Assistants
 A subject of importance to you is the method of selecting deputies, clerks, and assistants for the county and precinct officials. Article 3902 Vernon's Civil Statutes, requires that the official make application to the Commissioners Court for the number of deputies, clerks, and assistants that he needs and the amount of compensation that he proposes to pay them. According to the provisions of Article 3902 and the opinions of the Attorney General's office, it is a matter for the sole determination of the Commissioners Court as to the number of deputies, clerks and assistants that they allow, the particular officer and the compensation that they receive. Of course, the court must stay within the minimums and maximums allowed by law in fixing the salaries of county employees. What is more, the Commissioners Court cannot ratify or reject the appointment of any deputy, clerk or assistant, for this is a matter for the exclusive determination of the particular officer. Attorney General's Opinions 0-3925 and 5-699 (1948). The one exception to this rule is that the Commissioners Court must ratify the appointment of deputy constables under the provision of Article 6879a of Vernon's Civil Statutes; however, the court cannot reject the appointment of a deputy constable for personal reasons. Attorney General's Opinions 0-(1939) and 5-1050 (1950).

Texas Counties Watching Results Of Court Case

A great number of documents, including additional statements in the form of written arguments from both sides, will be under consideration by the district judge who will decide the "extra-deputy" matter in Eastland County. So far as is known this is the first appearance of the question and undoubtedly 253 other counties will be watching for the results of this court case. Some officials who had been refused additional employees in their sections, had appealed to the County Salary Grievance Committee for relief, and the Commissioners Court here also refused to grant the extra help on this request. So the suit was filed in 91st District Court for a ruling. "Art. 3902 (Deputies, assistants or clerks; appointment; compensation and salaries; increase" will be one of the documents considered. It reads as follows: Whenever any district, county or precinct officer shall require the services of deputies assistants or clerks in the performance of his duties he shall apply to the County Commissioners Court of his county for authority to appoint such deputies, assistants or clerks stating by sworn application the number needed; the position to be filled and the amount to be paid. Said application shall be accompanied by a statement showing the probable receipts from fees, commissions, and compensation to be collected by said office during the fiscal year and the probable disbursements which shall include all salaries and expenses of said office; and said court shall make its order authorizing the appointment of such deputies, assistants and clerk in any office. Upon the entry of such order the officers applying for such assistants, deputies or clerks shall be authorized to appoint them; provided that said compensation shall not exceed the maximum amount hereinafter set out. This is a positive action of the highest order and brings a blessing to all involved.

When he penned the words of the song IN THE CROSS OF CHRIST, Sir John Bowring had in mind the powerful resolution expressed by the apostle of Christ to the Gentiles Paul: "...far be it from me to lord, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ..." (Galatians 6:14).

Who was the individual who said this and why should he voice such a sentiment?

The man we most commonly know as the apostle Paul was, before his conversion, to Christ, a brilliant, highly trained and powerful activist in the traditional Judaism of the day (Acts 7:58; 8:1-3; 9:1-2; 22:3-5; 26:2-11; Philippians 3:2-6), with the original name of Saul. But the Damascus road events changed all of that (Acts 9, 22, 26). The former things were "counted loss" and as "refuse"-and this included power, position, wealth and a very rich traditional upbringing, in order that he might "gain Christ" (Philippians 3:7-8). The transition is defined as ceasing to have confidence "in the flesh" and glorying rather in Christ Jesus Philippians 3:3. What made the difference for him? Indeed, what has made the difference for so many of us since Paul's time?

The key is found in the expression "...if by any means I may attain unto the resurrection from the dead" Philippians 3:11. While it is true that at the return of Jesus, all the dead are going to be raised (John 5:28), there is a vital difference in the outcome. Those who "have done good" i.e. the righteous, are to be raised to "life", while those who have done evil will be raised to "judgment"-condemnation (John 5:29). As we share in the sacrificial aspect of Jesus work, through the process of conversion (Romans 6:1-11). We become united in the likeness and assurance of his resurrection Romans 6:5-11 Co. 1 Corinthians 15:22 ff.

Where is the glory? In the victory over death: spiritual Romans 6:23 and physical 1 Corinthians 15:57, in the triumph of the eternal over the temporal. It is only through the cross of Christ that this is possible: the cross "Towering o'er the wrecks of time". Regular Bible study and

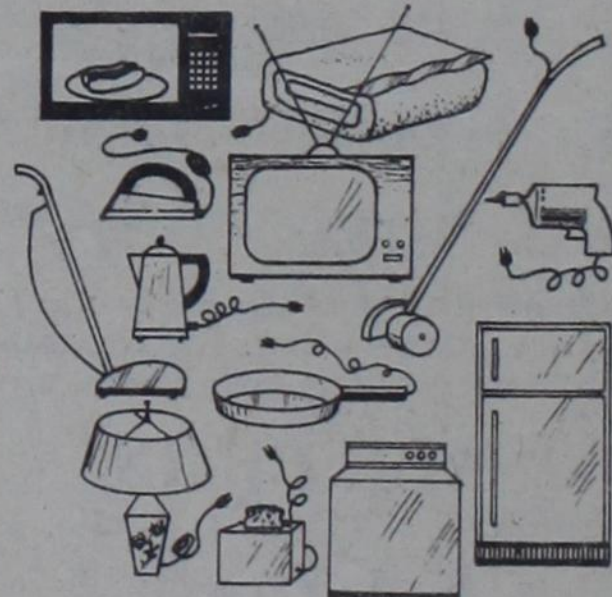
Mrs. Benson died at 2 p.m. on Monday at a local nursing home at the age of 96.

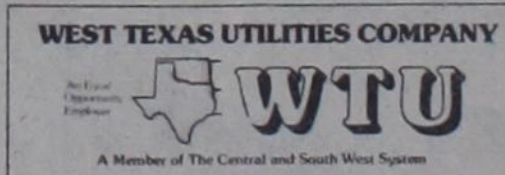




