



How To Sell Livestock For More Money

Cashing in on top market prices and saving pounds of shrinkage is a goal of every livestock farmer.

This extra profit is not so much luck as good management and common sense, according to the experts reporting to Massey-Ferguson research. Any livestock farmer can do it by practicing these

four simple procedures: Use the phone just before shipping. This tells you which market is paying the best price on a particular day. Economists at Purdue University found that hog prices have varied as much as \$1.50 a hundred-weight between markets at the same time for the same grade. This could mean \$200 more for a semi-trailer load of 72 hogs.

Sprinkle your hogs enroute. An easy way is to string a length of garden hose over your truck box, connect it to a water faucet at each stop on the way to market. This will save about \$75 a truckload in shrinkage and loss, on a summer trip of 25 to 27 hours.

Haul your cattle at night. You'll get a lot less shrinkage and make money after dark. Night hauling was tested in Texas by Purdue's economists by loading steers at 5 P.M. and arriving at the market to weigh in at 8 A.M. the next morning. They found that the steers only lost 3.8 per cent of their weight. When they made the same shipment in the daytime, the shrinkage loss was 5.4 per cent. This difference in shrinkage is about 16 pounds of beef per head, around \$4 worth at the market.

Pick the right date. Hogs usually bring about \$3 more a hundredweight in mid-summer and commercial cattle 10% higher in the spring. So, plan your feeding and breeding ahead to catch the best season next year. Buy feeder cattle which will reach market age in the spring; and breed sows at a time which will allow their pigs to be ready for market by mid-summer.

It has been estimated that these simple practices can mean as much as \$200 more on a truckload of hogs and \$10 to \$15 more per head for cattle. The extra profit is worth the effort.


