County Commissioners Discuss EMS and Many Other Important Items

Emergency Medical Services was one of the main topics at the County Commissioners Court meeting Monday.

County Judge Scott Bailey brought a letter to a Court from Eastland Memorial Hospital Administrator Marcia Carr stating that ambulance service from the hospital would end if the county-city subsidy ends Sept. 30.

Along with the letter was a copy of the proposed 1991-92 budget for basic emergency medical services. But the Commissioners were asked to take notice that the budget was based on the assumption that subsidies would continue.

"As you know," the letter continued, "Eastland County has tendered their notice of termination under the present contract. This termination becomes effective Sept. 30, 1991...."

"Therefore, as Eastland Memorial Hospital will have no ambulances, please be advised that effective 12 p.m. Sept. 30, 1991 Eastland Memorial Hospital will no longer be providing Emergency Medical Services.

"If it is Eastland County's desire to have Eastland Memorial Hospital continue the Emergency Medical Service after that date, please advise us on or before Sept. 1, 1991."

She went on to say that the Hospital would be willing to provide the services under the same terms and conditions as the present contract until such time as other arrangements can be made by the city, county or both.

Included in the arrangements referred to is that two fully equipped Emergency Service vehicles are provided at no cost to Eastland Memorial Hospital to operate, and collision and liability insurance is provided for the EMS at no cost to Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Subsidies on operation are provided by the City or Eastland and the county, with the county's share around \$25,000 annually. An equal Emergency Medical Service subsidy is provided to the other three Precincts in the county.

Some weeks ago the Commissioners Court stated that the county is using up its reserves and can no longer subsidize ambulances or other Emergency Services.

In discussing the letter, Comm. Richard Robinson said: "We started this, knowing we couldn't keep on forever. We were hoping they would see the value of it—they are definitely making money."

The Commissioners

said it might be possible to work out Emergency Medical Services with surrounding towns, with some arrangement where Cisco and Ranger Ambulances could cover Eastland.

Robinson said that County and Eastland City Commissioners are invited to a meeting at Eastland Memorial Hospital at 10:30 a.m. July 19. The Emergency Medical situation is expected to be reviewed at that time. Robinson said he planned to attend, but did not indicate much hope of a solution.

The proposed Ambulance Service budget submitted by Eastland Hospital to the Commissioners estimated total expenses for 1991-92 as \$123,203 and collections at \$109,754, showing a loss of \$13,449.

The budget also estimated calls at 2.2 per day, 66.9 per month, and 803 annually. The estimated charge per call would be \$201.

On a related subject, County Judge Scott Bailey reported that some petitions calling for an election for a county-wide Ambulance Service Taxing District had come into his office.

But there are only 65 verifiable signatures so far, the Judge said, and it takes 200. There are other petitions out circulating, but they have not been turned in early enough to meet the deadline for the August 10 election.

The Commissioners were told that the next possible date citizens could vote on whether to subsidize the Ambulance Service with taxes will be in November.

Although County Commissioners spent much of their time Monday discussing Emergency Medical Services, a number of other important topics

were also on the Agenda. There were budget requests and various reports on county affairs.

Sitting in the Court for Pct. 3 Commissioner L.T. Owen was Quintin Wright of Groman, Mr. Owen's foreman. Owen, who had heart-by-pass surgery last week, was reported to be improving rapidly at an Abilene hospital. "He is getting so restless you can't find him in his room," one visitor said.

County Judge Scott Bailey said he would like to wait on budget hearings until Owen is back at his post in the Court. The next fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

The Commissioners re-appointed Saul Pullman, Eastland attorney, as a Board member for the Central Texas MHMR Center.

Also appointed were a number of election judges to serve August 10 in voting Precincts of the county. These names will be published in the local newspapers.

Commissioner of Precinct 4 Reggie Pittman reported that last Saturday's auction at Cisco of surplus items brought in about \$10,000. The Commissioners who attended said that the crowd was not very large but that the people who did come really meant business. Items ranging from county equipment to outmoded typewriters were sold.

On another matter, Pittman reported that 19 prisoners were currently in the County Jail. This included one for another county, six for TDC, two on 'Blue' warrants, nine being held on pre-trial, and one inmate from the city.

Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth reported to the Court that

lunkers, unless your planning to put one on the wall. And even then a fiberglass replica will last you a lot longer and most even look better.

If you will watch your depth finder you will see most of the bait fish seem to be at this depth. Leons channel cats are biting on nightcrawler and cut shad. Perch fishing is great also so load the kids up and let them have it.

Eastland lake is turning out a few channels itself on grasshoppers. Bass fishing is fair on dark worms, shallow.

Lake Brownwood Crappie anglers are still catching nice limits with live minnows in main lake

brushpiles. The hybrid strippers are fair using 1 ounce white hair jigs during the day and on slug-go's at daylight and dark. Black bass fishing has been slow with a few fish coming on crankbait, and jigs in red colors.

Lake Proctor still seems to be healing slowly after last year's near disastrous flood. Crappie are fair in the main lake point brushpiles. Black bass are good to four pounds on jigs in 3 feet of water, black and white seem to be the best colors. The catfishing at night is picking up on live shad drift fishing in the dam area.

A simply summer time worming trick that has produced a few fish. Take any worm, place a small nail in the head, insert hook in the middle pushing it out the other side then simply insert the hook tip near the tail. This still gives you plenty of action and also places you in the position to hook up with these short bites.

April Texas Gas Production Up Compared To 1990

duction total was 457,250,107 Mcf.

The state's top producing counties, rank ordered by preliminary April production, were: Pecos, 27,194,752 Mcf; Zapata, 23,452,785 Mcf; Webb, 22,955,792 Mcf; Panola, 16,548,020 Mcf; Hidalgo, 15,824,369 Mcf; Crane, 11,902,695 Mcf; Hemphill, 9,168,018 Mcf; Yoakum, 8,729,870 Mcf; Crockett, 8,549,469 Mcf; and Ector, 8,322,559 Mcf.

Texas gas production in April came from 187,701 oil wells and 46,427 gas wells.

Alpha-interferon, one of the earliest biotechnical marvels, has received approval from the Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of widely prevalent hepatitis C. Brand name is Intron A.

People who walk at least 2 1/2 hours a week are less likely to have high cholesterol than those who don't, studies found at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah.

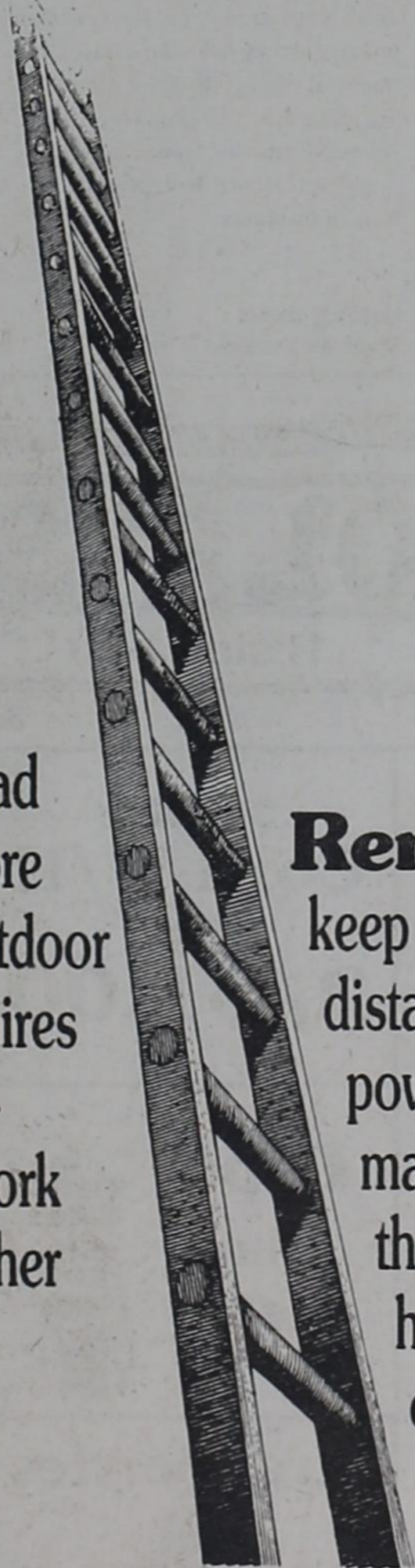

We want to thank Alma King for the chips, dips, and cookies she had set up Thursday. We do appreciate all you do for the club Mom.

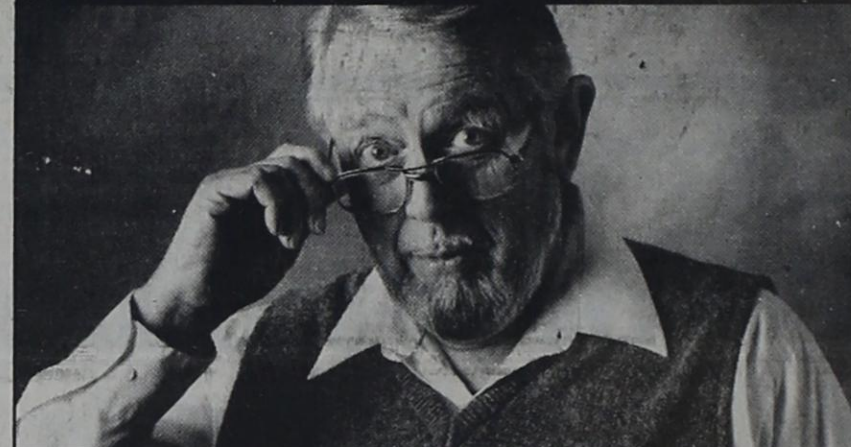
This week we'll have the regular 9 hole Thursday scramble. Tee off will be at 6 p.m. You don't have to be a member to play. Come on out and join us.
