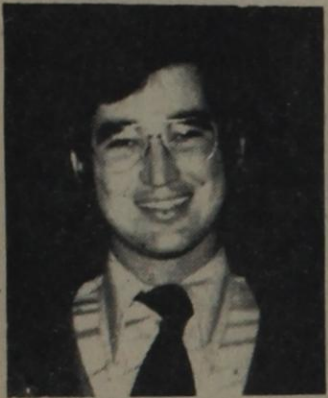


Local Bramlett Manager Enters Race For City Council

Filing Deadline For Homestead Exemption—April 1, 1980

Everyone is encouraged to come by the tax office and sign up for the Homestead Exemption if they haven't already done so. Everyone in the school district that owned their home as of January 1, 1980, are eligible for the \$5,000.00 exemption.

Persons over 65 years of age are eligible for an additional \$10,000.00 exemption. Disabled persons that are eligible for payment of disability

benefits under federal old age, survivors, and disability insurance as of January 1, 1980, are eligible for a \$10,000.00 exemption in addition to the \$5,000.00 exemption.

The Homestead Exemption is something that you MUST file for every year. If you fail to sign up you will not receive this exemption. Come by my office or call me for assistance.

Douglas Walker made a motion, seconded by Sue Barnes to hire Mrs. Pullattie (English and other possibilities); Doug Owen (Vocational Agriculture); and Dorothy Diddle (Home Economics) for one year contracts. Motion carried.

The contract of Band Director, Randy Taylor was discussed. No action was taken at this time, pending an interview with Mrs. Taylor.

Clay and Kathleen Hardesty for cooks; Bob Seale (bus driver and custodian), James Harrell, custodian and Bryan Milner as bus driver all with a 10 percent increase in salary. Motion carried.

A motion was made by David Harris and seconded by Sue Barnes to hire Mrs. Rawson for Librarian, Mrs. Tucker as school nurse, and Mrs. Asmus as counselor. Motion carried.

R.L. (Bob) Rust made a motion seconded by David Harris to hire Nan Owen for Tax Assessor-Collector for 1980 with a 10 percent salary increase. Motion carried.

David Harris made a motion seconded by Jack Hubbard to hire Rowena Chambers as school secretary for 1980. Motion carried.

The Board voted to postpone item 7 on the agenda. This is in regard to the insurance on the contents of the building.

Aubrey Lawrence made a motion seconded by Jack Hubbard to let A.C. I. replace gym door. Motion carried.

A motion was made by David Harris and seconded by Sue Barnes to postpone acceptance of bids on the school buses. Motion carried.

Bob Clark made a motion seconded by Aubrey Lawrence to pay the remainder of the total cost of repairing restrooms in the Ward School at \$362.40. Motion carried.

quite our cup of tea. We are ready to do something else.

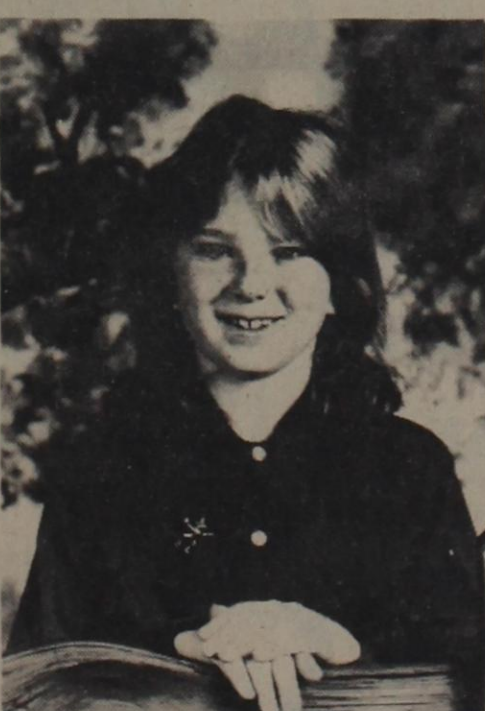

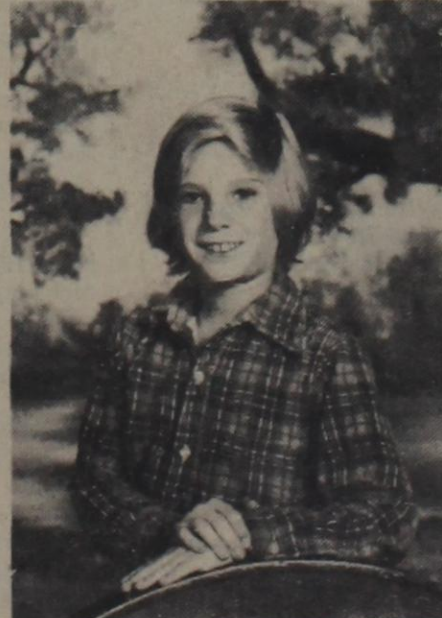

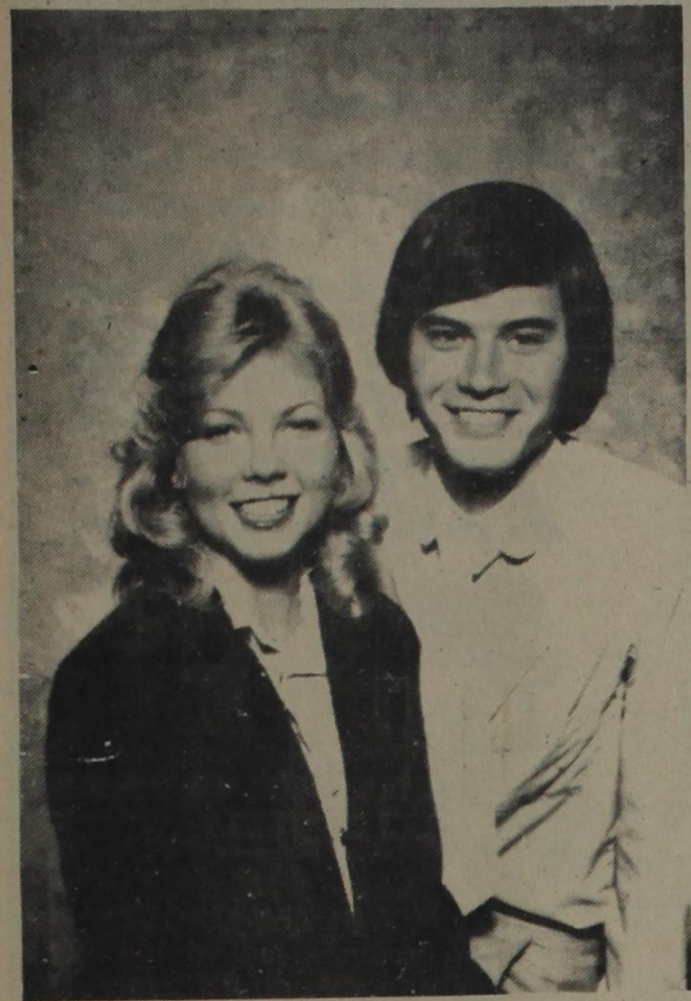

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the many people who helped and supported the recent Eastland County Livestock Show. It takes a lot of work and financial support for the show and sale. The show was larger than in several years. We heard people say the quality of the animals was improved this year, especially the market lambs and market hogs.

The coverage of the news media was appreciated, also. Low temperatures reported on Sunday morning, March 2 set new records in many parts of Texas. Unfortunately, several varieties of fruit trees were just beginning to grow and were sensitive to these freezing temperatures. Another freeze on March 18 may have caused additional damage. There were some reports in Eastland County of temperatures as low as 24 degrees. It is still too early to estimate the damage, but we are optimistic about the 1980 season since only 10 percent of the flowers are needed to set a full crop.

It takes several days of warm weather after a freeze to determine the damage. The injured buds grow slowly. Buds which appear to "hold" or develop slowly are probably injured. Even flower buds which develop normally may have been destroyed. Open the flower with a sharp razor blade or knife. The ovary and style are the first to develop a brown or dark color if killed. A dead ovary means no fruit. It is important to maintain the preventive spray program on all mature trees. Disease and insects can cripple any tree's bearing potential for years. And remember, if only 10 percent of the blooms get by the freeze, that is enough for a full crop.

Soil temperature is more important than you think when it comes to planting vegetables. More important than the moon signs are more predictable than weather is another variable which drastically affects how seeds and transplants grow - soil temperature. Soil temperature is a factor which few of us consider important enough to check before planting yet is probably the most important factor affecting seed germination and plant growth.

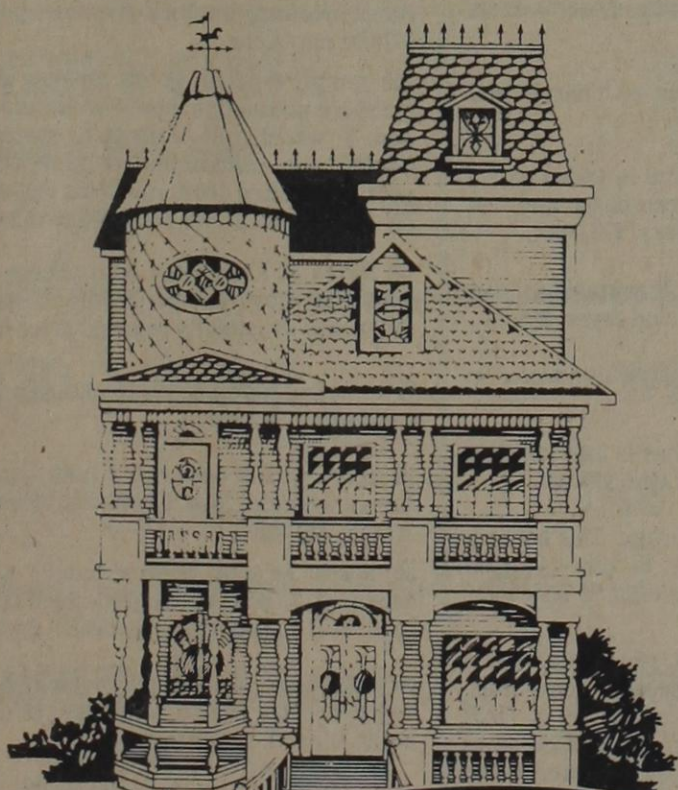
Soil temperatures at which vegetables seed will grow are classified into three categories - the minimum temperature required for seed growth, an optimum temperature and a "realistic" soil temperature. The realistic soil temperature is that temperature somewhere between optimum and minimum at which gardeners should plant to insure maximum success. For instance, the optimum soil temperature for seed germination of vegetable crops such as cucumber, canteloupe, okra, pumpkin, squash, and watermelon is 95 degrees, but the heat of summer will decrease yields and plant vigor. Yet if a gardener plants when the soil temperature reaches only 60 degrees, the vegetable seed will germinate and grow, but not vigorously. Thus, there must be a "realistic" soil temperature. For the above mentioned crops, the realistic soil temperature for best plant production are: cucumber (64), canteloupe (68), Okra (73), pumpkin (75), squash (70), and watermelon (72).

The realistic soil temperature recommended for the following crops are: beans (72), beets (45), cabbage (54), chard (54), eggplant (75), pepper (64), radish (45), tomato (55), turnip (50), and corn (55).

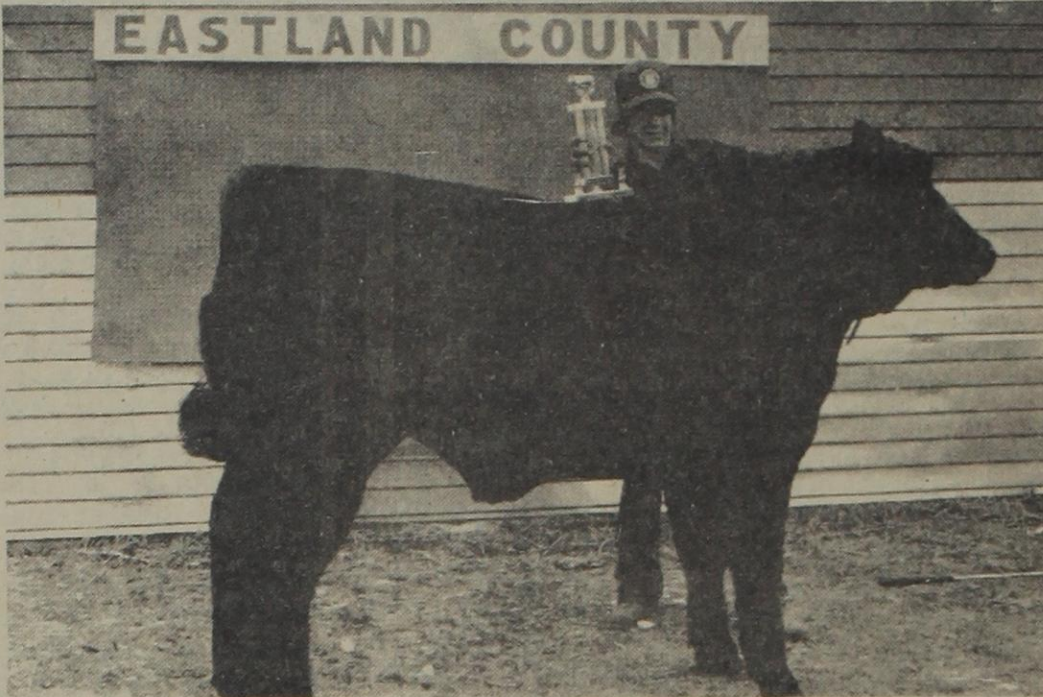

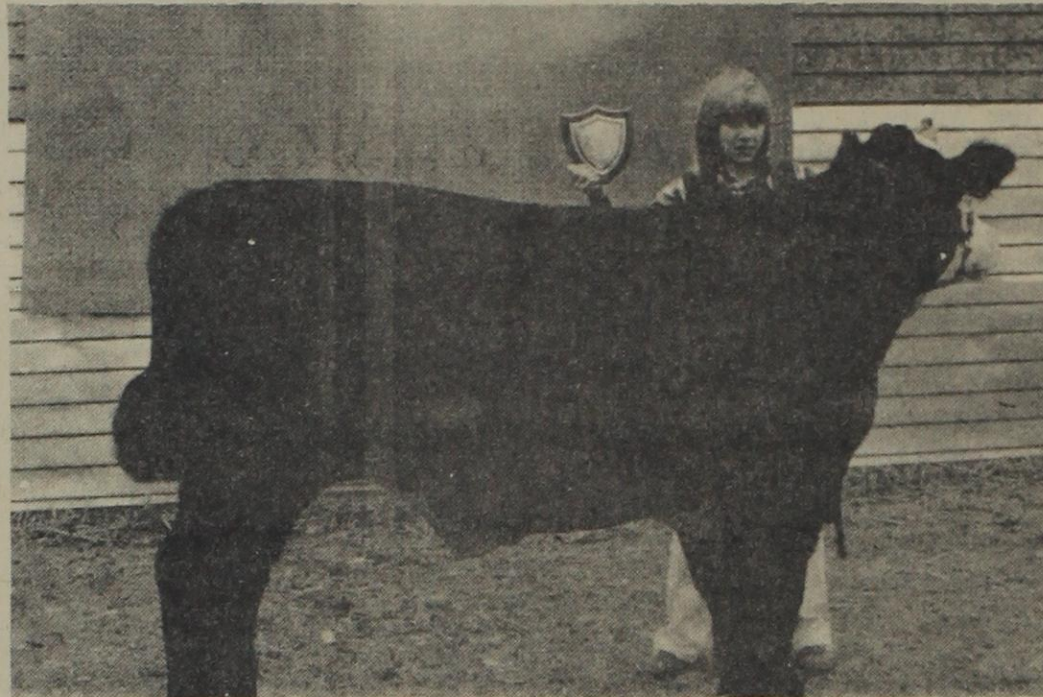

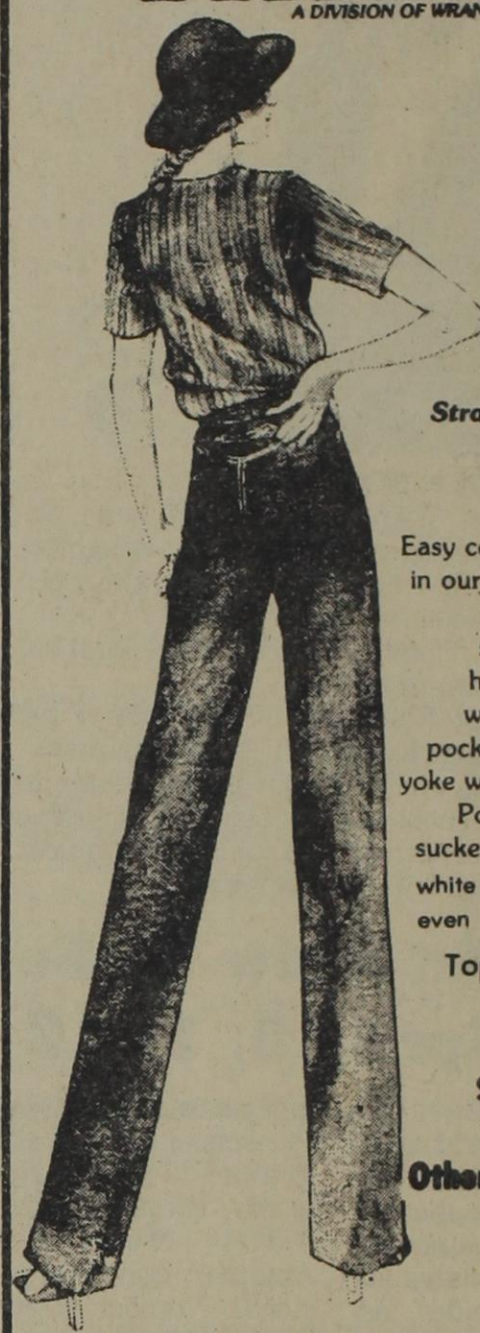

ENERGY

STAY-COOL IDEAS FOR ALL HOMES

Here is a collection of ideas for saving summer energy:

- Shade windows in the path of direct sunlight. This can be done by simply closing blinds, pulling down shades or drawing draperies. Since these steps allow some of the sun's heat to enter a house, a better method is to block the sun before it passes through the window. Awnings are a time-honored, dependable way to accomplish this. Newer methods include installation of solar screening, ultra-violet-reducing film or glass. The screening is made of thin bands of metal or fiber glass. The bands are angled so that the flat surface faces the sun. You can see through the window from the inside, but the sun's rays are blocked on the outside. Of the film and glass, glass (in a "summer" storm sash) is the better solution, since you can remove the sash in winter and allow that same sun to heat interior spaces. Film does not remove so easily, once it is applied to an existing window. Shade from deciduous trees works well, too. When the leaves are gone in winter, the sun warms the house interiors. Finally, shutters or outdoor blinds effectively block the sun's heat in summer, but, of course, they eliminate daylight, as well.
- Keep windows and doors closed during the hottest hours of the day and draw draperies and (or) blinds on sunny windows. Light colored draperies and drapery linings reflect heat to the outside; dark colors absorb heat. Awnings or bamboo shades will help protect the south sides of a structure from sun.
- If possible, cook and run heat-generating equipment—range, washer, dryer and dishwasher—during early morning or late evening hours. Electric lights also generate heat; use them sparingly on hot days.
- The moisture generated in the kitchen, laundry, and bathroom tends to increase humidity in other areas of the home. Use exhaust fans as necessary, and keep doors closed in heat-generating rooms when equipment is in use.
- Take advantage of solar energy by putting up a clothes line and drying clothes outdoors.
- Summer heat puts extra demands on your refrigerator. Keep equipment in top operating condition; defrost as needed; and don't open the door unnecessarily.
- During cooler evening hours, open windows, top and bottom, to vent built-up heat from your home. Open pairs of windows, opposite one another, for cross ventilation. If your attic is ventilated, open the door, cool air will enter your home through open windows on the lower floor(s); hot air will rise and pass out through the attic.
- Fans may be necessary to vent built-up heat when little air is moving outside and when the inside temperature of a home is greater than the outside temperature. The movement of air increases moisture evaporation which, in turn, cools the air.
- Window fans ventilate more efficiently than portable or rollabout fans. Window fans exhaust heat to the outdoors and should be set up accordingly.
- Attic fans ventilate best of all. During the night the fan is turned on. The blades draw cool night air through open windows and expel it into the attic space, where pressure pushes it through attic vents to the outdoors. When the family wakes in the morning, the fan is turned off, the windows closed and window shades on the east side of the house are pulled down. Or, shading devices already installed keep out the morning sun. The cool night air now inside the house will stay for most of the day. Even the strong late afternoon sun usually won't raise the indoor temperature to the outside level, although the house air will warm gradually. Next evening, the cycle is repeated.

Many quality fans are produced with at least two speeds, some with three. This gives you an option to move air at a gentle speed through the house on a day that is blistering hot indoors and out. It also allows you to move air at a comfortable speed during an evening dinner party. Choose a fan on the basis of air it moves, expressed in cubic feet per minute (CFM). First multiply in feet the length, width and height of your house (from ground level to attic floor). Divide this number by 10, and the result will roughly match the CFM rating of a fan properly sized for your house. Given a climate with hot days and cool nights and a choice between an attic fan and an air conditioner, keep in mind that the attic fan will consume far less power and will cost less to buy, install and maintain.

A number of city dwellers have purchased dehumidifiers. As its name implies, this fairly simple mechanism withdraws moisture from the air. Dehumidifiers are used wherever the climate in summer is moist. Because a single dehumidifier absorbs the moisture in a single area—the area in which it is located—homeowners are not prone to using them as they are air conditioners. To take the moisture out of an entire house, an owner would have to install a dehumidifier in nearly every room. The economics argue against that kind of comfort control, but a dehumidifier can be quite effective in a small apartment.

Dehumidifiers draw less power than air conditioners. Most have a humidistat control which shuts off the motor when air in the room has reached the humidity level called for. Some units are piped directly to a waste drain. Others require emptying when the water pan is full.

In states such as Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado, the atmosphere in summer is dry, not wet. As an in-between solution for keeping cool, many families in these areas install an evaporative cooler. Looking something like a room air conditioner, the cooler fits in a window opening. A fan within the unit blows outdoor air across a pan of water and into the house. Evaporating water lowers the temperature of the air around it. Thus, cooler air circulates through the room.

CARPETING

Now that home heating and cooling are newsworthy subjects, it is worth noting that carpeting can save energy!

Carpeted floors are warmer than non-carpeted ones because drafts of cold air are kept out by the carpet and pad insulation. Thermal tests indicate that heat loss can be reduced by as much as 54% when installed on an uninsulated wood floor. In houses with half basements, carpet over cement slab is recommended by builders and tests indicate that heat loss is reduced 72% when carpet is installed on uninsulated, exposed concrete on grade level. Studies have shown that carpet in the home can reduce annual heating bills by as much as 13%. And in summer months, the insulating properties of carpet can keep the house cooler, reducing air conditioning costs as well.

Draw the measurements and the shape of the area to be carpeted including doors, radiators and irregularities in the walls, on a piece of graph paper. Bring this diagram with you to the store when you order your carpeting. Let the carpet dealer help you figure out exactly how much carpeting you will need to do the job properly.

In general the best quality carpet should be purchased for the areas that will get the heaviest wear, such as living room, dining room, stairs and hall. If the area is likely to collect dirt and get soiled you might consider patterned, multicolored or tweed carpet as these show stains less than solid colors. Tufting or pile density and fiber determine the nature of the carpet—its looks and durability. In general, if the yarn is tightly tufted and very dense the carpet will perform well.

The higher the pile the more luxurious the feel of the carpet but the less the wearability. Look closely at the pile to see the degree of twist in the tufts. The tighter the twist the better the carpet performance. Check the label for "heat setting". This process locks the twist into pile and prevents the yarn from unraveling.

The fiber is an important factor to consider. Wool is the warmest and softest of all carpeting materials. It is crush resistant and easy to maintain. American wool carpets are moth-proofed but still susceptible to mold and mildew under damp conditions. Unfortunately, the price of wool, beginning at approximately \$40 per square yard for acceptable quality, is prohibitive for many consumers.

Nylon, the most popular carpet fiber, accounts for 75% of total face fabrics purchased today. Nylon is known for its tough, long lasting wear. Nylon resists

Energy Audits

As of January 1 of this year, public utilities are required by law to offer energy audits to their customers. The charge is nominal—generally about \$10 for an on-site inspection of your home. The audit tells you where you're losing heat, what it would cost to tighten up, how much you'd save on your energy bills, what contractors can do the job and where you can get financing. The earlier you call for an appointment, the earlier you can start saving money on heat.

A Drop In The Bucket

A faucet that drips once every second wastes 2,400 gallons of water a year (enough to run an automatic dishwasher 160 times). If you don't turn off the water while you brush your teeth, you waste 2½ gallons. Assuming everyone in a city of 150,000 did that twice a day, the city could waste 273,750,000 gallons of water annually.

Regarding Air Conditioning Equipment

Overcooling is expensive and wastes energy. Don't use or buy more cooling equipment capacity than you actually need.

If you need central air conditioning, select a unit with the lowest suitable capacity and highest efficiency. A larger unit than you need not only costs more to run but probably won't remove enough moisture from the air.

Ask your dealer to help you determine how much cooling capacity you need for the space you have to cool and for the climate in which you live.

Make sure the ducts in your air conditioning system are properly insulated, especially those that pass through the attic or other uncooled spaces.

If you don't need central air conditioning, consider using individual window or through-the-wall units in rooms that need cooling from time to time. Select the lowest capacity and highest efficiency for the rooms you need to cool. As a rule, these will cost less to buy and less to operate.

Install a whole-house ventilating fan in your attic or in an upstairs window to cool the house when it's cool outside, even if you have central air conditioning.

It will pay to use the fan rather than air conditioning when the outside temperature is below 82 degrees F. When windows in the house are open, the fan pulls cool air through the house and

fading and crushing but has a tendency to "pill" and generates static electricity. You might well consider paying a little more for an anti-static finish. Cost for nylon is usually \$10 to \$25 per square yard.

Acrylic is the closest to wool of the artificial fibers. It has a similar warm feeling but does not resist crushing as well unless the carpet is particularly deep and dense. It cleans easier than wool and is moth-proof, mildew-proof and non-allergenic. Acrylic produces little static electricity but soils more easily than nylon or polyester, and has a tendency to "pill" after long wear.

Polyester has a high luster look and is soft and pleasant. It resists abrasion and wears well but does not spring back as well as nylon unless it has been specially treated. Polyester is a good alternative to nylon or acrylic at a lower price.

Polypropylene (olefin) is second to nylon for toughness and durability, is more stain resistant and has less static build-up. It is easy to clean because it resists wet stains and moisture. Used primarily for indoor/outdoor carpeting, this fabric is moderately priced about \$6 to \$8 per square yard.

Fiber blends are becoming increasingly popular because they combine the best of different fibers.

Carpet backing is also important. The most common is woven polypropylene or jute. This material is impervious to moisture, rot or mildew.

Consider purchasing padding as well. This prolongs carpet life by helping absorb the crushing and grinding of footsteps. It also helps retain the carpet texture and increases absorption of noise. The density of the padding is most important. Check that the pile is thick, tight and springy.

Fire resistance, colorfastness and shrinkage are also worth looking into. Many manufacturers automatically guarantee these on the label. Soil retardant finishes are now regularly available and many prove to be well worth the investment.

Colors make the difference. Reds can warm up a cold room and add excitement to a drab one. Blues and greens have a cooling effect; in pale shades they help open up small areas. Yellow brings sunshine into a poorly lit, airless room. Natural shades of beige, gray and brown neutralize rooms that are too "busy". Dark or bold colors pull an area together. Light colors create a feeling of spaciousness. Wall to wall carpeting "pushes out" the walls adding an illusion of space.

Use It Or Lose It...

A product that helps energy and environmental problems, saves money and works as well as a similar product used by nearly everyone should be a big success.

Not so in the case of re-refined used lubricating oil. Few people use it even though the time is coming when re-refined oil can supply a substantial percentage of U.S. lubricating oil needs.

Several new processes have been developed to produce re-refined motor oils that perform as well or better than "virgin" motor oils, cost less and meet the highest grade standards after reformulation with additives. And, modern refining processes produce little or no pollution.

In virgin oils, the unstable materials react with engine parts and become contaminants in the used oil. These contaminants are removed as sludge during the re-refining process and are absent from the reformulated oil. The process also helps reduce pollution by diverting used oil to a refinery instead of it being dumped.

A major problem is that there are very few crude oils which efficiently produce good lubricating oils, and they are diminishing quite rapidly, which is a primary reason for the recycling of lubricating oils.

Despite the apparent advantages it is unlikely that the general public will begin soon to use large amounts of re-refined oil. Major oil companies don't sell it, so the brand names are unrecognizable to most people.

Kitchen Knives

Is slicing, dicing or chopping a chore for you? The right knife could make the difference.

Chopping, for example, is a breeze if you use a chef's knife (also called a French cook's knife). The blade is heavy to give you extra power and wide enough to keep your knuckles clear of the cutting board. Blades average about ten inches.

For peeling and paring, try the light, easy-to-handle paring knife (blade: two to four inches). It's also good for slicing small bits of just about anything. Other knives that will make your job easier: slicing or carving knives (for cooked meat), butcher knives (for raw meat), boning knives (for cutting away bone) and bread knives.

Can't afford to buy them all? A good compromise is a medium sized (five- or six-inch blade) utility knife. The blade is longer than the paring knife's but lighter than the chef's; it can peel and pare as well as do bigger slicing, dicing and carving jobs.

Stainless steel blades resist pitting and rusting, but the softer carbon steel is easier to sharpen. There's now a high carbon stainless steel that has the qualities of both, but it's more expensive, too.

The traditional way to sharpen a knife is to draw it across a sharpening stone which has been lubricated with a drop or two of oil. A butcher steel (a metal rod with a handle) is good for touchups. Electric sharpeners are quick and easy, but you have less control over the edge you give your blade.

Some Praise For Appraisals

Valuable jewelry requires two appraisals, one for insurance and one for estate purposes. An insurance appraisal establishes the cost of replacement due to loss, theft or damage, while an estate appraisal assesses the market value of your gems without a forced sale.

Since the appraisal involves a value estimate, you will want to get the best opinion you can. Usually the person who sold you the gem will be most familiar with it. Be sure the appraiser you choose has had certified training and can give you examples of past appraisals. The appraisal should include these points:

- For major stones: millimeter dimensions, quality and weight.
- For major diamonds: cutting, color, and clarity grades, a description of the grading system used, and a diagram of any imperfections in the stone.
- For minor stones: number of stones and total weight, individual dimensions, quality and identity.
- Identity and assessment of mounting workmanship.
- A photograph or thorough description of each piece.
- Estimated value without taxes.

In addition to the above, the equipment used in the assessment should be indicated. The forms should be numbered, signed, and dated with copies for insurance and files.

Lavern Carroll and Jackie LeBleu have been named Chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Spring Special Event in Rising Star. The announcement was made by the North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is a national volunteer health agency which funds research to find a cure or a control for cystic fibrosis and investigations for a reliable test to determine carriers of the CF gene. Inherited and presently

incurable, cystic fibrosis occurs once in every 1600 live births in the United States, making it the leading genetic killer of American children. An estimated 10 million Americans are symptomless carriers of the CF gene.

In CF, a thick, sticky mucus clogs the lungs and airways creating breathing difficulties, high susceptibility to infection and lung damage. The mucus

may also interfere with digestion by preventing the flow of enzymes from the pancreas into the small intestine, causing malabsorption of food. A child born in 1980 with cystic fibrosis has a 50 percent chance of reaching his or her 19th birthday.

HOFCO Inc., Abilene, completed No. 1 Graham-Reynolds as a Marble Falls oil discovery well six miles northeast of Cisco in Eastland County.

Location is 330 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of Section 51, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 28 barrels of 41 gravity oil, flowing through a 10-64-inch choke with 450 pounds casing and 40 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 3,512-18 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud acid. The pay was fractured with 15,000 pounds of sand and 750 barrels of fluid.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,560 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,578 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 2,743-1.

S.R.I. Production of Midland will drill three regular field projects one mile southeast of Bangs on the Dr. J.B. Stephens 247 acre lease. Each venture has a proposed depth of 1990 feet.

No. 1 Stephens will be drilled 150 feet from the north and east lines of Thomas Pratt Survey 107, A-757.

No. 2 Stephens is located 150 feet from the north and 1587 feet from the east survey lines.

Site for No. 3 Stephens is 1350 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east section lines.

Henry Hydrocarbon Inc. Arlington will drill No. 1 Belknap in the regular field one-fourth mile east of Brownwood. The planned 1700 foot venture is located on a 40 acre lease. It spots 750 feet from the northwest and 200 feet from the southwest lines of I. Roseau Survey, A-801.

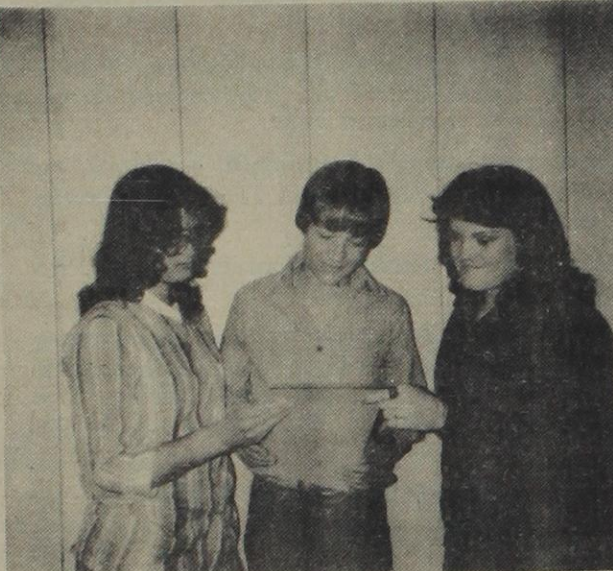

During my stay here at Texas Department of Corrections, I've met many very interesting people. Thrown together as we are, most people become pretty familiar with those whom he is around every day.

We spend many hours discussing the particulars of how and why we came to be in prison.

I'd like to tell you a little about one such man whom I've come to know here.

For this story let's call him Danny—Not his real name.

Danny is doing life for possession of narcotics. Although he is only middle-age, this is his third trip to T.D.C.

He was caught with four caps of heroin, about twenty bucks street value; but because of his bad record and the two previous prison sentences, he was convicted as a habitual criminal.

In January of this year, Danny passed his twelfth straight year behind bars.

When he was busted the last time, Danny had a wife and three children. Although his wife left him for another man, she has kept in touch and even sent him a little money down through the

years. His children, two daughters and one son have kept in pretty close touch. They visit occasionally, write regularly and often send pictures of all the family.

Danny is very proud of the pictures of his family, especially the ones of his little granddaughter.

When Danny was last busted, his children were quite small. Now both his daughters are married and one has a child of her own.

I have no way of knowing what Danny was like on the streets, but I've come to know him quite well here. He is a very kind and gentle man. Always ready to help his inmates, he works hard and seems to always be happy and jovial.

I like Danny very well and I'm very glad for his recent good fortune.

Many of you may not realize that a man can make parole on a life sentence. But after twelve years, Danny recently came up for parole the first time. He has been notified that he made the first parole. And any day now, for the first time in over twelve years, Danny will again be on the streets. I'm not sure how he will do, but I certainly wish him the very best.

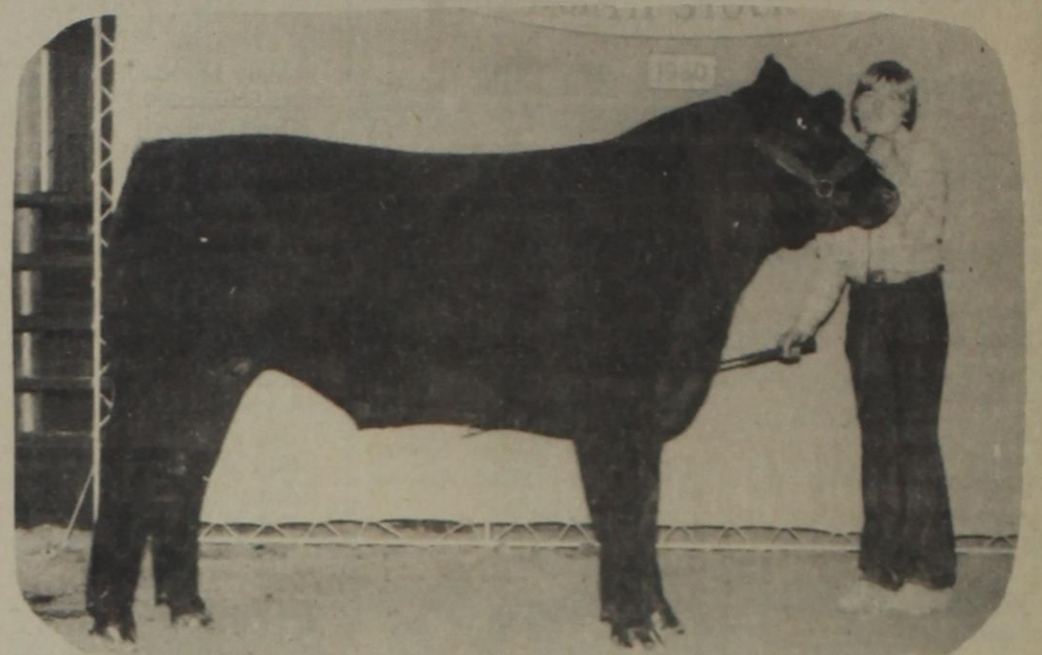

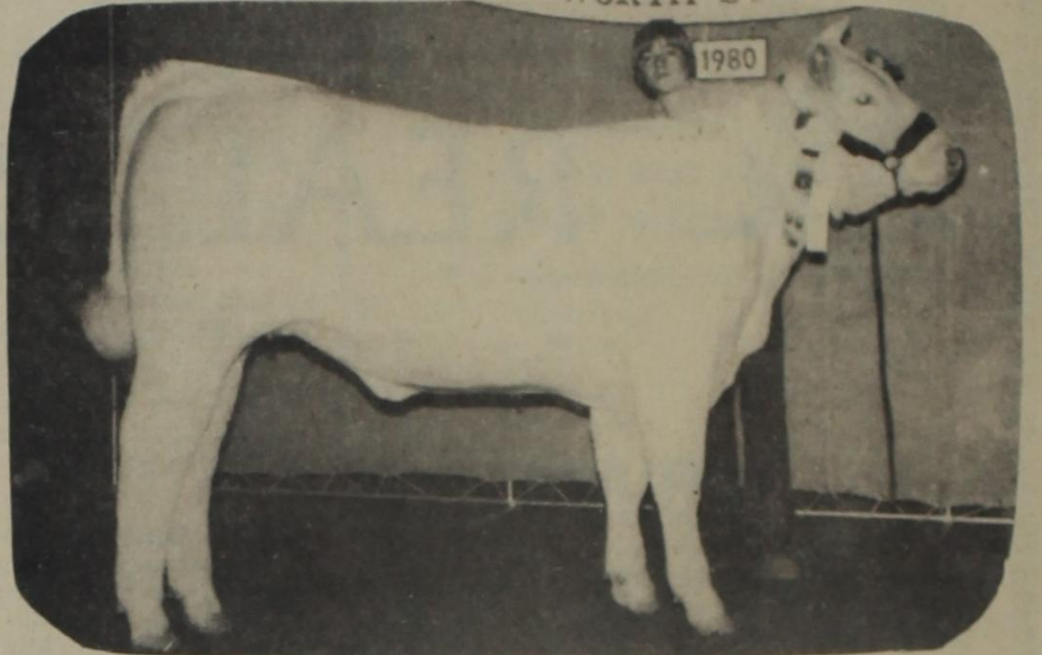

Homemaking Tips

By Janet Thomas

With gardening season just beginning, many families are planning on "growing their own groceries" this summer to help lower their family's food budget.

One of the earliest methods of food preservation was drying of fruits and vegetables. With the rising cost of food and energy, many homemakers are home drying and this method of food preservation is returning as a popular method. Dried foods also have the added advantage of conserving storage space.

If you are thinking about buying a food dehydrator, you might want to consider these points before buying. Food dehydrators range in cost from \$19.95 to several hundred dollars. Before buying an expensive piece of equipment it is recommended that you try conventional oven drying first to see if your families likes the taste of the dried foods. Be sure and consider the frequency of use in comparison to the cost of special drying equipment. Read the use and care instructions with several food dehydrator models to compare drying times and cost of operation.

The Extension Service office has a free bulletin MP-1209 entitled **Drying Foods At Home**. This publication tells how to prepare vegetables and how to prepare and pre-treat fruits for drying. Then, it tells you how to dry them whether you are using your own kitchen oven, a portable vegetable dehydrator, or in the sun. This publication also gives the directions for building a natural-draft vegetable dehydrator and an electric food dehydrator.

If you have never dried foods, there is no problem.

Begin with fruits, onions, green pepper, and herbs. These foods can be oven dried - often immediately after the oven has been used for baking.

One of the joys of dried foods is convenience. Their storage requires little space and it is simple to reach for the container on the shelf when 2 spoonful of chopped onion or green pepper is needed for a casserole. Another important feature of dried foods is that they are safe to use. They retain their quality for many months.

The high caloric and nutritive values of dried fruits may be best understood if you realize that it takes 5-1/2 pounds of fresh apricots to yield one pound when dried. Eighteen medium size apples weighing about 6 pounds dried out to about one pound...so dried fruits go a long way.

Drying foods was, in the olden days, and still remains, a good way to preserve surplus food when the freezer is crowded - or when canning jars are full - or if this method just appeals to you.

BEEF JERKY

- 1-1/2 pounds flank steak
- 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt
- 1/3 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons liquid smoke (optional)
- 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
- 1/3 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon onion powder
- Trim off fat. Semi-freeze meat and slice with the grain, making strips approximately 2 inches long and 1/2 inch thick. Place meat in shallow baking dish. Combine all other ingredients and

pour over meat. Marinate overnight.

Preheat oven to 140 - 150 degrees F. Lay strips of marinated meat in single layer on oven rack with a baking sheet or foil underneath to catch drippings. Leave oven door open a crack and bake 8 to 12 hours, or until meat is chewy.

This film portrays Jesus as a cynical cult leader who needed to be killed for political reasons. T.V. 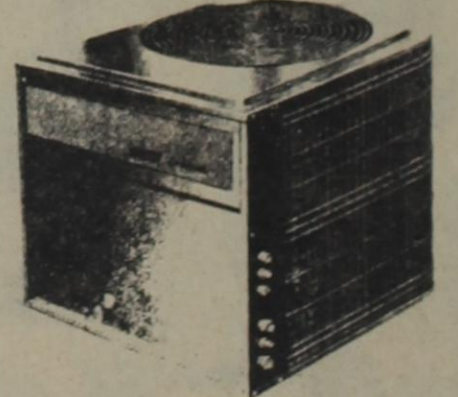
