Theresa Scott Wins Reserve Champion

Winning is not a new experience for Theresa Scott, 16 year old member of the Eastland County 4-H Club, but she says that every show is just as challenging and every championship is equally exciting.

Theresa, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Payton Scott, is a junior in Rising Star High School. At the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth in January, Theresa won Reserve Champion in the steer competition with

"Fuzzy" a Chianina-Angus cross. The steer brought \$3,300 in the show auction, this price was second only to the top bid of \$7,600 paid for the Grand Champion steer which was shown by Sherry Koenig of Cross Plains.

Interestingly enough, the champion steer was bred by Payton Scott and was purchased by Dick Koenig in a special club calf sale at the Scott Ranch, north of Rising Star.

In 1974 Theresa showed another cross breed, this time a Maine-Anjou, at the Houston Livestock Show, which was

selected grand champion of the show. This steer brought \$40,000 at the Houston auction. However Theresa is not the only member of the Scott family with show-ring prowess, her two younger brothers Neal and Sam have taken their share of honors, most recently in the Carcass competition with a Santa Gertrudis and Sam an 8th with a Maine-Anjou, and a 9th place with a British cross.

Theresa is showing this week in the Southwestern International Show in San Angelo.

Senator Creighton Seeks Re-election

MINERAL WELLS - State Senator Tom Creighton today formally announced for re-election in the 17 - county 22nd Senatorial District declaring opposition to increased taxes in the 65th Legislature to convene in January, 1977.

"The impact of inflation on the taxpayers dictates that our state government hold spending within available tax revenues," Creighton said. "This can be accomplished barring a fiscal catastrophe", the senator stressed, noting that official forecasts are that the state will start the next session with a \$428.2 million surplus.

"At next year's legislative session, there will be a real premium upon experience and calm, unhurried judgment," said Creighton who was first elected to the Senate in 1960 and is now fourth ranking member of the 31 - member body. "A careful and deliberate appraisal of all state programs will be essential", he said. "That I will do."

The 22nd District Senator is chairman of the Senate Economic Development Committee and is vice chairman of the Senate Finance Committee with chief responsibility to prepare the Senate's proposed state budget. He also is a member of the Senate Natural Resources Committee and the Legislative Budget Board which, between sessions, reviews budget requests from all state agencies.

"The high mark of the last legislative year", Creighton said, "was the people's defeat of State Constitutional revision" which he opposed as too much of an overhaul at one time of the people's basic charter. Creighton also fought for a more equitable public school financing system, successfully supporting a lower rate of ad valorem taxes to be paid by area taxpayers than proposed in the original bill. "Trimming down the rate



saved area taxpayers millions of dollars, although the local share was left too high", he said.

Creighton also is a strong supporter for agriculture and rural Texas.

During his first twelve years in the Senate, Creighton has been chairman of the important Water and Conservation Committee, Privileges and Elections Committee and, for the past four sessions, he has served on the Appropriations subcommittee and the Senate - House Conference Committee on Appropriations.

Creighton and his wife, the former Sue Sparks, reside in Mineral Wells where he is a practicing attorney. Their three sons, Will, Kenny and Mark, are all in college at this time.

The 22nd Senatorial District is composed of Bosque, Comanche, Cooke, Denton, Eastland, Erath, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell, Stephens, Wise and Young Counties.

In making this announcement, the veteran Senator said, "I believe that my re-election will prove to be of the utmost benefit to our District because of my past experience, seniority and knowledge of the needs of our district."

Validation Stickers Available

It's "something old, something new" for most Texas License plates now.

The something old is the five - year license plate issued in 1975 already mounted on the vehicle. The plates were designed to last for at least five years, being made with more durable materials than the one - year plates issued in earlier years.

The something new is a red, white and blue validation sticker to be affixed in the embossed rectangle at the upper left - hand corner of the license plate issued a year ago. Affixing the sticker will make the plate good for another year's driving.

The new system not only saves the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation \$8.5 million over the five - year period, but it relieves the burden of learning a new license number for most of the state's vehicle owners, not to mention the chore of removing and replacing the entire license tag.

Holders of personalized plates and other special license plates will receive a new plate, but the majority of Texas vehicle owners will receive

stickers and keep the same registration numbers.

Opening February 1, the vehicle registration season continues through March. The new stickers must be affixed by midnight April 1 or drivers will be subject to arrest and penalties.

Vehicles must be registered with the county tax assessor - collector of the county of the owner's residence. Most counties operate substations where registration fees may be paid.

Vehicle owners received computerized three - part registration forms for their vehicles by mail during January. All that is needed for registration is to bring the three - part form and the registration fee to the county tax assessor - collector's office or to one of the many substations that will be in operation during the registration season.

Vehicles can be registered by mail through the month of February by sending the registration form, the fee, plus \$1 (per vehicle) for handling to the county tax office. Owners should allow at least 30 days for delivery.

Church of Christ

What is a church? To most, a church is some kind of religious organization, often highly structured, and which generally holds meetings in a distinctively arranged and designed building.

The word "church" has almost universally come to be restricted to the Christian community. The Jewish equivalent is "synagogue"; the Moslem term is "mosque" - at least as far as the place of assembly is concerned, and so on for other religious groups. The word is Greek in origin (ecclesia) and simply denoted an "assembly" for a specific purpose. In New Testament times, it described: a mob (Acts 19:41); a governmental body in session (Acts 19:39); the collective group of the Israelites in the wilderness (Acts 7:38); but in the overwhelming majority of the instances where the term is used in the New Testament, it designates the body of disciples who were committed to the conviction that Jesus was the Son of God and the Savior of the world. It is thus employed more than one hundred times. This frequent use of the term is obviously intended to stress the importance of the idea portrayed.

Properly understood, then, the church is not simply an organization, nor is it tied to any particular architectural theme; it is rather the collective number of those who have been called out of the world, by the Gospel (2 Thessalonians 2:14), to serve God, in and through Jesus Christ. It is thus apparent that, according to the New Testament, anyone who is a Christian is a part of the church, having answered the call of Jesus to "come follow" him. It is impossible, Scripturally speaking, to separate the two. (More later)

I.C.A. Calls For Cut In Beef Imports

AUSTIN--The head of the state's largest livestock organization says foreign beef imports will continue breaking the back of the Texas cattle industry as long as President Ford refuses to use remedies available to him.

T.A. Cunningham of Goliad, president of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas, called on the President and Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz "to cut imports or explain why they let the beef industry go broke."

The 1000,000-member Cattlemen's Ass'n, largest group of its kind in both Texas and the nation, was organized in 1974 when it became evident that American agriculture was becoming a pawn in U.S. foreign policy.

Cunningham pointed out that a 1964 meat import law gives the President authority to reduce imports at any time without waiting for the law's import quotas to go into effect automatically when imports reach a maximum allowable of 1.1 billion pounds a year.

Cunningham said that imports continued to increase last year while the President and Butz

"sat back and waited on voluntary restraints which did not work and State Department agreements which did not materialize."

"I say it's time to take the State Department out of family farming and ranching," the I.C.A. president said.

Cunningham noted that Japan and the European Community--the world's two other great beef importing markets--"have had the good sense to save their domestic beef producers by cutting imports."
