In joining the program Mr. and Mrs. Dan Hughes, Administrator of the Rising Star Nursing Center announced an Open House on Mother's Day Sunday, May 14th. Theme of the week is "Be a good neighbor...visit a Nursing Home."

"This is a special effort by our profession to urge people in every community to take time for a personal visit with the residents and a close look into the operation of today's licensed nursing homes to learn first-hand the quality of care being delivered," said Dan Hughes. "We can provide every need of our residents except one... we can't make them know that the community cares about them. This special week gives everyone a chance to show that the people in the community do care about their neighbors in nursing homes."

Star Girls Sweep State Track Meet

As was expected, the Rising Star girls track team took the Class B State Track Title. Compiling a total of 61 points, the Wildcats made an outstanding showing. This marked the 9th straight team championship for the Wildcats.

The 400 meter sprint team composed of Laurie Hill, Vicki Elliott, Cindy Elliott and Carolyn Bessent tied the state record with a 49.0 flat time. They went on to make a record of their own in the 800 meter relay with a time of 1:44.0.

Teresa Underwood, Vicki Elliott, Cindy Elliott and Laurie Hill took top honors in the 1600 meter relay with a 4:01.1.

The only Senior of the team, Carolyn Bessent also was awarded 6th place in the 100 yard dash with a time of 11.4.

This gave the Wildcats a total of 61 points, no where near their closest competitor, Newcastle with 48.

Stacey 1 Of 4 Trumpet

Stacy Blair, of Eastland, was recently chosen as one of four finalist out of 400 entries in the International Trumpet Symposium this month. The contest is held at different Universities throughout the nation each year and is being sponsored by the University of Wisconsin at Madison for 1978. Stacy will be attending a Trumpet symposium there for about ten days the first part of June and the finals for this contest will be held at that time.

Stacy, a 1973 graduate of Eastland High School, and a 1977 graduate of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, is completing his first year in graduate school at the University of Louisville in Kentucky. While at Hardin-Simmons he studied under Bill Owens, trumpet director and instructor and was on the Dean's Honor Roll and Junior Class Favorite. He was also elected to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges.

This year his instructor at the Louisville School of Music is Mr. Leon Rapier. Rapier is the first chair trumpet player in the Louisville Orchestra and has played first trumpet in the New Orleans Symphony. He is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. Mr. Bill Owens of Abilene, Texas and Mr. Rapier are both instructors at the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan during the summer months.

Stacy has also studied under Mr. Bud Herseith this year and he is first chair trumpet with the Chicago, Ill. Symphony.

It was previously announced that Mr. Blair had auditioned for Maurice Andre', world famous trumpet player, when he was on a tour of the United States last fall. Stacy attended his concert in Toledo, Ohio and after an audition, was invited by Andre' to study at his Trumpet Conservatory in Paris, France. Andre' only accepts 5 or 6 students a year and Mr. Owens, Stacy's former instructor at H.-S.U. said "for a trumpet player, this is the ultimate."

In 1975, Mr. Blair played at the federation of Music Clubs of America in Atlanta, Georgia when he won their National Scholarship.

Also, while attending the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan during the summers of 1974, '75 and '76, he won the University of Michigan's Concerto Competition for Young Artist. He has also given Guest Artist Recitals at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.

One of his highest musical honors was winning first place for the National Competition for Blind Instrumental Musicians in the summer of 1977.

During his Spring Break this last March, he flew to Los Angeles, California to have some new rims fitted for his mouth pieces to his many trumpets.

This Spring, at the University of Louisville, he was presented in a recital playing "concerto for Trumpet," by John Addison playing on his C trumpet, "Concerto in E Flat" by Hummel, performing on his E Flat trumpet, and "Concerto for Trumpet in D Major," by Tartini, performing on his piccolo A trumpet.

Stacy recently featured in an Organ Dedication at the Beechmont Presbyterian Church in Louisville when the Messiah Concert, by Handel, was presented. Few musical works can claim the popularity that is associated with the Messiah. Handel wrote this piece of art in only 24 days and it was in 1742 that the first performance took place in Dublin, Ireland. Handel died in 1759 and it was 1784 before his work was commemorating the 25th anniversary of work differs from other oratorios in that it is not a dramatic work in the usual sense. It is drawn from 13 books of the Bible, and is divided into three parts. It reflects the "Spiritual Transcendence" of Christ over death and the immortality of His followers.

Stacy will stay in the East for several weeks after school is out in Louisville this semester and will tour and play in North Carolina, St. Louis, and Chicago. He will be in Texas, playing in his state, visiting his family and friends and resting for a few weeks.

Mr. Blair, who is legally blind, and does not read music, learns his compositions from tapes and recordings. He says he has 20-20 vision spiritually, and plans to study with Gabriel some day.

He has recently released his first record, a gospel music album. With his tremendous talent he has arranged some of the pieces himself which includes "Amazing Grace Medley", "How Great Thou Art," and "The Lord's Prayer." GORDON SPOT

If you think it's been dry lately you're right. According to the official weather records kept by James Dabney of Eastland we have had

9.33 inches rain during the last twelve months-May 1, 1977 through April 30, 1978. That is about 33 percent of the average for this county. During the first four months

of this year we have had 3.43 inches of rain and that's suppose to be our rainy season.

Many people are concerned about the Post Oak trees throughout the County. Some of these trees are very slow putting out new leaves this spring. We have examined some of these and found that part of the

problem is Forest Tent Caterpillars. They have been eating the new tender leaves at night, but the main problem is the drought. The trees seem to be doing better since the rain last week. The caterpillars have about run their cycle and shouldn't cause any more problems.

Have you noticed the heavy set of fruit on your peach and plum trees? Peaches naturally produce four time as many fruit as the tree can normally bear. For the first time in six years we did not have a late spring frost to thin our fruit. Therefore, trees in good condition have a very heavy set. You must thin the crop to have good quality fruit and healthy trees. Remove the extra fruit when they are 1/4 to 1/2 inches in diameter. Bump the limbs with a padded pole and follow up with hand thinning. The peaches should be no close than six inches after thinning.

The peach crop has a tremendous high number of double or twin peaches. This is when two fruit develop from the same flower. These fruit will not develop normally and should be removed. The fruit has two ovules, however, only one usually becomes a fruit. When twins occur both ovules have begun to grow. This is the result of our hot-dry September in 1977.

Healthy pecans depend on good growth in the spring. Zinc must be sprayed onto the trees at bud Break, Pre-Pollination and the First Generation of the pecan nut casebearer. Zinc may be needed as many as five times. Soil applications are of no value. Zinc sulfate or NZN are the only effective zinc sprays. Trees less than five years of age should be sprayed with zinc every two or three weeks from April to August.

Tomato foliage is susceptible to a number of different fungi which cause black to brown spots to be

formed on the leaves. This infection can result in defoliation. Chemicals are the only method of controlling these diseases. It is suggested that a home owner begin the spray program when the fruit reaches the size of a quarter and continues at two to three week intervals during the growing season. The materials that have been found to be most effective for foliage and fruit disease control is a combination of Maneb and Benlate. Zineb or Captan can be substituted for the Maneb. Remember, on tomato foliage control start early and carry it through the season.

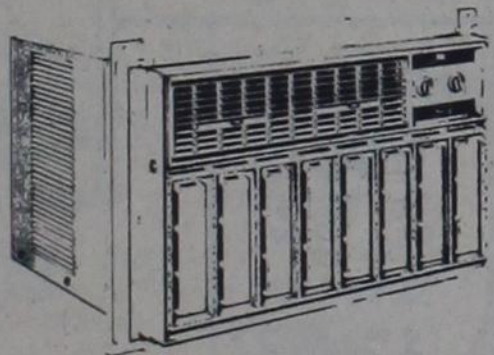

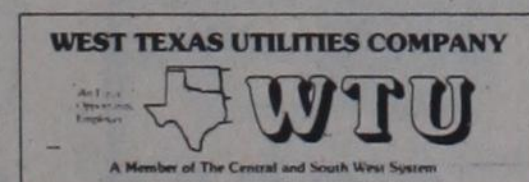

SOUTHEASTERN SECTION-demand for Southeastern grown peanuts was fairly light for old crop peanuts and moderate for new crop peanuts during the week ending May 4. Trading was moderate at unchanged prices. Widespread thunderstorms and abnormally low temperatures delayed planting and growth of crop. Planting was better than one-third complete in Alabama and over 1/2 complete in Georgia. Prices paid per pound for shelled runner type peanuts sold on an FOB shipping point basis were for old crop May shipment Jumbo 39 cents; US Splits 35; New crop September through December shipment Jumbo 36; US Splits 32. Sales of other grades were too few to quote.
VIRGINIA-NORTH CAROLINA SECTION-Demand for Virginia and North Carolina grown peanuts was light during the week ending May 4. Trading was slow as prices held about unchanged. Cool wet weather delayed planting by about one week. Warmer weather was needed before planting could begin. Prices paid per pound for Virginia type peanuts sold on an FOB Shipping point basis for prompt shipment were for unshelled Jumbo 41 cents; Fancy 40; shelled medium 38 1/2 to 39; number one 33 1/2; and number two with 70 percent splits 33 1/2. Sales of other grades were too few to quote.
SOUTHWESTERN SECTION-Demand for Southwestern grown peanuts was moderate during the week ending May 4. Trading was light. Prices were mostly unchanged. Planting remained behind schedule due to dry weather although southern and Central Texas did receive from 1/2 to 2 inches of badly needed rain early in the week. Planting
