

The referendum may be approved if two-thirds of the producers voting favor it, or if those voting favorably handled twothirds of the total turkey marketings in 1961, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation

Growers who have not certified their volume vote with their ASCS office should do so immediately. Though growers may do this as late as the voting period, Beanblossom explains that by doing it in advance of the referendum, it will allow all volume votes to be certified properly before the voting.






