Norman Claborn, Executive Director of the Rising Star Housing Authority has announced that plans are being finalized for the construction of a 12 unit rural Rental housing Project for senior citizens in the Rising Star area.

The property is located on the south one-half block on the corner of North Main and mills Street, (across from the old Exxon station). A pre-application was submitted to the Farmers Home Administration on sept. 20, 1979 for the loan approval. This includes the price of the property and the cost of the construction of 12 units which will be one story duplex units each having one bedroom. The total amount requested on the loan is \$228,000.00

Individuals presently living in the number 1 section of the Housing project (a total of 4) will move into the new units and these old

units will in turn be used for low income rental projects since they are 2 and 3 bedroom units.

The requested housing will be an asset to the city of Rising Star and will provide safe and decent housing which is badly needed by our citizens. The site selected is close to the business district, churches, schools and shopping are all within a few blocks of the site. It is also near a city park.

The proposed length of the project is nine months.

Ralph Kizer is the chairman of the Rising Star Housing Authority.

Also serving on the Board are Bill Dennard--Vice-Chairman, and members Art Fisher, A.P. Smith and Dick Williams.

As further information is received on the project, this will be printed in The Rising Star.

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Record Jump Is Cold

WE could see the beaches of sunny South Carolina and the sky above was teal blue. The temperature outside was 78 degrees below zero.

Those were the observations of Staff Sgt. Gary Cain as he and five other Green

Berets exited the door of an Air Force Starlifter, seven miles above Fort Bragg.

What is it like at 37,280 feet? The unanimous response from the jump team, all members of the Institute for Military Assistance, was COLD. The reason for the high altitude mission was to evaluate a new oxygen system which supplies air to the HALO (High Altitude Exit-Low Altitude Opening) jumpers when they operate at altitudes above 10,500 feet.

When the six man team exited their aircraft at 37,280 feet, they didn't realize they were about to set a record which will be hard to top.

First the freefall team set a new altitude exit record from C-141 aircraft after descending 6000 feet at speeds up to 140 mph. Cain, Durham, Gladney, and Fravarp formed a four man contact formation setting a North Carolina altitude link up record at 10,000 feet the four men separated and the total freefall time was three minutes and ten seconds.

Those HALO jumpers do not use standard military chutes. Their Stratocloud chutes have a staged deployment system and the opening shock is not much greater than that experienced by a paratrooper jumping a static line.

Sgt. Cain believes the higher the altitude,

the safer the jump. The team have more than 4,250 free fall parachute jumps.

Sgt. Cain is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Cain of Rising Star.

Public Opinion Poll Results Announced

Residents of the 17th Congressional District sent Congress Charles Stenholm a strong message recently: Give us less government and less Federal spending.

That's the basic opinion expressed in the majority of the 11,000-plus responses Stenholm received from a recent opinion poll conducted.

which would automatically terminate all federal agencies at 10 year intervals unless specifically reauthorized by Congress," Stenholm said. "One of the first pieces of legislation that I drafted after coming to Washington was H.R. 1739 which would accomplish this objective."

The sunset legislation issue received the most support—87 percent of the respondents agreeing—of the issues raised in the question-

naire. Only 6.7 percent of those replying disagreed with the proposal, while 6.3 percent remained undecided.

The question "Do you support legislation setting up a comprehensive national health insurance program to be funded by the Federal Government?" received the most opposition of questionnaire. Only 6.7 percent of those replying disagreed with the proposal, while 6.3 percent remained undecided.

The question "Do you support legislation setting up a comprehensive national health insurance program to be funded by the federal government?" received the most opposition of questionnaire items. A total of 70.3 percent of the respondents opposed the program, compared to 20.1 percent in favor and 9.6 percent undecided.

"I only wish I could

get that message across to those who are peddling the national Health Insurance program on the Hill," Stenholm said, "but they seem to have turned deaf ears to the fact that the people of this country don't want socialized health-care, just as they don't want any new federal spending programs."

The majority of questionnaire respondents, in fact, favor drastic cuts in government spending, even though some programs considered desirable or necessary would be curtailed.

In addition, almost 80 percent expressed support for a constitutional amendment which would require a balanced Federal budget.

The issue most closely divided involved spending, in the form of Federal revenue sharing payments. Respondents almost split down the middle on the revenue sharing, with 43.3 percent opposed. But on the same question, directed toward payments sent to local governments, the tide turned in opposition of continued payments, with 44.1 percent against and 41.8 percent in favor of continuation.

"This seemed a little contradictory to me," Stenholm said, "since

it is the states that have been built up such reserves in unused revenue payments during the past few years, while many local governments have gone begging."

replies were also divided on a return to a selective service system, Stenholm pointed out, with 31.1 percent in favor of institution of registration and classification of eligible men; 27.4 percent favoring registration and classification of both men and women; 5.2 percent favoring limited conscription into the reserve forces manpower pool, 16.3 percent favoring peacetime draft; and a surprising 20 percent advocating the establishment of a national service system to require service of ALL young people in the military or alternatively in hospitals, community service projects, etc.

Forty-five percent of the respondents thought the Strategic Arms Limitation Agreement (SALT II) should contain more protection for the U.S. and 16.2 percent strongly opposed SALT II altogether.

Regulatory agencies caught the axe as the area chosen for the largest spending reductions in government, followed closely

by social services and welfare and international affairs.

The group gave their approval to the development of alternate energy sources as the best method to address the energy problem, followed by decontrol of oil and gas pricing and voluntary conservation methods.

Respondents also split the illegal alein issue, with the majority (64 percent) favoring a work visa program providing for the issuance of non-immigrant visas to certain individual aleins to perform temporary labor contracts and safeguards. The majority, however, also supported civil penalties on employers who knowingly hire illegal aleins.

Changes in the social security system were also a divided issue, but the majority chose to see the program unchanged.

Nuclear energy and gasohol got the nod from those replying, as the majority said they would favor continued nuclear power development and would be willing to pay more for gasohol to curb imports of foreign oil.

Other issues receiving a bare majority were approval of mandatory wage and price controls if the voluntary program proves ineffective, and of granting a tuition tax credit to parents of children attending college.

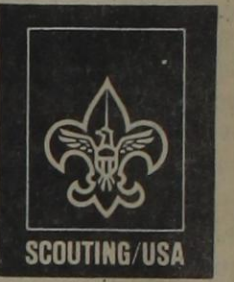

The 20th annual Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children grossed \$180,050.19 for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center Monday to set a record for the annual cattle sale.

Of this, \$136,502.45 came from the sale of cattle eartagged for the auction, while 143,547.74 was generated directly from donations.

Jim Alexander of Abilene, general chairman of the CRCC, expresses great satisfaction in the record sale which represented both the largest cattle and cash amounts ever for the annual cattle sale. The cattle sale always represents the first, and the largest phase of the CRCC, which also includes a horse sale, sheep and goat sale and special sale at later dates.

Alexander was also optimistic that additional cattle will be sold during the future Rehab sales in coming weeks. Alexander said there are still cattle to be picked up from throughout the state which means this

year's Round-up "was certainly a success."

One reason for the big total this year was increased participation by Texas cattle feed lots.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Willard Vinson of Abilene donated a pen of five fed heifers, purchased by Mr. and Mrs. R.W. McDonald for \$1.50 a pound, the highest priced beef in the nation on Monday.

A pen of heavy fed steers was donated by Abilene Cattle Feeders which sold for \$1.05 a pound.

Cal-Tex Feed Yard at Trent donated six head of heavy fed calves to the sale. Jane Rhodes of Abilene also donated four head of fed beef.

Other fed cattle from Pre-Feeders, Summerfield; Reeves Company Feeders, Pecos; Balmorhea Feeders, Verhalen; and Palmer County Cattle Feeders, Bovina.

The largest entourage of cattle came from Shackelford County—59 head marked for the Rehab Center, along with \$7,765 in cash donations from Shackelford County ranchers.

Erath County sent 33 head including four pigs, one pony, two turkeys, five chickens, and one sheep.

Twenty bushels of Caddo wheat seed also went for sale.

Three Longhorn crossbred calves were given in the memory of Authur Lance Sears, a Sweetwater rancher-businessman who died Saturday when thrown from a horse on his ranch at Alpine, by Matt Matthews of Albany. The Longhorn crosses brought \$1,050.

Matthews got top bid of \$200 on the 136-pound blue-ribbon watermelon of the West Texas Fair, grown by R.T. Ezzell of Rising Star.

A pair of hand-made James Leddy ostrich boots brought \$3,000. Jerry Morris of Abilene, son of the late Charlie Morris, chairman of the CRCC for many years, bought the boots.

Mrs. Gordon Banks of Goldthwaite donated a beautiful, old fashioned dress for a little girl, which a rancher bought for his daughter for \$350.

Dozens of rope

horses collectively brought more than \$4,000, and some were sold several times. Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Hailey of Stephenville made and donated the rope horses.

A rooster generated \$1,125 for the Rehab Center after being sold and re-sold eight times.

And so it went.

It was a nice day full of sunshine, according to the weather service, and for the handicapped of the Southwest who receive vital rehabilitation services of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Monday was a beautiful day.

Shelley V. Smith, Rehab Center executive director, expressed deep gratitude to all who played a part of the sale's super success.

Meanwhile, the second phase of the Cattlemen's Round-up for Crippled Children will be the annual horse sale, Saturday, October 6, also at Abilene Livestock Auction.

Other sales include sheep and goat sale October 15 at Junction and special sale Oct. 17 at Coleman.

Disability Insurance

Thursday, October 4, 1979

"Many people are unaware of the work requirements for entitlement to social security benefits for disabled workers and their families, or, of the events which cause the benefits to stop," according to Glyn Hammons, district manager of the Abilene social security office. "Since the benefits are designed to help replace earnings because of disability, there must have been specific amounts of work during specific periods of time in order for the work requirement to be met," he stated.

"Basically, a worker over the age of 30 needs to have worked 25 per-cent of the time elapsed from 1950 or, if later, the year he or she attained age 21, to the onset of the

disability. Also, five years of the work must have been within the 10 years immediately preceding the disability. Workers under age 30 need less work to qualify since they have not had the opportunity to work as long as older workers.

Monthly benefits for a worker disabled in 1979 range from about \$134.10 to \$549.40, depending mainly on the past earnings. Payments can also be paid to certain members of the family. Medicare coverage to help pay doctor and hospital bills is extended to the worker who has received disability checks for 24 consecutive months," he added.

Hammons went on to emphasize that these benefits do not necessarily continue indefinitely once

started. "They are only payable as long as the worker remains too disabled to do any kind of substantial gainful work. Any medical improvement or return to work must be reported to social security," he warned, "as failure to do so could result in an overpayment to the worker and his family which would have to be repaid."

"A return to work does not cause the benefits to stop immediately in all cases. Depending on the medical condition, some disabled workers are allowed to work nine months as a trial work period to see if they are able to re-enter the work force. If the individual is still working at a substantial rate of pay at the end of the nine months, his benefits from social

security will be terminated three months later. If the work has stopped or is not substantial because of the disabling condition, the benefits will continue until such time as the work and pay of the individual reach the level considered substantial.

People now receiving benefits from social security should make themselves aware of the events to report," he stressed. "The representatives at any social security office will be happy to provide the required information and supply free booklets that explain the reporting requirements.
