(3) Government deficit spending has created a heavy weight of debt upon the economy which has caused prices to spiral. Government borrowing from banks to finance the deficits has been a big factor in inflationary trends,

### STATE SOMETIMES "INHERITS" PROPERTY

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "secheat", to the State.

Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate.

And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirey in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement. What happens to property



## Other Disability Pay No Longer Bar To SS Benefits

Disabled workers who have not applied for social security disability benefits because they are receving disability payments from another Federal agency, or under a State Workmen's Compensation program, should get in touch with their local social security office without

According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abilene social security district office, many such workers can now get social security disability benefits. Moreover, benefits can go back as far as August, 1958, if an application is filed before Sept\_ ember 1, 1959.

Under the law in effect prior to August 1958, a worker's social security disability payment was reduced by the amount of any other disability benefit he received under a State Workmen's Compensation program, or from another Federal a\_ gency. In a number of cases, this meant that no social security disability payment could be made. As a result, many workers who would not have bene\_ fit by the "disability freeze" did not file a claim. These workers should check with their 10cal social security office not later than August 31, 1959, Tuley emphasized.
