

## When It Rained, It Poured

... Over Fields Yards, Streets and Highways

Almost seven inches of rain in the month of May, followed by more than seven inches in June, saturated the ground to the point that the last heavy rainfall on June 27 became runoff, which flooded fields, lots and yards in and near Rising Star. These rains brought the year's total rainfall to 20.43 inches according to records kept by John W. Lee.

The reports in Rising Star of from just over two inches to three inches of rain on Sunday lose magnitude when compared with the six to seven inches of rain that fell that same morning on an area from midway between Rising Star and May to a few miles south of May.

In Rising Star rainwater collected in a vacant lot south of the Louis Mayfield home on S. Main and became the scene of children, watched over by adult relatives, floating on innertubes.

Part of Mayfield Street was under water and some yards of homes to the south of that street were also covered. The C.E. Smiths of 419 S. Main

St. were forced to wade in water to reach their car, housed in a garage flooded by the downpour.

The same body of water covered the yard behind Mayor H.L. Killion's home and extended north from there to threaten the Rising Star Nursing Center, about a block north of Mayfield Street on S. Miller Street.

Mayor Killion alerted the Volunteer Fire Department to the threat to the nursing center and volunteer firemen, including Truett Horton, Willie Vandivere, Lewis Wilkerson and Larry Wiloth manned the pumper from about noon Sunday until midnight to alleviate the danger to the nursing center. Two 2½-inch lines were laid, one to the south and one to the north, on Main Street to pump off water and head it in the direction of storm drains. Also helping the firemen were Mayor Killion and Mark Cooksey; Sue Vandivere and Terry Wilkerson delivered sandwiches and tea to the men who spent so many hours at

the pumper.

Other yards were also flooded on S. Main Street, as were peanut fields and orchards near town. Farmers to the north and east of Rising Star reported receiving 2 to 2½ inches from the Sunday rains.

To the south of Rising Star farmers fared even worse as the thunderstorm dumped up to 7½ inches of rain, some hail and spawned damaging tornado-like winds.

Hardest hit by the hail appeared to be the Mike Hardwicks who

live a few miles NE of May and about 1½ miles east of Highway 183. A sudan crop, ready for harvest, was reduced to stalks, as was their corn. Their garden was in similar ruin and their peanut fields were severely damaged. High winds turned a cotton trailer upside down and tore limbs from trees.

Near the Williams road and Highway 183 an old barn on the Chitwood property was

completely demolished. The Jerry Lindleys live east of that barn and they reported high damaging winds and about 6 inches of rain, but not much hail.

The Warren Devers' near Williams received some hail damage to their garden and house, had fences near the house washed down and water got into their car. They have two rain gauges which both showed 6.2 inches of rain Sunday morning.

Eva Ashworth, who lives near the Williams road, reported more than 5 inches of rain, damaged trees and said that the water came closer to her house than she's seen in the sixteen years at that location.

George Plummer didn't have a gauge that held more than 5 inches, but measured rainwater caught in a bucket at 7½ inches. He lives a mile west of May.

A few miles south of May the rain gauge on the Junior Michael place ran over at 6½ inches and Mrs.

Michael stated that the lake behind the soil conservation dam on their property was still draining Tuesday and would probably continue to drain a few more days. The dam has been there ten years and this is the first time the lake has

been full enough to flow out of the spillway pipe. Residents all over the area look skyward and hope further rains hold off for at least a few weeks.

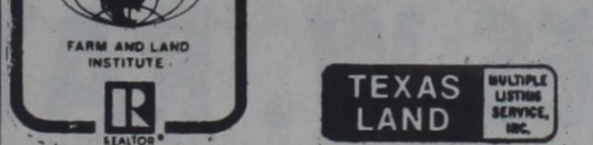

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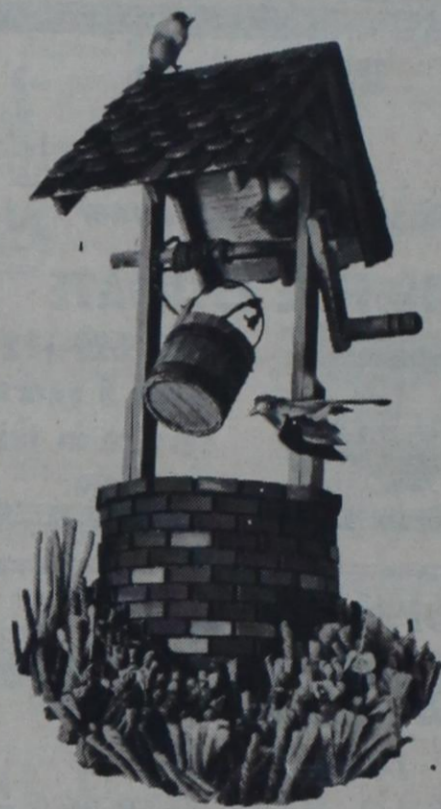

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# Commentary

Colossians 1:17, And he is before all things, and by him all things consist. Verses 18 and 19, And he is the head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that is all things he might have the preeminence. For it pleased the Father that in him should all fulness dwell. Jesus is called the Word of God; that is, He is God's message to man. He is the revelation of God to man. He is the express image of God made visible and audible to man.

When Phillip, one of the Twelve Apostles, asked for one final confirming sign, he said, "Lord, show us the Father, and it sufficeth us." Jesus' answer was an eternal revelation, not only for Phillip, but for you and I also. "He that has seen me has seen the Father." Jesus is like God and God is like Jesus. Jesus came in His humanity to show us what God is like, that God is good. The Nature of Jesus Christ is the best expression of God to man. Thorough what Jesus did for people during His earthly ministry, He shows us what God wants to do for us today. Verses 20-29; And, having made peace through the blood of His cross, by Him to reconcile all things unto himself: by Him, I say, whether they be things in earth, or things in heaven. And you, that were sometime alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked works, yet now hath He reconciled.

In the body of his flesh through death, to present you holy and unblameable and unproveable in his sight: If ye continue in the faith grounded and settled, and be not moved away from the hope of the gospel, which ye have heard, and which was preached to every creature which is under heaven; whereof I Paul am made a minister: Who now rejoice in my sufferings for you, and fill up that which is behind of the afflictions of Christ in my flesh for his body's sake, WHICH IS THE CHURCH: Whereof I am made a minister, according to the dispensation of God which is given to me for you, to fulfil the word of God: Even the mystery which hath been hid from ages and from generations, but now is made manifest to his saints: To whom God would make known what is the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles: which is Christ in you the hope of glory: Whom we preach, warning every man, and teaching every man in all wisdom: that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus: Whereunto I also labour, striving according to his working, which worketh in me mightily.

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# Lemonade, Anyone?

When life hands you a lemon, make lemonade.

That is the basic lesson in learning to cope with stress, say specialists at Baylor College of Medicine.

The first step is to take personal charge of your response to routine aggravations such as deadlines and traffic jams, said Seth Silverman, M.D., assistant professor of psychiatry at Baylor. As people learn to control their own reactions during stressful events, they gain a feeling of mastery that they can draw on during the next crisis.

Staying in control may be easier if people understand what causes some of the tendency to act irrational under pressure, said Silverman.

Stimulated by stressful cues in everyday life, an alarm system is turned on in the body. This automatic reaction to stress, switched on by hormones, is known as the "fight or flight" syndrome and it work-

ed well for our early human ancestors, preparing them to run fast or fight hard in life-threatening situations. But these changes in the brain, nervous system, heart and muscles also impede certain mental abilities.

People under stress often become forgetful, irritable and find it hard to make simple decisions, said William Blocker, M.D., assistant professor of physical medicine. Ironically, the body's adaptation to stress, intended by nature to help people out of tough spots, can actually hinder them in dealing with modern problems that require a cool head rather than a hasty departure.

Continued stress is also dangerous to health, said Blocker, since it can stimulate the body to act as if constantly under seige. One result can be an increase in blood pressure, a risk factor in heart disease.

However, there are ways to control stress.

Silverman said stress management begins with good self-monitoring: being aware of feeling angry, tired, sad or anxious. Accepting feelings frees one to deal with them.

While there are countless ways to handle problems, methods have common elements of information gathering, evaluation and planning.

As one engages in this process, stressful situations in the past may be remembered. Past experiences can cushion people in a crisis, helping them to view the problem as solvable. But if an old memory is hurting instead of helping self-confidence, the person can learn to separate the past and present event.

Exercise and relaxation techniques can also help people handle emotions while performing life's necessary tasks.

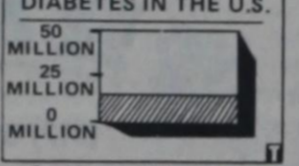

## County Oil and Gas Report

Supreme Oil Co. of Abilene has added a new natural gas producer in the Eastland Co. Reg. Field. It is the No. 2 Lula Canet, located in a 155-acre lease in Eastland County's McLennan Co. School Land Survey, five miles east of Eastland.

The well flowed at the rate of 19,000 CF per day on a 10/64 in. choke. The absolute open flow came in at 22,000 CFD.

Drilling went to 1,060-ft. bottom after the production zone was entered at 969. The production interval will be perforations 969 to 984-feet.

A new oil producer in the Madewell Field has been finished by Nimrod Oper. Co. of Cisco. Designated as the No. 2 J.H. Broyles, the well indicated capacity to produce 160 barrels of oil and 15,000 CF of casinghead gas per day on an open choke.

Flowing natural gas at the rate of 370,000 CF per day on a 3/8-in. choke, the No. 1 Moates is a successful new wildcat well in Eastland County. B&W Exp. of Gorman is the operator. The well exhibited absolute open flow potential of 449,000 CFD. Location is in a 124-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC Survey, about one mile east of Gorman.

After entering the pay zone at 2,720-feet, the well bottomed at 3,317-feet and will produce from a set of perforations ranging from 2,720 to 2,776-feet into the hole.

Nimrod Oper. Co. of Cisco has posted initial production figures for the No. 1 Kathryn Elliot and also the No. 2 Kathryn Elliot, new oil wells in the Madewell Field, both two miles southwest of Romney.

The No. 1 well indicated potential for 86 barrels of oil and 8,000 CF casinghead gas on an open choke. This well had total drilling depth of 1,212-feet. It entered the pay horizon at 1,144-feet and will produce from a set of perforations 1,144 to 1,156-feet into the wellbore.

W.R. Erickson of Hobbs, NM has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Frances Cox, a 3,999-ft. developmental well in the NW Ranger Field, four miles northwest of Ranger. The operation will be in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's J.F. Walker Survey.

3-BOU, operating out of Lovington, NM, has recorded a successful developmental well in the Hawk Eye Field. It is the No. 4 Tarver, showing potential for 70 barrels of oil, along with 16,000 CF casinghead gas per day on an open choke.

Drillsite was in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, one mile east of Romney. The well was drilled to a total 1,188-ft. bottom after entering the pay structure at 1,110-feet.

Location has been staked by Petroloer Exp., Inc. of Abilene for a 3,600-ft. developmental probe in Eastland County's East Co. Reg. Field, two miles northwest of Cisco. Drillsite will be in a 145-acre lease in the S.P. RR Survey.

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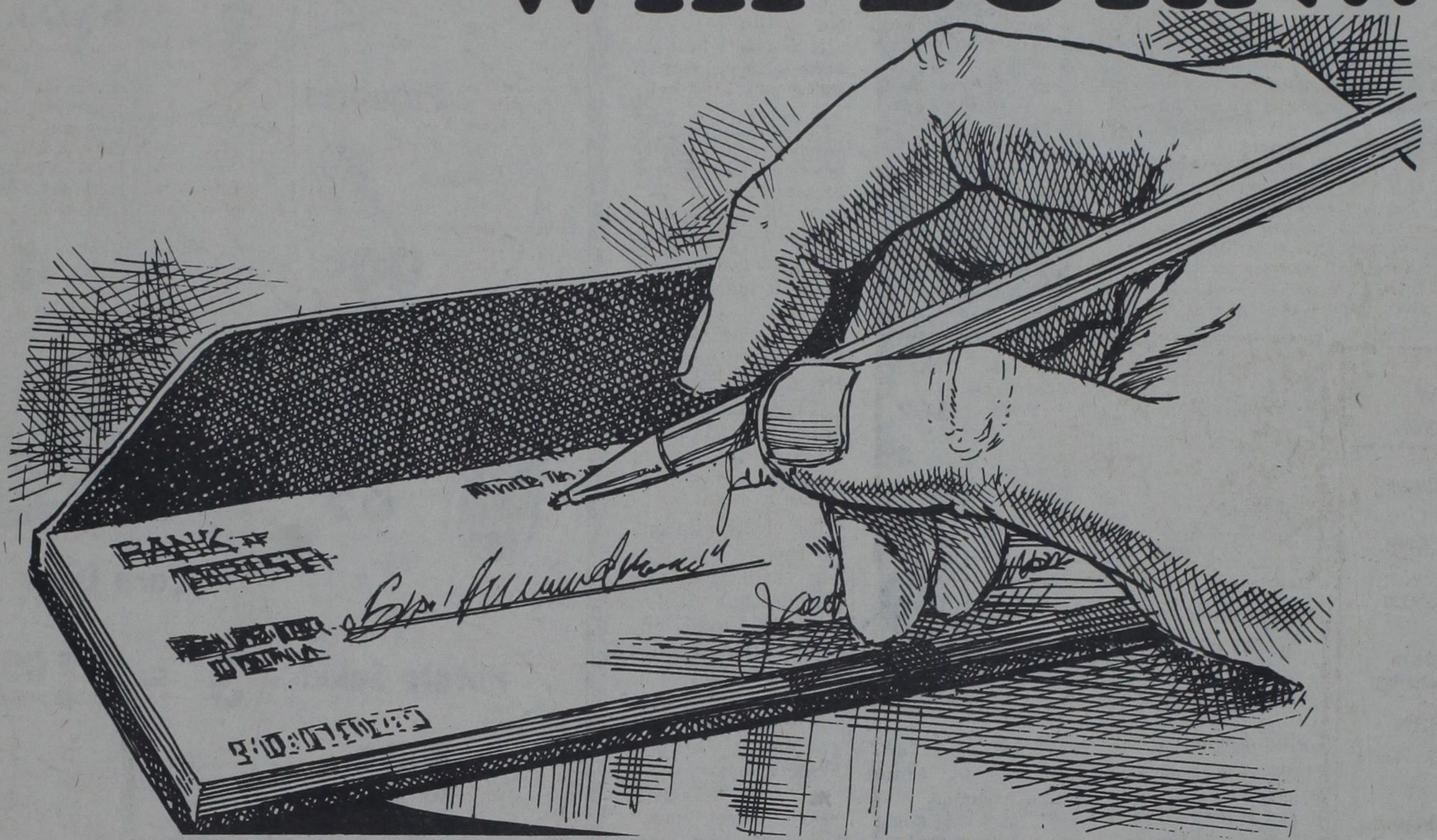

## HOME ECONOMICS

Help out in water conservation--use every drop that comes out of your faucet, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

While you're waiting for water to get hot, catch otherwise wasted water in a bucket for plants or to wash vegetables with, she advises.

McCormack is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Take care of zippers on clothing to prolong their usefulness, says Alma Fonseca, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Always close zippers after use--and before washing--to prevent misalignment.

For balky zippers, try rubbing with bees wax, candlewax or zipper lubricant.

Repair frayed tape edges promptly--look for fraying at the top or bottom of zippers where they meet the garment fabric, Fonseca says.

"Home, sweet, home" is still true for older adults--especially when home is a living environment with the older person in mind, says Dr. Peggy Owens, a housing and home furnishings specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In their homes, older adults need safety, convenience, minimal upkeep and features that promote a feeling of independence, she says.

Do family affairs affect work output?

Conditions that affect the stability of American families DO have an impact on family members' work productivity, says Diane Welch, a family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
