

> Secondly, while some workers will pay more, they will also be able to count on bigger benefits checks when they retire, and for their families if they should die or become disabled. Benefits are based on average earnings over a period of years, but only earnings on which social security taxes are paid count in figuring the average. When

And third, consider the alternative. In order to keep social security benefits up with the cost of living, it is necessary to change either the contribution rate or the earnings base. Increasing the contribution rate means that everybody would be paying more taxes. Increasing the earnings base means that only those with higher earnings will be paying more.

Traditionally the earnings base has been raised periodically to keep up with the increase in wages in the the social security benefits is based on the amount of the average annual earnings, if the amount of taxable earnings were not raised more and more workers would have insurance protection related to an increasingly smaller part of their total earnings. Eventually the program would provide a flat benefit because almost everyone wuld be earning at or above the maximum taxable



NEED A HUMIDIFIER?

This is the chilly time of year when the furnace is pumping away, the thermostat registers 70 or 72 degrees, and yet you may be uncomfortable. And the house seems cold, the air dead and unpleasant; you may develop a dry, stuffy nose and scratchy throat. Reason: the air in the house is too dry.

To feel fresh, the heated air needs a constant supply of moisture. When it is properly moist, you will feel invigorated, and also feel warmer.

People used to set out pans of water to increase the moisture in the air. but this had little effect because the water didn't become sufficiently heated for rapid evaporation. The answer, of course, is to invest in a humidifier. You can buy a small table-top unit that holds a couple of quarts of water. or a console type on casters. Then there's the permanent powered type that fits over a forced-air

One version utilizes an atomizer that sprays a fine mist of water into the air; the other is evaporative, forcing air through a porus pad saturated with water from a tank. You can also get a humidifier that ties in with the central heating system.

Things to look for when you buy a humidifier: A built-in humidistat to maintain a humidity level

They are also less expensive when you buy them in the shell. Six pecans fresh from the shell have about 105 calories whereas dry or oil roasted pecans have 205 calories per ounce.

Sometimes eating nuts

Chestnuts roasted in the shell have a little less than 10 calories each. Fresh hazelnuts or filberts have about 8 calories each. Brazil nuts from the shell have about 17 calorieseach, but shelled walnuts have about 30 calories each.

The small nuts that we tend to eat by the handful can total up quite a few calories. One ounce of pistachios, roasted and salted in the shell, has about 169 calories. Pine nuts or pignolas have 157 calories per ounce. True, you get more nuts per ounce, but it's also likely that you'll eat more ounces. The arithmetic of eating nuts can be tricky. If you can't give them up entirely, really limit your quantities. ©1976 McNaught Synd.



The success you have in keeping it alive after Christmas resistant to diseases and this will depend on the care you give it while it is in your home. Here are some suggestions for caring for your living tree:

Do not subject a live tree to hot dry, household air for longer than two weeks at the most, and 7 to 8 days would be best. Keep the tree in as cool a location as possible. Keep it out of drafts from heating vents and away from radiators. Provide as much natural light as you can. Place the root ball or container in an attractive tub that has been lined with heavy plastic to protect the floor. If the plant is balled and burlapped, allow an inch or two of damp peat moss or sawdust to pack the root ball.

Some varieties are more means less spraying and a healthier tree. Many new varieties are being released by the USDA Pecan Station at Brownwood, which have resistance to pecan scab. Old varieties such as Desirable or Sturat also have resistance of the two. Desirable is the preferred variety. The Stuart makes a good shade tree, but

the pecan shell is rather thick. Of the new varieties, Choctawand Chevenne have the highest level of resistance to pecan scab. Sioux, Caddo, and Shawnee ean be grown in most areas with only limited spray applications. Selecting disease resistant varieties now will save on expensive fungicide applications later on and will result in more high quality

Q. I'll be 62 soon and can't decide whether to retire now or work a while longer. How much would my social security payment be reduced if I start getting benefits at 62 instead of

A. The social security benefit amount at 62 is 80 percent of what you'd get at 65 and the reduction is permanent. Actually, you can begin getting benefits any time between 62 and 65. The closer you are to 65 when payments start, the



smaller the reduction.




