# 'Great Texas Trash Off'

More than 247 people in Eastland County will join 15,000 Texans in cleaning up the state's highways on Saturday, April 25, in the largest one-day clean-up effort in the U.S.

Called "The Great Texas Trash Off," the program involves volunteers across the Lone Star State who will clean approximately 2,000 miles of roadways as part of the highway department's agressive war against litter.

"By Saturday night, Texas should be as clean as it's been in the last 50 years," said Jean Sparks, public affairs officer of the Brownwood district.

The clean-up effort combines two of the most successful antilitter programs in the nation, Adopt-a-Highway and DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS. Both innovative programs were developed by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. 'Our goal is not just to

In 1985, Texas taxpayers spent \$24 million removing trash from the state's highways, and the cost had been increasing 17-20% every year since 1970.

In 1986, the highways department introduced the tough-talking DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS program. Unlike other antilitter messages, DON'T MESS WITH TEXAS is the first program in the country to talk directly to "habitual litteres." In its first year, this program is credited with a 29% reduction in litter.

"We're pleased with the reduction so far, but it is going to take the program several years to significantly and permanently change litterers' behavior.'

WHAT ABOUT RELIGIOUS

There are many ways in which the Bible can be made of none effect by the actions of those who are spoken to. Let us briefly look at only twee of these ways, for it is ever so important to our lives and our eternal destiny that the bible does have its proper effect upon us.

1. Religious division makes the Hible of none eflect, yet it prevails as the commonly accepted practice of our day, "Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; That they all may be one; as thou Father, art in me, and I in thee, that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that thou hast sent me" (John 17:20,21).

2. Man-made tradition, man-written creed books, and man-made doctrines set asily obygenive and effectiveness of the word of God.

Thus hypocrites, well did Esais prophecy of you, saying. This people draweth nigh unto me with their mouth, and housureth me with their lips; but their heart is far from me. But in vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matthew 15:6-9).

Though there are other ways in which God's word is made of none effect, these two go hand in hand in condemning the evil of division and man-made tradition, which is known as denominationalism. There is no need of any man being a part of a denomination, for denominationalism is unscriptural. The church belonging to Christ is no denomination, has no earthly headquarters or heirarchy and has no man-made creeds or church manuals. The Lord's church strives to speak where the Bible speaks and to be silent where the Bible is silent, with the Bible as its only rule of faith and practice. Is that not what many of you have always desired---just to follow the Bible, nothing

more or Jess? Wherefore come out from among men, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing: and I will receive you. And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty"(II Corinthians





#### 1986 Wool, Mohair Payments

WASHINGTON, April 3--Sheep producers will receive about \$109 million in federal incentive payments on wool and lambs sold during 1986, according to Milton Hertz, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Mohair payments total \$38 million

for the same period. The 1986 support price for shorn wool is \$1.78 per pound, determined in accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended. The 1986 national average market price for shorn wool, 66.8 cents per pound, was 111.2 cents less than the support price.

A 1986 payment rate of 166.5 percent for wool results from dividing the support price by the national average price. The payment rate is the amount required to bring he average price received by producers up to the support price. The 1985 payment rate was 160.7 percent.

For mohair, the 1986 average price was \$2.51 and the support price \$4.93, making the payment rate 96.4 percent. The 1985 rate was 28.4 percent.

Hertz said that USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation will not make payments on those parts of a producer's sales proceeds that exceed \$2.67 per pound for wool or \$10.04 per pound for

Producers will receive \$4.45 per hundredweight in federal payments for unshorn lambs that were sold or slaughtered during 1986. The payment is base on the shorn wool payment rate, the average weight of wool

per hundredweight of lamb, and the price of lambs' wool relative to the national average price for shorn wool.





Today, most working people and two-thirds of their dependents have a Social Security number. It is used primarily in recording lifetime earnings for entitle-

ment to future Social Security benefits. Also it may be requested for a bank account or savings bond, a driver's license, an application for government benefits, a college entrance examination, or other purposes.

A provision in the tax reform Act of 1986 requires you to have a Social Security number for each dependent age 5 and over whom you list on Federal tax returns due after December 31, 1987. Just make sure you have it when you file your tax return early in 1988.

Evidence of the dependent's date of birth, U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status, and identity is required. A public, hospital, or religious birth record is usually sufficient for the first two proofs. School, medical, day care, and certain other records can be us-

ed for identity. Most school districts in the Big Country area have agreed to assist the Social Security Administration in an effort to assign Social Security numbers to students who do not already have one. Applications will be distributed through the schools to be taken home, completed and returned to the school along with the birth certificate. The documents will be left at the school for the student after a proper certification has been made. The school records will be used for identity, so separate documents will not be required for anyone born in the United States.




