## Through The Specs Editor's

Voters who participate in the State primary next Saturday will encounter a number of innovations in the conduct of the voting and the precinct conventions to be held on the afternoon of that date. The most radical change, of course, is the new date for the primary. Whereas, in the past, the first primary had been held late in July, this year the anguish and uncertainty is over two and a half months earlier.

Another important change has been made in the organization of voting boxes. Whereas, in previous elections voters of this area cast their ballots at half a dozen or so boxes, they will now vote in only one — at the Rising Star City Hall.

There are other significant changes in regulations governing participation in party precinct conventions which will be held on the afternoon of the voting day. Those citizens who wish to take part in party activities looking toward state and national party policies, platforms and candidates, should acquaint themselves with these new requirements in order that they may insure themselves against possible disqualifications which might prove both frustrating and embarrassing.

The Rising Star FFA Land judging team, which went to Oklahoma City last week to engage in the international FFA contest did not place in the first bracket, but neither was it among the lowest. The team, which won the area contest at Stephenville on April 2, and placed second in the state contest at the same city later, was 20th among a field of 48 teams from twenty of the United States and several foreign countries.

The land judging team was composed of Skipper Ezzell, Dick Morrow, Bobby Guynes and Richard Creech.

The Dairy judging team of Tommy Byrd, Mack Harris and Darwin Cain, scored in the lower half of a field of 80 teams at the State meet at Texas A&M College Saturday.

H. L. Geye, chapter advisor and agriculture teacher at Rising Star High School, had a busy week transporting and sponsoring the teams in the big contests. He first carried the land team to Oklahoma City, where they were in the contest Friday, and Friday night drove back to Rising Star, picked up the dairy team and drove to College Station for the Saturday meet.

The dairy team also won first place in the area meet at Stephenville, giving the chapter the distinction of being the only FFA group among 280 schools, to take two firsts there.

Voters of Rising Star, Long Branch, Romney, and Cook will cast their ballots in the first Democratic Primary at the City Hall in Rising Star next Saturday, May 7. Five voting boxes which were combined into what is known now as the Rising Star Precinct No. 8, were:

Rising Star 7 and Rising Star 8, Long Branch No. 14, Romney No. 20 and Cook No. 24.

## Lee Horn Asks For Support in Sheriff's Race

Lee Horn, candidate for Sheriff of Eastland County, asked the voters to consider his record as a citizen and peace officer in deciding whom they will support in the Democratic First Primary Election on Saturday, May 7.

Mr. Horn is a native of Eastland County and has spent practically all of his life in the county. He was an oil worker for many years until he joined the sheriff's department as a deputy in the early 1950s. After two years as a deputy, Mr. Horn was hired by the City of Cisco as chief of their police department.

Mr. Horn left the police chief's job early in the year to devote full time to running for the office of Sheriff. He is a veteran of World War I, is a Mason and a church worker. Mr. and Mrs. Horn have one son, Jack, who was transferred recently by Texas Electric Service Company to Graham after being in Eastland a number of years.

Personally acquainted with all law enforcement officers in this region, Mr. Horn said he would be able to assume the sheriff's job with full knowledge of the duties, responsibilities and acquaintances helpful in the discharge of those duties.

"I firmly believe that my experience as a police officer, including two years as a deputy sheriff, fully qualify me for this important position," Mr. Horn said. "Everyone has my pledge that I will operate the sheriff's office as all of the people's best interests."

Judge of the election will be Democratic Precinct Chairman Raymond Gray and the polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Under the law voters who appear to cast their ballots must present a poll tax receipt or sign a register certifying that they are qualified voters.

The new primary voting date — observed for the first time this year under the changes in the primary voting laws — is more than two and half months in advance of the old primary date which occurred in the latter part of July.

Another important change in the regulations governs eligibility to attend precinct conventions to be held on the same date.

According to County Clerk Johnson Smith citizens who qualify to attend the precinct conventions must have their poll tax receipts stamped by the election judge to show their party affiliation and certify that they have voted in the primary. The poll tax receipts carry a place to show party affiliation.

In towns of 10,000 population and above where citizens over 60 years of age must obtain and show exemption certificates — not required in Eastland county — the receipts also have a place to show such a filing.

However, Mr. Smith explained, each election judge will be furnished with certificates which, in lieu of poll tax and exemption certificates, may be issued by the judge to a voter showing that he has participated in the primary voting as a democrat. Under the new law, Mr. Johnson explained, a citizen who wishes to participate in the primary convention must either have his poll tax receipt stamped by the election judge in the proper place, or secure a certificate from the judge.

Furthermore, as the county clerk said he interprets the law, no party member who does not attend a primary convention is eligible to attend the county party convention. This is taken to mean that all delegates to a county convention must have been in attendance upon their precinct conventions, a regulation which imposes upon a precinct the necessity of supporting its precinct convention in order to insure its proper voice in county deliberations of the party.

The precinct convention in the Rising Star box will be held at 3 o'clock p. m. Saturday at the Rising Star Record office. Absentee voting, which ended Tuesday of this week, was well below the total for last year, the county clerk said. Tuesday, 105 absentee ballots had been counted with a few yet to be added. Mr. Smith estimated the total would not exceed 125, about half of the number cast two years ago.

However, Mr. Smith pointed out, this does not indicate any voter resistance in his opinion. Whereas the primary two years ago occurred in the midst of the vacation season, this year's voting takes place during the school term while most people are still at home and expecting to vote in the primary itself.

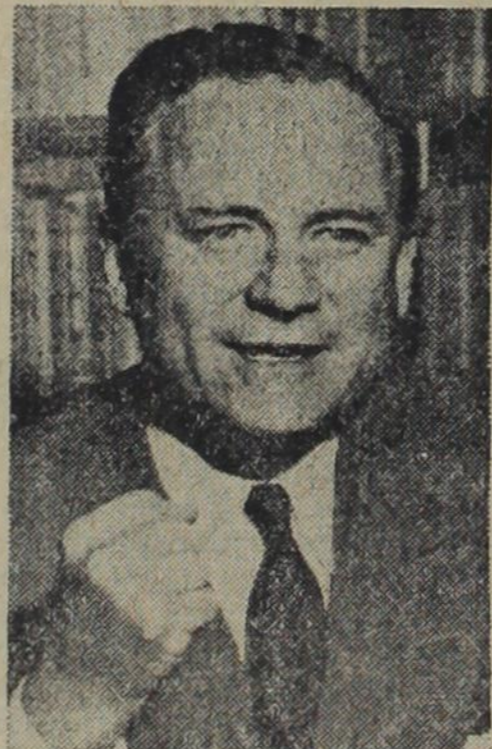

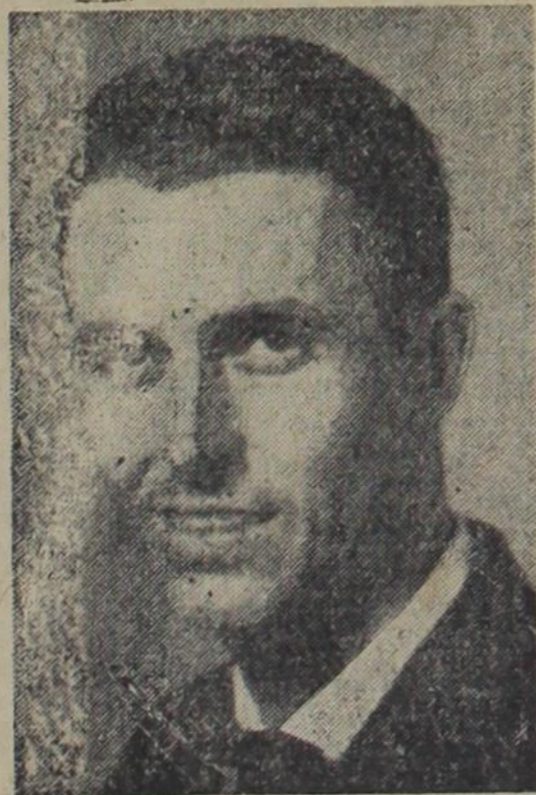

GO TO CHURCH!

Ben Ramsey Is Opposed to Sales And Income Taxes

Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey in a formal statement of his platform for re-election today called for a halt to any further taxes on homes and stated opposition to a general sales tax and a state income tax.

The veteran small town lawyer from San Augustine, whose public services have been recognized by his being elected to five 2-year terms in his present office — once by a record-setting Democratic Primary majority — outlined a six-point program.

Ramsey opened state campaign headquarters in Austin yesterday and announced that he had made "his own decision to run for re-election and would run his own campaign."

Ramsey said on issuing his platform statement, "I am grateful for the honor and responsibility of serving as lieutenant governor. During my tenure as lieutenant governor the public school and higher education systems in Texas have made their greatest progress. We have strengthened the insurance and securities laws for the protection of the policyholders and investors and made great strides in the state highway system, the welfare and pension systems and created greater protection for our homes and juveniles."

"I have a good, sound platform and my work as a public official is a matter of record. I am running on that record. I do not offer special favors to anybody. That is my philosophy and will always be my practice. I seek the support of every Texan, in every walk of life. Any Texan who wants to vote for me, without any terms, conditions or strings attached to it. I want his vote. I think my experience in state government will be of value to Texans these next two years, and upon that premise, I made my decision to run for re-election."

Ramsey's platform included statements on:

TAXES — The cost of essential state services should not bear too heavily on any one segment of our population.

Equitable taxation first requires savings and economies where possible. I am opposed to a general sales tax and a state income tax. As added protection for the taxpayers, a two-third majority in each legislative house should be required for passage of tax bills.

HOMEOWNERS — The small homeowner is in a tight squeeze. Taxes are making home ownership a burden. To encourage "home ownership," any further taxes on homes should be prohibited.

SCHOOLS — We must provide more support for our growing school system. This means improved educational standards and better pay for teachers.

WATER — The growth of our cities and industries requires that we settle upon a comprehensive program to fully develop and utilize our water and soil resources.

LOAN SHARKS — We must

finish the fight against those who charge excessive interest rates. Loan sharks must not be allowed to impose upon the people of Texas.

OTHER ESSENTIALS — Old age assistance, public health, safety and good roads are some of the numerous programs the State must continue to support. These responsibilities are all growing with our population. The means of providing necessary funds must keep pace. Any expanded services should come, as far as possible, from further elimination of duplications, unnecessary expenditures and waste. —(Pol. Adv.)

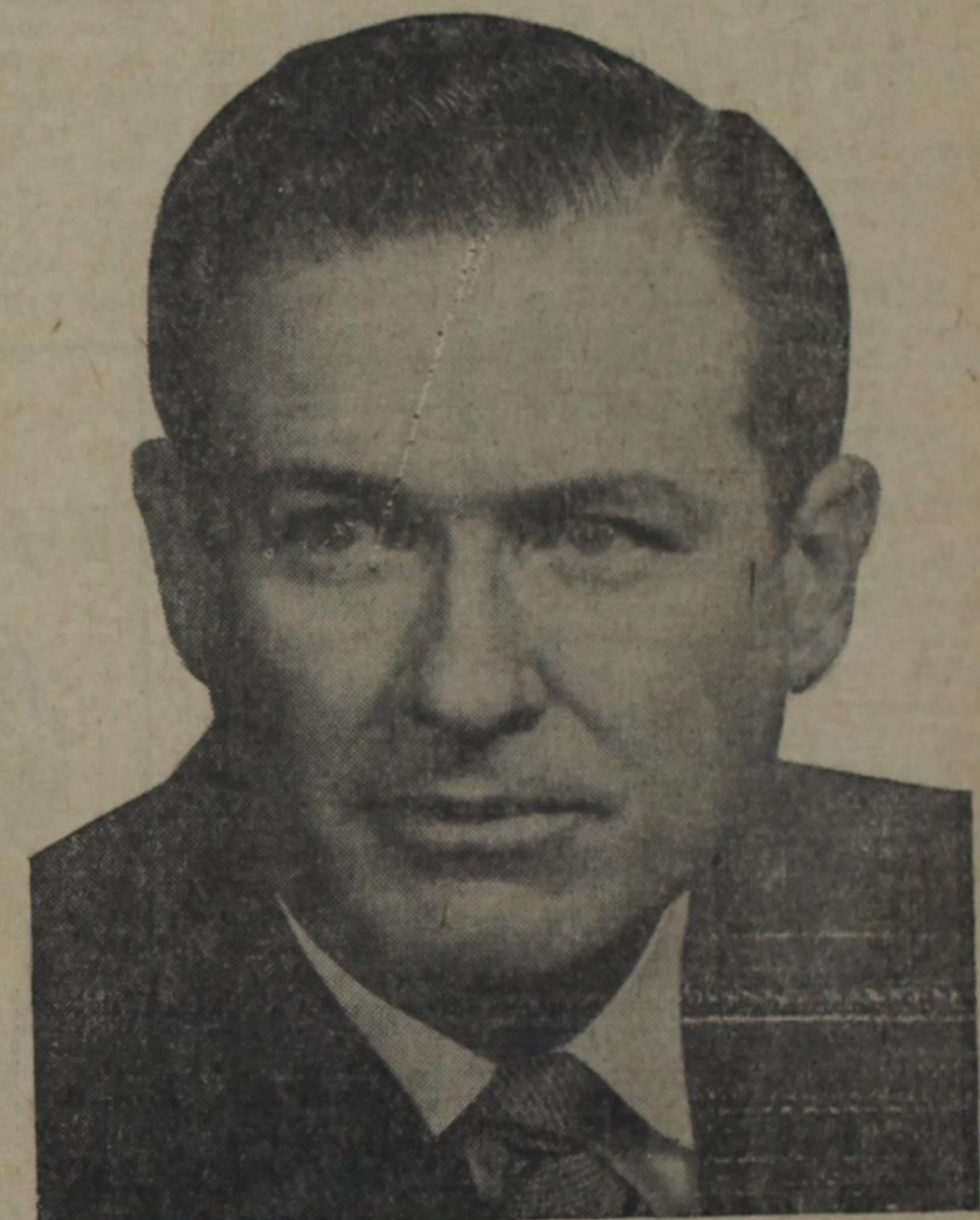

Abilene Firm  
Low Bidder on  
Housing Project

V. B. Likins and Associates of Abilene were low bidders on the Rising Star low rent housing project of 12 units to be constructed on the former McDonald estate tract on North Main Street.

The Abilene firm submitted a bid of \$90,852, approximately \$2,400 less than the next lowest bid, also submitted by an Abilene firm. There were nine bids in all, the highest being for \$109,555, which was also made by an Abilene firm.

Bids were opened at the City

Hall in Rising Star at 2 p.m. Wednesday of last week. A large number of bidders and interested people attended the public opening, which was followed by a called meeting of the directors of the Housing Authority of the City of Rising Star, Texas, which will construct and operate the units. Award of the bid to the low bidder was made subject to approval of attorneys and the Public Housing Administration.

Firms in Brownwood, Lampasas, Lubbock and Hamilton also submitted bids. There were five bidders from Abilene.

Construction of the units is expected to start within the next thirty days allowing for the formalities of the bid award, signing of construction contracts and issuance of proceed orders.

The project was designed by Fitch and Associates of Houston, Texas, and Lake Charles, La., architect-engineer for the local authority. Construction will be supervised by architect and by the Public Housing Administration out of the Fort Worth regional office.

Approximately eight months will be required for the completion of the units. Occupancy and rents will be governed by income of tenants admitted to the project when it is completed.

Construction will be of brick veneer on solid concrete slabs.

Coastal Bermuda  
Continues to Win  
New Friends

COLLEGE STATION. — Coastal Bermudagrass continues to

make new friends because of its adaptability and high yielding characteristics, says George McBee, extension pasture specialist.

Spring, says the specialist, is the optimum time for planting Coastal in most sections of Texas. Fall plantings are considered best in far South Texas. Plantings made now will give the plants time to become established before the beginning of the summer season.

McBee offers these sugges-

tions for the successful establishment of a Coastal Bermuda pasture. Plant fresh, good quality sprigs. Plant in a moist seedbed which has been well prepared and is clean, level and firm. Planting Coastal in established stands of other perennial grasses usually results in a poor stand, he advises.

He suggests planting in 36 or 42-inch rows with the sprigs at 36-inch intervals in the row. This spacing will require about 9 bushels of sprigs an acre.

Closer row spacing will require more sprigs but will mean a faster ground cover and less competition from weeds.

McBee recommends that fertilization be carried out in accordance with soil test findings. He says it's ideal to put the fertilizer in a band 3 inches to the side and below where the sprigs are placed.

After graduation from Cisco Junior College, Bailey attended the University of Texas and received a Bachelor of Science degree from North Texas State College. He resigned his position as a high school teacher in order to conduct a vigorous campaign for State Representative.

Bailey, a veteran of the Korean conflict, saw service as an enlisted man in the US Army. His service includes active duty with the 17th Infantry regiment and he holds several campaign ribbons for hard military service during his two years of active duty.

In making his formal statement, Bailey said:

"I do not intend to make a lot of promises or commitments that would be impractical or impossible to fulfill. If elected as your State Representative, I will attend to duties of this

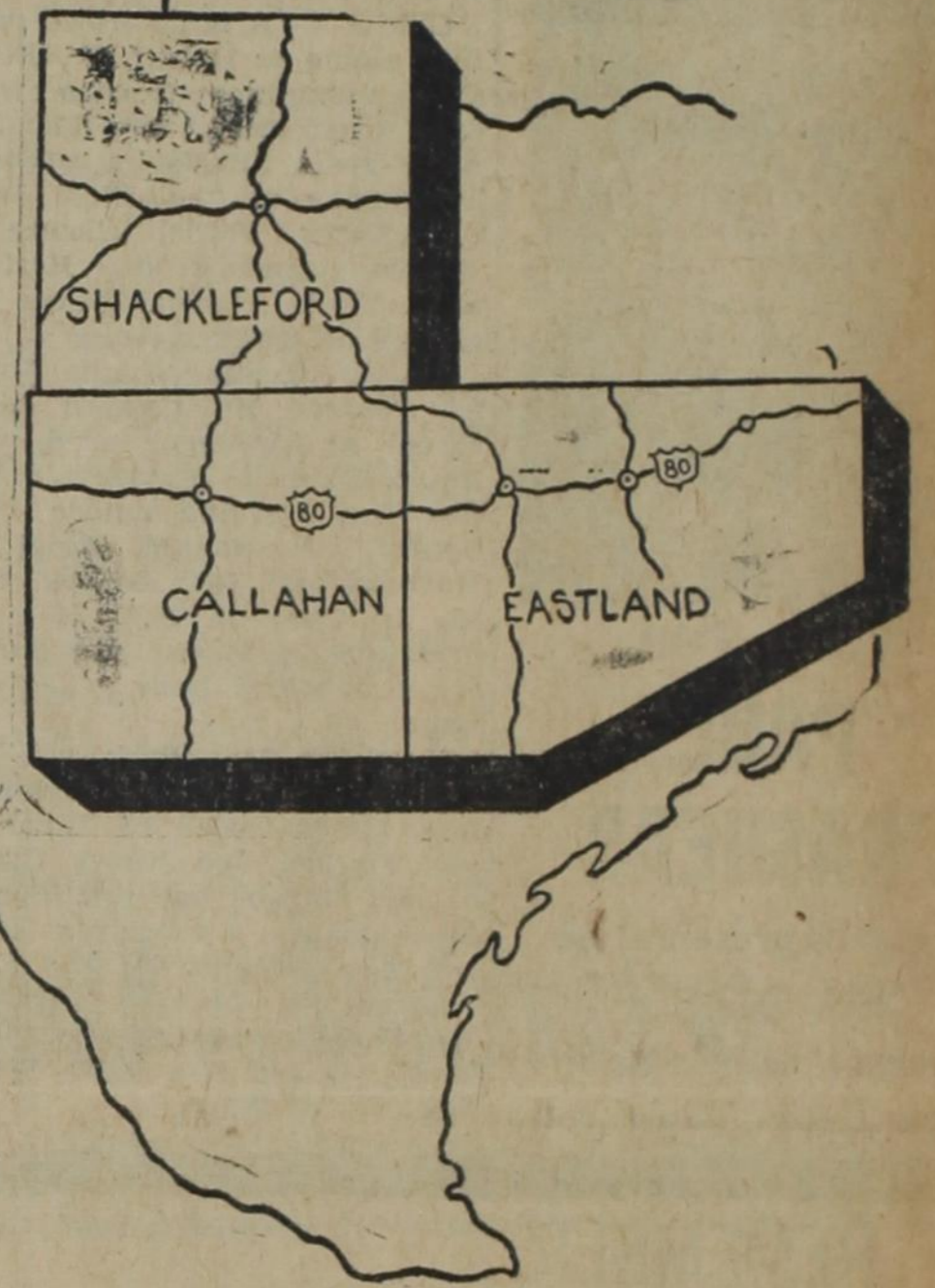

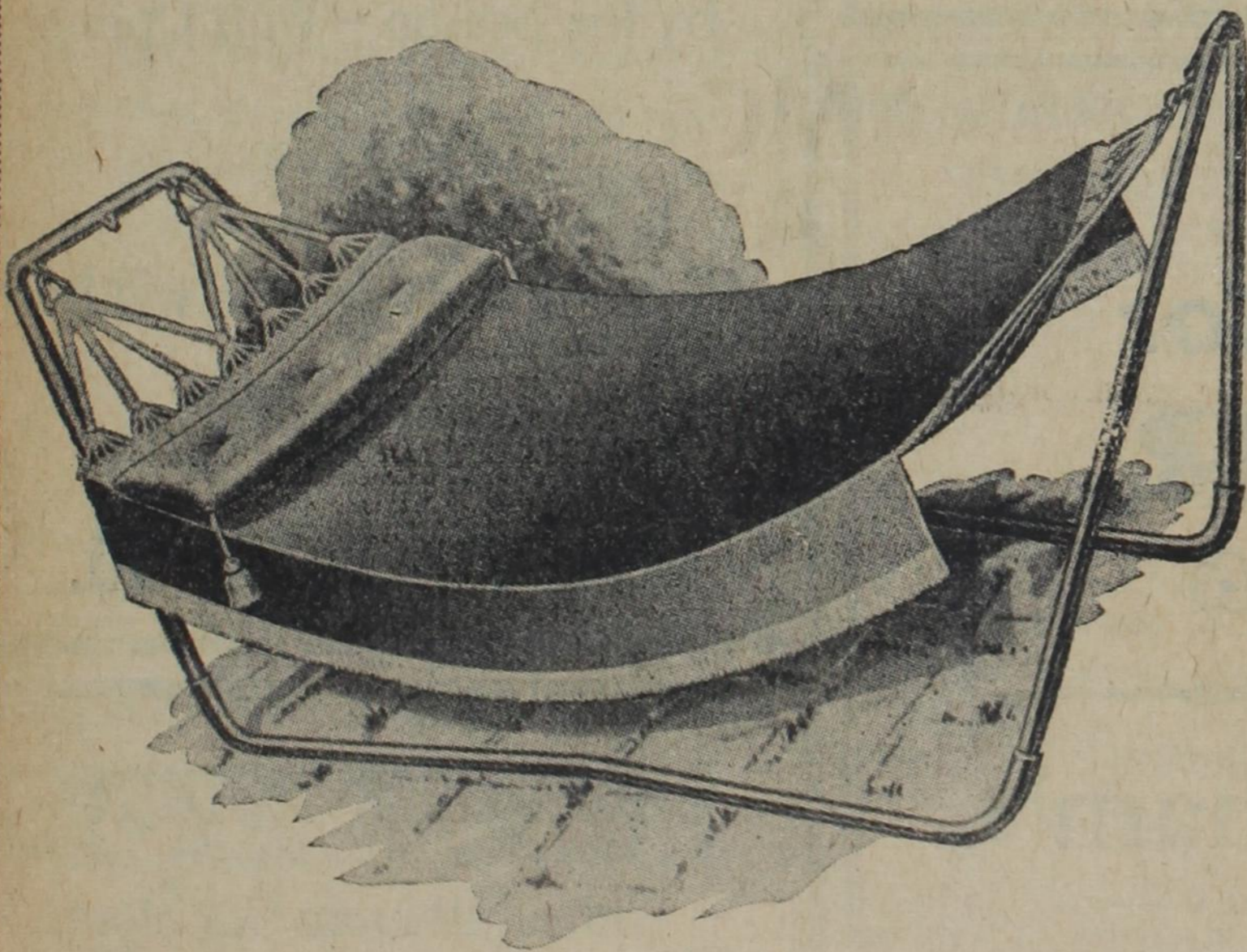

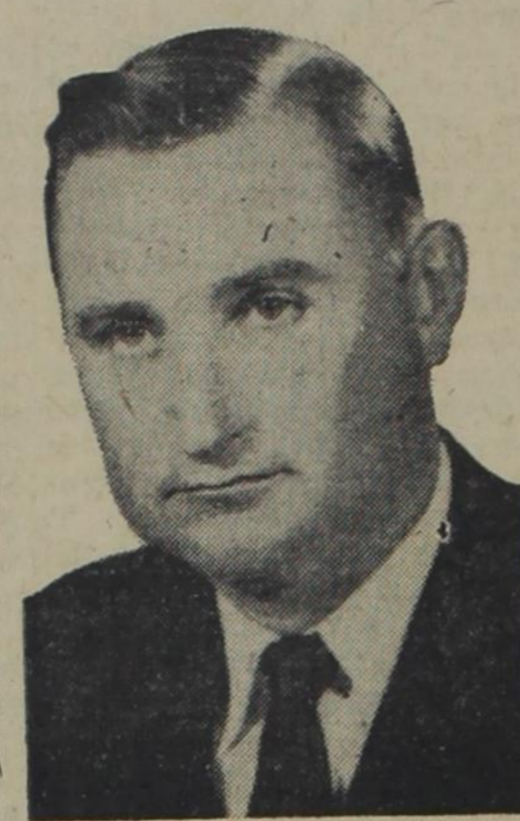
