ple because it teaches them self-esteem, determination, a desire to win, to set goals, leadership, to be team players, to strive for perfection and to be a winner.

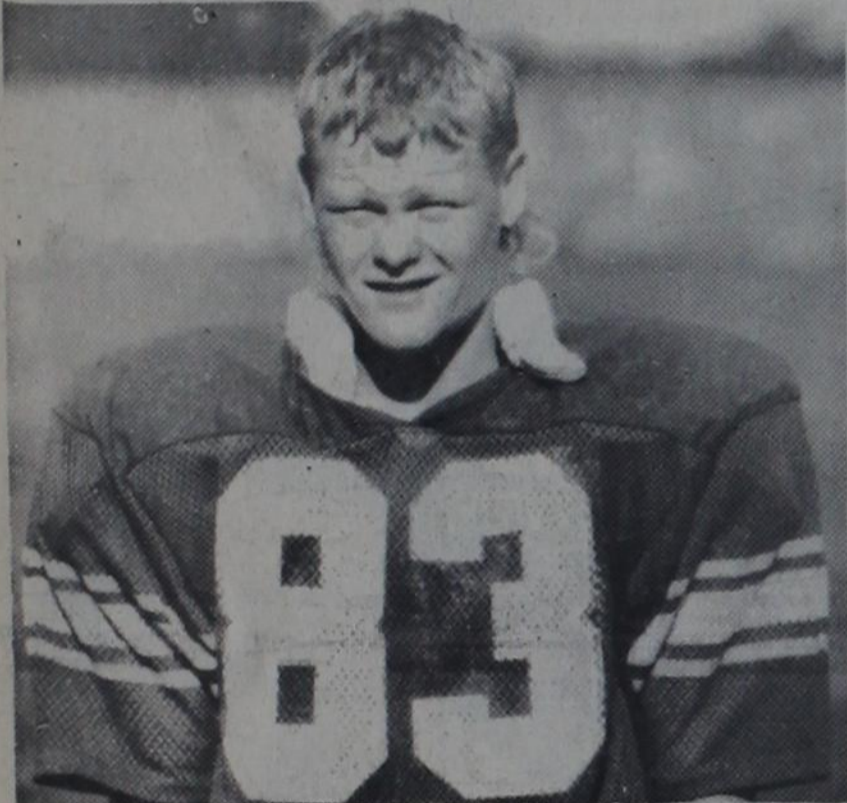
Coach Allen thinks that the hardest non-district game will be with Eden, and the hardest district game will be against Gorman.

Former Rising Star Publisher Ben A. Butler Dies

CISCO - Ben A. Butler, 88, former editor of three area newspapers, died Sunday at his home. Services were at 1 p.m. Tuesday at the Cisco Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Ken Diehm officiating. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Born in Paris, Texas, he served as editor of the Eastland Telegram from 1924 to 1928, the Cisco Press from 1928 to 1954 and The Rising Star from 1954 to 1979 when he retired and moved back to Cisco. He was a former schoolteacher, a justice of

the peace, manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for a number of years, a Mason and a member of First United Methodist Church.

He was the widower of Vera Wafford Butler. Survivors include a daughter, Verita Rice of Lingleville; two sisters, Maybelle Gilbert of Carl Junction, Mo. and Ann Robertson of Albuquerque, N.M.; three grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.
