





## FROM OUR CHURCHES

#### **Church of Christ**

According to the New Testament, the term "church" denotes the collective number of those who have responded to the Gospel call to follow Jesus. The original "oneness" of this body of believers has been lost in the vast proliferation of differing, non - fellowshipping groups. Even a casual reading of the New Testament will show that such was never encouraged or envisioned by Jesus and the apostles.

Why have those who profess faith in Jehovah God, in Jesus as the redeeming Son of God and the Scriptures as the revelation of God to man become so divided among themselves? Admittedly, the answer is complex. History has tended to hide the origin of many present - day distinctive bodies within Christendom. Traditions have become firmly entrenched and any re examination of origins and bases becomes an attack upon the persons and convictions of

cherished historical leaders. In the beginning of the Gospel era, the apostles of Jesus and certain other individuals endowed with supernatural guidance by God "spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit.." (2 Peter 1:21). Their messages were "oracles of God" (1 Peter 4:11),

"...revelations of Jesus Christ..." (Galatians 1:11 - 12); in substance, these were: "remembrances" of what Jesus had taught (John 14:26), plus additional materials given by the Holy Spirit (John 15:26; 16:13). This body of Revelation, at first spoken, was eventually committed to writing and became the New Testament, recognized as the final and authoritative norm of God, beyond which no one should go (1 Corinthians 4:6; Revelation 22:18 - 19; 2 Timothy 3:15 - 17; 2 John 9 - 11; etc.)

Very early in the history of Christianity, however, it became apparent that not everyone was willing to respect this limitation. The authority of the apostles was questioned and divergent views were urged. As these were propagated, the bonds of fellowship were broken and distinctive groups began to crystallize. (More later).


