

of gravy is a good proportion to keep in mind." Now, return the desired amount of fat to the roasting pan and the cleared meat juices that have settled in the bottom of the bowl. Place the pan over low heat on top of the range. Measure out an equal amount of flour for the amount of fat used. Stir the flour into the heated fat. Cook and stir to the desired browning. Measure 1 cup of water or stock for each 2 tablespoons of fat, and stir into the fat-flour mixture. Cook over low heat stirring constantly.

You can further the interest of good gravy by bringing in a variety of flavor - through the by varying the liquid base. Instead of water, you may want to use bouillon, tomato juice, fruit juice, cream or milk.

Do you realize that whats left of the Christmas turkey is just like a treasure at your fingertips? There are many delectable dishes you can prepare with roast turkey.

First of all, the leftover turkey must be stored properly. After the big meal is over, scoop out the stuffing that's left in the neck and body cavities! of the turkey. Refrigerate the stuffing immediately to cool it quickly. Later, cover the cool-ed stuffing. Treat the turkey the same way. After it is cooled, you may want to cut the meat from the bones and wrap white and dark meat separately and store in the refrigerator. Here are some delicacies that may be whipped up from the roast turkey: Cut it into small cubes and tuck onto picks with pieces of dill pickle or preserved watermelon rind for an appetizer that is different and special. **Comedy Corner** "The coach must be training us for water polo!"







## March of Dimes Scientists Find Armadillo Helpful in Twin Study

An oddball research animal that looks like a cross between an anteater and an armored tank is causing scientists to wonder if "identical" human twins are so identical after all.

The nine-banded armadillo, which is a native of Texas and points south, has several child-bearing characteristics that are similar to those of humans.

For this reason, Dr. Kurt Benirschke and colleagues at Dartmouth Medical College, Hanover, N. H., are using armadillos for studies of pregnancy and birth defects under a National Foundation-March of Dimes research grant.

It takes about the same length of time-nine monthsfor baby armadillos or baby humans to develop in the womb. And in both species, the placentas are structurally similar.

But a quirk of nature has made this odd mammal even more useful for medical research. It always has a litter of four. The four baby armadillos come from the same egg and are therefore always of the same sex.

What has this to do with human twins?

For years, scientists have believed that identical twinsthose who develop through division of the same egg-are exactly alike down to the very last gene. They've assumed that plants of skin or of organs between identical twins.


