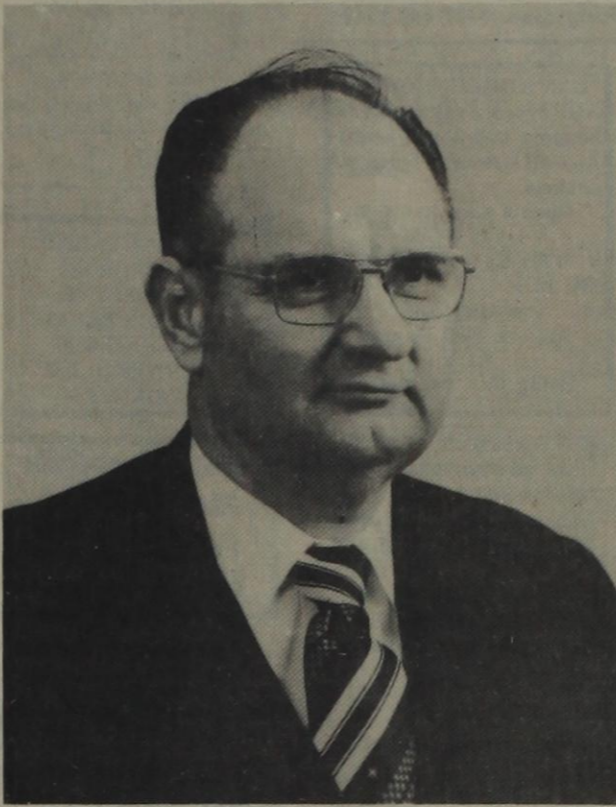

## Chamber To Sponsor Citizenship Program Tuesday



The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Citizenship program which will be presented to the public and the students of Rising Star in the High School gym on Tuesday, May 8, 1979 at 10:30 a.m.

Mr. C.L. Kay, Executive Director of the Center for Business and Economic Education at Lubbock Christian College will address those assembled.

This program is designed to help students as well as the general public become more aware of their responsibilities as citizens in school and the community.

Mr. Travis Williams and Mr. Jack Shults were instrumental in setting up this program.

Mr. Kay was born on April 29, 1927 in Beaverdale, Pennsylvania. He attended school in Cleveland, Ohio with formal education from Henderson, Tennessee; Eastern New Mexico, Portales, New Mexico;

and Oklahoma Christian College in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. He has held various positions including Head of the Department of Religion at West Texas State College in Canyon, Texas; Instructor in history and Government at Lubbock Christian College, Dean of Students, Dean of Student Life, Vice-President of Public Affairs and Executive Director for the Center of Business and Economic Education. Kay is very active in Civic work and has delivered some 3,800 addresses on the principles of the American System of Private Enterprise, the nature of man, comparative economic systems, and the religious, historical, and moral values that have contributed to our economic well-being.

He is an exponent of the free-market, private ownership of property, and limited government rationale.

Mr. Kay is a member of numerous professional organizations and has been awarded many citations and awards for his work in public affairs and economic education.

C.L. Kay has been with Lubbock Christian College since its beginning in 1957. He was instrumental in securing grants from the Mabee Foundation for the Mabee American Heritage Center, the Mabee Agriculture-Science Laboratory, the C.L. Kay Christian Development Center, the Mabee Student Life Building, the refurbishing of the Mabee American Heritage center, and the Center for Business and Economic Education. In addition, funds were secured from the Moody Foundation, The Texas educational Association, the Price Foundation, and the Sears Foundation.

In 1974, he founded the Center for Business and Economic Education located in the Mabee American Heritage Center at Lubbock Christian College. The Center is designed to create an understanding of our traditional value system, the American System of Private Enterprise, and the philosophy of the American form of

government. The Center for Business and Economic Education utilizes symposiums, seminars, and various publications to promulgate its information to students and the business community.

As an officer and a member of the Board of the Defense Orientation Conference Association, Dr. Kay has had an opportunity to be informed about national defense. "ON THE SPOT" briefings have been given on matters related to the Department of Defense and the various Commands including the Alaskan, the European, the Pacific, and the Southern.

Dr. Kay has visited defense installations in the United States, England, Belgium, West Germany, East Germany, Greece, Turkey, Italy, Spain, Hawaii, Cuba, Thailand, Taiwan, Quemoy, Korea, Okinawa, and Japan. In addition he has visited Greenland, Iceland, Hong Kong, Singapore, Australia, New Zealand, Tahiti, Panama, and Columbia.

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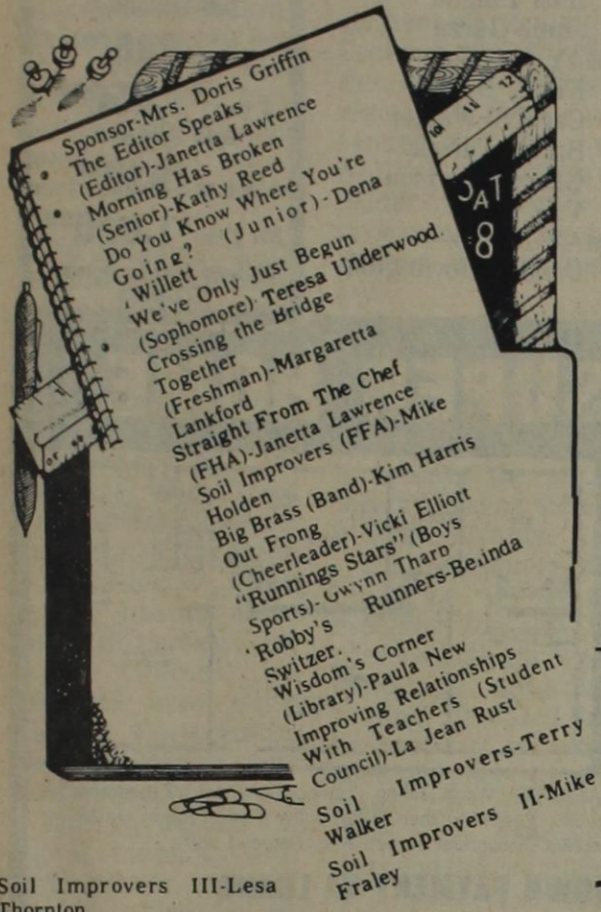

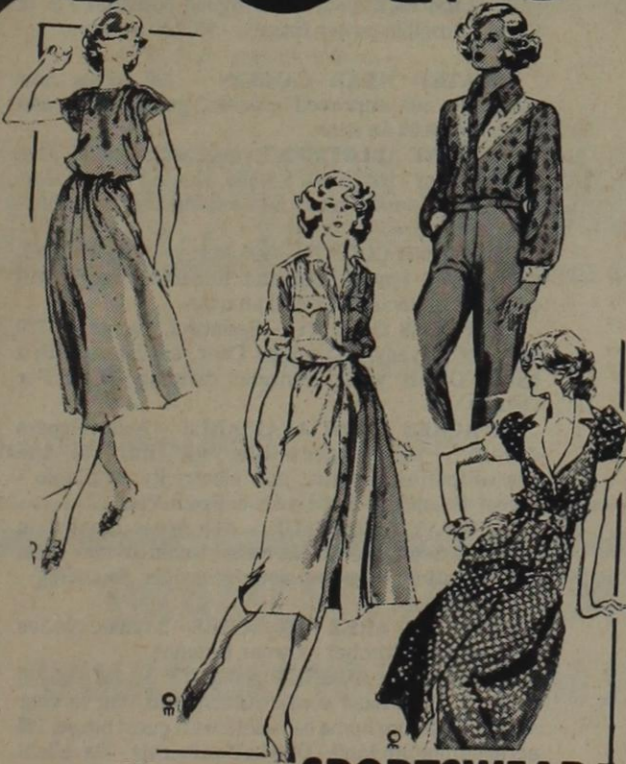

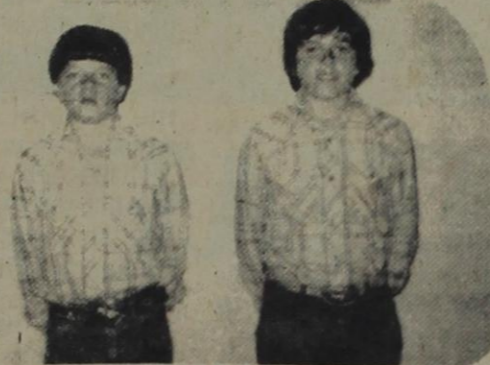

## Size Standards Effective July 15-18

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Sectional Center Manager-Postmaster Jack D. Watson reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal service's new size standards become effective.

The Fort Worth postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 and one-half inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Watson said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few

retailers should be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Watson said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths(.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

### COMMENTARY

It was at Megiddo that Ahaziah, King of Judah, died. The great king Josiah fought the Egyptian Pharaoh and was mortally wounded there in 610 B.C. The Canaanites also met their defeat there. Megiddo was of great strategic importance, since it was situated at the opening of a narrow pass on the great highway which connected the lands of Egypt and Assyria. This highway, called the "Way of the sea", became the important military artery of the Romans, and was known as via Maris. In 1918, the British troops invaded the north of Palestine through Megiddo Pass. Allenby, the commander-in-chief, was given the title of Lord Allenby of Megiddo. Megiddo, or Megeddon, is a symbol of war. The worst battle is yet to come as we read in revelation 16:16: And he gathered them together into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon. This is Har Magaddon, or Mount of Megiddo. Joel speaks of the valley of Jehosaphat, which lies at the foot of Mount Olive (Joel 3:2,12), which is the valley of judgement. This places the battle southeast of Mount Carmel toward Jerusalem. After this battle, Christ will punish the nations for their persecution of the Jews (Matthew 25:31-46); revelations 14:14-20, as God will honor the Abrahamic covenant (Genesis 12:1-3 and will usher in the "Dispensation of the fullness of time" (Ephesians 1:10). The armies, along with the dragon, the beast and the false prophet, will meet their doom in this great battle (Rev. 19:20; 20:10). The Bible describes the battle of Armageddon as the bloodiest battle of all history. The blood mingles with the waters of much rain and flows to the depths of the horses' bridles, running through the newly created valley 200 miles, yet the battle will last for only a single day (Rev. 14:20; and Zachariah 14:7-8). In the first half of the tribulation there is the sealing of the 144,000 Jews from all the twelve tribes of Israel. These are sealed and protected through the trumpet judgements and are not to be hurt by the plagues (Rev. 9:4). They are known as the man child (Rev. 12:5). The very next scene shows them in heaven (Rev. 14:1-5). These are virgins to the extent that they have not

Shall the earth be made to bring forth in one day? or shall a nation be born at once? for as soon as Zion (NOT THE CHURCH) travailed, she brought forth her children" (Isaiah 66:7). Jeremiah also places the fulfillment of this event in the time of Jacob's trouble (Jeremiah 30:6,7). These Jews will be saved after the rapture of the Church. In Daniel 12:1 we read, And at that time shall Michael stand up, the great prince which standeth for the children of thy people; and there shall be a time of trouble, such as never was since there was a nation even that same time: and at that time thy people shall be delivered, every one that shall be found written in the book." These will rule with a rod of iron symbolizing authority, according to Rev. 12. So will we. Rev. 2:27).
