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#### Bargaining in Bad Faith

"It doesn't go very far," writes a syndicated columnist who favors ratification of the nuclear test ban treaty with the Soviet Union. "It involves very few and very limited risks because it is a minute step toward controlling the arms race. It does not reduce or restrict the production of nuclear weapons. It does not inhibit or limit their use by either side. It does not halt underground testing, because the Soviet Union rejects necessary on-site inspections to police such a ban."

One wonders why anyone should be in favor of a treaty the arguments for which admit the reasons for its rejection?

"The risk in all of this," continues the writer, "does not stem from the test ban treaty, which has merit in itself,, but from the CERTAIN EFFORT OF THE SOVIET UNION (our emphasis). to tempt the United States and the West into false relaxation while getting ready for its next move in the cold

Isn't that exactly what opponents of ratification have been warning all along-that the Soviet Union is entering into this treaty in bad faith? Are the risks so very limited after all?

For the Soviets this test ban is merely another tactical move in a continuing warfare against the West. The truth is that it will relieve Khruschev from further expensive effort in a field of armament in which he is already superior, while it ties our own hands, what, really, do we gain?

Anyone who thinks that that the productive energies of the Soviet Union thus released, will be devoted to improving Russian domestic standards to the exclusion of emphasis upon other phases of the cold war is as naive as a person who believes a thug will reform if his intended victim disarms himself.

History in our time is replete with tragic instances of such trust, a sainted blindness arising from the idea that because we are peace minded those who would bury us require only our assurance that we are. And yet, we have been told time and time again, and it has been as persistently proven, that the communist concept of peace is universal communism, and that peace as we think of it is a weapon he uses to achieve that enslavement.

The tragedy is that our leaders know this. They cannot be so ignorant, so naive or blind as not to know it. By their failure to act with realism and political courage they are encouraging the public apathy and false sense of security of which they warn

#### COURTROOM DRAMA

We've all seen a great man, courtroom dramas in the movies, on the stage or on television. Too many, some may say, but there's no denying the drama in the courtroom.

A theater seat or a comfortable chair in front of the TV screen is the closest many of us ever get to a courtroom. It's from such vantage points that most of our ideas come today about court procedures and how a trial is carried on.

Stage and screen trials normally present only the highlights and take many shortcuts in the interest of brevity and audience appeal. Often an attorney is pictured making objection after objection to the questions and answers as witnesses testify. He makes these objections vehemently, pompously, or sarcastically-and often in a voice louder than necessary-according to the demands of his role, and depending upon wheather he's on the side of the villian or the hero The judge then raps for order, and booms out, "sustained", or "overruled," and those of us in the aucience usually are in the loss over why he made his

In a real courtroom it's true that attorneys protest against what's being done or said, as a means of assuring a fair trial, and the judge must allow or disallow each objection.

The principals in the real courtrooms are just practicing common sense when they folthe "rules of evidence" in placing facts before the judge and trial and a just verdict, there must be true facts.

Evidence in the courtroom may take several forms, but two are most common. Answers to questions from a witness under oath are the bestknown type of evidence.

Exhibits - written records, letters, "the murder weapon," and other physi al objects having to do with the case-are the next most common. "Depositions," or written statements, from a witness who for some reason is unable to appear personally in court are sometimes admitted as eviidence n certain cases.

Perhaps you've heard: "A trial is not a contest of learning, skill, or tact between lawyers, but a proceeding to find out the truth according to the evidence received and the law as explained by the judge."

That's about the size of it, and that's the way each of us wants it to be if ever we are placed on trial or taken to court for even so much as a speeding ticket.



### Many Others Now Eligible For Social Security Benefits

Anyone who is now 62 or older, and who has worked in employment covered by social security at any time, may be losing money regularly by not finding out what his rights are, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr. District Manager of Social Security in Abilene.

"With the amendments of 19-61, many people who were previously ineligble, became eligible under the reduced work requirement," he explains. "And since benefits can be paid retroactively for only twelve months, each month's delay may cost one monthly benefit check."

Even those who are still earn ing more than \$1200 should inquire promptly at age 62, be cause under the more flexible "retirement test" some benefits may be payable even where substantially

greater than \$1200. Full information may be obtained from the Social Security Administration office at 203 Fannin in Abilene. The residents of Rising Star may meet a representative of the Abilene office at the Rising Star City Hall on Monday at 10:30 a.m. September 16.

Under the new program, flies roduced and treated with radiation materials at Mission, Texas, laboratories, which make them sexually sterile, are dropped in vast numbers. Since the female fly mates only once mating with a sterile fly prevents egg production and the insect cannot reproduce.

During the week of August 11-17, 140,866,250 sterile flies were dropped in areas of the Southwest where instances of screwworm infestation were re-

#### Texas License Plates Produced At Lowest Cost

AUSTIN-License plates for Texas motor vehicles are pro-duced at the lowest comaprable cost of any state in the Union, the Texas Highway Department said today.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said a report compiled by the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators showed that Texas' delivered price on its 1962 plates was only 14.2 cents a pair -lower than any other state making two plates per car. The 1962 figures are the latest available.

The Highway Department supervises the production of license plates, which are manufactured by prison labor at Huntsville State Prison. Forty other states Eastland County livestock men also use prison labor to make license plates.




