Temperature Drops To 6 Degrees Here

Rising Star, with the rest of the country, shivered over the week end in the coldest weather to strike this section in 20 years.

According to the recording thermometer at the City Hall, the temperature plummeted to six degrees above zero, Sunday. The cold wave continued severe over Monday when the reading was eight degrees above.

The freeze, made even more severe by clear, dry weather caught most of the community unprepared, and did much damage to water lines. The city's gas supply was strained to meet the demand, some sections of the city suffering a shortage for part of the time. Public schools dismissed Monday because of bad attendance conditions.

On the credit side of the ledger was the probability that a great part of the insect population, increased by many seasons of comparatively mild weather, was killed.

But whatever benefits may result, they cannot offset the fact that the country is seriously in need of moisture. The dry, pleasant fall weather, a boon to the peanut harvest, did nothing to restore the moisture content of the soil and improve grain crops and pastures. A prime reason for the good peanut crop last year was the moisture received during the heavy snow and rains of last fall. Good winter rains are needed now, farmers say, if there is to be a chance for good crops next summer.

Lone Star To Test New Formations Stroebel Wildcat

Cisco - Lone Star Producing Co. plans to test new formations in their No. 1 Clarence Stroebel, wildcat oil test some nine miles south of Cisco, according to information here today. Drilled to the Ellenburger several weeks ago, the well has been testing various formations in an effort to complete a producer.

Lone Star officials reported that soon after January 1 they would shoot an upper formation for thorough tests.

Eight miles northeast of Cisco, Magnolia Petroleum Company recently staked their No. 1 First National Bank of Fort Worth, trustee, as a 4,200 foot rotary project. This would be an Ellenburger test. Location was given as 330 feet from the north and 1,555 feet from the west lines of Section 69, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

A project of interest here was recently announced by Teagle and Watson et al, San Antonio, to re-enter and deepen an old test five miles southeast of Nimrod. The well was Corvete Corporation's No. 1 Ben Williams, located 4,731 feet from the south and 5,730 feet from the east lines of the Mary Ann Clark survey.

Corvette drilled the well to 2,654 feet last May to test the Caddo lime. Teagle and Watson plan to deepen to 3,700 feet to test all formations to and including the Ellenburger, it was reported here.

Near Pioneer in south Eastland County, L. A. Warren et al, Abilene, have staked their No. 1 B. B. Hickman as a wildcat oil test. Location was in Section 18, Block 2, T&P Railway Survey.

New Billing Process Installed By Kizer

The Kizer Telephone Company has installed a new billing process known as machine billing. The new type of bill was received by subscribers of the company on January 1, 1959. The new bill form was designed for compactness and legibility, and the new method allows better and more accurate bills to be made in considerably less time than under the old system.

With the addition of new telephone lines and new areas of service, billing has become a major problem, said Ralph Kizer. The company now bills about 1,200 subscribers and handles 5,000 toll tickets each month. Machine billing is accomplished by two main machines - one of which imprints the name and address on each bill while the other prints and automatically totals the charges. The machine which totals the bills also gives a grand total of all bills at the end of the billing period.

This advancement was made possible by the REA loan program to the Kizer Company, which is locally owned and managed.

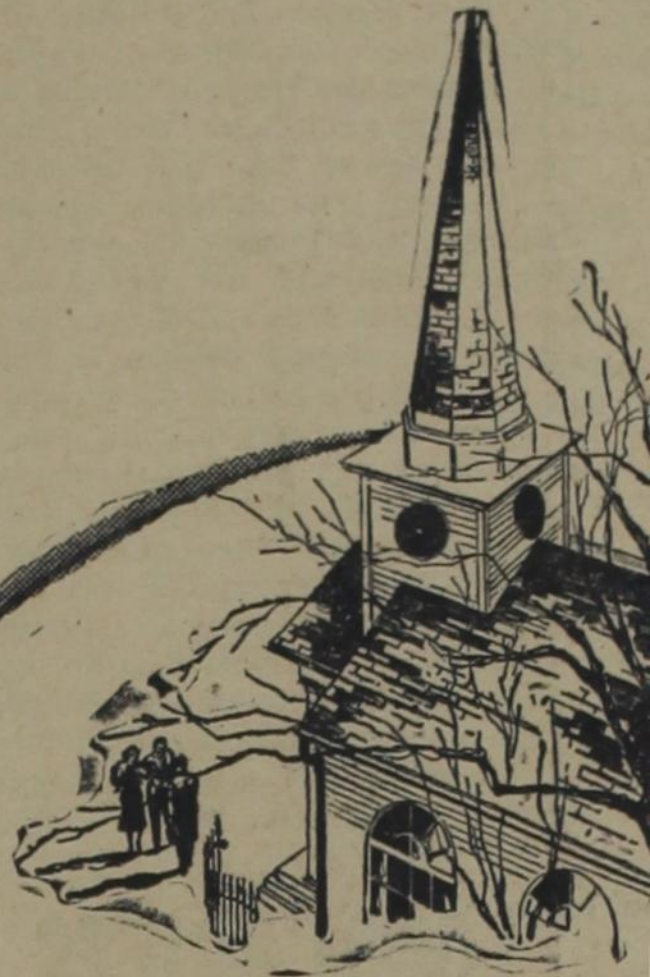

Irrigation Is Profitable in Peanut Growing

College Station - Five years of experience in the West Cross Timbers area of Texas showed that wells of low capacity, 25 to 120 gallons per minute, can be used profitably in the production of irrigated peanuts.

From 1953-57, yields of peanuts on irrigated land averaged 34 bushels per acre compared with an average dryland yield of 14 bushels per acre - a net difference of 20 bushels in favor of the irrigated peanuts. Irrigation also improved the quality of peanuts produced, particularly during the dry years of 1954 and 1956. Irrigation increased hay yields about 20 bales per acre.

The small heads of water combined with the types of equipment needed result in an irrigation development cost ranging from \$146 to \$301 per acre irrigated on individual farms. Costs

for irrigation water averaged \$5.09 per acre-inch, or \$63 per acre.

The cost of labor for irrigation and other costs associated with irrigation ranged from \$10.04 to \$13.66 per acre for the 5-year period. The average total cost of irrigation including operating and overhead ranged from \$37.96 to \$63.34 per acre on the five individual farms studied and averaged \$46.64 per acre for all farms.

The 5-year average net return from irrigated peanut production on individual farms ranged from \$39.65 to \$59.64 per acre but differed considerably among farms and on the same farm in different years. The lowest net return was \$10.25 per acre and the highest was \$196.40 per acre.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released a bulletin giving a complete summary of the study. It is entitled "Costs and Returns of Irrigated Peanut Production, West Cross Timbers, 1953-57." It is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for Bulletin 917.

Drop in Farm Population Is Reversed in '57-'58

College Station - The sharp decline in Texas farm population which occurred in 1956-57 does not appear to have continued during 1957-58, reports R. L. Skrabanek, professor, Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, Texas A & M College.

Skrabanek attributes this temporary reversal partly to the economic recession which tended to retard movement from farms because of a drop in the number of off-farm job opportunities. He said there also is some evidence that the recession caused the return of some workers to farm areas.

The 1958 farm population figure of 1,052,000 represents a decline of 335,000, or 24 percent, from the estimated farm population in 1950. It represents an increase of 34,000 from the 1957 estimate of 1,018,000.

As Texas' total population continues to grow, the proportion of farm population to the total population continues to decline. In April, 1958, farm residents comprised 11.3 percent of the total population, as compared to 17.9 percent in 1950.

This decline represents a continuation of a long-time trend. In 1910, about three of every five persons in Texas resided on a farm. The proportion living on farms continued to fall during intervening years, interrupted only during depression years and brief periods since World War II.

U. S. farm population in April, 1958 was 20,827,000. The proportion of the nation's farm population living in Texas remains relatively the same. In 1957 about 4.99 of every 100 farm people in the nation resided in Texas. In

Fish do not require the attention livestock do, but they should be fed. For information on fish pond management, check with the Soil Conservation Service technicians.

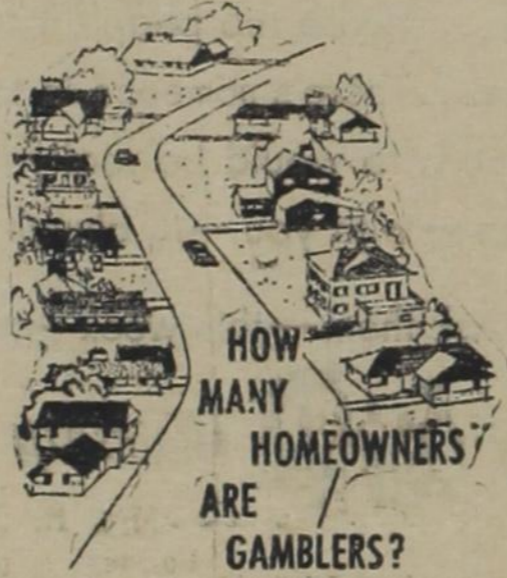

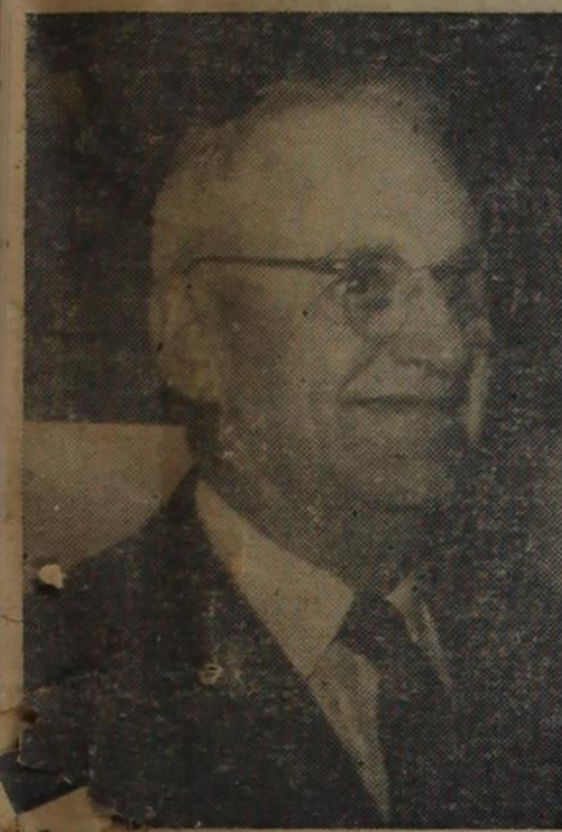

Temperature Drops To 6 Degrees Here

Rising Star, with the rest of the country, shivered over the week end in the coldest weather to strike this section in 20 years.

According to the recording thermometer at the City Hall, the temperature plummeted to six degrees above zero, Sunday. The cold wave continued severe over Monday when the reading was eight degrees above.

The freeze, made even more severe by clear, dry weather caught most of the community unprepared, and did much damage to water lines. The city's gas supply was strained to meet the demand, some sections of the city suffering a shortage for part of the time. Public schools dismissed Monday because of bad attendance conditions.

On the credit side of the ledger was the probability that a great part of the insect population, increased by many seasons of comparatively mild weather, was killed.

But whatever benefits may result, they cannot offset the fact that the country is seriously in need of moisture. The dry, pleasant fall weather, a boon to the peanut harvest, did nothing to restore the moisture content of the soil and improve grain crops and pastures. A prime reason for the good peanut crop last year was the moisture received during the heavy snow and rains of last fall. Good winter rains are needed now, farmers say, if there is to be a chance for good crops next summer.

Lone Star To Test New Formations Stroebel Wildcat

Cisco - Lone Star Producing Co. plans to test new formations in their No. 1 Clarence Stroebel, wildcat oil test some nine miles south of Cisco, according to information here today. Drilled to the Ellenburger several weeks ago, the well has been testing various formations in an effort to complete a producer.

Lone Star officials reported that soon after January 1 they would shoot an upper formation for thorough tests.

Eight miles northeast of Cisco, Magnolia Petroleum Company recently staked their No. 1 First National Bank of Fort Worth, trustee, as a 4,200 foot rotary project. This would be an Ellenburger test. Location was given as 330 feet from the north and 1,555 feet from the west lines of Section 69, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

A project of interest here was recently announced by Teagle and Watson et al, San Antonio, to re-enter and deepen an old test five miles southeast of Nimrod. The well was Corvete Corporation's No. 1 Ben Williams, located 4,731 feet from the south and 5,730 feet from the east lines of the Mary Ann Clark survey.

Corvete drilled the well to 2,654 feet last May to test the Caddo lime. Teagle and Watson plan to deepen to 3,700 feet to test all formations and including the Ellenburger, it was reported here.

Near Pioneer in south Eastland County, L. A. Warren et al, Abilene, have staked their No. 1 B. B. Hickman as a wildcat oil test. Location was in Section 18, Block 2, T&P Railway Survey.

January 31 Important Time For Farmers Employing Help; Must Report Wages

An important date for farm operators to remember is January 31, 1959. On or before that time, employers of farm help must report the amount of cash wages paid farm workers during 1958 to the District Director of the Department of Internal Revenue. This statement applies to all farmers who employ farm workers whose work meets the definition of Agricultural Labor, as defined by the social security law. To determine if your farm worker is covered by the social security law there are three (3) tests which can be applied.

Test No. 1 includes all agricultural workers who are paid \$150 or more in cash wages during 1958. In determining if the \$150 a year test is met, all cash wages must be included regardless of whether paid on a time, piece-work, or other basis.

Test No. 2 includes those workers who perform agricultural labor for one employer on 20 or more days during the year for an amount computed on a time basis. The time basis may be by the hour, day, week, etc. (In determining if this test is met, count only the days on which the employee worked for cash pay, computed on a time basis. However, if the 20-day-year test is met, all cash wages paid during the year, whether on a time, piecework, or other basis, are subject to social security tax).

The third test concerns domestic service in the private home of an employer. If the service is performed on a farm operated for profit, the domestic employee is considered an agricultural worker and must meet either test No. 1, or test No. 2.

If your agricultural worker meets any one of the three tests, your yearly report showing the worker's name, social security account number, and amount of cash wages paid during 1958 must be submitted by January 31, 1959, to the District Director of Internal Revenue. The report should be made on Treasury Department Form 943 and can be obtained upon application from the Internal Revenue Service. This form requires that the social security tax of 4 1/2% of all wages paid for 1958 up to a total of \$4200 in the year for an individual employee accompany the report (2 1/4% should have been deducted from the employee's wages and 2 1/4% is to be paid by the employer.) The employer may pay the total tax of 4 1/2% regardless of whether or not the 2 1/4% is deducted from the employee's wages. To facilitate accurate reporting, the employers should keep records showing the employee's name, social security number, number of days worked, cash paid, and the amount deducted as tax from the worker's wages.

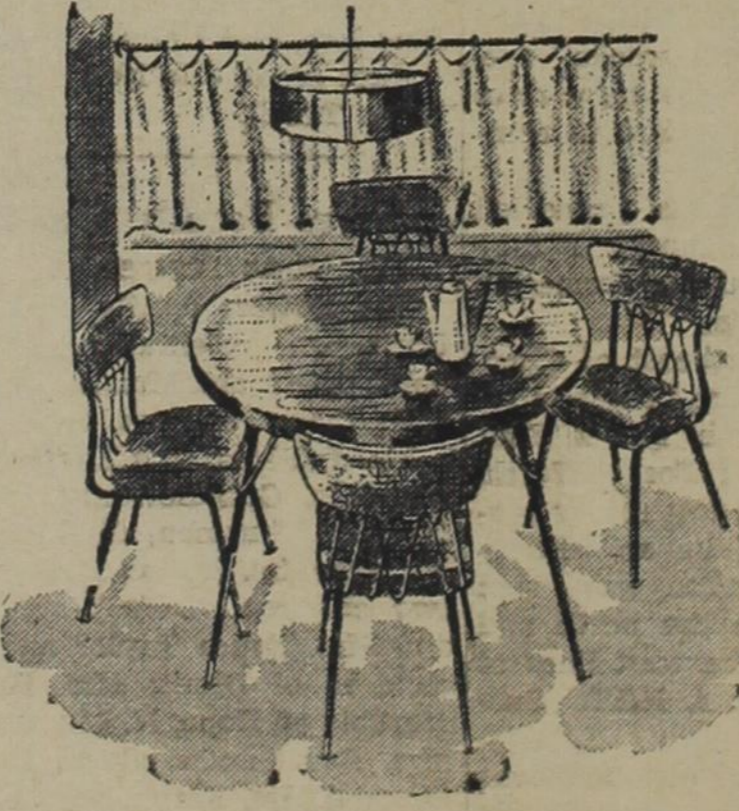

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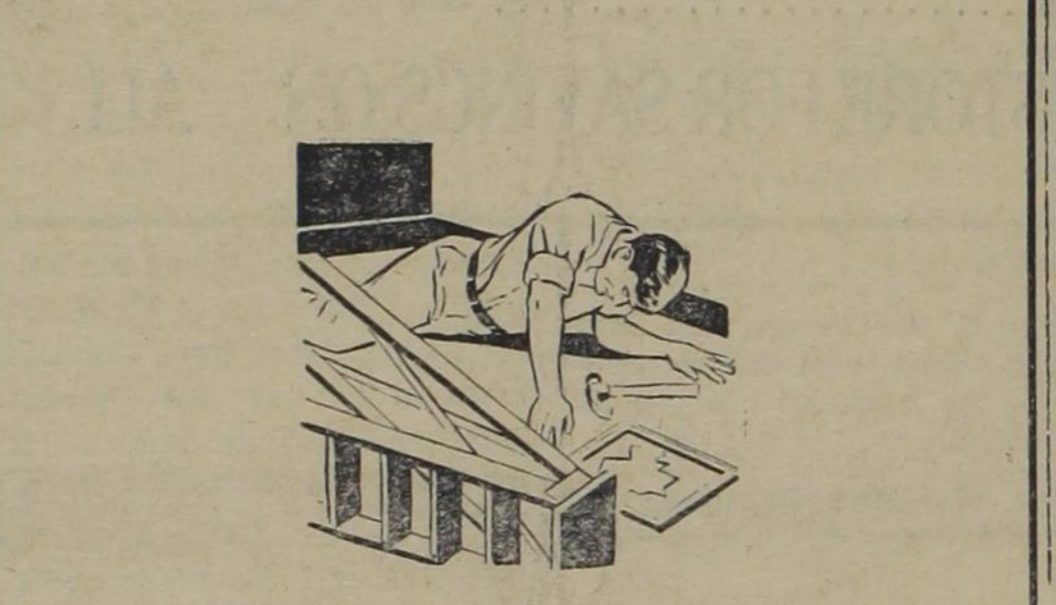
