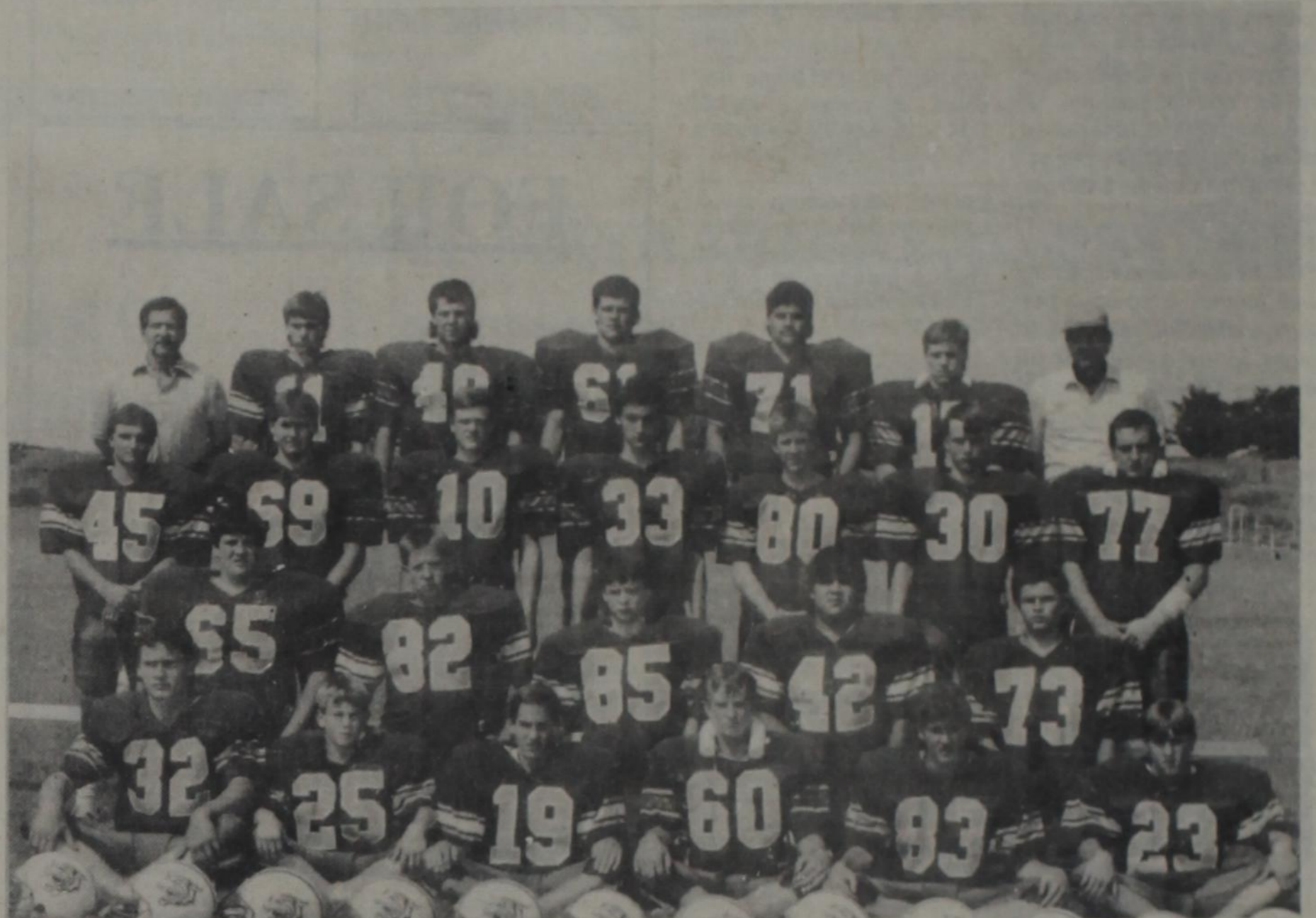

Cats Play Throckmorton Friday

Wildcats Beat Tolar, Win Playoff Berth



Congratulations to the Rising Star Wildcats who won a berth in the football playoff games with their 34-17 victory over Tolar Friday night. Gorman's win

Wildcat Chris DeLong summed it up well at last week's pep rally. The Wildcats must beat Tolar in order to go to the playoffs and could not depend on Gorman defeating Baird to do it for them. The Wildcats did just that as they traveled to Tolar and defeated the Rattlers 34-17, assuring themselves of a playoff berth.

The Rattlers fumbled the Wildcats' opening kickoff and Scotty Wilson landed on the loose ball in the end zone for 6 points. Donny Alcorn's PAT was good and the Wildcats led 7-0 with only 11 seconds played.

Tolar tried to rally but on 3&5 Alcorn made the tackle for a 4-yard loss, forcing the Rattlers to punt. On the Wildcats' first offensive play of the game Alcorn followed good blocking for a 25-yard gain. Two plays later with 8:22 on the clock Alcorn raced 47 yards for his first touchdown of the game. Alcorn's PAT was blocked and Tolar returned for the 2-point play. The Wildcats led 13-2.

On Tolar's next possession Matthew Harmon and Rene Rodriguez tackled the ball carrier for a one-yard loss. Tolar managed to connect on a 10-yard pass before Donnie Horton put a stop to the Tolar drive by batting down a Rattler pass. Alcorn's teammates did a good job of opening holes and he managed several double digit gains - 14, 24 and 18 - before the quarter ended.

Early in the second quarter Tolar was trying to rally but the swarming defense of Brandon Geye, Rodriguez, Larry Hollis and Wilson chased the quarterback around and safety Jimmy Evans made the sack which resulted in a 9-yard loss for the Rattlers. Tolar tried to pull out the old trick play but a fumble on the flea flicker resulted in an 11-yard loss and forced the Rattlers to punt. The Wildcats' special teams became Tolar's nightmare as D. Horton again made a big play. His tackle knocked the football loose and who came in to make the recovery?

That's right, folks - Scotty Wilson. Alcorn scored from 9 yards out to start the second quarter off for the Wildcats, with 10:126 left in the first half, Evans hit Jeffrey Medley for the 2-point conversion and the score was 21-2.

Even though the Cats' air attack from Evans to Geye connected on a 16-yard gain the Cats were forced to punt on their next possession. The coaches were determined to work on the passing game and Evans hit Jarod Horton for a 15-yard gain before connecting with Geye for a 10-yard touchdown. With 1:03 left Alcorn's PAT was good and the Cats took a 28-2 lead into the dressing room.

Tolar drew first blood in the third quarter on a long 49-yard touchdown run at 9:27. The PAT was good and the score moved to 28-9.

The Wildcats had bad luck when J. Horton's 65-yard touchdown was nullified by a clipping penalty with 9:02 on the clock. Again a big play on defense came when Too Tall Jones, excuse me, Donnie Horton, tipped another Rattler pass. Alcorn had a QB sack which resulted in a 13-yard loss for Tolar and the combined efforts of Harmon and Rodriguez's pass rush caused the next pass to fall incomplete. Geye tipped a Tolar pass and with good concentration picked it off but on his return the Rattlers managed to strip the ball loose and get a new set of downs. The third quarter ended Rising Star 28, Tolar 9.

Tolar's passing game was doomed to failure as Alcorn tipped another pass and three plays later Jason Bible also tipped a pass. Alcorn caused a fumble but Tolar managed to recover. On the next play Hollis and Wilson teamed up for a -10-yard sack, then Rodriguez chased the ball

carrier into the arms of Geye for no gain. The Cats' running machine, Alcorn, dashed 53 yards and then 17 to the end zone with 3:48 on the clock. Evans' pass to Geye for a 2-point conversion was incomplete and the Cats led 34-9.

Tolar decided to retaliate and scored on a long run. The Rising Star fans were sure Alcorn caught the Rattler at the 2-yard line but the officials did not see the ball carrier's knee hit the ground and signalled "touchdown" on the 60-yard gain. Tolar's extra point attempt was good for 2 and the score was 34-17.

The Wildcat defense continued to swarm and on the

last play of the game Medley tipped the Tolar pass and teammate J. Horton came up with an interception. The game ended 34-17 and the Wildcats were in the playoffs!

Senior running back Donny Alcorn rushed for 308 yards and three touchdowns; Alcorn also accounted for two PATs. His total yards are now over 1500 for the year. Not only is this a fine tribute to his outstanding ability to carry the ball, it also shows what an excellent job his fellow teammates have done in opening the holes. Congratulations, Donnie, on your first 300+ game!

For men with a non-cancerous enlarged prostate, a new procedure uses a surgical balloon to relieve urinary obstruction. Doctors reporting the method in the Lancet, the British medical journal, have not yet determined how long the improvement will last.

Heart patients who take beta blockers should not go off medication -- even for a while -- without a doctor's approval. Stopping the drug abruptly temporarily quadruples heart attack risk, the Journal of the American Medical Association reported.

All pregnant women should be screened for gestational diabetes between the 24th and 28th week, according to a report in Obstetrics and Gynecology. Currently, only older women with specific risk factors are tested.

Obesity is strongly tied to heredity, a study of identical twins found. Studies reported in the New England Journal of Medicine noted that twins ended up the same weight, whether they grew up together or apart, and that some people do get fat even when they eat less.

The Topic Is Toothpaste

Q. What is the history of toothpaste?
A. Throughout the years, people have used an unusual variety of abrasives as toothpastes. About 4000 years ago the Egyptians used a substance made of incense, green lead, and verdigris (the green crust that forms on metal when exposed to water or air) as a dentifrice. The Chinese experimented with ground fish bones to clean their teeth. During the Middle Ages, the Arabs were the first to recognize the danger highly abrasive materials could have on teeth, especially the sand and pumices contained in some products. In Europe, acids were used to remove stains, and similar agents continued to be used until the early part of this century. It wasn't until 1934 that the American Dental Association began rating toothpastes as "accepted" or "unaccepted."

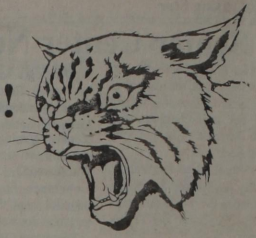
