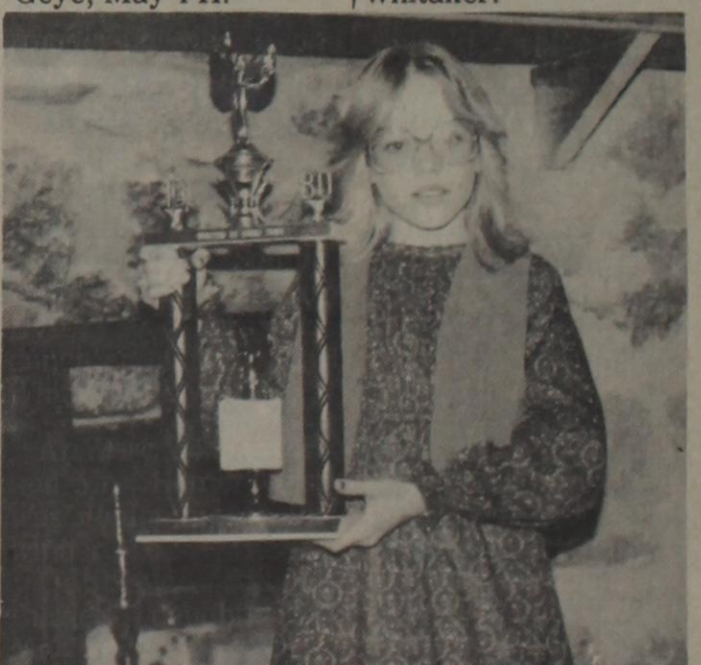

MAY NEWS

Dear Sis,

Everything is great up this way—Charles was home for a brief visit this weekend—Nearly everyone has a hoarseness or cold due to our drizzle and cold weather which is due to stay with us for a few days. We do have a weathermans promise—Warming and clearing by Friday.

I'm enclosing the fruit cocktail cake recipe for the one you enjoyed so much during the holidays.

FRUIT COCKTAIL CAKE

2 C. flour.
1 1/2 C. sugar.
1/2 tsp. salt.
3/4 tsp. soda.
1 can fruit cocktail.

Mix together, pour in long cake pan. Sprinkle brown sugar over top of cake, about 1/2 cup. Bake about 40 min. at 325 degrees.

FILLING

Bring to boil 1/2 cup canned milk.
1/2 cup sugar.
1/2 stick of butter. Boil, then mix pecan and coconut, 1/2 cup of each. Pour over cake while cake is hot.

Load And Go Ambulance

A Relic From The Dark Ages

Until recently, the term "ambulance" brought to mind little more than hastily loading a critically ill or injured person into some type of vehicle and rushing off, often at a dangerous speed, to the nearest medical facility. If the victim was lucky, he survived the ordeal, although he may have suffered additional needless injury during loading and transport. This "load and go" technique not only failed to save lives that could have been saved, but also cost lives and caused complications of injuries that could have been prevented had competent, well trained personnel and a well equipped ambulance been available.

Fortunately, "load and go" is becoming a thing of the past. Through the development of educational programs on emergency care (ECA, EMT, EMT-P) and the use of vital life saving equipment the survival and recovery rate of patients requiring am-

balance service has vastly improved over the past few years and with the development of new field care techniques and continued education of ambulance personnel it will continue to do so.

The cost of obtaining equipment and training people to use it is often high and this cost is ultimately borne by the public. In larger cities, county and city subsidies often help meet the cost of hiring and training personnel and purchasing equipment. In the smaller, rural areas, the problem of funding often seems insurmountable. In many areas concerned citizens are volunteering their time to serve their communities and attend ECA or EMT programs at own expense. All too often, in spite of these people who wish to work as non-paid volunteers, city or county governments feel that the cost of purchasing and equipping an ambulance is prohibitive. The result is trained personnel and no equipment,

which translates into lives lost: lives that could have been saved.

How much is a life worth? Most people will agree that there is no price tag. Why, then, do we often let the price tag in an ambulance or ambulance equipment prevent us from saving lives? For the sake of the community, it is time for the people and governments of rural areas to work together to find ways to meet cost and provide the care that their communities and counties need. State and federal aid programs, tax bonds, contributions, and many other means are available to provide a solution to the problem. There is no easy solution, but saving lives is never really simple, is it?

What Saith The Scriptures?

QUESTION: What must I do to be saved?

ANSWER: In order for a person to be saved he must believe on the Lord Jesus Christ (John 3:16; 8:24; 20:31). When a Philippian jailor asked the question "What must I do to be saved?" (Acts 16:30), he was told "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). This jailor was then taught "the word of the Lord" is "the gospel", which is "the power of God unto salvation" (Romans 1:16). The gospel is the good news "that Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures; and that he was buried; and that he hath been raised on the third day according to the scriptures" (1 Cor. 15:14). The gospel is also the news that Jesus reigns as Lord in heaven (Acts 2:36). We must believe in Jesus as the Son of God who died for our sins, and

as the Lord who reigns in heaven, in order to be saved.

In order for a person to be saved he must also repent of his sins (Acts 17:30). You must be moved by godly sorrow to turn from sin and turn to God for salvation (2 Cor. 7:10). When a great crowd of people were taught that Jesus was Lord (Acts 2:36), they believed this and "they were pricked in their heart" (Acts 2:37). They immediately asked "what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37). Peter told them "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission (forgiveness) of you sins..." (Acts 2:38).

In order for a person to be saved he must also confess his faith in Jesus. "Because if thou shalt confess with thy mouth Jesus as Lord, and shalt believe in thy heart that God raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved: for with the heart man believeth unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Rom. 10:9-10; see also Matt. 10:32).

In order for a person to be saved, he must also be baptized (1 Pet. 3:21). Jesus himself said "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..." (Mark 16:16). When lost men asked "What shall we do?" (Acts 2:37), they were told "Repent ye, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission (forgiveness) of your sins..." (Acts 2:38). When Saul (Paul) asked the Lord on the road to Damascus, "What shall I do Lord?", the Lord told him, "Arise, and go into Damascus; and there it shall be told thee of all things which are appointed for thee to do" (Acts 22:10). In Damascus he was told "and why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on his name." (Acts 22:16)

To a person who asks "What must I do to be saved?", the scriptures answer: Believe on the Lord Jesus, Repent of your sins, Confess Jesus as Lord, and Be Baptized for the forgiveness of you sins. This is what a sinner must do to be saved.

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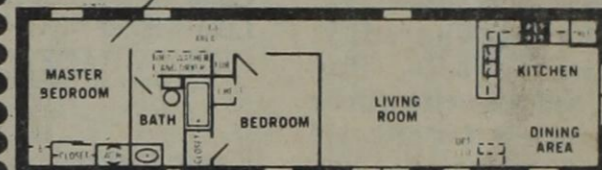

righteousness by our own efforts. The Christian life is the outliving of the inliving Christ, the justifier.

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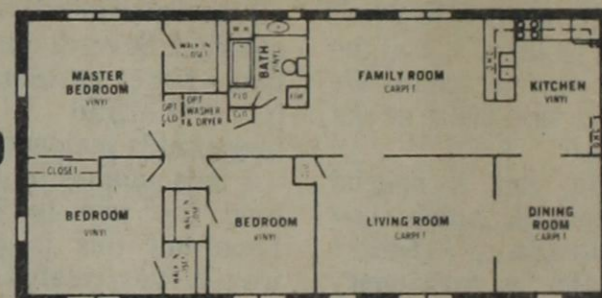

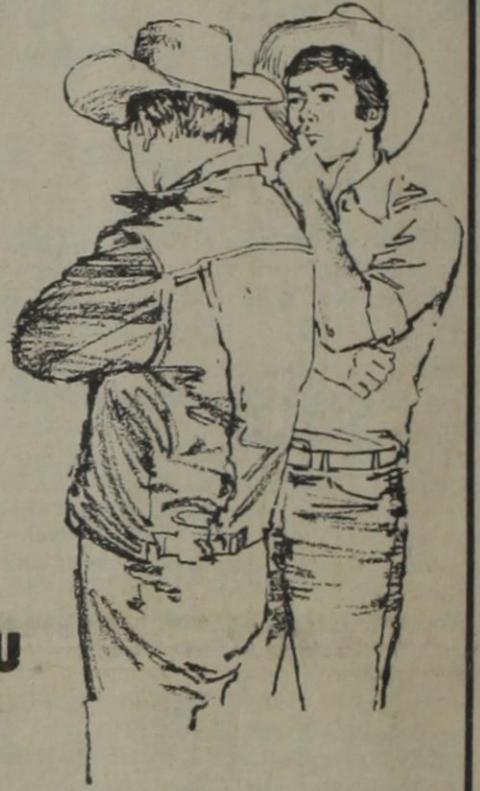

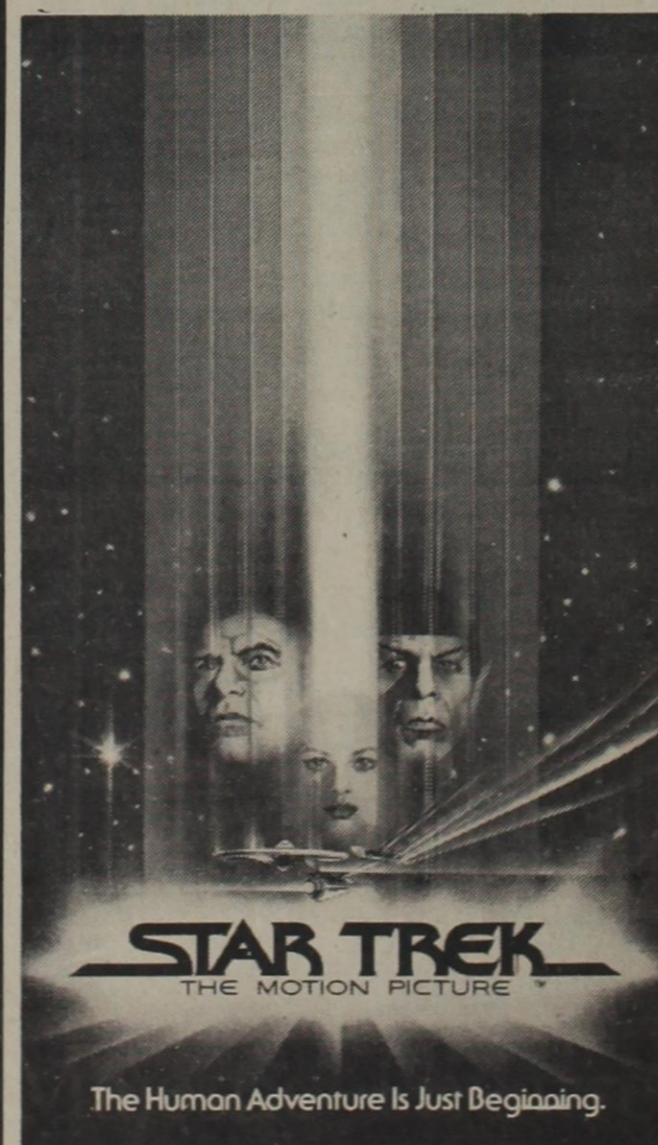
