Prominent Rising Star Rancher Dies At 54

Services for John Dan (Skeet) Clark, 54, will be held Wednesday afternoon May 11th at 2:30 p.m. in the Church of Christ with Gary Adams of the Cisco Junior College Bible Chair officiating. Adams will be assisted by Owen Aiken, local Church of Christ minister. Burial will follow in the Rising Star Cemetery under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. Graveside services will be conducted by Herschel McDonald, minister of Sixth Street Church of Christ in Brownwood.

Mr. Clark, a life-long resident of Rising Star, died Monday morning at approximately 5:45 a.m. following an apparent heart attack.

He was born February 12, 1923 in Sipe Springs to John M. and Tennie Price Clark. Skeet attended public school in Sipe Springs from which he graduated. He later attended Howard Payne College in Brownwood. During World War II, Skeet was a member of the Army Air Corp and saw active duty in Europe.

On June 14, 1946 he married Mary Frazier at Sundown, Texas. To this union, four children were born. Three sons, Frazier, Bob and Jack; and one daughter, Marilyn.

"Skeet" as he was known by most, played an active role in the community affairs of Rising Star for many years. He

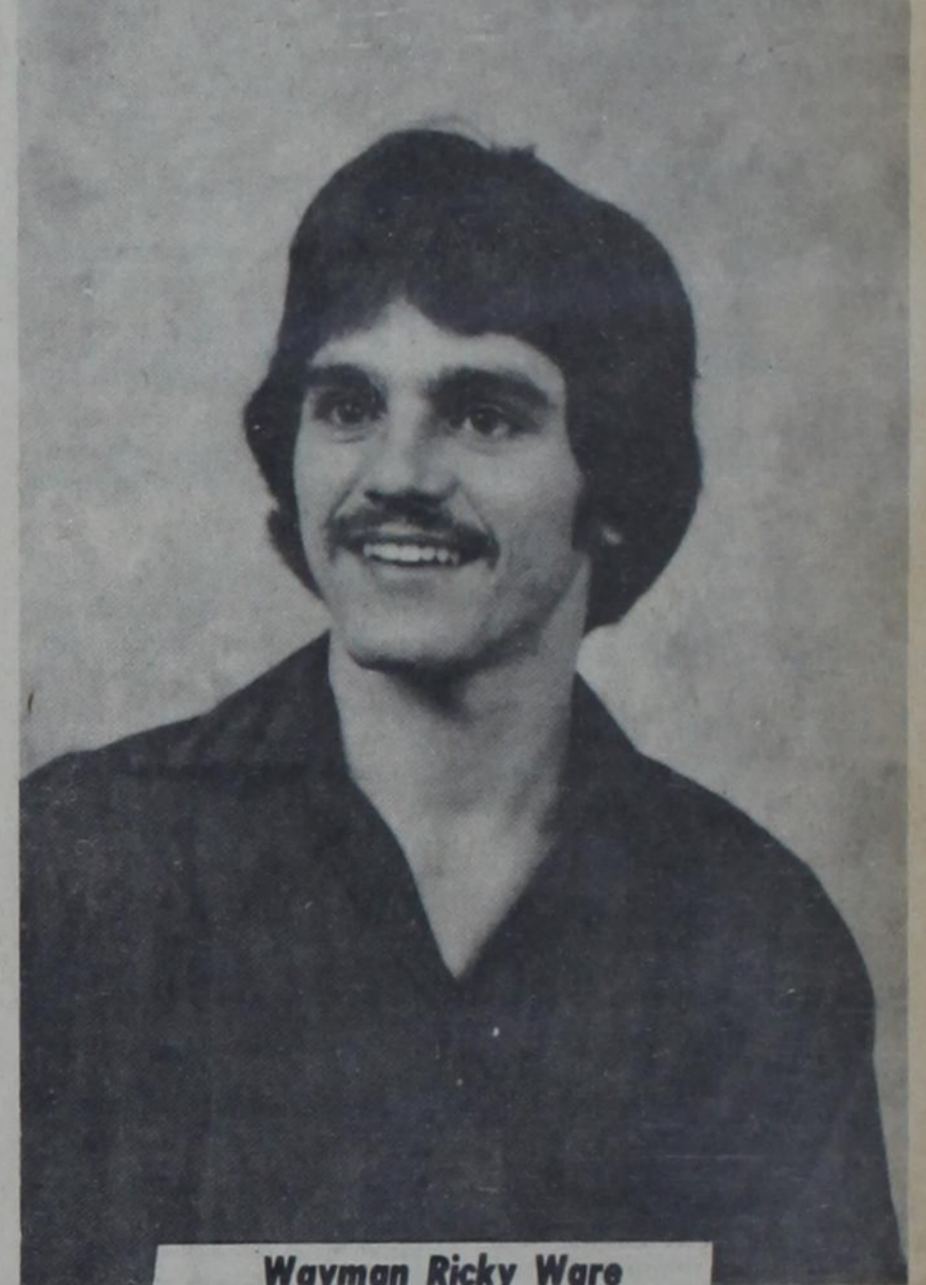

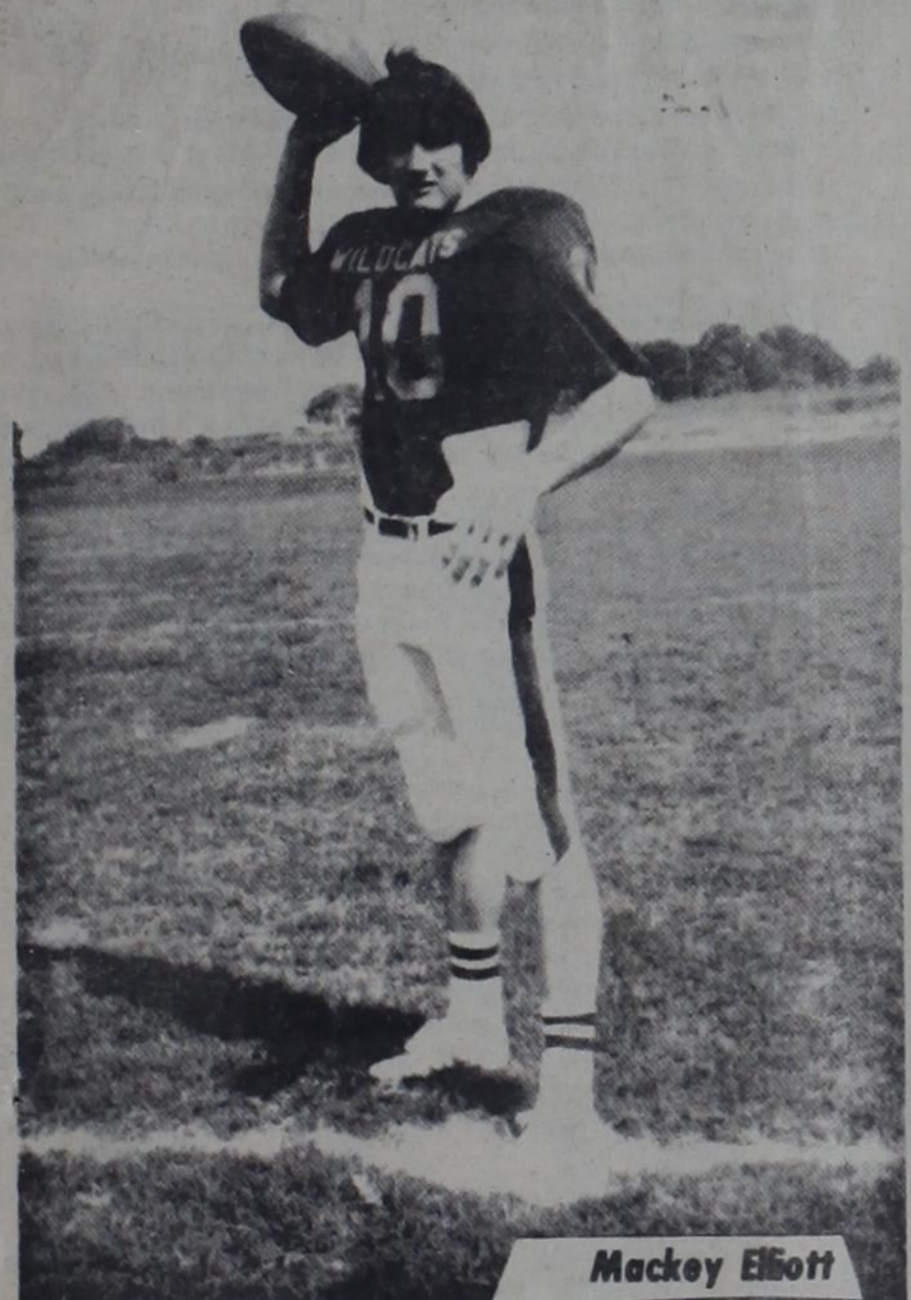

CJC Band And Belles To Make Third Appearance In New York Macy's Parade

The Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles will make a third appearance in the famous Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York on November 24 of this year. CJC officials have formally announced. The group will be one of the featured attractions of the nationally-telecast parade.

Douglas Fry is director of the CJC Band and Mrs. Pat Owens is Belles' director. Eris Ritchie, Public Relations Director for the college, will coordinate all arrangements for the appearance and trip to New York.

The two groups have previously been in Macy's Parades in 1971 and 1973.

Plans call for the band and Belles to fly to New York City on two American Airlines 707 Jet aircraft, as a part of their financing procedures they will have additional seats on the planes available to the general public, along with a travel package plan that will include all air and ground transportation from Cisco, three days and two nights in New York City, and many entertainment and sight seeing features. They are detailed in a separate publicity release issued jointly with this one.

Mr. Fry, Mrs. Owens and Mr. Ritchie all expressed a great deal of satisfaction at the prospect of making the New York trip and a third national television appearance, and they indicated that all of the students were equally delighted. They voiced their appreciation to Macy's officials as well as Dick Schneider, the NBC Television producer from New York, who have taken an interest in the band and Belles and given them an opportunity to once more again gain national recognition for the college.

The Macy's Parade is one of the nation's most prestigious parades held each year, and hundreds of groups apply for participation, with only about twelve to fifteen bands and one or two drill teams selected. The parade is telecast on two networks--NBC and CBS--to an audience estimated as high as 50 million.

Mr. Ritchie stated that the college did not anticipate an extensive fund-raising campaign such as was conducted in 1971 or even a modified money-raising program such as was employed in 1973. "If we can just fill two 707's with people taking advantage of our travel package we'll be able to adequately finance the trip," he said. He also stated that the members of the two groups would all contribute a portion of their individual expenses.

"We'll be the only group in the parade from Texas, and we will do our best to represent our state, as well as Cisco and CJC, in a creditable way," Mr. Fry, Mrs. Owens, and Mr. Ritchie concluded.

New Class For Licensed Vocational Nursing

A new class for Licensed Vocational Nursing training on the main campus of Cisco Junior College in August will begin, and applications for places in the class will be accepted through the remainder of the month of May.

Instructor for the program, which is held in cooperation with the Texas Education Agency, Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco, and Eastland Memorial Hospital, is Mrs. Venita Mitchell. Mrs. Mitchell has stated that applications are being taken now for the new class, and she may be contacted at 817-442-2567.

CJC also operates LVN programs in Abilene and Graham.

The program is accredited by the Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners, Dean Bint said. It combines scientific foundation in the classroom with application of the principles in the clinical area.

The LVN program lasts twelve months. In its beginning stages most of the work is in the classroom, with a limited amount in the hospital. As the year progresses there is more and more time spent in the clinical situation under the supervision of physicians and registered professional nurses.

Satisfactor completion of the program entitles the student to a certificate from the college, which in turn qualifies the graduate to take the examination given by the State Board. Passing the state examination of course certifies the student as a licensed Vocational Nurse.

Mr. Bint said that a prospective student must be at least 17 years of age, and must be a high school graduate or furnish a GED (General Educational Development test score) establishing equivalency to high school graduation.

Students must also be in a good physical and mental health.

Tuition for the program is \$150.00, payable in installments of \$50.00 each. The student also buys uniforms, books, a name pin, bandage scissors, nurse shoes, and a watch, all totalling approximately \$200.00.

Mr. Bint and Mrs. Mitchell urged any prospective student--male or female--to seriously consider the many advantages of entering training to become a Licensed Vocational Nurse, and both are available for counseling or more information concerning the program.

Mountain Top United Pentecostal Church In Romney Dedicates New Facilities

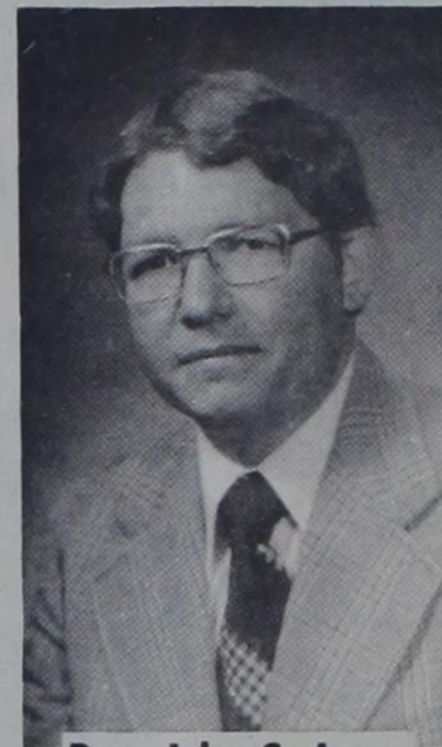

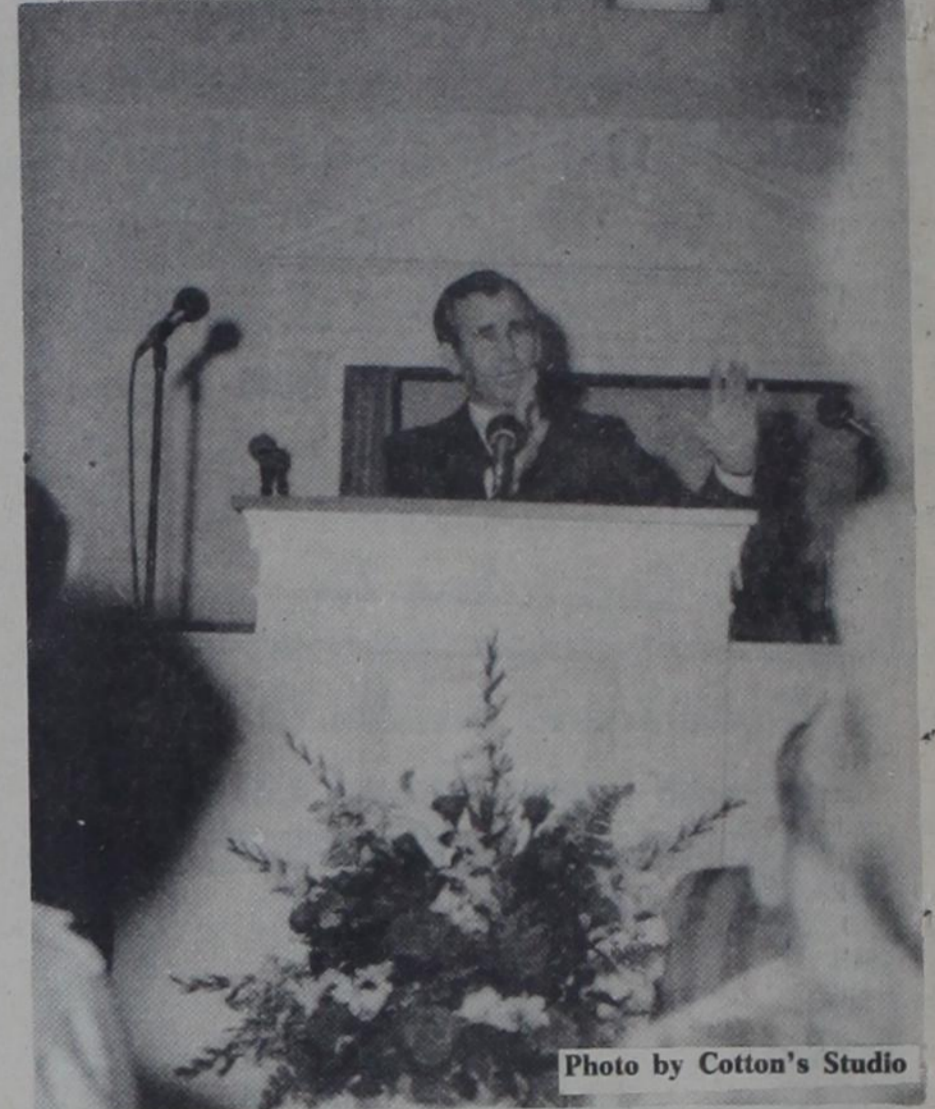

Fashion 'n Fabrics

By FANNIE GLEESON

SIMPLEST ALTERATION OF CURVED SEAMS
A princess seam jacket or dress is one of the most wearable of all styling. The gentle curves are slimming and comfortable; the shaped seams particularly good for a jacket as they avoid the bulkiness of a boxy blazer.

The unlined jacket illustrated as worn by Marlo Thomas is from Marlo's Corner for McCall's. The pattern includes an A-line skirt in two lengths and pants.

Though you purchase a pattern according to bust size, you may not have quite the build of the standard pattern and may need to raise or lower the bustline. Take the alteration in simple steps. First, place a tape measure at the center of your shoulder and measure to the apex of the bust. Measure the pattern of the side front section from the shoulder to the seam line at the fullest part of the curve. Compare these two measurements and note the difference.

If your bustline is lower than that of the pattern, let's say an inch and a half, measure an inch and a half from the top notch of the curve and place an ink line. Now, place white shelf paper under the pattern and trace along the cutting line of the pattern between the two notches of the curved bustline. Include both notches.

Move tracing down, so that the top notch of the tracing is opposite to the inked mark you made on the pattern. The lower notch should be at the cutting line of the pattern. Tape tracing paper to pattern and blend new line to the pattern if necessary.

Make a corresponding change on the matching front pattern piece. Trim tracing paper in order to have a good cutting line. Then pin the two front sections together and check the pattern against your figure.

To accommodate bust fullness that is higher than the standard pattern, mark the amount of change on the pattern above the top notch of bust curve. Follow the same procedure as described for the person with the lower bustline, only this time raising the tracing paper. Draw blending lines.

Medicine Chest

Why is there a slowdown of new drugs being developed in this country? -- C.C.
The trend began in 1962 when Congress added the Kefauver amendments to the Food and Drug Act. These amendments infected the drug industry with bureaucratic waste and red tape. Today Federal Drug Administration officials stand to bear heavy personal costs if there is a bad outcome from the approval of a new drug, but they receive little of the benefits of a good outcome. As a result Americans are being denied drugs of a choice available in other nations. These are often safer than drugs approved for domestic use.

How do you clean a cool air vaporizer? -- M.B.
Fill the container with cold tap water. Remove a cup of the water, then add a half-cup of household bleach. Plug vapor outlet with a piece of cloth to prevent vapor from escaping. Run vaporizer for 1 1/2 hours. Clean your vaporizer this way after every two days of use. It will extend its life.

Several books have come out recently which claim that a high fiber diet will not only help you lose weight, but will also protect you from diseases such as diverticulitis, hemorrhoids, appendicitis, and cancer of the colon. Other scientists say that more extensive research is necessary before such claims can be validated. At this point the best stance for interested dieters is the middle of the road. Most scientists do agree that some additional fiber in the American diet is desirable and for calorie counters who want to keep their diets high in fiber, the low-cal fruits like melon, apples, berries and citrus fruits are ideal.

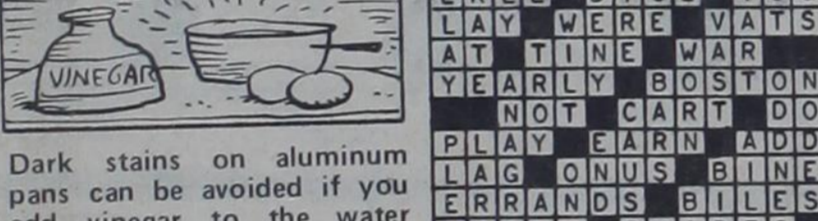
YOUR CHILDREN INHERIT YOUR FAT: Most people who know anything at all about the subject of getting slim or staying slender have heard or learned somewhere that the problem of obesity is passed from parent to child, not only because the condition is hereditary, but also because mothers and fathers will obviously pass on their own poor eating habits to their

offspring while children are still young and living in the home. If you have a weight problem yourself, you must be particularly careful in guiding the diet of your youngsters. Statistics show that if one parent is obese, there is a 40 per cent chance for each of their children to be obese. If both parents are overweight, there is an 80 per cent chance of the children becoming fat. And, this process can start in the very first year of the child's life when he or she is totally dependent on you to select the diet. Consult a good pediatrician and ask for a nutritious, low-calorie diet for your child even if the youngster does not yet show signs of overweight. If you are struggling with a weight problem yourself, surely you will realize that an ounce of prevention now will save your child the problems of watching pounds in later life.

MILK DRINKING FOR DIETERS: Almost all nutritionists agree that adults need two glasses of milk each day, children need three, and teenagers should drink four. If you drink two glasses of whole milk, that adds up to 320 calories, but two glasses of skim or buttermilk total considerably less, 180 calories.

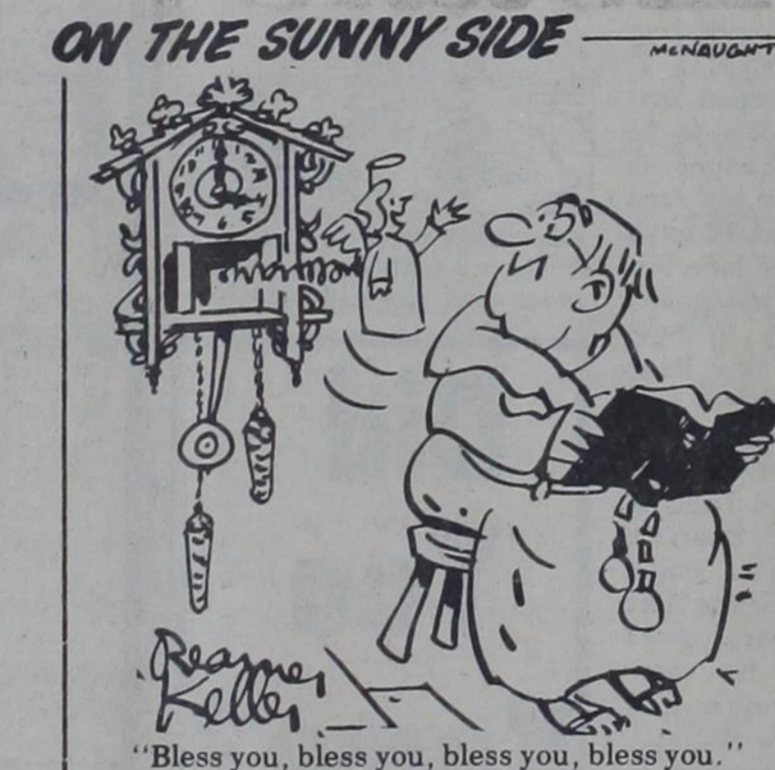

Q: I am constantly running out of shards, broken pieces of clay pots, with which to cover drainage holes when I'm potting plants. Any solutions?
A: I sometimes use fruit pits for this purpose because they are rounded and serve the purpose of keeping soil in while allowing excess water to drain out. Another good idea is to buy fiberglass screening material from a hardware store. Cut the screening into small squares that will fit over drainage holes. This works very well.

Q: How does one cut back a too-tall-growing dracaena marginata?
A: In my book, there is no such thing as a too-tall-growing anything--the taller the better. Of course, when it starts to look as though you'll have to make holes in your roof to accommodate your plants, measures must be taken. In the case of the marginata (which does have a tendency to grow profusely when well loved), green leaf top can be cut back about two-thirds, leaving a few of the spear-like leaves still growing from the bottom portion. This forces the cane stems to break and branch. Do it one stem trunk at a time (allow a two-month interval between cuttings so cut parts can recuperate) and give the plant full sunlight and plenty of water after cutting to encourage new side growth.

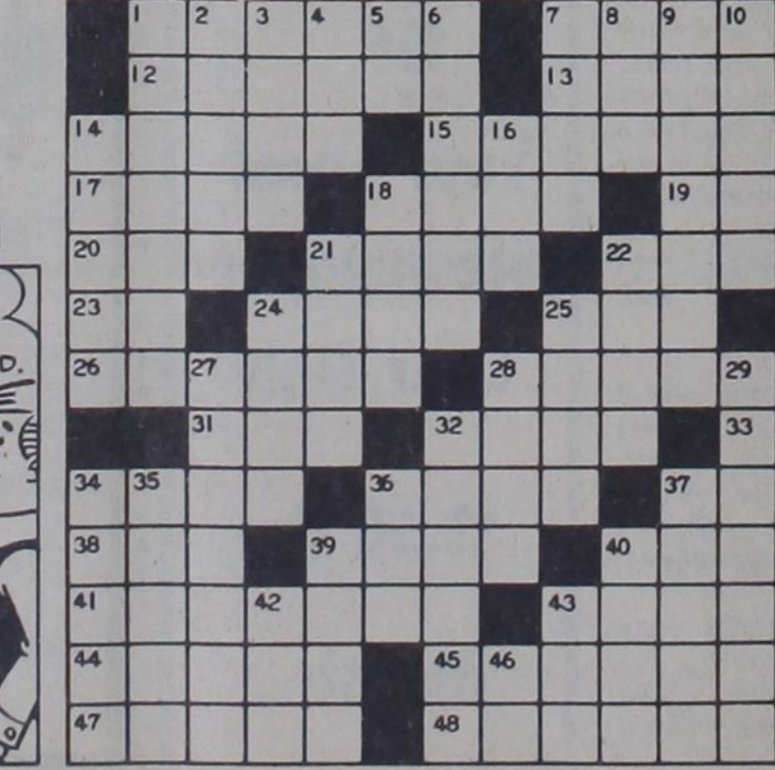
Q: Are there any general guidelines for watering -- or not watering -- cacti?
A: The closer you can imitate the natural environment of a plant the better. Generally, water cacti thoroughly (so that water flows freely from drainage holes) no more than once every two months in fall and winter and no more than once a month in spring and summer.

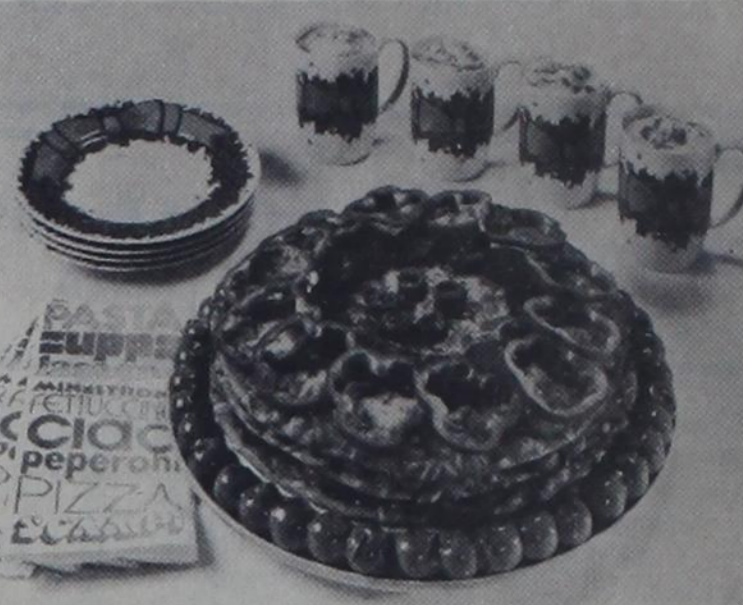

GORDON SPOT

Home lawns throughout Eastland County have been damaged extensively by white grub infestations and by a cold winter. The damage was not apparent until spring when the lawns began to green up or, in some cases, failed to green up. Damage was most severe on St. Augustine grass lawns although some bermudagrass lawns were damaged by white grubs. Areas of the lawn damaged by white grubs can be distinguished from areas damaged by winter killing by examining the root system. In grub damaged areas the root system has been destroyed and large sections of turf can be lifted like a carpet. In those areas the grubs can be found 1 to 4 inches below the soil surface. Control measures should be delayed until July or August in order to control the next generation of grubs. Inspection of the sod in early July will indicate the need for control measures. If an average of 4 or more grubs per square foot are found in the upper 2 inches of the soil, control measures should be initiated.

Winter killing of St. Augustine grass was prevalent in non-irrigated lawns due to numerous dry cold fronts experienced during the winter. Even though the grass was dormant during that time, desiccation of stem and root tissue occurred because of low moisture levels in the rootzone. Since St. Augustine is a shallow rooted grass, it suffered greater injury from winter kill than bermudagrass. The most severe losses of turf occurred on slopes and in heavily thatched lawns where the root system was restricted and

Rainfall was lost through runoff. Where large areas of turf have been lost the area should be removed by raking, the area fertilized and new grass planted by seeding, sprigging or sodding.

Some people have been wondering if St. Augustine Decline (SAD) disease has been killing their St. Augustine grass. There have been a few cases of SAD identified in the county, but it is unusual for this area.

Floratam is a new variety of St. Augustine grass selected in a cooperative program of the Texas and Florida Agricultural Experiment Stations. It is resistant to SAD and the lawn chinch bug. It is similar to common St. Augustine in appearance but has wider and longer leaves and larger, purple stems. It is slower to initiate new growth in the spring and is less cold tolerant than common St. Augustine. For this reason Floratam is not recommended for this county unless you have had problems

We have had several call requesting spray dates for pecan trees. You do not need to spray pecan trees with an insecticide until about the last week of May in order to control the pe can nut casebearer. It is too early to give the exact dates to spray at this time. We will keep you informed as we observe the activity of the casebearer. If you spray too soon you will be wasting your insecticide. However some pecan growers have sprayed with Zinc for the control of Rosette.

Thirteen Tips For Women

1. Always lock your doors, both when you're away from your car and driving.
