Hospital Takes Step Into Computerized

E.L. Graham Hosptial has taken another big step into the Electronic Age, or to be more precise, computerized medicine. A national

computer network, Telemed. Corporation, has recently installed the instrumeIntation to ennable E.L. Graham Hospital to "telephone- in" electrocadiograms taken on its

patients. The ECG information is transmitted to the Hoffman Estates, Illinois Computer Center when it is processed. The computer then calls the hospital and a teleprinter unit receives the analysis.

> TALKING TO THE COMPUTER

A technician places small electrical sensores or electrodes on the patient's ankles, wrists, and chest. These are attached to the ECG cart with small wires. The technician then dials the computer center and the computer answers with a "beep" in the telephone receiver. The technician then moves a switch on the cart and code data is automatically transmitted to the computer which identifies the hospital and patient and the patient's height, age, sex and weight. Two seconds

later, the computer again

informs the technician via a

signal light on the cart that it has received the code information and is ready to receive the ECG. A switch is flipped and the cart automatically records the entire ECG in 20 seconds.

While the cart is taking the

ECG, the computer is watching the process. At the end of the ECG, the computer lights another signal lamp on the cart telling the technician that the information was received The technician then hangsup the receiver and waits for

the computer analysis. Wthin minutes, a bell rings on the teleprinter unit as it starts to type out its

First comes a verification of the patient and hospital code, then a series of tabulated numbers rating the various functions of the heart. Finally a printed analysis and interpretation concludes the report.

24 HOURS A DAY 365 DAYS A YEAR

The big advantage of this recent development is a speedy reading and interpretation of the heart's performance, and it can be obtained at any time of dayor night, a particularly valuable aid in off hour emergecny cases.

Being concerned for American agriculture, it is my deepest hope, that you will print the following letter to the peanut farmers in your area. These facts might enlighten consumers as well. Mr. Peanut Farmer:

You are invited to join the protest in support of yourselves and others like you, who are opposed to input costs verses selling prices in our land. I have been involved in farming for several years, particularly in

family farmer as most of you are. Whether you farm irrigated or dryland peanuts. you are faced with an immediate reduction in your income. Beginning in 1978 and approximate reduction of 30 per cent over a four year period, the largest part in 78. Based on the best three years out of the last five your quoto will be set, then the reduction. To a dryland farmer in drought areas the past three years, this is considerably more than 30 per cent.

Our crop price or ton price has been frozen at 21 cents per pound. Inflation has not been frozen. We are faced today with the same problems we have had the past few years, spiraling costs of fuel, fertilizer, chemicals seed, equipment, clothing and the market


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## Stenholm Addresses Farmers Rally

Charles Stenholm, candidate for Congress from the 17th Congressional District, told farmers assembled at the Farmers Rally in Abilene on December 14, that few people, a short time before the rally, would have believed that so many would attend the meeting to show support for farmers. But the turnout, Stenholm said, proved the deep concern that farmers and other members of the community had for the farm crisis.

Stenhholm, while remarking on the success of the rally, closed his speech with the questions, "What next? What happens today and tomorrow? How do we begin to achieve those very worthwhile goals that you are here today to demonstrate your interest in achieving?'

As a farmer personally involved in the problems of present- day agriculture, Stenholm has prepared and offers his own answers to the questions that he asked on December 14.

· "Those farmers in the 17th Congressional District who have participated in the recent rallies and tractor parades should be justifiably proud that they have been peaceful and have demonstrated widespread understanding and support for a solution to the farm price dilema. The question now is, "Where do we go from

Farmers have the attention of the nation. We must now act positively and responsibly. We must not become party to any violent action' any obstruction of local retail operations; or any activities that are disruptive or abusive to our customers. We must keep in mind the absoulute necessity of maintaining and exforeign and domestic markets, and above all the general welfare of this nation. Our proposals must quite obviously be those that can be supported by a large majority of farmers, but they must also be supported by consumers, and a Congress and President dominated by advisors from more populus sections of this nation.

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The consumer must understand that bankruptcy or other factors drastically reducing production will surely mean skyrocketing prices. The consumer is working in his or her own interest when supporting a fair profit for producers. Every business must have a

profit to continue to operate. If there is any doubt in your mind concerning the seriousness of the farm

cost- price squeeze, the plain facts are that the possible loss of independent farmers threatens the very fabric of our agricultural productivity, and if that fabric is destroyed so will be the nation.

Such a critical situation demands leadership and immediate action by those who can take steps to correct this dangerous economic situation, which unattended can affect the future of America. We must, however, realize that we did not get into htis situation overnight; and we will not get out overnight.

I am today proposing a 4 point program for us to build upon; a program that calls for meaningful participation by every farmer and a renewed understanding of the free enterprise system on the part of every consumer in the United States.

Point Number 1: Farmers should immediately curtail all sales of non-perishable commodities at current prices. Farmers should then agree on an orderly marketing plan drawing on the abilities of all talents available. This plan should include a pricing structure that includes a reasonable profit and be consistent with domestic and foreign competitive factors.

To clarify what is said above, farmers should begin placing their products on the retail shelf with a reasonable markup and sell when the free market can use it and is willing to pay a fair retail price. If farmers must throw a "sale" to move inventory, let it come later, but not today. Very few retail merchants can stay in business by selling at 50 percent off the year around.

No government payments, and no production (unless needed to maintain the cattle industry) would come from this Set Aside acreage. Stubble mulch clean tillage must be permitted.

The freedom to participate or not participate must be left to the individual farmer. I believe in the right to work. I also believe in the right to

I basically believe that the majority of farmers would rather farm three- fourths of their land at a profit than continue farming 100 percent at a loss. No businessman continues to add inventory when he cannot sell what he already has on hand.

Point Number 3: An expanded effort using all available resources to increase foreign sales of farm commodities at profitable prices to any country that wishes to trade.

Point Number 4: Full and speedy implementation of present USDA efforts to build reserves owned by farmers on the farm or stored in local, independent grain warehouses to provide a cushion for drouth and other natural disasters.

The program that I have just outlined can accomplish our goals. It should begin to increase farm prices to more profitable levels within a short period of time. It will allow the market to function by allowing supply and demand to determine price. It will not cause consumer food or fiber prices to increase dramatically. It will allow the Congress and the President time to implement any additional legislation required after listening to farmers to determine needs and solutions. And these proposals will have the added benefit of give the farmer more control of the price of his production than he has now.



# Farm Bureau Convention Jan. 8-12

HOUSTON- - The American Farm Bureau Federation will grapple with problems associated with the farm price depression at its annual convention in the Houston

Civic Center Jan. 8- 12. Texas will be well represented with 15 voting delegates and input in several convention activities. Some 15,000 persons, representing 2.8 million farm families in all states except Alaska and including 214,000 Texas families, are expected to attend.

Tentative resolutions prepared by a committee consisting of state presidents recommendations coming out of state annual meetings held recently indicate the organization will take an aggressive attitude in an effort to see that farm producers get adequate prices for their commodities in order to compete with other industries and still

make a fair protit. Emphais is expected to be

expanding export markets and keeping trade channels open. A strong stand can be expected on cutting costs of production and limiting government interference in farming operations. Attention will also likely be

given to the new farm bill with a view to keeping it from being administered in ways that would make farmers dependent on government payments on a continuing basis or establish government- controlled stockpile of agricultural commodities.

In addition to being hosted by the Lone Star State, the national meeting will be heavily Texas- oriented.

She will be demostating her prize winning pictures of roses at the January meeting. All members and guests are urged to attend. There will be a \$1.00 fee for non-members.

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
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
