Fat lambs will be the largest division of the Annual Eastland County Livestock Show March 20-21 according to W. B. Eaves, General Supt., who reports that entries for 158 of them had been turned in to him.

The show this year will be on the new show grounds between the Lakeside Country Club and Lake Eastland, Ed Harrison, Gorman, president of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association that sponsors the two day show, said.

Besides entries of the lambs, Eaves reported that there will be 27 head of fat calves and 126 head of fat pigs, 53 head of swine in the breeding division and 36 head of other sheep and only 28

head of dairy cows and heifers. The beef cattle and goat divisions will be small Eaves reported.

The livestock show catalogue is expected to be out in the near future and will show several changes. One is that all goats and sheep, except fat lambs will be judged on the afternoon of March 20th. Another change is that either the exhibitor or some mem ber of his or her immediate family must be a member of the County Livestock Raisers Association to be eligible to show. This is in lieu of a stall fee in order to raise money to develop the show grounds and buildings.

The dairy division will no longer be a classification show as it has been for many years.

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


