

Education Money

We should have known that some kind of a change in school financing would finally come out of Austin. For years there have been rumblings of discontent from various quarters. Some people even put forth the suggestion that the whole system of taxing property to finance education was unconstitutional.

Yet the Texas Supreme Court ruling last October in the Edgewood vs. Kirby case still sent shock waves through the state. This was a case of a poor district with low local tax resources asking for "equalization" in funding.

The ruling stated that Texas' state-local school finance system is not "an efficient system," and violates the Texas Constitution. This was a unanimous finding of the nine State Justices. State district court Judge Clark's injunction preventing state officials fro disbursing state funds to local districts was stayed until May 1, 1990.

Comments from the Court were interesting; "We do not now instruct the legislature as to the specifics of the legislation it should enact; nor do we order it to raise taxes,: the court stated. "The amount of money spent on a student's education has a real and meaningful impact on the educational opportunity offered that student....There must be a direct and close sorrelation between a district's tax effort and the educational resources available to it; in other words, districts must have substantially equal access to similar revenues per pupil at similar levels of tax effort." The court said "...any local enrichment must derive solely from local tax effort."

Continuing in that vein, the Court had other comments.

"The legislature's recent efforts have focused primarily on increasing the state's contributions. More money allocated under the present system would reduce some of the existing disparities between districts but would at best only postpone the reform that is necessary to make the system efficient. A band-aid will not suffice; the system itself must be changed."



Oak Wilt Prevention **Discovery Announced**

COLLEGE STATION— Plant doctors soon may be giving trees shots to immunize them against the deadly fungus that causes oak wilt.

Dr. David Appel, plant pathologist at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, announced Wednesday that injections of a new fungicide has proven in three years of research to prevent, and in some cases stop, oak wilt.

"As a preventative, it is most promising. It has potential as a therapeutic," Appel said, "but it would be an overstatement to say it is a cure."

Ciba-Geigy, the chemical's manufacturer, plans to release the product to arborists in April or May, according to company spokesman Ray Smith of College Station. The product already is labeled for other uses, but Ciba-Geigy is working through the Texas Department of Agriculture to obtain a 24-C, or local need label which would allow the treatment of the state's oak trees. A new name for the product also must meet federal approval, Smith said.

Oak wilt is a fungus disease that enters the tree's vascular system blocking the flow of water and nutrients. The disease sneaks into the tree either underground through roots shared by an infected tree, or by funguscontaminted insects which land on open wounds or pruning cuts on healthy trees.

incidence of oak wilt, but the disease has been diagnosed in many other states, Smith noted. Ciba-Geigy is pursuing a full, federal label.

Researchers have been seeking a solution to the Texas oak wilt problem since the mid-1970s when the disease was first diagnosed in the

"Millions of trees have been lost in Texas," Appel said. "Some of those trees are worth tens of thousands of dollars each."

He said economic impact studies at Texas A&M have shown that property values in Austin can plummet by 13-19 percent when oak trees in the landscape die.

Early fungicides were not effective, the plant pathologist said, because they did not move far enough through the tree's vascular system.

"This product distributes better in the tree, and the fungus is more sensitive to it," Appel said. "It also is less toxic to the tree and user."

The new fungicide is derived from a new chemical class, a triazole or demethylation inhibitor, meaning it doesn't allow the formation of cell membrane, thus preventing the fungus from

Appel's tests have involved about 140 trees, ranging in age from 30-200 years, in plots from Fort Worth to Bandera in Central Texas.

"We treated trees at very high risk — immediately adjacent to diseased trees,"

Appel said. " Some are in ranges, and some are in front lawns."

The scientist said the studies proved that if trees are injected before the fungus begins infecting, the disease is prevented.

"If fungus already is in the tree, it appears promising as a therapeutic if we catch it early," Appel said. "It will not bring the tree back to what it was before infection, but it will stop the disease from doing more damage."

The product will not cure trees with severe infections, however, Appel stressed.

Appel's research now will focus on defining minimum application rates, the number of treatments needed in the tree's life, and the persistence of the fungus in the tree.

"These treatments need to hold up for 5-7 years before the trees are out of danger," he said. "The fungus may challenge the tree for that long, but if it can't establish, the fungus will move on the next time."

Appel said stopping oak wilt will save one of the state's most treasured natural resources.

"People get emotionally attached to their trees," he said. "The tree is one thing that lasts as long as we do or longer. In some very harsh country, the live oak has survived and provided an awful lot to humans without asking to much in return."


Morality and immorality are habits that are taught. If we expect our children to grow-up with clean morals, we must set good standards.



Mammography Unit Will Be in Rising Star

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, which services Rising Star is certified by the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an X-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff quailifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accredication must be renewed every three vears.

The accredication program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

According to the American Cancer Sociey, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated
