Many thousands of youngsters this week are taking a symbolic step which dramatizes a significant division of their lives. They are putting on caps and gowns as teenagers and undergraduates and a short while later taking them off as new, young adults ready for college and specialized training for careers or for the responsibilities of earning their own ways and making a contribution to the society in which they live. The wonderful world of make-believe becomes soon a world of hard reality and exacting demands.

How successfully each reacts to the challenges and the disillusionments that result will depend in the main upon what each has come to believe about the world in which he lives and about himself.

We hear a great deal of talk about liberalism vs conservatism, of the responsibilities of the government for the social and economic welfare of the people. These arguments are only the present phases of the old, old struggle of the individual vs the institution, of freedom vs order.

You can never change human nature by changing the forms end means through which it expresses itself. Any law that is enacted before the will to law is ineffectual, and no amount of political coercion or mandate can change a state of mind. It can only restrain or conceal it.

The world of each individual is a world of his own mind. He sees it through his own glass. What he believes about it and about himself are tremendously important. It need not be true, necessarily. There have been great achievements inspired by false principles, as strange as that may seem. Error has made its contributions, but it has done so only because someone believed in it so deeply that it inspired a moving faith in that person's self.

We can find some explanation of Russian achievements in that fact. What the communists believe in we know to be false. But the faith which it seems to inspire in them is a sobering proof of the results which may be obtained, even under primitive conditions, when the creative power of the individual is touched with a flame. In that fact, I am confident, exists the ultimate refutation of communism's essential error, for error contains the seeds of its own destruction.

The most unfortunate person is not one who believes an error, but one who has no faith at all. That person is without any motive power, any real incentive through which eventually truth will triumph. For regardless of what may be the wealth or material power of a country, its strength depends upon the creative force of the individual. No social fiat or political program can guarantee national or individual security. That depends upon the strength of the individual, his own creativeness inspired by a faith in himself. There have been many tragic failures of good principle.

Burial was in a Waco cemetery, beside the body of his wife, Monday.

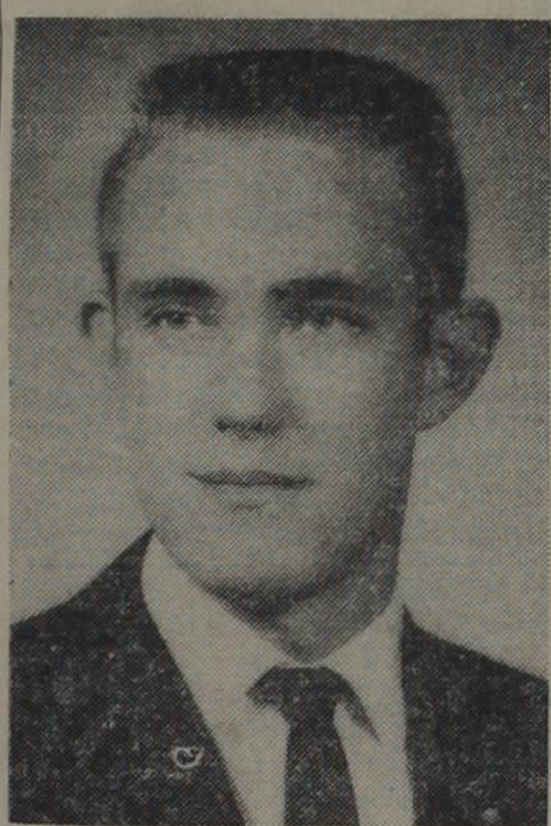
The Rev. Mr. Butler was pastor of the Rising Star church for three years during the middle 1940s.

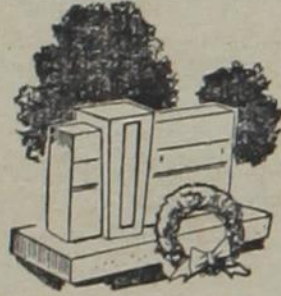

Hereford Clinic To Feature Study Of Beef Carcass

COLLEGE STATION — Meatness is a subject that gets a lot of discussion whenever stockmen gather. The upcoming Southcentral Hereford Progress Clinic, scheduled for Fort Worth's Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum, May 16-17, is no exception.

An expected highlight of the convention will be what Roy Snyder, extension meats specialist, terms as a small carcass contest. At least 12 steers, mainly from the Lewter Feed Lots, will be used. Dr. O. D. Butler, head, Department of Animal Husbandry, Texas A&M College; Dr. J. C. Hillier, Oklahoma State University; and C. O. Lyksett, Swift and Company, Fort Worth, will be in charge of this event.

On the opening morning, they will discuss the classification of the live steers. Then the steers will be slaughtered and detailed cutting information, such as yield, size of rib-eye, thickness of fat and other factors will be obtained. On the second morning's program, from 11 to 12, the steer carcasses will be on display and the three meat specialists will discuss the carcasses and the cutability information obtained. This is the pay-off information, says Snyder, that is so valuable to producers in their breeding and selection programs aimed at producing animals with more meat and less fat.

Other subjects up for discussion by well known individuals in the Hereford and meat industries will include marketing breeding programs, calf crop evaluations and other practices dealing with both registered and commercial Hereford production. It's the kind of a meeting that Hereford folks will not want to miss, believes Snyder.

Cattle Raisers Seek Brucellosis County Program

The Eastland County Livestock Raisers' Association is currently engaged in an all-out campaign which will result in making Eastland county a certified Brucellosis clean area. Forms have been available in various communities of the county for some time on which producers can sign petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas to take the necessary steps to realize this objective. The urgency of this program cannot be overemphasized. Mr. D. S. Buchanan, owner and operator of the Eastland Auction Company, has recently been notified officially by the Texas Animal Health Council that all breeding animals that are eight months old and originating in the so-called "dirty" counties which include Eastland, Erath, Palo Pinto and Comanche, that will go back to the farms from the auction ring have to be tested for Brucellosis. When this order goes into effect on June 15, it can mean the following inconveniences to the sellers of cattle. First, it will cost livestock producers several hundred dollars per month in test fees. Secondly, checks for cattle cannot be issued until the results of tests are known. Third, delayed loadings of cattle resulting from delays during testing will cause buyers to stay away from markets in those counties that are "unclean". Fourth, many buyers now hesitate to buy cattle that have to be tested because when they finish their buying, they desire to finish their transactions and go home. The Livestock Raisers' Association is currently in the process of compiling eligible lists of livestock producers residing in the various communities of the county. As soon as these lists have been completed, the Association will meet and formulate specific plans for petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission to carry out their testing program in the county and to follow through with other necessary procedures in making this a clean county.

Livestock producers are urged to cooperate in this program. It is obvious from the above facts that unless our county follows through with this program in the near future, our livestock markets will suffer and livestock producers in the county will suffer financially. All producers of Livestock should make sure that they sign a petition which will be made available to them within the next three or four weeks.

In event that a petition is not made available to you, you are asked to contact Mr. J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent, Ross Wilson, Gorman, or your local Vocational Agricultural Teacher who will see that a petition is available for your signature.

Public Invited to Hear Cancer Specialist At Eastland May 17th

EASTLAND — The public is cordially invited to hear Dr. James W. Finney speak on cancer at the annual meeting and election of officers of the Eastland County Cancer Society, May 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the Annex of the Eastland First Christian Church.

Dr. Finney, assistant chief of cancer research for Baylor University Medical Center, Dallas, will present a 20-25 minute program of the research program demonstrating the procedure from the inception of the program leading to the ultimate application to the cancer patient. Color slides will be used as illustrations.

He received a BA degree in Bacteriology and a minor in organic chemistry from the University of Texas in 1955 and a MA in Microbiology and minor in Physiology with training in immunology and radiation, 1955-57. He has done Microbiology research at the VA Hospitals in McKinney and Dallas, and at present he is an instructor in Microbiology, Baylor University Dental School, Dallas.

He has worked with teams on the studies in tumor autoimmunity in cancer patients.

Dr. Finney is one of a team of three men doing research with hydrogen peroxide as a cure for certain cancers. The hydrogen peroxide used in the treatment is the same sort of solution women use to bleach their hair. For the cancer therapy, it is "infused" in the tumor for about 40 minutes, and during the last five minutes, radiation from an X-ray machine also is sent into the malignancy.

It has long been known that cancer cells seem to be deficient in oxygen and that if oxygen is increased in the tumor, then better results can be obtained when conventional X-ray radiation is used. The hydrogen peroxide is simply the means used to increase the oxygen in cancer sites.

94 RISING STAR PEOPLE INTERVIEW SS MAN

Figures for the first four months of 1962 show that 94 persons in the Rising Star area talked with H. L. Weatherly, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration on the 4 visits made to the City Hall here.

Weatherly says that the 1960 and 1961 amendments made it advantageous for all persons to file their social security retirement if still working. And, if ment claims soon after age 65 not earning more than \$1200 per year, a person should file at age 62, or be certain why he doesn't.

Everyone should check into just what social security can mean for him and his family, when that 65th birthday rolls around, for checks are due many persons whose annual earnings surpass the \$1200 figure by a considerable amount, Weatherly concluded. The next visit to Rising Star will be on May 21.

TINKER AFB, OKLA. — Technical Sergeant Melton D. Beck of May, Texas, has completed the United States Air Force advanced air traffic course here.

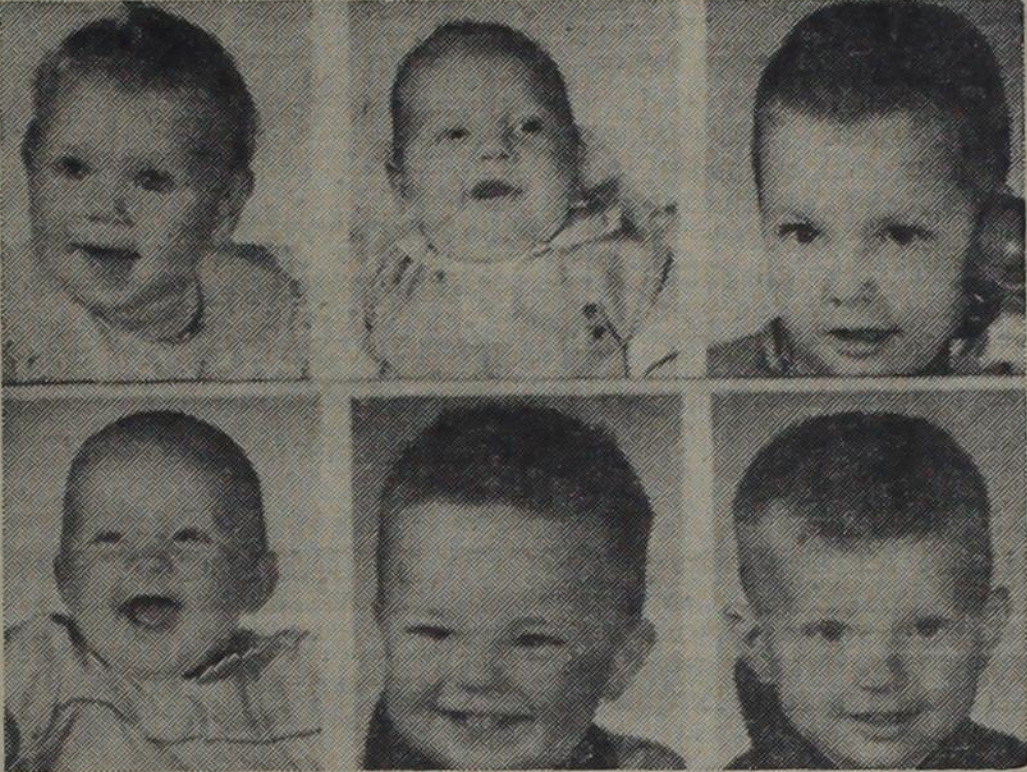

15 Per Cent More Fastland Countians Receive SS Checks

Eastland County showed an increase of 15.2 per cent in number and 21.8 per cent in amount of monthly social security checks from December, 1960, to December, 1961, according to figures just received by R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

1867 persons received \$122,257 in retirement checks for December, 1961, and 122 persons received \$10,334 in disability payments.

728 wives and dependent husbands received \$24,096 in retirement claims and 28 others received \$1,089 from disability claims.

278 children received \$12,934 from claims on a retired or deceased parent, and 28 children were paid \$981 from claims on a disabled parent. 383 widows, dependent widowers, and parents received \$22,234.

At the present time, social security benefits total over a billion dollars a month to just over seventeen million beneficiaries: (1) more persons in the aged group; (2) age qualifications now 62 instead of 65, and (3) less social security credit now needed for eligibility to retirement or survivors benefits.

Seed of New Oat Variety Available For Fall Planting

College Station — Seed of Alamo-X, a new variety of oats developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will be available for fall planting. The new variety is being distributed to replace Alamo because of its greater resistance to Helminthosporium blights and certain races of crown rust. It is also more tolerant of low temperatures.

Observations made during the severe January 1962 temperatures show that Alamo-X is considerably superior to Alamo in cold tolerance. Averaging data for four locations in Texas, Alamo-X survived 92 per cent compared with 54 per cent for Alamo, 72 for New Nortex and 94 for Mustang. This hardiness will permit fall seeding of Alamo-X as far north as North Central Texas.

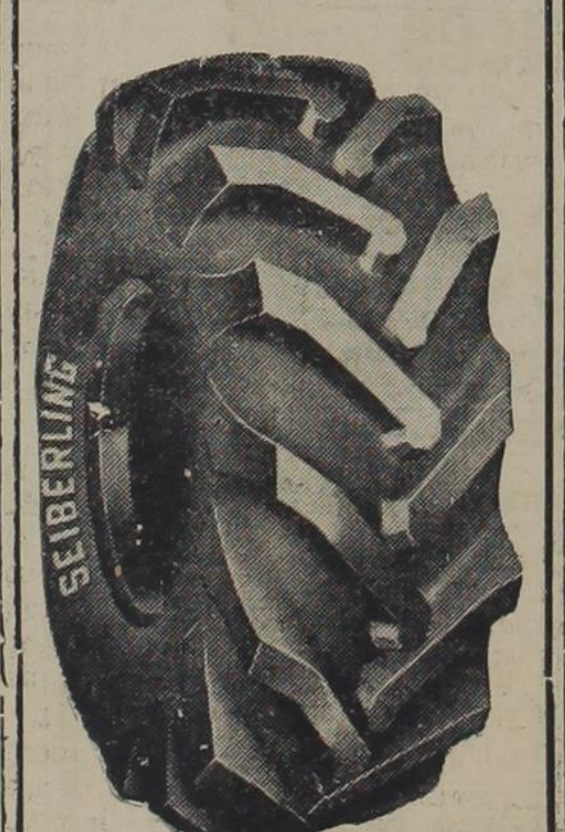

Milk Producers Set Record During April
During April 1962, 475 producers of the Central West Texas Milk delivered a total of 16,815,489 pounds for a daily average of 560,516 pounds. Daily producer deliveries during April set a new record high and were 3.0 per cent above the average for March, 2.2 per cent over April 1961 and 4.5 per cent greater than the average for April 1960. Seventy-three per cent of producer milk was classified as Class I during April 1962, compared with 84 per cent in March 1962. Daily deliveries per producer averaged 1,180 pounds during April 1962, compared with an average of 1,063 pounds in March 1962.

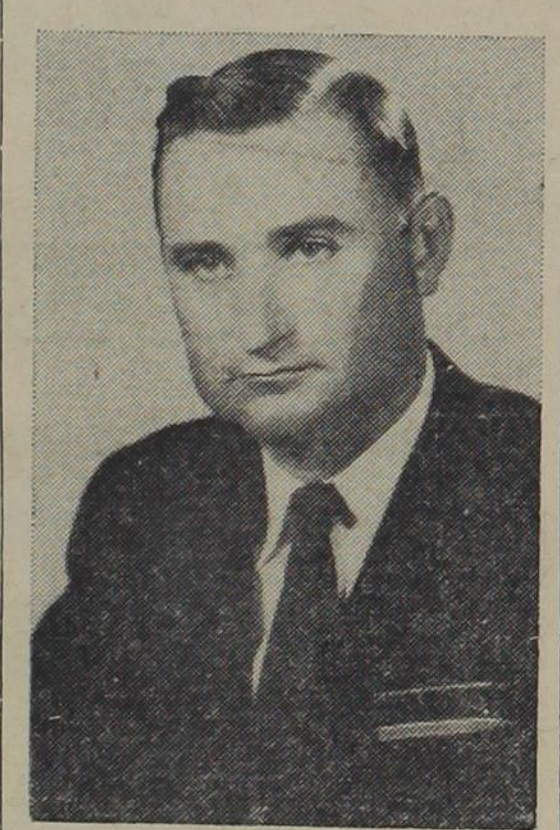
