Dedication of Living Memorial



The 1990 graduating class of Rising Star High School held a ceremony dedicating a living memorial to a deceased classmate. The stone with the bronze plaque will stand beside the tree planted on the front lawn of the school. Jackie L Bleu and Sherry LeBleu, center, relatives of the late Meredith Hamblen, took part in the ceremony.

One of the last acts members of the Class of 1990 performed as a group prior to graduation was to hold a formal dedication ceremony for a living memorial to a classmate who died two years ago. The ceremony was held at Friday, May 18, on the front lawn of Rising Star High School.

The memorial, a tree, was planted on the school campus two years ago by the students, just two months after their classmate, Meredith Hamblen, died in a vehicle accident near Rising Star. This year's graduating class had a bronze plaque fixed to a stone they placed near the tree, in memory of a classmate whose ebullience and joy in living left a lasting mark on the lives of many who attended school with her.

The honored guests at the ceremony, Jackie LeBleu Sherry LeBleu, Meredith's grandmother and aunt, were just two of the sizeable crowd that gathered to honor the memory of a girl who was

Murderers Being Considered For Paroles Release

When the men convicted of murdering Mrs. Johnnie Wilson of Rising Star and ten year old Tona Worthington of Abilene were sent to T.D.C., some Eastland Countians, and Abilenians, breathed a sigh of relief, thinking that they would no longer be a threat to society.

But that sense of security was recently shattered when it was learned that both were being considered for paroles.

Rising Star residents have signed petitions asking that Jimmy Ervin Christian, convicted of murdering Mrs. Johnnie Wilson, not be paroled. More than six hundred people, more than half the cities population, signed the petition.

Also considered a threat by countians is James Duke Creel, who was convicted of kidnapping elementary student Tona Worthington, raping her, savagely killing her, and stuffing her body in a colvert in northwest Abilene. Creel was tried in Eastland on a charge of venue, and the trial took three weeks.

If you oppose the release of either of these men, you may

counted on by her fellow students to cheer them, to help them learn to laugh at themselves and at life. Fellow student Roanen Barron and close friend Becky Walker spoke to the crowd of their memories of a special person and Meredith's grandmother responded to the tributes.

In addition to the living memorial, a scholarship in Meredith's name was begun two years ago. Donations and a dinner-theater put on by Future Homemakers of America each year help fund the scholarship.

The seniors of 1990 are saying goodbye to their school

days in Rising Star but they are not saying goodbye to the memory of the blithe spirit of a girl who embodied sunshine and happiness in their lives during years that often mean difficult adjustments as bodies undergo rapid changes and emotions are apt to be troublesome.

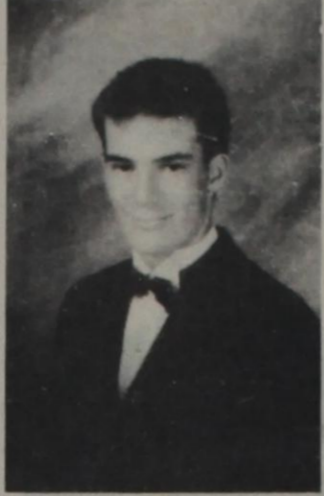
Becky Jill Walker, 18, has attended Rising Star schools for 13 years.

Becky's most enjoyable memories of her school years are from her years of cheerleading, she said.



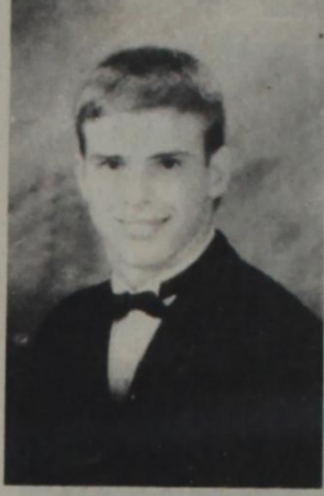
BRANDON CARROLL

The most important and influential happening in his school career included being elected to State 4-H Council and serving as State Secretary, and being selected to the All-State Football Team as a linebacker.



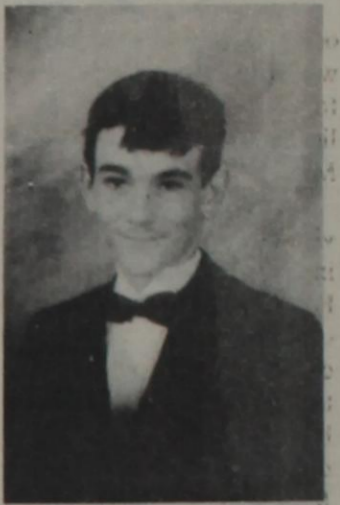

Girl Scout Resident Camp Is Not Just For Girl Scout

As summer approaches, both parents and children will be thinking about what to do with the long school vacation time. Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council, which covers 19 counties in Central Texas,

operates Camp Wood Lake, on Lake Brownwood, as a Resident Camp Program for girls ages 7 through 17 during the summer months. Sessions range from one to two weeks in length, with several different one-week sessions for girls who have completed the first through fifth grades, and a variety of two-week sessions for girls who have completed the third through eleventh grades. The fees range from \$115 for five-night sessions and \$210-\$215 for sessions which are 12 nights in length. Any girl, regardless of whether she is currently a Girl Scout, may attend Camp Wood Lake. Non-members pay an additional \$4.00 membership registration fee.

Program opportunities cover a wide variety of activities such as: campcraft skills, the arts, crafts, hiking, stargazing, nature exploration, swimming, sailing, canoeing and singing. One-week sessions offer girls a chance to try a little bit of almost everything at camp, while two-week sessions are more specialized. Regardless of the length of the session, activities are designed so that the girls have lots of fun, while learning skills they might not have the opportunity to develop outside of the camp setting.

Some of our specialty sessions include: "Reach For The Stars," in which girls explore the arts, "Dreamers," in which girls further their campcraft skills, "Make Your Own Magic," in which girls explore a variety of areas including basic canoeing, "Outdoor Adventurers," in which girls learn about Backpacking and advanced campcraft skills, and "Paddles and Sails," in which girls learn how to canoe, sail, and about water safety on a lake. Each of these specialty units is designed for a specific age

Younger girls (grades 1-3) live in cabins with 5 to 6 girls per cabin, while older girls (grades 4-11) live in tents with 2 to 4 girls per tent. The cabins and tents are grouped into units which hold 14 to 30 girls each. Each unit has a unit building, shower and toilet facilities with electricity. A Junior Olympic-sized pool is used for swimming lessons as well as free-swim activities for each girl who attends camp. Nearby hiking trails provide opportunity for nature exploration and hiking.

The Camp Staff are screened carefully to ensure the best people available are working with the girls. The Staff are selected based on skills, maturity and ability to relate to children. An overall ratio of one program staff member per six girls is maintained to ensure safety and adequate supervision for the campers. Our Co-Directors for 1990 are Pam Lindsay and

Kay Hutton. Mrs. Lindsay operates a day care facility for the Cooperative Alternative Program in Coleman County. Ms. Hutton is Program Services Director for Heart of Texas Girl Scouts, a position she has held for five years. Both grew up in Girl Scouting, are experienced campers and administrators, and share a love the outdoors and working with children.

Meals are served family-style in a centralized dining hall. The camp is inspected by the Brown County Health Department and the State of Texas to ensure that regulations regarding safe operations are maintained. Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council is committed to quality program for all of its camping operations, and resident camp is no exception. Summer camp is an experience your daughter will remember for a lifetime!

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Emergency Response – Because Your Life May Depend on It

RECOGNIZING MEDICAL EMERGENCIES

Serious bleeding, unconsciousness, choking and signs of a heart attack are all obvious reasons to call EMS. Broken bones and head, chest, abdominal, or neck/spine injuries present less obvious injuries, but should be treated by EMS for transport to the hospital. Trauma is the leading killer of people age 44 and younger and must be treated promptly.

CALLING EMS

Try to be calm or have a calmer person make the call – give whatever information the dispatcher asks for. That will probably include the address, a nearby cross street, your name, a call back number, the name of the victim, and what is wrong with the victim. **STAY ON THE LINE** until the dispatcher tells you to hang up – this is important! Then have someone wait out near the street or in the parking lot to direct the emergency medical technicians to the victim. And teach your children how to call EMS. They may need to make the call for you someday.

FURTHER TRAINING

EMS training and certification has four levels – First Responder Emergency Care Attendant (ECA), Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), EMT-Special Skills, and Paramedic. Contact your local EMS or your Texas Department of Health Public Health Region office for more information on EMS training. Phone numbers and addresses are listed on the back of this brochure.

EMERGENCY CARE

This is a guide to management of common emergencies in the home, workplace and streets of your community. Using the simple guidelines in this pamphlet may enable you to save the life of an ill or injured person. Your intervention, before EMS arrives, may mean the difference between life and death for a friend, relative or fellow citizen.

GENERAL EMERGENCY CARE RULES

1. Do not move the person unless they are in a burning car or other immediate danger.
2. Call EMS immediately. Send someone else to call for help if you can, so that you can stay with the person.
3. Do not give the person anything to eat or drink and do not allow them to smoke.
4. Keep the person calm and still.
5. Apply the following emergency care measures until the ambulance arrives.

HOW TO CHECK BREATHING AND HEART BEAT

If someone is not breathing or their heart is not beating, they may die or suffer permanent damage before EMS arrives. Always check for breathing and heartbeat (pulse) in a medical emergency, and be sure to give that information to EMS when you call.

1. If the person has collapsed, try to wake them up by shaking their shoulder and shouting at them.
 - If they do not respond, gently lay them flat on their back, on a firm surface.
 - Call for help or send someone for help.
 - Gently lift the person's chin with one hand while pushing down on the forehead to tilt the head back.
 2. Put your ear to the person's face and listen for breathing sounds; feel for warm breath on your cheek. Also, watch for rise and fall of chest.
 - If the person is breathing, their heart is beating.
 - If the person is not breathing, begin rescue breathing.
 - Pinch the nose, cover the entire mouth area with your mouth, and blow 2 deep breaths into the mouth. After checking pulse, continue giving two breaths every five to ten seconds.
 3. Check for pulse. Put two fingers on the person's neck in the groove just to the side of the Adam's apple; feel for a pulse for 10 seconds.
 - If you are sure there is no pulse, begin CPR if you are trained.
 - If there is a pulse, but still no breathing, continue rescue breathing.
- Remember: Your care may make the difference between life and death.

Bites or Stings

- Insects – remove stinger if possible. Apply cold compresses. If there is any reaction, such as breathing problems, call EMS immediately.
- Snakes – keep the person calm, have them sit quietly, avoid excessive movement, call EMS immediately. Try to identify or describe the snake without endangering yourself.

Bleeding

- Call EMS immediately for serious or spurting bleeding.
- Have the person lie down.
- Apply firm, direct pressure over the wound to stop bleeding. Use the cleanest available pad. Use cloth, handkerchief, clothing, or bare hand if necessary. If pad becomes blood soaked, leave it on and put another one on top of it.
- Maintain the pressure until EMS arrives. Elevate the injured limb.
- Raise the person's feet higher than the head.
- DO NOT use tourniquets.

Broken Bones

- Keep the injured limb from moving. DO NOT move the person unless they are in immediate danger.
- Apply ice packs to minimize swelling.
- If a broken bone protrudes through the skin, cover it with a dry dressing, but DO NOT try to push it back in. If there is excessive bleeding, use direct pressure over the area to try to stop the bleeding.
- If there is reason to suspect multiple broken bones, or when the neck, back, pelvis, or thigh might be broken, DO NOT attempt to move the person. Call EMS immediately.

Burns

- Remove the person from danger.
- Extinguish and remove burned clothing.
- Keep the burned person in a comfortable position.
- Raise burned arms or legs higher than the person's heart.
- Cover burned area with a cool, wet cloth, but do not over cool.
- DO NOT break blisters or remove burned skin or clothing.
- DO NOT use butter, ointments, or other home remedies.
- For small or minor burns, immerse in cool water.
- For serious burns, do not treat, but call EMS immediately.
- Keep the patient covered lightly to preserve normal body temperature.

Choking

If the person can speak or cough, then they are able to breathe, and the airway is not totally blocked.

- Encourage the person to cough out the object. DO NOT interfere with efforts to do so.

If the person cannot speak or breathe, but is still conscious, you must quickly dislodge the object that is blocking the airway by using the Heimlich maneuver if you are trained.

If the person cannot breathe or has already collapsed:

- Call EMS immediately.
- Place the person on their back, turn the head to one side, open the mouth and look for and remove any visible foreign material.
- Use the Heimlich maneuver to dislodge the object if you are trained.

If an infant chokes:

- Place the child face down over your arm; with the baby's head down, rest your arm over your thigh; with the heel of your hand give four quick, hard blows between the shoulders.
- If the object does not dislodge, turn child over, support with your arm resting on your thigh, and with the baby's head down use two fingers to press its breastbone four times.
- Repeat the procedure as often as necessary until EMS arrives.

Convulsions/Seizures

- Call EMS immediately.
- Protect the person from further injury-remove obstacles.
- Turn the person onto one side.
- If the person has fallen or shows evidence of head injury, they should be assumed to have a broken neck and should be treated accordingly (see Neck or Back Injuries).
- DO NOT force anything into the person's mouth.
- DO NOT try to restrain the convulsive movements.

Eyes

- For an object in the eye, try to wash it out by flushing the eye with lots of clear water.
- If the object cannot be easily washed out, call EMS.
- If either eye is injured, cover both eyes with a cloth, keep the person quiet, and call EMS immediately.
- DO NOT use drops or ointments.
- For exposure to chemicals, gently flush eyes with clear water. Continue flushing until EMS arrives.

Fainting/Dizziness

- If a person reports "feeling faint," have the person lie down on their back until feeling better. Raise the person's feet higher than the head.
- Check breathing and heartbeat.
- Apply cold compresses to the person's forehead.
- If fainting is associated with chest pains, convulsions, or severe headache, or if it lasts more than one or two minutes, call EMS immediately.

Fainting is a relatively common problem, but it may be caused by a serious condition.

Head Injuries

- Call EMS immediately.
- DO NOT move the person until EMS arrives.
- Severe, deep cuts should not be cleaned, cover with a clean cloth.

DO NOT apply heavy pressure to bleeding areas.

Heart Attack

The person may have pain or feel very heavy pressure in the chest area or in the jaw, shoulder and arms. The person may have a feeling of indigestion. They may sweat, vomit, or have trouble breathing.

- DO NOT wait to see if the pain/discomfort goes away.
- Call EMS immediately. Assure them that help is on the way, and do not leave them.
- Have the person sit or recline, whatever is most comfortable for them.
- Make the person as comfortable as possible.
- Loosen the clothing at neck, chest and waist. Keep the person warm, but not hot.
- If the person suddenly collapses and loses consciousness, try to awaken them. If the person cannot be awakened, and if there is no breathing and no pulse in the neck, begin CPR if you are trained.

Neck or Back Injuries

- Call EMS immediately.
- DO NOT move the person at all unless absolutely necessary to save their life.
- DO NOT prop up the person's head.

Poisoning/overdose

- Call EMS immediately.
- Then call the Poison Control Center and describe the product, the amount swallowed, and the time it was taken.
- Give water or milk to someone who has ingested a poison, unless the person is unconscious or having convulsions.
- Look inside the person's mouth for burns that might indicate the ingestion of an acid or alkali. Also, smell the person's breath to see if it smells like a petroleum product (gasoline or kerosene). If either sign is present, DO NOT induce vomiting.
- Loosen clothing at the person's neck and waist.
- Keep the person quiet and warm.
- Take the container of the suspected poison with you on the ambulance. Every household should have syrup of ipecac on hand. The poison center will tell you when to use it.

Unconsciousness

- Call EMS immediately.
- Check for breathing and a heartbeat.
- If the person cannot be roused, but is breathing well and has a good pulse, they should be placed on their side unless you suspect a neck injury.
- If there is no breathing and no pulse in the neck, begin CPR if you are trained.
- If drug overdose or poison is suspected, the container of the suspected toxin should be taken with the patient on the ambulance.
- DO NOT give the person anything to drink.

Pharmacy Topics

Chest pain is not the only indication of a heart attack in people at high risk. Doctors at the University of California/Los Angeles found that any unusual pain -- in the jaw, teeth, neck, wherever, may be a warning for high risk people.

New Recommended Dietary Allowances have been announced by the National Academy of Science's Food and Nutrition Board. They call for more iron for women, more calcium for men and women up to age 24, more vitamin C for smokers, and less sodium for everyone.

Experimental vaccine uses cowpox virus together with strains of melanoma cells to fight cancer recurrence in people who've had melanomas. Testing is coordinated at M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and six other centers are involved.

Lyme disease continues to spread across the country, and more people are using insect repellents to ward off the ticks that carry the disease. However, the products should be used strictly according to directions to avoid toxic reactions, especially among youngsters.

LANA ROBINETTE

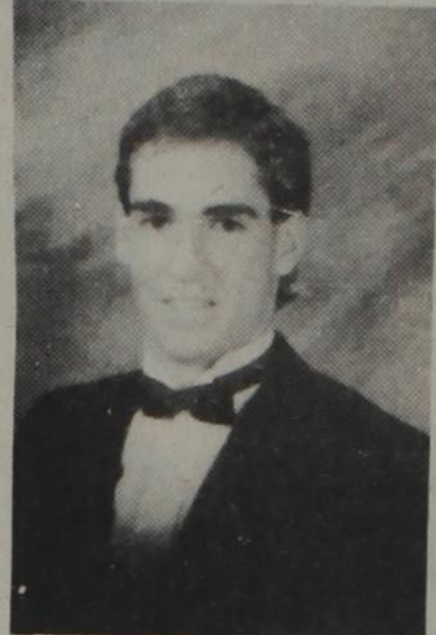
Lana Robinette, 19, attended Rising Star School seven years. She is the daughter of Buddy and Joyce Robinette and the gran-

LEE DE LONG

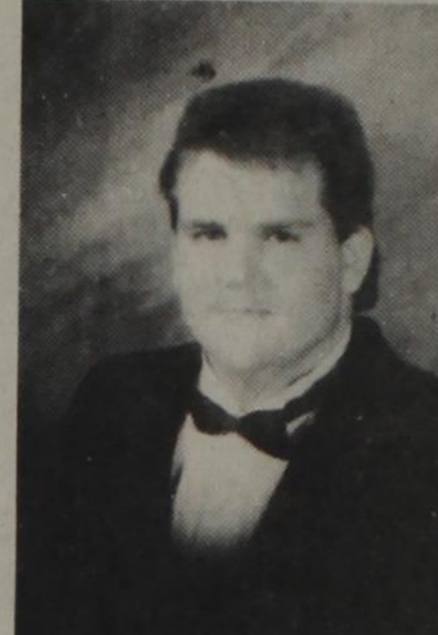

He plans to attend a four-year college and ultimately become a chiropractor.

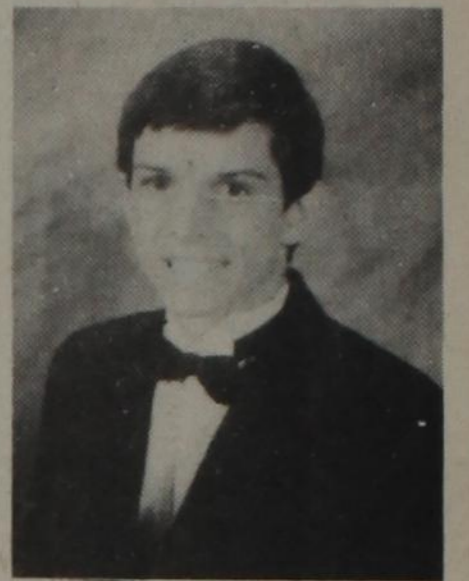

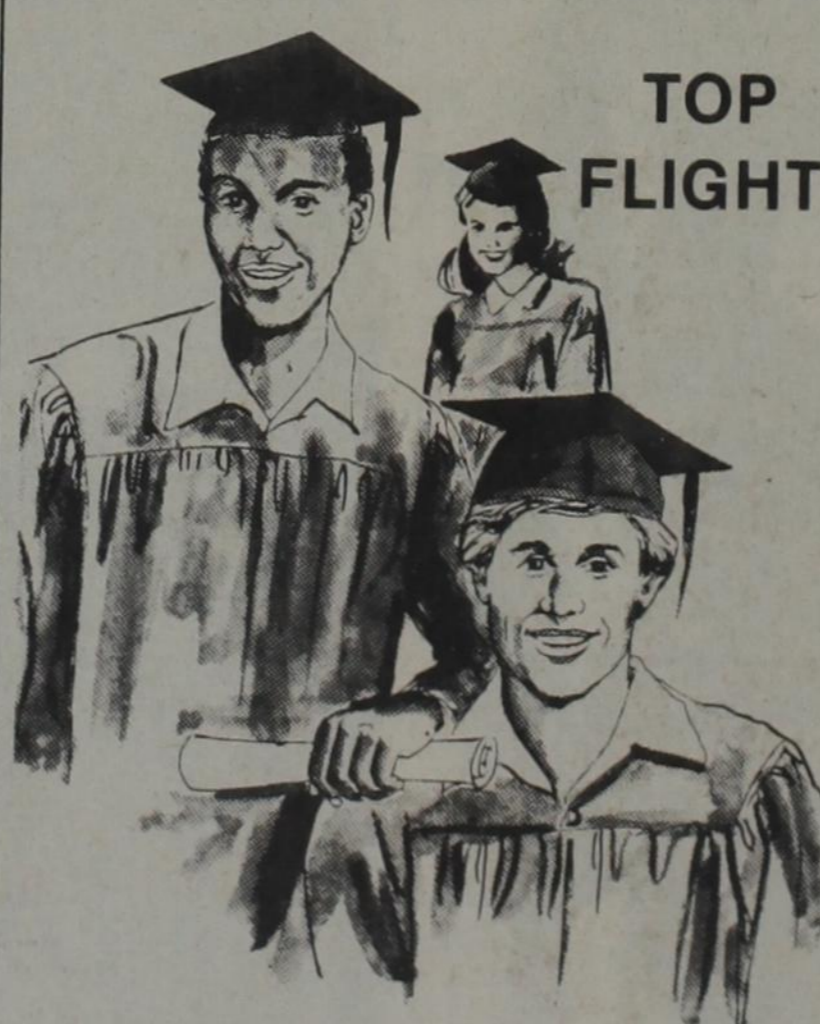

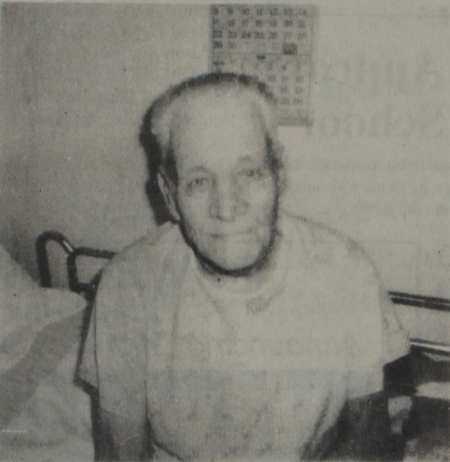
