electric power as a serious

crime," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services, "because we feel a strong responsibility to protect the interest of our good paying customers."

"It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers have to make up the difference."

The State Legislature amended

the criminal mischief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person in whose name the service was last billed is the responsible party. Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities

since the law was passed, and WTU recently filed charges which resulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer.

Welch said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is becoming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous.

"Many people do not understand the danger involved," he said. "Property damage, serious injury, or even death can result."

City Tax Rebate

Austin-State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$94.5 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax on May 12.
"The checks we're sending today bring this year's total payments to \$309.6 million statewide, which is 2.7 percent below the total at this time last year. Although these receipts are still running behind last year, we have seen a steady improvement for the past three months. This is in line with our forecasts and, if the trend continues as we expect, we should finish this year with a slight increase over 1982's totals," Bullock said.
The May checks were for taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by the end of April.
Rising Star received a check for \$3,889.23, compared to \$3,286.89 for the same period in 1982. Payments to date for 1983 total \$9,968.59, while the 1982 payments to date were \$9,726.89, a 2.48% increase.
Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Ranger and Cross Plains all have decreases in the amounts of payments to date in 1983 when compared to 1982 payments to date.

School Related Laws Noted

Gene Hicks, Constable in Rising Star, notes that students and their parents need to be aware of two state laws which are reprinted here:

4.23. Loitering on School Property

(a) Any person loitering upon school property after being warned to leave by the person in charge shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00.

(b) School property for the purposes of this Act shall include the grounds of any public school and any grounds or buildings used for school sponsored assemblies or for

activities." "4.25. Thwarting Compulsory Attendance Law

(a) If any parent or person standing in parental relation to a child, within the compulsory school attendance ages and not lawfully exempt or properly excused from school attendance, fails to require such child to attend school for such periods as required by law, it shall be the duty of the proper attendance officer to warn, in writing, the parent or person standing in parental relation that the attendance must be immediately required. If after this warning the parent or person stan-

ding in parental relation intentionally, knowingly, recklessly, or with criminal negligence fails to require the child to attend school as required by law, the parent or person standing in parental relation commits an offense. The attendance officer shall file a complaint against him in the county court, in the municipality in which he resides. An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for the first offense, not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for the second offense, and not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 for a subsequent offense. Each day the child remains out of school after the warning has been given or the child ordered to school by the juvenile court may constitute a separate offense."

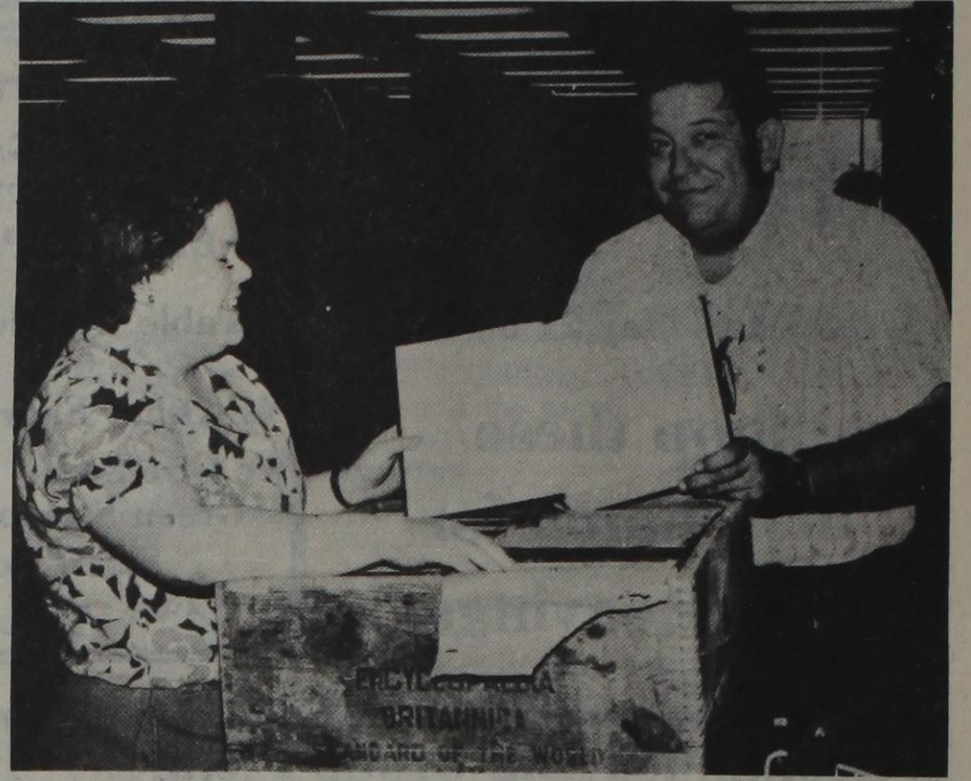

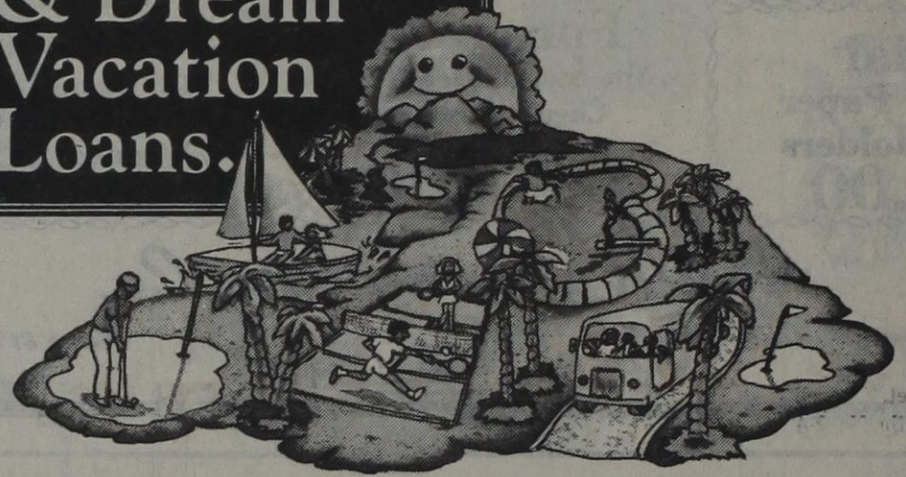

Drilling To Begin On No. 1 Wilson

A 3,950-ft. Eastland County wildcat for oil or gas is scheduled to be drilled 13 miles south of Cisco. Lyles Energy of Ore City is the operator.

Location will be in a 80-acre drilling unit in the Mary Ann Clark Survey Sec. 29. The well will be known as the No. 1 Wilson.

Four new wells are scheduled in the Eastland Regular Field by Sentinel Petroleum Corp. of Hurst.

The ventures include:
- The No. 1 D.D. Foster "A", 3,800-ft. total depth, located in a 40-acre lease, Frederick Scranton Survey, six miles south of Ranger.

- The No. 1 Louise Harlow "G", 4,000-ft. TD, located in a 40-acre unit, H&TC Survey Sec. 26 Blk. 3, five miles southeast of Cisco.

- The No. 1 Sayre "A", 4,000-ft. TD, located in a 20-acre lease in the W.B. Samford and M.V. Murphy Survey, six miles south of Eastland.

- And the No. 1 Sayre, a 1,900-ft. well, located in a five-acre lease, Samford Survey, six miles south of Eastland.

Location has been staked in the East Nimrod Field for a 1,500-ft. developmental try, with Menique Oil of Irving as the operator. The operation will be in a 42-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey A-254, four miles northwest of Romney. Patio Formation oil pay is the target. The well will be known as the No. 2-A Henry Schaefer.

At a location two miles southwest of Breckenridge, Jones Co. of Albany has finalized a new oil producer in Stephens County's East Lakeside Conglomerate Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Brown "16 A", flowing oil at the rate of four barrels per day on a 12/64 choke. Tubing pressure was 50 PSI. The well also showed potential for 53,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas per day.

Location is in a 100-acre lease in the Lunatic Asylum Lands Survey. Bottomed at 4,550 feet, the well will produce from perforations 4,019 to 4,025 feet into the hole.

Shane Oil Corp. of Temple has filed first production figures on a new wildcat gas well. The No. 11 Cook Heirs indicated ability to flow 734,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8-inch choke. It was rated at 2,600,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

The operator has 925 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's T&PRR Co. Survey, three miles south of Caddo.

The well will produce from an interval 1,429 to 1,433 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,725 feet.

At a location one mile northeast of Brazos, Chester R. Upham, Jr. of Mineral Wells has finalized a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's Calabria Conglomerate Field.

The well is designated as the No. 7 Calabria Estate. It showed potential to yield 494,000 CF gas per day on a 7/8-inch choke. The absolute open flow came in at 1,625,000 CFD.

Location is in a 2,241-acre lease in the Allen Williams Survey. Bottomed at 4,450 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,743 to

3,761 feet into the hole.

Discovery Exploration Corp. of Palo Pinto has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Regular Palo Pinto Field. The No. D-102 W.M. Sanders showed potential to make three barrels of oil per day on open choke.

The operator has 614 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Co. Survey, nine miles west of Palo Pinto.

The well will produce from an interval 1,200 to 1,224 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,316 feet.

The No. 1 Johnson has been finalized by Lewis & Atkins Oil & Gas Inc. of Midland.

It is a developmental well in the Kessler Field four miles southeast of Mineral Wells. Drillsite is in a 25-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Co. Survey.

The well went to a 3,860-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations 3,723 to 3,757 feet into the hole.

The new producer indicated ability to flow 250,000 CF gas per day on a 14/64 choke. It was rated at 270,000 CFD on absolute open flow.

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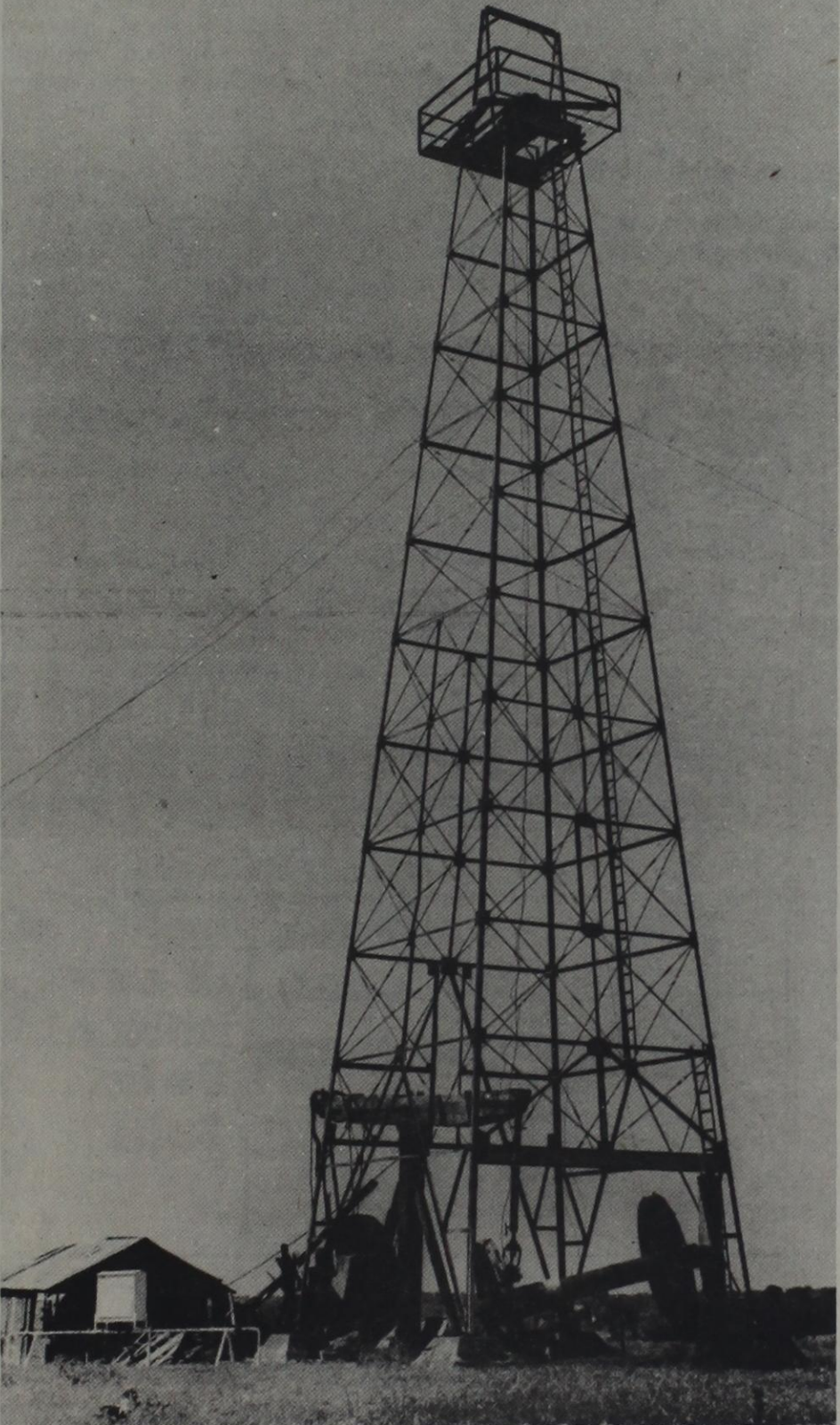
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The Way It Was

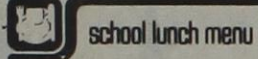
numerous confections in bright trays, bits of jerky (for atmosphere, not taste) and fruit punch.
