Nothing can be done about this years show, but I do hope next year Rising Star shines a little brighter than it did this year.

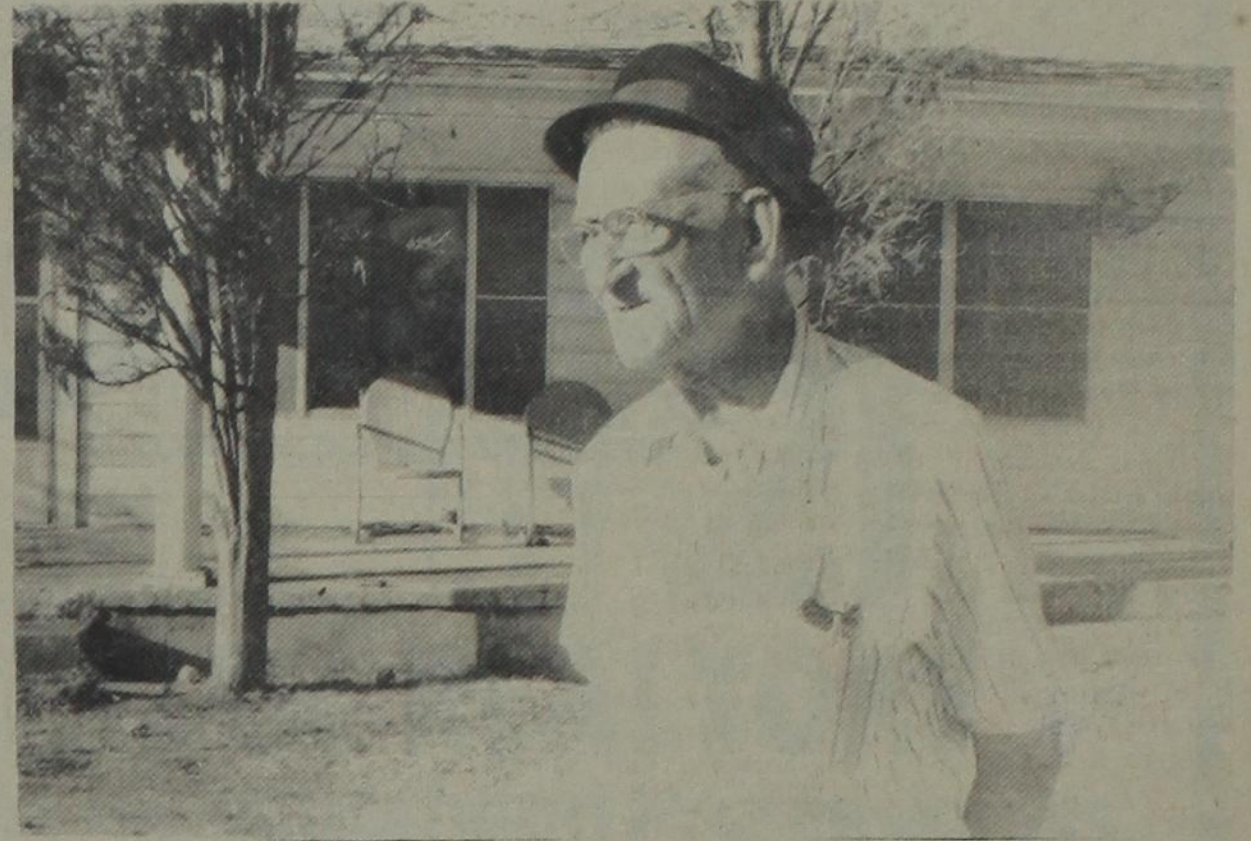

H.H. (Hayman) Lawson



If you want to sit back and enjoy visiting with a very intelligent and interesting person---H.H. Hayman Lawson is the man to see. As he sits back from his typewriter, usually occupied with a tax return these days, he can take you from your own world to one of the many countries he has visited. It is only within the last ten years or so that he has begun his travels, but each place he has visited holds special memories for Hayman. The countries he has visited are Israel, Peru and Ecuador. And as you sit and visit, he can tell you of his upcoming trip to Switzerland in June. It will feature side-trips to Italy, Austria and Germany. Most of the excursions are arranged through the Scottish Rite Bodies of Texas or the Masonic Rites. They usually are gone from eight to ten days. Another joy for the 80 year old Lawson, is meeting the different people on the tours. Many of these people still keep in touch with him today and plan to visit him sometime again. A special memory for Hayman was on a trip to

Quito, Ecuador. He had adjoined to his room in the hotel when he found a basket piled high with fresh fruit and cakes presented to him by the manager in congratulatory wishes of his 50th year as a Mason. He is one of the very few men in the state of Texas to attain such a fete.

During his tenure as a Mason, Lawson has held the post of District Deputy Grand Master and District Deputy of the Royal Arch. He finds his work with the Masonic Lodge very enjoyable and if you ask his special favorite, he answers with a grin. "They feeds."

Mr. Lawson was born December 6, 1898 in Arkansas. He moved with his family to the Rising Star community at the age of 2. He attended school at Williams and later graduated from Rising Star.

In 1919, he attended Midland College for one year. He then went to work for Humble Oil Company, for whom he gauged and did field work traveling all over the state of Texas. This kept him busy for 15 years. But

the call of farming and ranching which was instilled in him at an early age, surfaced again and brought him back to Rising Star where he farmed and raised cattle. In addition to this, Lawson also began tax preparations and was also a bookkeeper for various individuals. Today he still keeps books for Robert Butler and prepares from 90 to 110 tax forms per year. "some of these forms take a long time to fix", he says, and then chuckles as he says, "Lucy Boase once said--You must be a nut to do them and if you aren't when you start--you will be when you finish."

When asked about his life here he says, "It's been a pretty good life--I like the community, town and the people--they are my friends."

Mr. Lawson enjoys each day and whatever it brings with it--especially visiting with his friends.

Lawson has two brothers; Robert who lives in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and Edgar who lives in Gilmer.

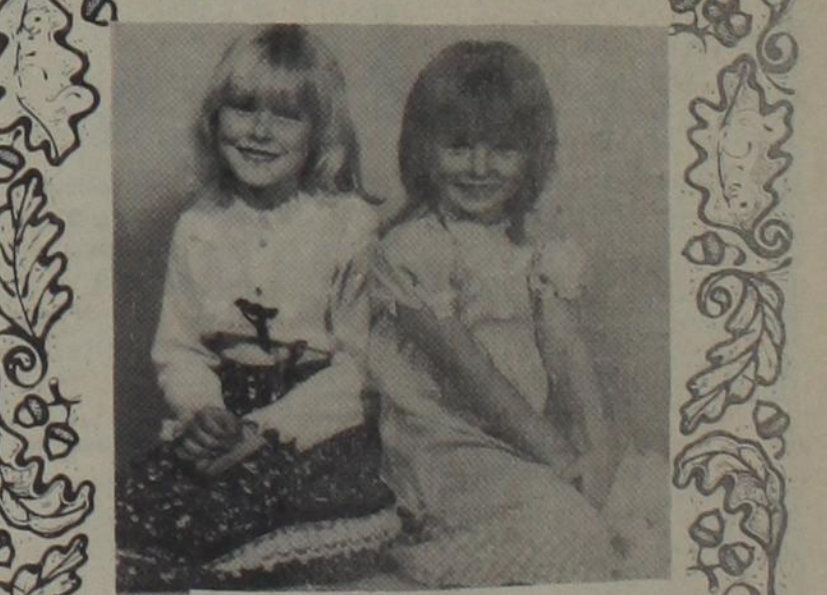

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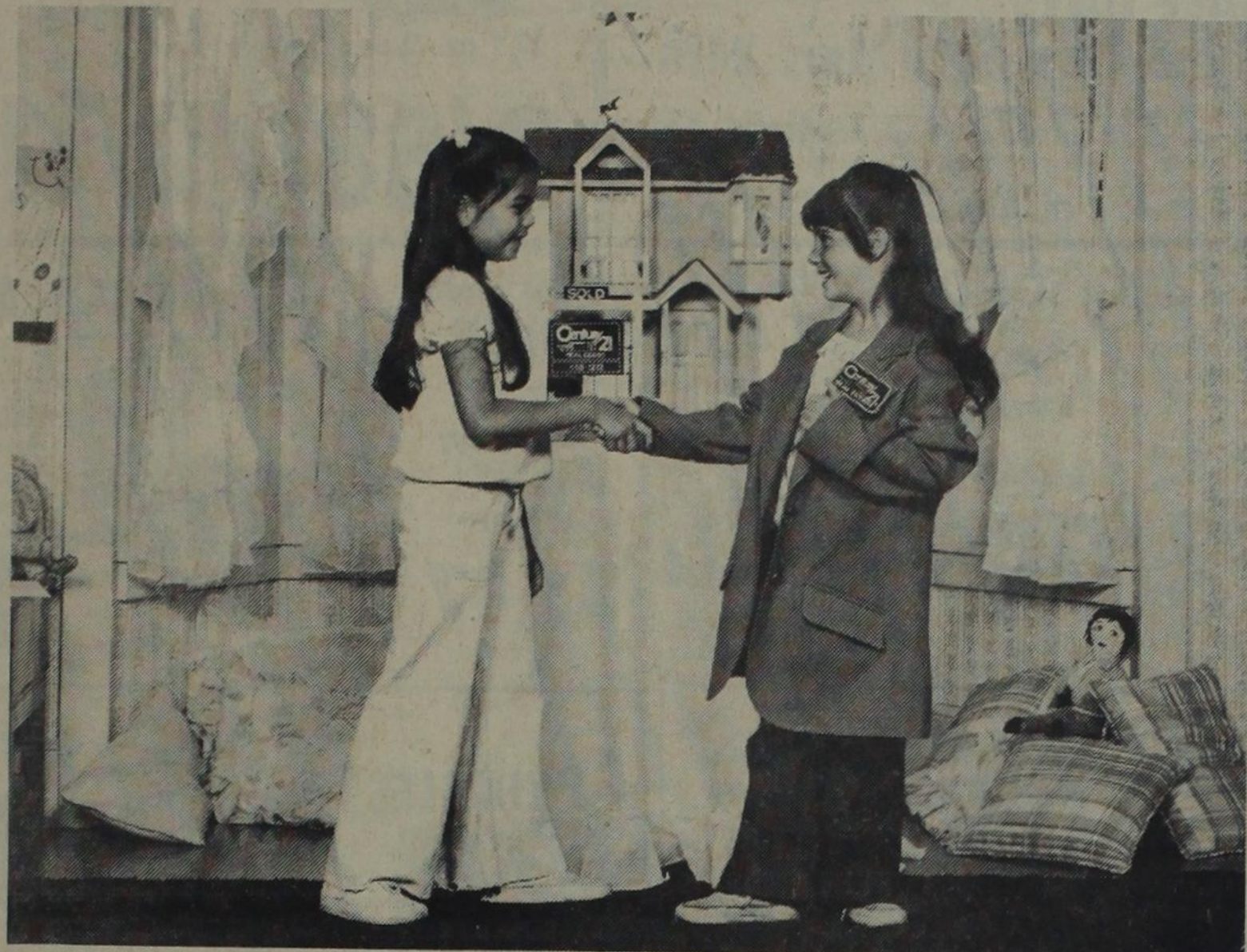

COMMENTARY

From the dying figure of the Son of God as He hung forsaken on a wooden cross, sang out a plea of such compassion such as the world had never heard... "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." He had taught His disciples to pray in this fashion in the perfect prayer when He had said, "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against." On the cross He was following His own teaching. FORGIVE...blessed word, proof of a Christlike heart. FORGIVE...following in the footsteps of the Master. If men would only learn the meaning of this tender word, war would be outlawed, murder would become only a memory, hatred would forever be banished from the earth and men would live in peace. There would be no more broken hearts. Schisms in the church would have their remembrance only in history. FORGIVE...and the prodigal could once again return to his father's house. FORGIVE...and the wayward daughter could find her way out of the gutter back to the mother's arms. FORGIVE...and the divided house could gather once again in an unbroken circle. When the disciples asked Jesus how many times they should forgive, He gave them this generous standard of behavior...until seventy times seven. Yet how many times has the testimony of the church been besmirched by those who refuse to forgive even once; yet profess to be followers of Christ. How many of our young people have been driven from the fold by an unforgiving spirit on the part of their elders who condemn rather than offer them counsel and love. Jesus said, "How can ye love the Father whom ye

have not seen, when ye love not your brother whom ye have seen?...Judge not, that ye may not be judged, for with the judgement ye judge, ye shall be judged. And with the measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." What a warning this should be to those who are so quick to pass judgement and so tardy in forgiving.

They are sounding the death knell to their own hopes of heaven and reward. The world will never be evangelized by bitter hearted people who trample under foot the flowers in the garden of God. The drunkard, the harlot and the prodigal will never be delivered by those who judge them, but by those who live them for Jesus' sake. No one can be a child of God and harbor an unforgiving spirit in their heart. Yet in so many churches there have been feuds and vendettas that have been going on for years, and those who are guilty find no answer to their pleas and prayers, nor do they find any escape from their many trials and tribulation. When the flower of forgiveness fades and dies in the human heart, then we have lost the very essence of the gospel of Jesus Christ. His was a ministry of Mercy and its keynote was, "Neither do I condemn thee." So Faithfully and vigorously did He pursue that ministry that He was accused of consorting with the harlots and the winebibbers. How quickly they had forgotten what He had so often said, He had not come to minister to the well, but to the sick. And how quickly have we of today forgotten the true mission of the church...to bring hope to the hopeless, help to the helpless, life to the lifeless. Ours was to be the "GO YE" type of ministry and not to sit complacently in our select circle and condemn those who are not as fortunate or as far advanced spiritually as we. We are not to be couriers of condemnation, but ministers of mercy.

Some years ago I picked up a Bible I found after the morning service. I opened the fly leaf of the Bible and found that it belonged to one of the youth of the church. I read these words, "A guilty conscience dreads the presence of God."

I am convinced from my experience as a pastor the reason so many people drop out of a church fellowship and active christian service is a guilty conscience. Having committed some sin of which they are ashamed a guilty conscience becomes a barrier to fellowship with both God and fellow christians.

A person at unrest within is as a troubled sea when it cannot rest or as a person being destroyed with a cancerous growth.

"I will hear what God, the Lord, will speak; for he will speak peace unto his people, and to his saints; but let them not turn again to follow." (Psalm 85:8)

For the christian, peace with God comes this way:

First, confess the sin to God. The word confess means "to say the same thing". When we confess our sins we will say something like this, "God you said this is sin, it is wrong. I have committed this sin. I agree with you it is wrong and I have sinned in doing it. I ask for cleansing." I must recognize the sin and confess it to God. (1 John 1:9)

Secondly, forsake the practice of the sin just confessed. Put it out of the life, stop doing what we know is wrong.

It is a relief to mind and soul to know that we are right with God and being right with God we can be right with those about us. Guilt is a terrible burden under which to exist. Peace is a beautiful experience in which to live.

After the meal, Jesus took off his outer garments, took a towel, a water basin, and washed their feet after the manner of a slave. This is a picture of Jesus' basic attitude toward life, "He made himself of no reputation and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of man." "All the way from Bethlehem to the Cross it was the same, Jesus giving himself for the good of others. Jesus took a towel. We have here a picture of what the church ought to wash one another's feet.

For I have given you an example that ye should do as I have done to you. Verily, verily I say unto you, the servant is not greater than his Lord. Neither he that is sent greater than he that sent him. "John 13: 14-16" Can there be any doubt that Jesus tells us that the mission of the church is a more relevant symbol of the Christian life than the cross. Perhaps at times we use the word "cross" too lightly. We use it sometimes to describe a sickness or sorrow that millions of others have suffered as well. Only one person died on a cross for your sins and mine, Jesus Christ. The hymn writer of old asked the question, "Must Jesus bear the cross alone and all the world go free. No, there's a cross for everyone and there's a cross for me." I'm not sure there is a cross for everyone. Some folks seem to get along quite well without a cross, but I am sure that their is a towel for everyone who trusts in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. Jesus took a towel. "The servant is not greater than his Lord. It was the way the master went, should not the servant treat it still. May you respond to God's many blessings is my prayer. Bill Easley Pastor

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 7, 1979, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District 2 members for 3 years terms and one for 1 year term.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names

placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered at City hall

Building, in Rising Star, Texas, in said School District, with E. L. Gains as Presiding Judge and Mary Claborn and Elizabeth Robertson, Clerks.

(b) In election precincts numbered at Building, in Texas, in said School District, with as Presiding Judge and, Clerks.

NOTE: If additional polling places are necessary, follow the above form for each additional polling place and insert here.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8 o'clock a.m. to 7 o'clock p.m.

4. Rowena Chambers is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall, Rising Star, Texas within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at

least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. 
