Peanut Bill Passes First Hurdle

According to Ross Wilson, Secretary of National Peanut Growers Group, a peanut bill prepared by Congressman Charlie Rose and strongly backed by the National Peanut Growers Group was favorably reported by the House Agriculture Subcommittee for Tobacco and Peanuts, chaired by Rose on April 8.

The Bill would extend the present two price system with allotment and quotas for the period 1982-85. The proposal calls for a quota support rate in 1982 at the national average cost of production, but not less than \$631 per ton to be adjusted in 1983, 1984 and 1985 to reflect increased production costs. The measure also would modify several existing program provisions to improve their operation at the farm and market level.

The Bill had strong bi-partisan support of all Subcommittee members. A bill draft was submitted by the Department of Agriculture to the Subcommittee prior to the April 8 session, but the major program changes proposed in that document were rejected by the Subcommittee. The USDA recommendations call

for abolishment of peanut acreage allotments in 1982, reduction of farm poundage quota by 10 percent each year, transfer of farm quotas by sale and lease within states, elimination of deadlines for contracting additional peanuts and would provide authority for any grower to contract with handlers for delivery of additional peanuts for both the export and domestic edible markets.

The Bill must now be considered by the full House Agriculture Committee. The measure will probably be presented to the Committee early in May.

Senator Jesse Helms, Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, introduced his farm bill in the Senate on April 7, including a peanut section similar to the bill reported by the House Agriculture Subcommittee. Deliberation on the Helms' bill and the Administration farm bill are expected to begin in the Senate Agriculture Committee the last week in April and will continue for an extended period. A specific date for Senate Committee action on the peanut section of the farm bill was still pending at press time.

Food Shortage Looms As 'Time Bomb'

COLLEGE STATION—There's a time bomb scheduled to go off in the near future

throughout the entire world—global hunger—and it's just as deadly as any bomb, a national spokesman for the red meat industry said here recently.

Orville K. Sweet of Des Moines, Iowa, said "the threatening time bomb is world food shortages. Some 80 million people are born each year, and another half billion in developing countries are reported starving. This is the only known country where people are fighting to get in, and the reason is our food supply."

In many other coun-

tries, people are fighting to get out, Sweet added.

Sweet addressed the Texas Animal Agriculture Conference's beef and swine short courses.

"Our food production system was developed over a period of the last 60 years because we placed a priority on it and supported research to improve our technology. In the past, one of our biggest problems was living with a surplus food supply. From now on, however, our problems will concern living food shortages. What will we do when our protein source costs as much as caviar?"

Forty years ago, 39 percent of the national budget for research was given to agriculture for production and development of food, Sweet said, while today only 2.2 percent goes for agriculture.

"We are not going to be able to feed the world, but we are going to have to export technology so that people can stay at home and help themselves," declared the executive vice president of the National Pork Producers Council. Sweet is also a rancher and former official of a major purebred beef organization.

"Research on food and nutrition is the key, and we need more money for research," he said.

He suggested that the nation's red meat producers, especially beef and swine, must make their voices heard "in the statehouse and in Washington, because that's where decisions are made. We need to win the battle of the 'soapbox' and convince consumers that our products are safe."

Sweet said "we've used up our reservoir of research, which is the key to preventing global shortages. The American farmer has always been the hero when it comes to food production, and America is the country looked to for a solution to world hunger. We'll need new research breakthroughs if we are able to accomplish this."

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

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

Buying Children's Clothing— A Parent-Child Affair

Make buying children's clothing a parent-child affair, suggests Becky Saunders, a clothing specialist.

Children have definite preferences when it comes to what they wear, so consider their ideas as well as your own, the specialist reminds parents.

Mrs. Saunders, on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, says a recent survey revealed a number of factors that children ages three to five consider important about clothing.

CHILDREN'S VIEWS

Here's what the study found: **COLOR**--Children especially like bright colors, particularly red. Color is one of the most visible and first-seen components of clothing.

TEXTURE--Children like to feel clothing items, and they have a special fondness for

warm, furry garments or slick, shiny surfaces. You can find textures such as these in trimming for children's clothing.

DECORATIVE DETAILS--Favorites are animals and other unique designs.

COMFORT--Here, children say what they don't like: clothes that are too hot or cold for the day's weather, clothes that restrict movement and clothes that irritate the skin.

FAMILIARITY--Children like often-worn garments because they feel secure in them.

This factor can be a source of frustration for parents as some children keep selecting the same items which may be worn out or unattractive, but familiar.

CONFORMITY--Children like to dress as their friends do. At the ages of three or four, children are unaware of sex differences, so they may like to dress like their father, older brother or sister.

NEW CLOTHES--When children do like new clothes, a major reason is the attention that new clothes bring. At this age, they are not always aware of difference between clothing bought or made new. When new to them, the clothes are "new."

PARENT'S VIEWS--Parents have a different view of their children's clothing, the researchers say. here's how parents look at the subject: **Number One Factor--durability.**

Other Factors--costs, comfort, ease of care, child's attitude, and finally, attractiveness--in that order.

Most children are not aware of many of these factors--especially durability, cost or ease of care, of course, the specialist says.

But it is possible to combine the preferences of both parent and child when it comes to shopping for children's clothing, she concludes.

Congressional Comment

House to consider budget resolution

WASHINGTON, D.C.—When Congress reconvenes after the current District Work Period, House members will be called upon to cast one of the most important votes of the year — approval of the first concurrent budget resolution.

In all likelihood, there will be two proposals considered by the full House, the House Budget Committee's (HBC) recommended budget and a bipartisan substitute that has the Administration's approval. I will be supporting the bipartisan plan.

That proposal, I believe, is superior to the budget reported by the HBC in every respect. It encompasses most of the changes that conservative Democrats recommended to the President when we visited the White House earlier this year. It restores full defense funding to the level recommended by the President and it reduces total outlays by \$6.1 billion below the level of the Reagan March 10th budget. It also adds money back for veterans' programs to bring the level of veterans' cuts to the level recommended by the Veterans Committee. Partial funding for the Economic Development Agency and Vocational Education programs are restored, as well.

Following the Budget Committee's approval of their proposal, there have been charges and counter-charges involving whether the Reagan economic assumptions used to formulate his spending plan or the differing House assumptions were

correct. Key issues in those assumptions are the inflation rate and increased economic growth. While members of the HBC staff agreed with Reagan that new tax and spending policies would have positive effects on both areas, the staff forecast was based on an annual inflation rate of 10.4 percent in 1982, compared to Reagan's assumption of 8.3 percent. The committee staff also predicted a slower increase in the gross national product and an interest rate of 12 percent, opposed to the 8.9 percent used to calculate the original Reagan proposal.

Even if the House Committee assumption is correct (and I would concur that it probably is more realistic), I believe that the bottom line would show the bi-partisan proposal cuts deeper into federal spending and its effects on the national economy would be reflected by the depth of those cuts.

The assumptions argument will probably be debated until the year is over and the final results are in. But the HBC proposal has much higher spending levels than the bipartisan counterpart and my continuing commitment is to reduce that spending level.

The final act of this legislative drama will begin April 27 in the Ways and Means Committee, as they begin work on the tax portion of the economic package. When the House finally votes on the tax package, we will have made the first step toward reinvigorating our national economy and slowing inflation.

Pre Measure Before Planting Spring Crops

Before planting spring crops that could be covered under the 1981 farm program, farmers may want to request pre-measurement of their acreages, CED, David W. Martin of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

To help farmers obtain accurate crop acreages, ASCS will stake and measure the land before crop planting time. Farmers are required to plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is measured, and, for full program compliance, certify or report their crop acreages to ASCS after planting.

The measured acreage is guaranteed and farmers who take

advantage of the service will avoid unnecessary worry about the loss of 1981 farm program benefits, Martin said.

Other producer services offered to farmers by the agency include measuring total cropland, field or subdivisions to be planted and land areas for other purposes. Fees vary, based on the type of service rendered.

The ASCS official said pre-measurement is especially useful before planting quota crops such as peanuts. The service also helps producers decide which fields to plant certain crops.

To request pre-measurement, farmers should contact the local ASCS office.

Homemaker's Tips

By Janet Thomas

Non-stick coating for bakeware, top-of-the-range utensils, ovens, and small appliances are popular with many homemakers. The non-stick coatings make clean-up fast and easy. These non-stick coatings may be applied at the factory or at home.

Factory-applied finishes are plastic resins or silicone coatings. They may be clear or covered. Plastic resins coat inside of utensils or appliances. Silicone coatings may be inside or coat all of the utensil.

Common characteristics of both coatings are that they have the ability to release from other materials, they do not conduct electricity, and they are resistant to usual cooking temperatures.

*Plastic resins are fluorocarbons (TFE). Some examples are Teflon and Teflon II, Tuftram, and G.E. Double Non-Stick Coating.

*Silicone coatings cost less to manufacture and can be applied to thin gauge metal. Examples of silicone are General Electric Hardkote, and Dow Corning 800 and Panlon.

CARE OF FACTORY-APPLIED FINISHES - Pre-Testing - New plastic-coated utensils and appliances should be pre-treated in the following manner: Soak off label. Wash

thoroughly. Then rub surfaces with a paper towel soaked in oil. Wash and dry thoroughly. (Do not pretreat angel-food cake pan.)

General Care - After each use, wash thoroughly in hot sudsy water. Do not use abrasive household cleaners or metal scouring pads. Generally, cooked-on food can be removed by use of a plastic scouring pad. Plastic-coated utensils should be hung up or stored in racks to avoid scratching. Waffle grids should be stored with a piece of paper toweling between them.

Metal utensils may be used with care on Teflon II and General Electric Double Non-stick Coatings. Other plastic coatings require special tools. Coated utensils may be washed in the dishwasher; however, this may affect the color and appearance of the utensil.

Stain removal on plastic coated utensils may be done using a commercial cleaner for non-stick coatings. A solution of 1 cup water, 1/2 cup liquid household bleach, and 2 tablespoons of baking soda boiled for 5 minutes in the utensil may be used on Teflon or Teflon II. Some manufacturers do not recommend using household bleach. After the stain removal treatment,

pre-treat with oil before using.

Repair of plastic-coated utensils may be done with a liquid scratch-repair solution or spray-on coatings. For the best results, follow the directions on the container.

HOME-APPLIED FINISHES are available for the homemaker who wants to apply a non-stick coating to cookware or ovens. These are aerosol-spray coatings and are not permanent (one product claims to last about 2 months). For best results, apply as directed on container. Examples of products are Pan-Shield, Ovengard, and Magic Spray Coat.

A vegetable spray-on coating can be put on cookware to make it non-stick. Apply while the utensil is cool and each time the utensil is used. This is also good for spraying on barbecue racks to make them easy to clean. An example is Pam.

The Extension bulletin B-1348 **Care of Housewares and Surfaces in the Home** is an excellent publication available free from the local Extension Service office. This publication has directions for cleaning everything from ceramic, marble, bricks, brass, to crystal glassware.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

A new recipe of mine that we tried recently is for **Spinach Casserole**. We thought

it was delicious with ham. The Italian bread crumbs really give the casserole a special taste, so don't delete or substitute these!

Spinach Casserole
4 boxes frozen, chopped spinach
2 sticks butter
2/3 cup Italian bread crumbs
8 ounce cream cheese
1 can artichoke hearts
Drain spinach and add chopped up cream cheese to hot spinach. Melt all but 1/3 cup butter and add to spinach. Butter bottom of pyrex dish and place artichoke hearts on bottom. Cut artichoke hearts in fourths. Add spinach mixture. Melt reserved 1/3 cup butter and mix with 2/3 cup bread crumbs. Sprinkle on spinach. Bake about 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

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GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

The fruit trees are loaded with small fruit. This will be the year when fruit thinning will be very important. We have seen some trees that have ten times more fruit than is needed on the tree. If unthinned, the fruit will be small and may cause a lot of limb breakage.

It takes 191 peaches of 1 1/4 inch diameter to make a half a bushel and only 79 peaches of 2 1/2 inch diameter to make the same half bushel.

Peaches and plums should be thinned while the fruit is still as small as a dime. Fruit should be thinned until all small peaches at 4 to 6 inches apart and there are no side by side fruit. Plums should be thinned to 3 to 4 inches apart.

The small fruit can be removed by hand thinning or limb beating. Some people use rubber hose at the end of a broom handle. The rubber hose will not injure the limb.

Now is the time to fertilize lawns in the area. The proper fertilizer applied at the proper rate will get our summer grasses off to a good start and help

the grass fill in any bare spots or areas that were killed during the winter.

The three numbers on the fertilizer bag represents the percentages of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in the bag.

A soil test will indicate the correct fertilizer for your lawn. In the absence of a soil test, a fertilizer with a 1-1-1, 2-1-1 or 3-1-2 ratio should be applied. Some examples of these are 13-13-13, 12-6-6 and 15-5-10.

The first number or percentage of nitrogen in the fertilizer will determine the amount of that fertilizer that should be applied to your lawn for each application. If the fertilizer contains 12% nitrogen then it should be applied at a rate of about 8 pounds per 1000 square feet. If it is 15% nitrogen - 7 pounds per 1000 square feet. These rates are designed to apply 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet to a lawn in fairly good condition. If the lawn is in poor condition, the rates could be slightly higher or the fertilizer may be applied more frequently.

For St. Augustine and tall fescue lawns, the fertilizer should be applied in mid-April, again in first part of June and the last application is in September. Use the same dates for bermudagrass, but you may add a mid-July application.

Peanut growers who want to obtain Federal Crop Insurance on their 1981 peanut crop have until April 30 to get the insurance.

Several agencies are selling the crop insurance. One of the salesman will be at the Production Credit Association office in Eastland, April 21, from 9 until 11 a.m.
