OPEN LETTER TO THE TAXPAYERS IN THE CITY LIMITS OF RISING STAR

The CITY TAX SYSTEM is in the process of a reformation. In this re-establishing of the city tax, the values have been advanced to the same current amount of the school tax. The rate has been tentatively set at \$1.00, again the same as the school's rate.

In the next few days, if you have not already received a notice, everyone in the City will receive a reappraisal notice. This notice will show you the value and tax amount of 1978 and the new value for 1981. Again, let me stress that the actual rate has not been set and cannot be set until after the Board of Equalization meets on June 22nd. The rate is only an estimate shown on your notice. It could be more or it could be less. The actual dollar figure for taxes will be set by the City Council, probably at the Council meeting to be held in July or early August. Notices for the tax rate hearing will be posted in my office and will also appear in this newspaper. You will have the opportunity to state your opinion to the Council on the rate to be adopted.

If you have any question pertaining to the value, not the actual tax, please, do not hesitate to call me at my office, and I will be more than happy to discuss this with you.

Also, on the reappraisal notice is a place for the \$15,000.00 homestead exemption that was adopted by the City Council. The amount of your exemption up to \$15,000.00 was subtracted from your value before the tax rate was applied. If the 1981 tax shows a 0-figure, that simply means you will not have to pay any City Tax in 1981.

But if you think you signed up and I did not post it on your reappraisal notice, please call me so it can be corrected. I realize there was some confusion in this, because you had to sign up twice, once for the school and once for the city. One exemption will not be for both city and school.

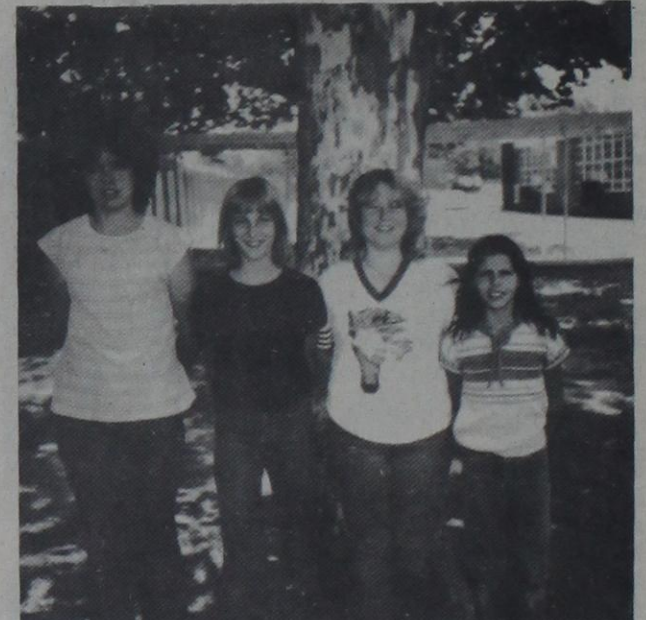
Celeste McCleskey "Miss Rising Star"

WTU Signs Agreement With Exxon for Future Fuel Needs

West Texas Utilities Company, a subsidiary of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation, has signed an agreement with Exxon Coal, USA, to meet future fuel needs.

The contract calls for the delivery, beginning in 1986 and continuing over a 20 year period, of 48 million tons of Wyoming coal to the Oklaunion Power Plant site in north central Texas. The Oklaunion project is being managed by West Texas Utilities which will own 350 megawatts of the unit's total capacity of 640 megawatts. Two other Central and South West System Subsidiaries, Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, with 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, with 175 megawatts, are participants.

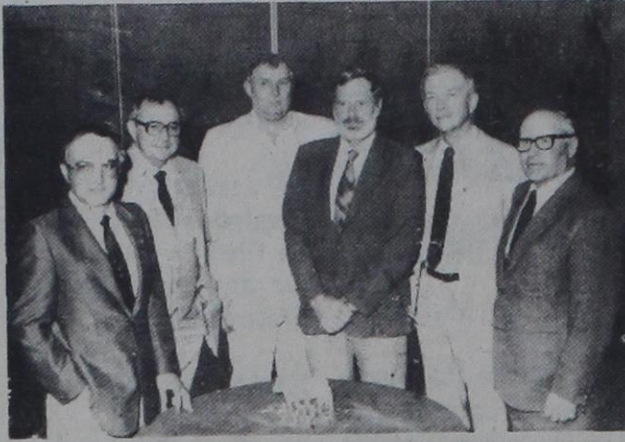
The fuel contract

between West Texas Utilities and Exxon Coal is extendable for a 15 year period following completion of the initial 20 year delivery schedule.

Exxon will ship the coal from its Rawhide Mine near Gillette in Campbell County, Wyoming.

On May 8, 1981, West Texas Utilities, acting on behalf of its partners, filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for a certificate of convenience and necessity which will allow construction of the power generation station and related facilities to proceed. The plant is to be operational by December, 1986.

Estimated cost of construction of the 1900 acre site is \$675 million. The location is in Wilbarger County, southeast of Vernon, Texas and near the community of Oklaunion.

On July 1, 1981, the Texas cattle industry will implement a voluntary 25-cent-per-head beef promotion investment program.

Under the new system, 25 cents will be collected on cattle and calves sold through participating markets, packers, dealers and order buyers. The funds will be remitted entirely to the Beef Industry Council of the Meat Board for use in national programs of research, education and promotion.

Endorsed recently by five Texas organizations, the investment plan is designed to generate additional funding

needed for aggressive beef market development.

The organizations initiating the 25-cent investment are the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assn., Texas Cattle Feeders Assn., Texas Farm Bureau, the Independent Cattlemen's Assn. and the Livestock Marketing Assn. of Texas.

At a meeting May 6 in Irving, Tex., these groups agreed to put the investment program in motion and also to form a beef promotion coordinating committee which will oversee the implementation of the entire effort.

Back Checks Limited

People who delay applying for social security retirement or survivor benefits for some time after they become eligible may be affected by a change in the law which took effect March 1, Glyn Hammons, social security manager in Abilene,

said recently.

Under the new law, back payments can be made only for up to 6 months before the month of application, Hammons said. Under the old law, back checks could be received for up to 12 months before the month of application.

The change generally applies to retired workers over 65 and their dependents, and to widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased workers who are themselves over 62.

People who apply for reduced benefits--retired workers and their dependents under 65 and widows and widowers under 62--cannot generally get benefits for months before the month of application. This part of the law was not changed.

People who apply for benefits because they are disabled--workers adult children, widows and widowers--are not affected by the new law. They can still get benefits for up to 12 months before the month they apply if they are found eligible.

Improve Fishing With Fish Attractors

COLLEGE STATION—Fish attractors can increase your catch in a sport fish pond.

An attractor can be constructed from any material that will attract, or concentrate, fish, says a fisheries specialist with the Texas A & M System.

"Bait fish are attracted to cover provided, and crappies, bass and catfish are attracted, in turn," says Billy Higginbotham of Overton. "Several sport fish species also use attractors for shelter and spawning sites, especially in waters with little or no natural cover."

Two types of fish attractors commonly are used in Texas--brush and tire reefs.

"Brush attractors are the most popular," notes the specialist. "Willow tops and discarded Christmas trees make excellent fish habitats when anchored with concrete blocks or rocks. Additional brush usually is needed every two or three years to keep this type of attractor productive."

To make a tire reef, tie various numbers of

tires together in configurations that provide structure or relief on the pond bottom, suggests the specialist. Holes can be drilled in the tires to prevent air pockets so they will sink easier. A tire reef will last almost indefinitely and will not harm the aquatic environment.

"Attractors made from a combination of brush and tires are often used, with excellent results," notes Higginbotham.

Good areas for attractors include underwater points and drop-offs. Materials can be transported to an attractor site with any type of boat. Size of an attractor is strictly up to the individual, but several attractors at different depths usually give better results than a single attractor, contends the specialist.

"While fish attractors do not increase the number of fish in a body of water, they do concentrate certain species already present," says Higginbotham. "That increases the odds for an angler to fill his or her stringer."

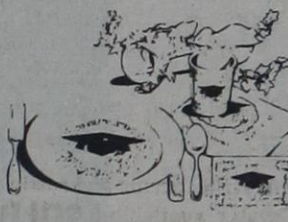

NOT ALL INSECTS ARE PESTS

Contrary to the beliefs of many people not all insects are harmful or pestiferous. Only about 3% of the approximately one million known insects are pests. Of those that are left about 7% are classified as beneficials, the rest are of no consequence to man.

However the 3% which are pests have given the entire class of animals a bad name. Everyone has had some experience with a Mosquito or Ant bite, a Cockroach scurrying across the kitchen floor, Fleas on their pet, or Tomato Horn Worm devouring their prize tomatoes.

It is because of these personal bad experiences or social conditioning that we often over react when we encounter any insect in the yard or garden. Of course none of us want to share our

Homes with any unwanted guests.

Nevertheless, it should be remembered that many Insects perform valuable services for us all. Bees are involved in the tedious work of pollination of many fruit and vegetable crops. Many Insects are involved in the breakdown of dead animals and plants.

Probably the most beneficial work done by Insects is the control of other Insect populations. Insects which feed on other Insects fall into two classes: Parasites and Predators.

The Beneficial Parasitic Insects which live on or in soft bodied adults (such as Aphids) or Larvae (such as Leaf Feeding Caterpillars). After the eggs are hatch the Larvae of these Flies or Wasps feed on the Pest In-

sects.

The Beneficial Predator Insects are probably better known. These Insects devour their prey. Some of the better known Beneficial Predators include Lady Beetles and their Larvae, Lace-Winged Fly or Aphid Lion, Praying Mantis, and Assassin Bugs. Many Spiders also fit into this category.

The moral of the story is you shouldn't always kill an Insect just because he's an Insect. You might be killing one that does Mankind a service. If you have any questions or have any Insects which you would like indentified, contact the county Extension Office.

PROTECT YOUR TOMATOES

Now that those beautiful garden Tomatoes are full of blooms and soon to begin bearing fruit, you sure don't want to see all of your toil and

labor go to feed the Insects, warns Gordon Woolam, Extension Pest Management Agent.

The most destructive and wide spread pest of Tomatoes is the Tomato Hornworm. It is a large green caterpillar with diagonal white stripes and a hard, curved horn on the rear end. The adult is a 4 to 5 inch gray-brown nocturnal flying moth.

Tomato Hornworms feed on foliage for 3 to 4 weeks starting in the late Spring. A few Hornworms can strip an entire plant rapidly.

This pest can often be controlled by hand-picking. Insecticides should be applied when damage appears on plants. Recommended Insecticides include Seven (R), Dipel (R) (Bacillus Thuringiensis) and Thiodan (R).

Other major Tomato pests include Red Spider Mites, Stink Bugs and Tomato Fruitworms. Spider

Mites are not Insects, but are minute Red Mites related to Ticks and Chiggers. They suck juices from the undersides of leaves, causing discolored areas. A heavy infestation can cause leaves and flower buds to shed. Kelthane (R) should be used for controlling Red Spider Mites, usually two to four applications are needed.

Stink Bugs also suck plant juices. These Insects feed on the fruit of a variety of vegetables including Tomatoes. Treatment should begin when the first signs of damage occur on the foliage or fruit. Seven (R) or Thodan (R) are recommended Insecticides.

The Tomato Fruitworm also known as the corn Earworm attack the Tomato Fruit. This caterpillar chews its way into the fruit and devours it. The caterpillar may reach 1 1/4 inches and may vary in color from

green to pink to almost black. Seven (R) or Dipel (R) should be applied while the Worms are small.

Be sure to refer to the label instructions for application rates and instruction. No endorsement is intended by the reference to commercial products or trades names. For additional information on controlling these or other pests, contact the County Extension Office.

Local Counties Receive Reimbursement

AUSTIN, Texas—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said Texas counties were paid \$627,542 in state funds under a law designed to encourage voter registration and accurate voting lists.

He said 219 counties shared in the funds which represent reimbursement for county voter registration efforts.

The Texas Election Code permits the Comptroller to pay counties

40 cents for each new registered voter and 40 cents for each cancellation made to update lists.

Bullock said the payments were made to help reimburse registration activities from February 1, 1980 through January 31, 1981.

Payments to the state's larger counties included:
Harris County, \$111,286.40. Dallas County, \$88,612; Bexar County, \$42,145.60;

Tarrant County, \$54,196; Travis County, \$31,773.60; El Paso County, \$14,624.80 and Nueces County, \$11,711.60; Loving County--the state's least populous county--received the smallest reimbursement, \$9.60.

CJC Band & Belles Receive 4th Invitation To Macy's

College To Sponsor Tour To Accompany Group On Thanksgiving Week

The Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles, who have appeared in three Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parades in New York, have received an unprecedented fourth invitation for the famous nationally-telecast Thanksgiving Day event, according to an announcement by CJC officials today.

At the same time, the college revealed that it would sponsor a four-day, three-night tour to New York in cooperation with American Airlines, which will allow some 200 extra persons to accompany the performing group on their trip. A similar tour was held in 1977 when

the band and Belles made their third appearance in the parade.

Tim Jones is director of the Wrangler Band and Pat Owens is the director of the Belles. Both groups are expected to have approximately fifty members next year, the directors said.

Eris Ritchie, former CJC official who handled arrangements for the three previous Macy's appearances, will again be responsible for the mechanics of the tour. Mr. Ritchie has been doing promotional work in seeking the invitation for the groups ever since the 1977 ap-

pearance, and has agreed to line up all of the travel, hotel, sightseeing, and entertainment again this year, a CJC spokesman said.

Band Director Tim Jones will handle the business arrangements for the tour, and will receive reservations, deposits and payments.

The official letter of invitation, received by Mr. Ritchie recently, came from Mark Schonberg, Operations Supervisor for Special Productions at Macy's-New York. It read, in part, "It gives me great pleasure to extend this invitation to the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles to participate and represent the state of Texas in Macy's 1981 Thanksgiving Day Parade."

In revealing particulars concerning the CJC-sponsored tour, Mr. Ritchie stated, "We will have an absolutely fantastic travel bargain for anyone interested in going to New

York. We will have a trip that will include a dozen or more features, some of which are: all air and ground transportation, three nights' hotel lodging, a sight-seeing tour, Thanksgiving Dinner and show, a show at Radio City Music Hall—and more. The really great thing about this is that we'll include all of the features for \$50.00 less than the price of a round-trip plane ticket from D/FW Airport to New York. A current price for this ticket is \$484.00. The price for our complete package is \$434.00 per person, based on double occupancy."

The sight-seeing tour will go through lower Manhattan, take a ferry boat to the Statue of Liberty, and include a guided tour of the United Nations. A separate tour will go backstage at the famous Radio City Music Hall. The group will also see the multimedia production of "The New York Ex-

perience" in Rockefeller Center, and will enjoy a Thanksgiving Dinner and floor show at a well-known restaurant-club, the Riverboat, in the Empire State Building. They will also go to the observation deck of the Empire State Building for a view of the city at nighttime. Mr. Ritchie said that the group will also likely take at least one ride on New York's "infamous" subway, and would see the lights of Times Square.

The students and tour group will be housed at the Southgate Tower Hotel, across the street from Madison Square Garden at Seventh Avenue at 31st Street. One unusual feature of this particular hotel is that each room has a kitchenette, Mr. Ritchie said. The hotel is also very convenient to Macy's and the television rehearsals and parade viewing, he pointed out.

Inquiries concerning the tour should be directed to Mr. Tim Jones, who will handle the business arrangements. Mr. Jones may be reached at CJC (442-2567) or at home (442-3419). Slight discounts are available for those who stay three in a room or four in a room, Mr. Jones said. A descriptive

brochure regarding the tour, which has an application form on it, may be obtained by contacting Mr. Jones or by calling the CJC PBX operator. The brochures will be available in approximately one week, Jones stated.

Reservations may be made by paying a deposit of \$100.00 per person. The balance will be due by August 15. Approximately 200 extra people will be accepted for the tour, and after those places are filled a waiting list will be established in case of cancellations.

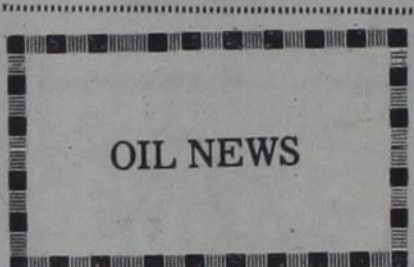

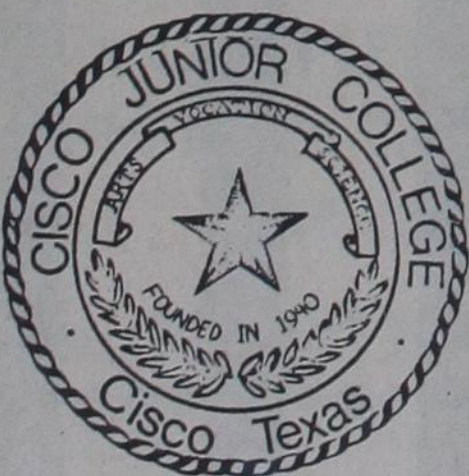
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
