





The Rising Star Wildcats may or may not win the Track and Field Championship of their District in the meet at Mason, Saturday, but they won what amounts to much more impressive championships when they took the title of the Brazos River Relays at Abilene last Saturday, in a field of 33 schools, setting a new meet record in the sprint relay in the course of doing so, and in taking also the title of the invitation meet at Bangs, Thursday of last week.

But for the fact that Bob Needham, one of the most talented of the Rising Star crew, has been handicapped with a knee injury suffered last fall, the Wildcats undoubtedly would have won their victory by a much more impressive score.

And, even so, if Gary Scott, Rising Star's stellar mile runner, had been able to enter that event n which he had a good chance of either winning or placing high, ed his race in order to help his

Rebuilding Of 36 Thru Rising Star Approved

Widening and straightening of Highway 36 from Pioneer to Rising Star is among the road reconstruction projects approved for this area in the State Highway Department's Program for the next fiscal year.

The program approved at the March session of the commission, calls for widening the present right-of-way twenty feet, flatening the curve two miles west where the Katy railroad formerly ran, and constructing a new roadway 26 feet wide, with 8 foot paved shoulders, making a total paved width of 42 feet.

The route of the highway will continue over West College Street as at present. The portion to be rebuilt, a section 5.8 miles in length, will link up the modernized portion of the Highway now ending at Pioneer, with the rebuilt section on East College St. The project, which will probably be built next fall, will eliminate a very bad section of road and improve traffic conditions over a route which is constantly increasing in use and importance. This is part of the Department's Consolidated 1959-1960 Program of Advanced Planning. Another project approved at the March meeting of the Commission calls for improving Highway 380 from Callahan County line to Cisco, re-routing it around Lake Cisco Dam which it presently traverses.
